County Extension Agent - Agriculture The boll weevil has become a main cotton production limiting factor ter and extremely high numbers of overwintering boll weevils surviving three to four insecticidal applications will probably be needed to control overwintering boll weevils this year.
In years when there has been a higher level of overwintering mortality, one or two insecticidal applications have been adequate. With the emphasis on quality cotton in recent years, cotton varieties that are less determinate are
being used. This provides a higher level of square production during the entire growing season and requires a higher level of pest management. Cultural management of the boll eevil and other coton pests is a bament system. Cotton variety selection, planting date and rate of planting can e used to reduce pest damage and pest control expenses. In fields where
boll weevils are a problem a cotton oll weevils are a problem a cotton
variety that will be susceptible to boll weevil damage for a shorter period can be used.
