Cyclone Type Winds Hit Motley County

Almost without warning, late Monday, powerful winds salmed into Motley County, knocking down trees, damaging property, breaking power lines and spawning at least two funnel clouds.

Members of the Floyd County 4-H camp at the Springs Ranch near Roaring Springs were sent to shelter at about 8 p.m. when a funnel roared over the recreation site. The roof of a storage building at Lee's Feed and Seed in Roaring Springs was torn off and power lines were reported down in several locations around the county.

Trees were uprooted at different locations in Matador following what appeared to be a wall of

dust rolling in from the west at about 7:30. But hidden in the dust was a junior size twister.

The storm first appeared as a heavy thunderstorm in the west at about 6 p.m. It seemed to skirt the county, leaving only gentle sprinkles. Then from the northwest the rising dust clouds and tumbling darkness indicated Motley County might be in for a thrashing.

Volunteer firemen went out to set up

weather watch posts but already the dust was spinning upward to meet the churning clouds at the western outskirts of Matador.

Local weather watchers observed a funnel cloud east of Matador, but it apparently never touched the ground.

Wind was estimated blowing between 60 and 70 m.p.h.

Heaviest damage was broken limbs, and on some, such as at Pete Williams, Ward Rattan

and Ray Webb residences, could be seen where the twisting force of the wind had yanked the trees up by the roots.

It all lasted less than an hour and as the huge thunderheads moved southeast away from the county, residents witnessed one of the most spectacular views ever of the sky. As the sun sank under the clouds in the west, the entire sky turned orange and a full rainbow glowed in the east against the smooth back of the storm.

Fire Destroys Truck, Equipment

A flash fire early Wednesday destroyed a semi-truck rig in Roaring Springs as its crew of four men were sand blasting and relining the city's water tower.

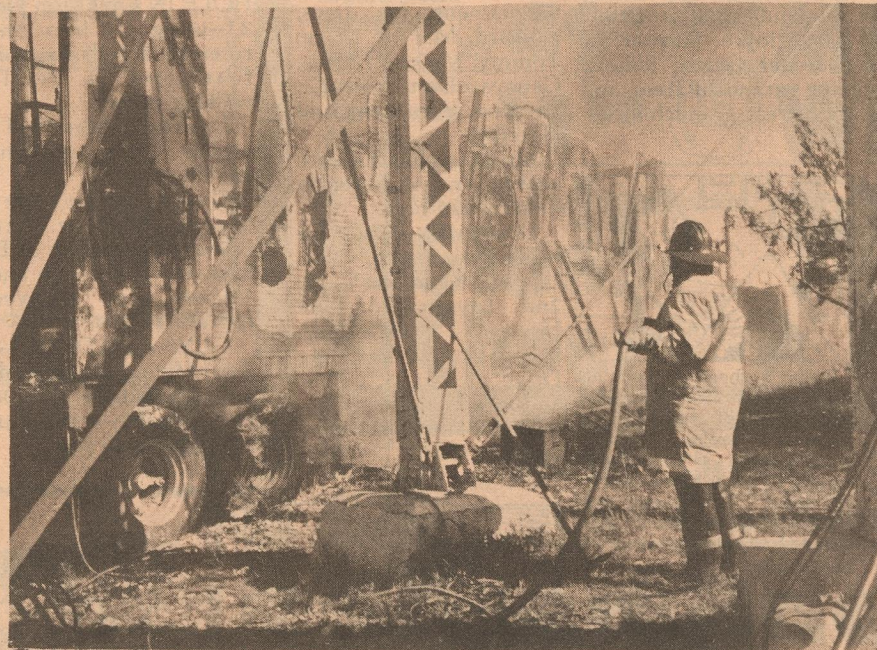
The crew, employees of Steel Tank Services Company of San Angelo, were almost finished with their week long job of relining the tower with fiber glass when they noticed the top of the van was on fire. Within minutes the blaze had spread through the equipment inside the trailer and flames were shooting out of melted places in the rigs side.

Inside the rig, which was parked beneath the water tower, employees

said power tools, welders, pressure pumps, drills, torches, compressors, and several household appliances were all completely lost, including almost \$2,000 of the crew's savings.

Estimated loss of equipment alone was placed at \$60,000.

"We don't know what happened," one employee said. "We were finishing up the last of the inside work when we noticed the top of the rig on fire. The money we had in there was our savings to get home on. Now we're broke." When asked if he had any idea how the fire started the employee stated, "I don't know. I guess skylab fell on it."

MEADOR, MOORE EARN A&M HONORS

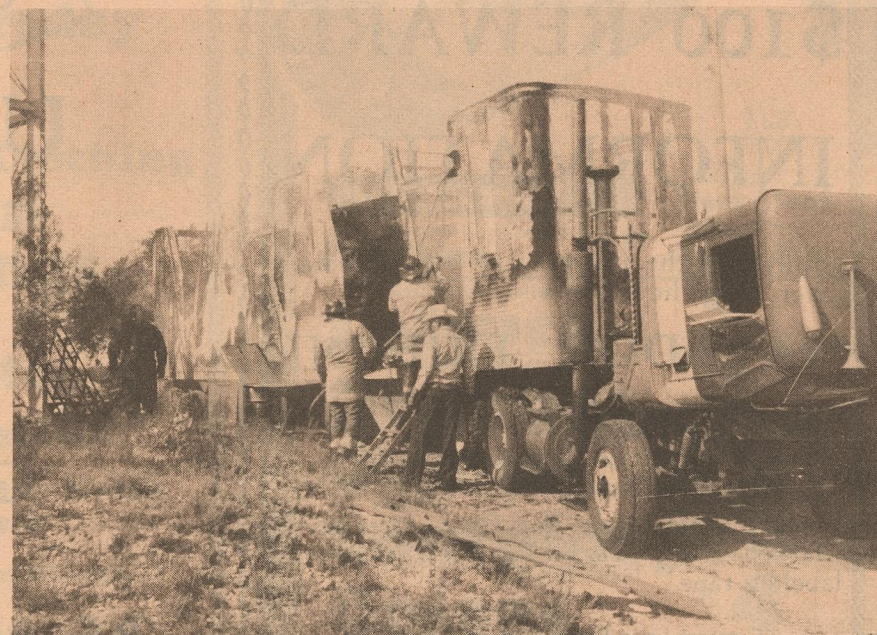
Two students from Matador have earned "Distinguished Student" ranking at Texas A&M University.

July 16 Final Date For To Certify Acreage

July 16, is the final date to certify your total farm acreage for the 1979 crop year. This includes cotton, grain sorghum, set-aside, guar, hay-grazer, etc. An accurate certification is needed from every producer on every farm that he works whether it has an NCA crop planted on it or not. Failure to certify all farms that you have an interest in makes you ineligible to participate on all farms.

LATE FILED REPORTS??? -- Almost an impossibility. The county committee has no latitude for accepting any late filed acreage reports except in rare cases where lateness was absolutely caused by

measures beyond the control of the operator.

FOR CLARIFICATION--Some have had in mind that the acreage intentions they filed back prior to April 30 constituted their acreage report. This is not the way it is. An acreage certification has to be filed. Also, anyone who may have filed a disaster claim already on cotton or some other crop had to certify that crop at the time of filing the disaster claim. However, many did not give a full acreage report, so this needs to be done by July 16.

ACCURACY of the acreage report is extremely important and the reports must be broken down on a field by

field basis. Failure to accurately report will result either in a severe penalty or complete elimination for eligibility for program benefits.

I know these constant reminders of this July 16 deadline is boring to you, but we have so many still uncertified the situation warrants another notice. Also if you timely requested measuring service, you will be notified when to report your acreages to this office.

AGAIN! DON'T LET JULY 16 GET BY YOU IF YOU HAVEN'T ALREADY TAKEN CARE OF THIS IMPORTANT ITEM.

Who Was Joseph McCarthy?

People asked, will say, "Why he was radical." "He was the nearest thing to a fascist, we've ever had as a U.S. Senator." But was he?

Though he exposed and accused many in our government of being communists in the 1950's in a reckless manner, he was on course in accuracy about 90%. He became dangerous to those in high places who were guilty of treasonable acts, so they thrust him through with a barrage of smears that assassinated his personality with the same techniques they charged him with using: lies, fascism, smear tactics, extremism and so on.

The main charge against him was "McCarthyism." They claimed this was dangerous to our freedom. That it created mistrust in our government. What it really was, was dangerous to American communists, not Americans. He was exposing their subversion and takeover of the reins.

The danger of today is not McCarthyism, but reversed McCarthyism, which is the assumption that communists are not dangerous, even if they are in our government. If this is so, what happens to countries they are taking over now? Wholesale slaughter and enslavement.

Yes, we still have the enemy within. For example the ADA, Americans for "Democratic" Action, called Sunday for Edward Kennedy to run for president. In 1962, under vice-chairman, Arthur Schlesinger, Jr., they sought to repeal the anti-communist Smith Act (now repealed), recognition of Red China (done), repeal the loyalty oath (done), condemn the FBI (done), repeal the House Un-American Activities Committee (done), George Schlesinger was an admitted communist. Today we have him as Secretary of Energy.

McCarthy quoted Lincoln of the impending Red menace, "From whence then will danger come? If this nation is to be destroyed, it will be destroyed from within, if it is not destroyed from within, it will live for all

time to come." He himself in one of his last public speeches said, "If I succeed at nothing else during the rest of my life, I would like to impress upon you, my fellow Americans, the immense and awesome power of the communist party in this country."

He was quoted of the "vast conspiracy" and "communist infiltration."

He was accused of seeking power in his aggressions against his accusers, but he only sought to warn. He should be vindicated publicly today by the U.S. Senate that conspired him June 7, 1952.

If we would have listened to him telling us who was causing China to fall Communist in 1948, we would have had no Korean War in 1950.

If his warnings of the grave today would be heard, we would not allow the fall of Panama, Free China, Nicaragua or any other country, especially in our hemisphere; for what will be the future result? Doom! Look at what the fall of Iran has brought upon us and to Russia.

Gen. Bradley said we fought the wrong enemy in the wrong war.

McCarthy quoted from the "Rise and Fall of the Roman Empire", "There have been many examples in history of rich and powerful states which have been corrupted from within, enfeebled and deceived until they were unable to resist aggression."

As yesteryear but applicable to today's "Panama Canal" he said, "What does this whole world of sordid transactions teach us about the good faith of the advisers of Roosevelt and the assorted liberals, communists, sympathizers and agents of the Kremlin...who have for so long been insincerely befuddling people with talk of imperialism and people's rights in Asia?" and "...surrender of all China to Russia without the firing of a single shot."

Finally, he said, "This war will not end except by either victory or death of this civilization." This vindicates Joe of all! The man, the patriot.

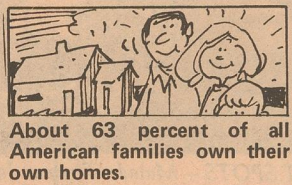

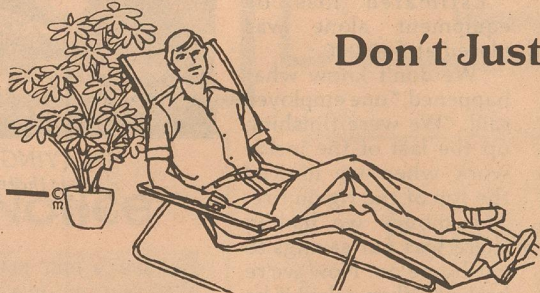

Insect Training School Announced

A meeting will be held in Motley County School, Matador, Wednesday July 18th, starting at 2:30 p.m. to provide information for cotton farmers and insect scouts on the proper way to check fields and determine if controls should be applied. Emory Boring, Area Extension Entomologist from Vernon will present the information.

There is a proper way to check fields to determine if insect infestation is heavy enough to justify applying control measures. Timing of application is also critical, because if the application is too late, few insects will be controlled and the damage will have been done. If the application is too early, the insecticide neutralizes itself before the insects are present to come in contact with it. Be sure to use only recommended insecticides, apply at the rate given on the label, and follow other precautions given on the label.

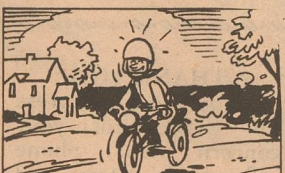
Farmers Must File For Priority Gas

Farmers who purchase interstate natural gas for agricultural purposes will not be eligible for priority use requirements unless they file a request with their local distributors by July 15, Texas Attorney General Mark White said Monday.

White said many High Plains farmers may not be aware that they need to request Priority 2 treatment by that date. The Priority 2 classification entitles all essential agricultural users of natural gas purchased from interstate pipelines to 100 per cent of their current requirements.

The new classification system is part of a natural gas curtailment plan adopted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The plan is scheduled to go into effect November 1.

White said that after users file their requests with their local distributors, the requests will be reviewed and forwarded to their interstate pipeline suppliers by July 30.

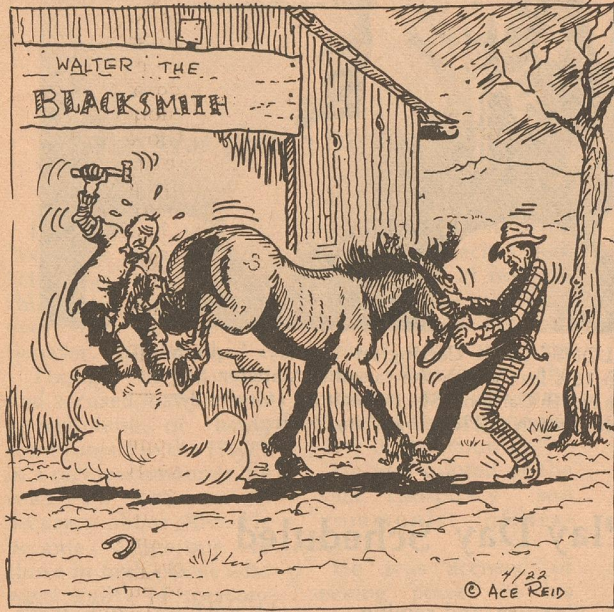
