WASHINGTON, Oct. 23. (AP) - Three Hollywood stars told Congress members today that Communists are active in the film capital, but accomplish little except to create disturbances. Actor Robert Montgomery called

Actor George Murphy had much the same story for the House committee on un-American activities, now in its fourth day of hearings on communism in Hollywood.

He estimated "less than one percent" of the Screen Actors Guild are communists, but they cause constant irritation."





"It is wholly out of accord with the decencies of constitutional usage that suddenly, without cause or provocation and without discussion, let alone consent, a single party should by virtue of its majority seek to diminish the remaining powers of the upper house for the purely cynical purpose of easing the passage of a single controversial measure," the Times said.

Its reference was to the gov ernment's announced intention carrying out its election pledge to nationalize the iron and steel industry before 1950. A proposal to nationalize the gas industry was presented to Parliament yesterday, but iron and steel national ization was not mentioned in the message by the King. Some laborites believe the Lords would use their powers to delay steel and iron nationalization.

VA regulations require administration of the programs on an allowance not to exceed five per cent of the instructors' salaries. Veterans are required, they were informed, to make proportionate restitution to the government when total income exceeds \$2,400 per annum, or \$1,320 net. 

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



Margin Goes Into Wrong Pockets

Prices on wheat have been ascending to the dizzy heights in recent weeks, lately hopping above the \$3 mark.

Contributing factors to this rise include heavy domestic demands, a short corn crop, buying for export under the European aid plan, unfavorable conditions for the 1948 crop. Rooted in all of these is still another factor-speculation.

It is noteworthy that prices were firm at the outset of this year's bumper harvest. broke somewhat as the deluge of grain became apparent. Once the harvest was complete, however, the trend was stronger. Since most producers sell their crop either before or at the time of harvest, most of the increase in the past two or three months has been marked up to trader prof-

Worse than this, the amount of trading on the board is several times the total amount of the crop, indicating that there has been no little speculating beyond the limits of conventional hedging and strad-

Where do we come in? Well, we come in the cost for a 30 per cent plus increase in the cost of a basic commodity. It makes no difference if we buy it for our table or whether we ship it off to relieve starvation at other points on the globe, we pay the increase. It is extremely regrettable because that 30 per cent is not going into the pockets of those who toiled to produce the grain-except in minor instance—but into the pockets of those who hoard or gamble.

Outlawing Reds Is Hard Job

WASHINGTON, UB- "Outlaw could be done. They all pointed the communist party," says the witness. "That's how to get rid of communism in this country.' All around the big hearing room people-but not all the

people-nod their heads yes. yes. For two days it's been like that at the un-American activities committee hearing on whether there's communist influence in Hollywood.

One witness after another has climbed up on the stand, talked about communism, and then said: "Outlaw the party."

It's easier to talk of outlawing the party than it is to do it. Outlaw it how?

Seeking a definite answer to that question, this writer called a number of lawyers here and in New York, lawyers inside and outside the government. They are men who are specialists in civil rights and liberties. Bunched together, their answer

was: "That's a \$64 question." They didn't agree on how it out that the Supreme Court

The answers of these lawyers, some of whom admitted they are puzzled about the whole business of outlawing the communist party, are given here:

1. Congress might try to pass a law not only banning the party but making membership in it a

2. The individual states might try to crush the party by outlawing it and making membership in it a crime.

The states might claim they had a constitutional right to decide what political parties can operate in their territory. 3. Or the states might try to

do it this way: By forbidding on election ballots unless it had previously won, say, 50,000 votes in a past election. (The communist party has

never won 50,000 votes in any state. Total membership in the might throw out a 'law banning party is probably not more than 100,000 although many more peothe party. ple than that, in sympathy with communists, might vote for their candidates.)

> But then this would certainly follow: The communists, outlawed by the state or federal governments, would certainly fight through the

courts up to the Supreme Court. And the high court might decide that trying to outlaw a political party is unconstitutional and can't be done in this coun-

Even so, where the communist party was outlawed by name, the communists could easily adopt some other name and carry on their work, fighting through the courts any attempt to interfere with them.

One thing to remember is this: The Constitution guarantees the right of free speech.

Pressure Put On House Of Lords

England's first socialist House house. of Commons, finding itself threatened with obstruction at the hands of the House of Lords in carrying out the nationalization program, has decided to put a further curb on the legislative power of the conservative upper body of Parliament.

. That curb will fairly well reduce the Lords to the status of a debating society-a very distinguished organization, to be sure, but virtually impotent insofar as interference with Commons is concerned.

For close to 600 years the House of Lords functioned as a bereditary institution, amidst all the power and glory of ermine and crimson. The Lords exercised great authority until one day in 1909 they rejected the national budget which had been passed by the House of Comnons. Liberal Prime Minister Herbert Asquith rose up in wrath and led a terrific fight against the power of the Lords.

It was one of the greatest political battles of English history. The upshot of it was that in 1911 Asquith secured the passage of a bill in Commons to deprive the House of Lords of its veto power. Then he jamraed this down the throats of the Lords by threatening to have the King create mough liberal Peers to outvote the conservatives in the upper

The Lords accepted the bill because there was nothing else for them to do, since the Monarch would have had to create the liberal Peers if the Prime Minister requested it. Later the Lords were further crippled by an act under which the Commons can override any action in Lords voting it down in three successive sessions of Parliament.

However, three sessions of Parliament cover two years, which the socialists feel is too great a delay if they encounter obstruction by the Lords. The real point at issue is nationalization of the iron and steel industry. This was one of the items on the socialist platform when they were elected to power a little over two years ago. Because of the economic crisis the socialists want to delay this nationalization for perhaps another year, so not to interfere with the

present industrial set-up. So Prime Minister Attlee's regime has decided to put another crimp in the prerogatives of the upper house. It is said that a bill be introduced to cut down the length of time that the Lords can delay passage of a bill, reducing the time to perhaps six

Passage of such a bill can be secured-if necessary-by the same method employed a generation ago by Asquith. The upper house could be packed with socialist peers created from the ranks of labor. It would be a hardy House of Lords which would try to buck such a line as

Poultry-less Thursday Mix-Up

WASHINGTON. -Trouble over poultryless Thursday might have been avoided had the White House let one hand know what the other hand was doing. On the Sunday afternoon President Truman made his food-saving appeal to the nation, Secretary of Agriculture Antierson sat outside the door of Press Secretary Ross, waiting to get a chance to see the boss's speech. But the chance never came. Poultryless Thursday was announced without benefit of advice from U. S. agricultural experts who had been studying her majesty the hen for weeks, were convinced that more chicken should be eaten, rather than less. . . Biggest food problem still remains grain fed on the farm. It's disappearing at an alarming rate.

Ambassadorial report: Three top ambassadors reported to the President last week that there would be no war with Russia, though a serious incident in Germany where U. S. - Russian troops are cheek-and-jowl could start almost anything. . . The ambassadors were: Lou Douglas from London; Walter Bedell Smith from Moscow; Bob Murphy from Germany. . . all three urged a special session of Congress. Truman countered that congressmen couldn't be back from European trips before December 1, and not much could be accomplished during the Christmas holidays. France is willing to cash in her hidden assets in the USA, provided Secretary Snyder will tell France where they are. But Snyder won't tell. . . before the war, the treasury department surveyed all foreign holdings in this country. U. S. banks turned the information over to the treasury, asking that the names of French stock and bond holders be kept confidential. That's why Snyder won't tell the French government where Frenchmen are hiding their money. . . Most significant talk newspaper editors had in Washington last week was an off-the-record conference with George Kennan, General Marshall's chief Russian policy maker. Here are the highlights: Russia's tough talk is nothing new. It's been going on for 160 years, under both Czars and the Soviets. 
