Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT\&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agree o pay refunds to those WaTS $/ 800$ customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of $\$ 4.53$ to $\$ 5.95$ per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied.
