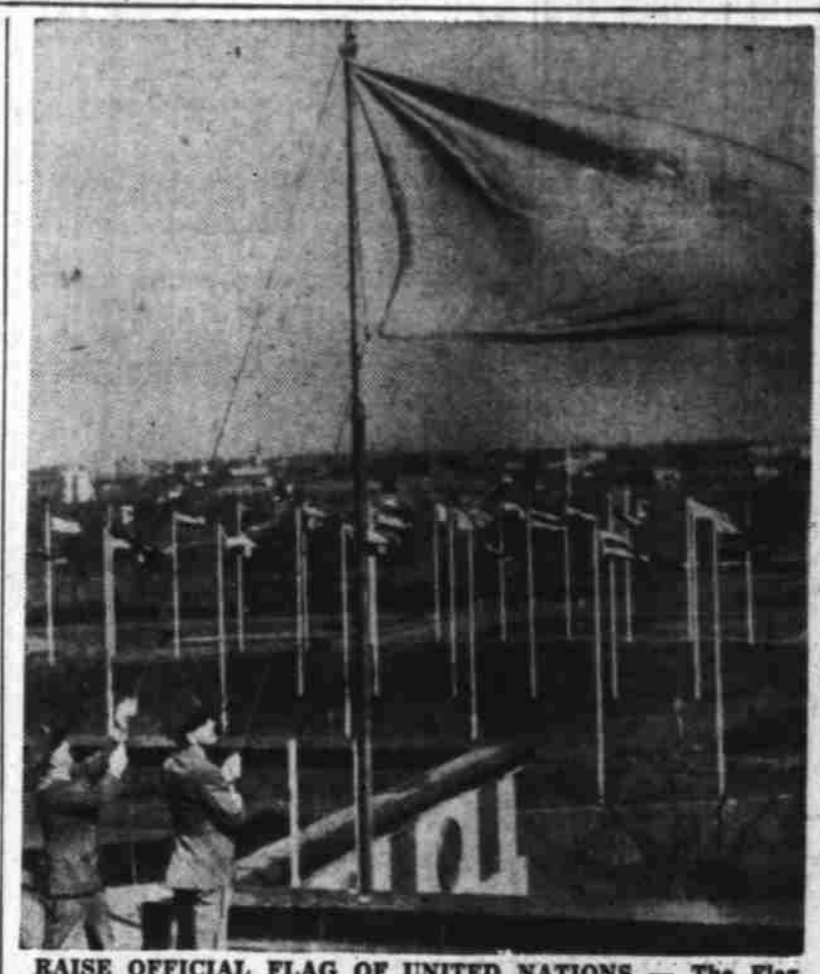

LABOR PROPOSAL

British Press Hits Limiting Of Lords

LONDON, Oct. 23. (U.S.)—The Labor government's proposal to trim the House of Lords got an almost unanimous pasting yesterday from the British press.

Only the socialist Daily Herald voiced lukewarm approval for the little-remaining authority of the measure proposed at the opening of Parliament Tuesday, a proposal described by the Marquess of Salisbury as a "shabby and shoddy political deal" and by Winston Churchill as a "deliberate act of socialist aggression" that would "divide the country."

An all-out floor fight over the proposal seemed definitely in the cards and some political circles predicted a new general election would result.

Prime Minister Attlee announced in the course of preliminary debate on the proposal yesterday that the government's intention was to limit the power of the

hereditary House of Lords to delay enactment of legislation from two years to one year.

The Lords have no final power to defeat legislation, but can refuse to enact it and thus require the House of Commons to pass it three times, a two-year process under present laws.

"It is wholly out of accord with the decencies of constitutional usage that suddenly, without cause or provocation and without discussion, let alone consent, a single party should by virtue of its majority seek to diminish the remaining powers of the upper house for the purely cynical purpose of easing the passage of a single controversial measure," the Times said.

Its reference was to the government's announced intention of carrying out its election pledge to nationalize the iron and steel industry before 1950. A proposal to nationalize the gas industry was presented to Parliament yesterday, but iron and steel nationalization was not mentioned in the message by the King. Some laborites believe the Lords would use their powers to delay steel and iron nationalization.

REPORT SHOWS

Downward Trend Noted Here In Juvenile Delinquency

Lack of consistency in all realms, except the pay-off is noted in the report from J. B. Bruton, county juvenile officer, covering three years of activity for the office.

While there is no fixed pattern as to times or seasons of peak complaints, or even the age groups involved, there is nevertheless an encouraging trend in reduction of totals.

During the first year of operation, ending with September of

1945, the number of calls handled by Bruton was 1,012. This dropped off sharply the second year and in the year just ended, the call total had declined to 639, or a drop of 37 per cent from the outset.

At the same time number of arrests tumbled from 122 in the first year to 73 the third year, a decrease of 41 per cent.

Cumulative total for the three years is 2,330 against 297 arrests. Out of the total arrests, only 43 were even comparatively regular school attenders. The church and Sunday school totals were even lower.

report shows that boys, far more than girls, constitute the delinquent problem, for in three years there were 236 boys picked up, 50 girls.

Youngsters coming before Bruton for action totalled 18 in three years below 10 years of age. There were 18 boys and one girl 10 years of age; 20 boys and no girls in the 11-year old group; 22 boys and three girls in the 12-year bracket; 20 boys and six girls 13 years of age.

Out of all those picked up, only 61 were judged actually delinquent in the three-year period, and 14 of these could not be corrected satisfactorily at home. Three had to be sent to the state school of training for a second time.

Over-all totals show conclusively that the most dangerous ages for delinquency is between 14 and 16, half of the total lying in that group. It is equally hazardous for both boys and girls. Incidentally, the

But at the age 14 things pick up with 37 boys and nine girls. At age 15 there were 31 boys and 15 girls, and age 16 a total of 74 boys and 10 girls. Boys over 17 (some 17 were turned over to regular law enforcement agencies) are not regarded as juveniles, but girls of that age are, and six in this group were called before the juvenile officer.

Statistics by no means tell the story, but although there are pronounced fluctuations in months and seasons without rhyme or reason, the most encouraging conclusion to be drawn from the report is a steadily downward trend.

Importance Of Conservation Is Stressed

With the number of people in the world already exceeding limits which can be adequately supported by existing cultivated acreage, soil conservation becomes an increasingly important matter. E. J. Hughes, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, told the Lions club Wednesday.

Called upon not only to furnish own requirements but to export food and fiber to other nations, emphasis on conservation in the U. S. is increased, especially in light of retirement of half a million acres per year through erosion and other causes, he said.

Significant strides have been made in conservation of the soil, he said, for in Texas the 133 organized districts include 140 million of the 170,000 acres available. Problem is to "treat each acre of each farm and ranch according to the needs of that particular acre," according to Hughes. "It is the

job of putting soil conservation on to the land through engineering, biological and social sciences. . . . Ultimately it concerns and must have the support of all the people."

Conservation plans have been developed and applied on approximately 1,837,000 acres in the Martin-Howard district, leaving much yet to be done in this field, plus the ever present task of maintenance, Hughes explained.

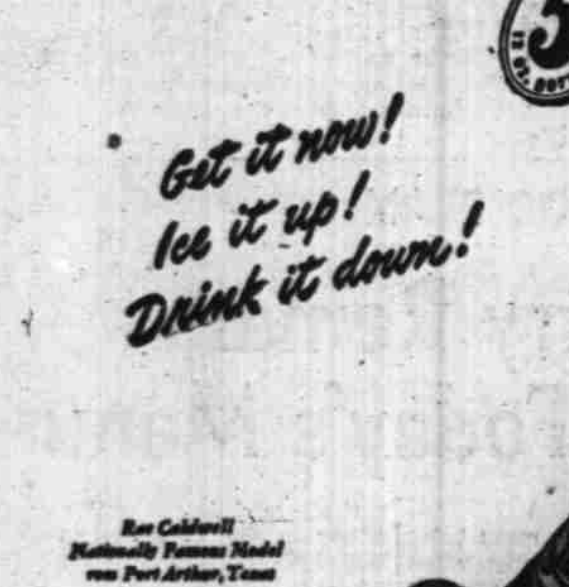

End Nears On ITU Hearing

BALTIMORE, Oct. 23.—Indications are the National Labor Relations Board trial examiner's hearing on an NLRB complaint the International Typographical Union and its Baltimore local violated the Taft-Hartley Act by failing to bargain collectively with Baltimore print shops will be completed tomorrow.

The case is the first of its type under the Taft-Hartley Act, which amended the labor law to make unions—as well as employees—liable to prosecution for "unfair labor practices."

At yesterday's session—the seventh—developments included:

1—A disclosure by Woodruff Randolph, president of the ITU, that sample contracts providing for an "all union" shop had been sent to 807 locals as a substitute for the union's traditional closed shop, banned by the new labor law. Randolph said the sample contracts were an answer to what he termed "union busting tactics" of newspaper publishers and print shops.

2—A contention by Gerhard Van Arkel, ITU counsel, that the NLRB is powerless to order the union to bargain, since ITU officers have yet to sign non-communist affidavits.

Schoolmen Attend Meeting Of VA

E. C. Dodd, co-ordinator, and Lawrence G. Adkins, assistant co-ordinator, attended a Veterans Administration meeting in Lubbock on Wednesday, hearing a review of regulations and status of the on-the-job training program. Schoolmen were informed that VA regulations require administration of the programs on an allowance not to exceed five per cent of the instructors' salaries. Veterans are required, they were informed, to make proportionate restitution to the government when total income exceeds \$2,400 per annum, or \$1,320 net. As in Howard county, most of the programs in this area offer instruction to veterans engaged in agricultural work. Howard County Vocational School has four such classes in operation, in addition to one on mechanics.

WALKING HOME

Girl Is Run Down, Beaten By Motorist

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 23. (AP) — A pretty 17-year-old high school girl was run down by a motorist, beaten with a tire iron and driven along lonely back roads for several hours before she was released, state police reported early today. State policeman Maurice Wilhere said dark-haired Alice Sanchez, a student at West Chester, Pa., high school—managed to stagger to her home at nearby Milltown where her parents rushed her to Chester county hospital. Physicians said the girl was suffering from shock, loss of blood and bruises. Wilhere said the girl told him she was walking along a road near her home after leaving a trolley when she had taken from school late yesterday. The state policeman quoted her as saying: "An automobile drove past with a young man at the wheel. The motorist stopped several hundred yards from her, turned around and started back. As Alice stepped aside to permit the car to pass, the automobile swerved into her, knocking her down and scattering her school books. As she attempted to retrieve the books, the man got out of the car and began beating her. He stopped only after she agreed to get into his car. Wilhere said the girl told him. For the next two or three hours she was driven through the countryside too weak to remember clearly what her assailant looked like or where she had been. Oilmen Must Plan To Stop River Pollution

AUSTIN, Oct. 23. (AP)—Oil Operators in the Darst Salt Flat and Luling fields today were under orders to present within 90 days a plan to stop salt water pollution of the San Marcos and Guadalupe rivers or face injunction proceedings. Charging operators with putting off plans to remedy a situation which has existed for several years, city officials and state representatives from Victoria, Cuero and Gonzales yesterday demanded that contamination of the two streams cease in a reasonable length of time. Their protests, as well as those of business men, farmers, and state agencies interested in maintaining good water supplies, were backed up by Attorney General Price Daniel. Daniel said his department already has sufficient evidence to merit an injunction suit against oil operators for violation of the state's anti-pollution statutes, but he expressed hope the oil companies would work out a solution agreeable to the complaining parties. Mayor George Seydler of Gonzales warned: "If we don't have some definite plan of action submitted to the state health department or attorney general in 90 days, then we're going to ask the state to bear down in whatever way it should."

Texan Named To Fourth Army Post

TEMPLE, Oct. 23. (AP)—Maj. Gen. Andrew D. Bruce of Temple will become the Fourth Army's deputy commander upon departure of Maj. Gen. John Coulter, Gen. Thomas T. Handy, Fourth Army commander, announced here last night. General Coulter has been ordered to Tokyo, effective the first of next year. During the war, General Bruce commanded Camp Hood, near here. Later he commanded the 77th (Statue of Liberty) division in the Pacific, principally in the Philippines campaigns. After VJ day he took command of the 7th (Hour Glass) infantry division in Korea. Bruce won the distinguished service medal for organizing and commanding the tank destroyer center at Camp Hood. A graduate of Texas A&M College, he won five campaign stars with the second division in World War I.

IN SPEECH

Byrnes Declares Russia Will Stall On Peace For Germany

COLUMBIA, S. C. Oct. 23. (AP) — Former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes predicts that Russia will stall indefinitely on a peace treaty for Germany and says the United States, Britain and France may as well call their own peace conference without waiting any longer. "If they are going to do it a year hence—why not do it now?" He asked an audience of South Carolina fraternal groups meeting here last night under sponsorship of the Masons. Byrnes took occasion to clarify what he meant when he said in his recently-published book "Speaking Frankly" that if Russia persists in holding eastern Germany after the other allies have made peace there should be measures of "last resort" as prescribed by a majority of the United Nations security council. "There is no suggestion," he said in his speech, "as to whether such collective action should be persuasion, economic pressure or military action. That would be for the nations to determine under the circumstances existing at that time." He added: "I heartily disapprove of talk of war against Russia, and I have lost no opportunity to discourage talk of the inevitability of conflict." Byrnes said the epithet "warmonger" applied to him by Russian delegates to the United Nations, "is one title I do not like." Byrnes said he is convinced Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov will not agree to real progress on a German peace treaty unless the other allies grant Russia \$10,000,000,000 of reparations out of current German production and a share in control of the Ruhr industries. The United States, the former cabinet member declared, cannot go along with either demand. He said Molotov may permit preliminary work on a treaty at the London foreign ministers conference next month, but "he knows he can delay the preliminary draft for at least six months" and even then could insist on a veto of even minor points. Byrnes concluded that there will be no four-power agreement on the peace unless Molotov has his way and declared: "The United States, Britain and France will then have to decide whether the chaotic conditions of Europe will indefinitely continue or whether they will proceed to do what I suggest they now do—call a peace conference regardless of the Soviet attitude." During his speech Byrnes denied a United Press report which he said gave the impression that his book advocated countering Russian obstructionism with atomic bombs and ouster of the Red Army from Germany by force if necessary. He said there was nothing in the book "about atomic bombs or driving the Soviets out of Germany by force." At Washington, the United Press bureau said it based the story on Byrnes' statement in the book that "We should not start something we are not prepared to finish."

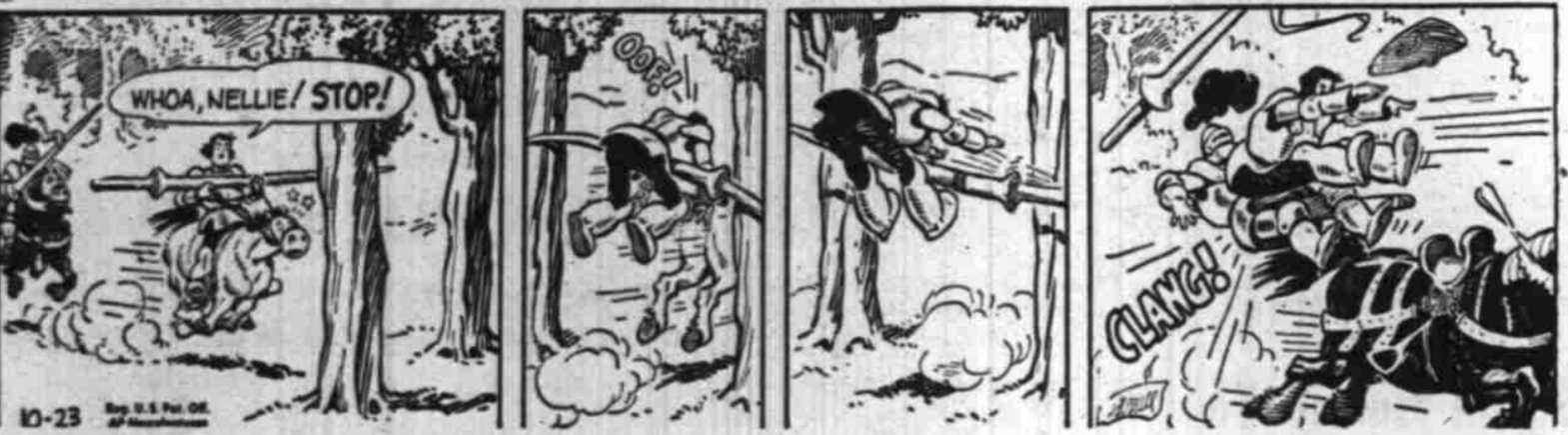

FOR CONFERENCE

Experts In Animal Nutrition Will Convene At Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 23. (AP)—Experts in the field of animal nutrition will convene at Texas A. and M. College today for the third annual Texas nutrition conference sponsored by the college for benefit of ranchmen, poultrymen and feed men. The conference continues two days.

These experts will make available to Texans their accumulated knowledge on production of maximum poundage of meat, poultry and eggs from available feeds. Papers dealing with problems of securing maximum results in beef and dairy cattle feeding and poultry feeding with available feeds will be read, followed by a discussion and question period.

Dr. R. M. Bethke, in charge of

nutritional investigations at Ohio agricultural experiment stations, and Dr. T. H. Jukes, head of the department of nutrition and physiology research for Lederle laboratories of Pearl River, N. Y., will discuss the latest application of scientific information in fields of animal nutrition and biochemistry to problems of feeding a hungry world.

The group will tour the experimental farms and laboratories of the college and attend the Texas A. and M.-Baylor football game Saturday.

Clayton's Wife Treats Spouse As Footballer

HOUSTON, Oct. 23. (AP)—Susan Vaughn Clayton said that she was treating her husband, Will Clayton who last week resigned as under-secretary of state, like a football star.

"I'm only taking him off the field to rub him down and dress him up so he will be ready if needed," she said yesterday, in explaining why Clayton, Houston cotton merchant, had resigned his Federal post.

"It just seemed to me that no man could work like Will worked for 45 years. I just knew I had to stop him."

But both Clayton and his wife pointed to the other as the reason for the resignation. In Washington, Mrs. Clayton's health was given as the reason for Clayton's leaving the job.

"That was my idea. Will was very tired but he did not know it."

Stuffed Eggs And Tomatoes

6 hard cooked eggs
1-2 cup chopped cooked meat
1-2 tablespoons chopped tomato pickle
1-2 tablespoons chopped olives
Mustard
1-2 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1-2 cups white sauce
Aspic jelly
Watercress
Thin slices of ham
Cut eggs in halves. Sieve yolks and mix with the chopped meat, tomato pickle and chopped olives. Moisten with mustard, add seasonings if needed and refill the whites. Soak gelatin in cold water. Dissolve in white sauce. Place eggs on the slices of ham and place on oval molds of tomato mousse. When white sauce is cool pour over eggs and mousses.
Tomato Mousse
2 cups tomatoes
1 chicken bouillon cube
2 tablespoons gelatin
1-2 cup cold water
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1-2 teaspoon salt
Few grains cayenne
1-2 pint cream
Rub tomatoes and bouillon cube through a coarse sieve. Cook for five minutes and add gelatin which has been soaked in cold water. When dissolved add rest of ingredients. Chill until it begins to thicken and then fold in cream which has been beaten until light but not stiff.

Braised Duckling For Cooler Weather

1-5 or 6 lb duckling
1-2 onion
1-2 cup flour
Salt
Freshly ground pepper
2 tablespoons cooking fat
1-4 cup consomme
1 orange, unpeeled and quartered.
2 tablespoons brown sugar
Cut off wings and legs, leaving them in one piece. Split the breast and back in two. Rub pieces of duckling with onion. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, and dust lightly with flour. Brown pieces in fat in large skillet or baking pan. Add consomme and cover tightly. Simmer one and one half hours or until tender. Turn pieces once or twice during cooking period. At end of one hour of cooking time, pour off excess fat. Sprinkle orange quarters with brown sugar and place in pan around pieces of duckling. Cover and continue cooking for remaining half hour. Place duckling and orange quarters on hot platter. Make an orange sauce with three tablespoons of drippings, three tablespoons of flour, one and one quarter cups of orange juice, one-third cup hot water, one and one half teaspoons grated orange rind and one cooked duckling liver, finely chopped. Blend flour with drippings. Combine orange juice with water and add to flour mixture, stirring until smooth. Add orange rind and liver and cook until smooth and thickened. Cook for two minutes longer.

1/2 cup pineapple juice
1 cup diced orange
Combine all ingredients and mix well.

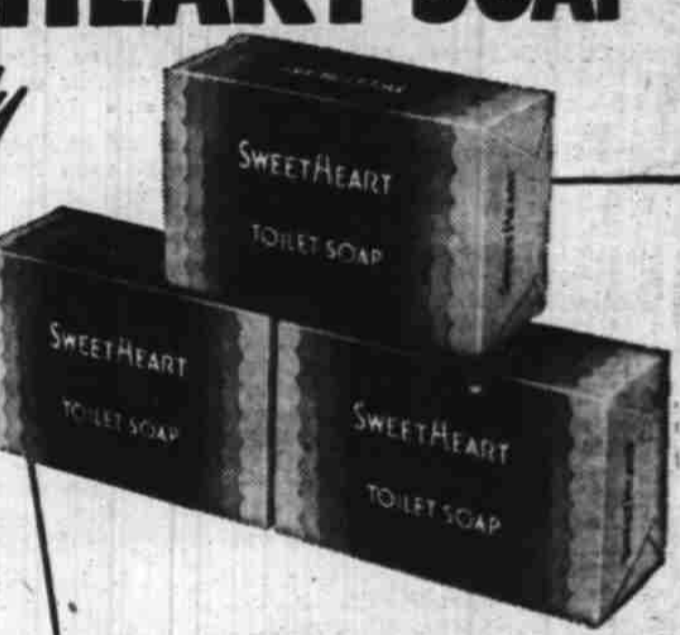

Salt
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon flour
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1/4 cup vinegar
1 cup evaporated milk

Please Pass The Cake For More Like These

It's such fun to bake sweet things again, now that all the ingredients are available, isn't it? Because I think the answer is yes, I'd like to give you a couple of new and interesting cakes to try. Here they are:

Delicate Yellow Cake
1-2 cup butter or vitaminized margarine
1 1-2 tablespoons boiling water
2 1-8 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
7-8 cup milk
1 1-2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 eggs
Pecan halves

Place vitaminized margarine in a mixing bowl. Add boiling water and mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add to margarine with milk and vanilla. Beat two minutes by hand or moderate speed on electric mixer. Add eggs and beat two more minutes. Brush baking pan with butter or margarine and line with waxed paper, also brushed with butter or margarine. Pour cake batter into pan and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 35-40 minutes. Remove cake to cooling rack. When cool, frost with Easy Caramel Icing and decorate with pecan halves.

Easy Caramel Icing
5 tablespoons butter or vitaminized margarine
1 cup brown sugar firmly packed
1-4 cup milk
1 1-2 cups confectioners sugar
1-4 teaspoon salt
Melt butter or margarine in saucepan. Add brown sugar and bring to boil, stirring constantly. Add milk and boil slowly three minutes. Cool thoroughly without stirring. Add confectioners sugar and beat until thick and creamy.

Applesauce Cake
1-2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
2 cups flour
1 cup thick applesauce
1-2 teaspoon salt
1-2 teaspoon powdered cloves
1 teaspoon powdered cinnamon
1 teaspoon soda
1-2 cup chopped raisins
1-2 cup black walnuts

Cream shortening and sugar. Add beaten egg yolks. Sift dry ingredients. Add alternately with applesauce to first mixture. Dredge raisins and nuts with flour and add. Bake in a greased loaf cake pan in 350 degree oven for one hour. Frost with Coffee Boiled Icing.

Coffee Boiled Icing
2 eggs whites
1 cup sugar
1-4 cup boiling water
1-4 cup strong coffee
Boil sugar and water together until it spins a thread when dropped from the side of a spoon. Beat egg whites very stiff and add the sugar-water syrup to them a tablespoonful at a time, beating thoroughly with each addition. Do this quickly as possible so that the syrup will not granulate. Beat in coffee at the end.

Bavarian Cream With Peppermint

1-2 tablespoons gelatin
1-4 cup milk
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 3-4 cups milk
1-2 pound peppermint candy crushed
1-2 pint cream, whipped
Hot chocolate sauce
Soak the gelatin in the quarter cup of milk. Add the salt to remaining milk, along with the crushed peppermint candy and scald in top of double boiler. When the candy is melted, add the gelatin and stir until it is dissolved. Cool quickly by placing in a bowl of cracked ice. When mixture begins to thicken, beat until light and fluffy, then fold in whipped cream. Pour into a mold and chill. Serve with hot chocolate sauce.

Sweet Potatoes And The Diet

It's sweet potato time again. About 900 cars have already moved out of Louisiana and harvesting is beginning in East Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma. This year's crop is smaller in all of these states but the quality is good, according to reports received by Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sweet potatoes add that extra touch to fall meals, as a vegetable, a garnish for meat dishes or as a dessert. Try a sweet potato pie, pudding or tart. Some cooks even use them to make candy, a secret learned from the Indians.

You'll find plenty of food values in potatoes too. Because of their yellow color, they're rich in vitamin A. Also, they furnish some vitamins B1, C and G.

When you buy sweet potatoes, see that they're smooth and firm. Odd-shaped ones with large growth cracks take too much time to prepare, and if they have cuts or bruises, they'll spoil quickly. Otherwise, sweet potatoes are easy to store for several weeks or more in a cool place. Warm, moist temperatures may cause them to sprout.

The sweet potato family is divided into two main groups. On one side there's the moist sweet potato with deep orange-colored flesh. It's often called a "yam", though it has nothing to do with the true tropical yam.

Then there's the dry sweet potato, with mealy pulp of a lighter yellow color. Usually you can tell by the texture of the potato and its shape what kind you're buying.

Potted Lamb Roast

5 lb. fore-quarter of lamb
Flour to dredge
Salt
2 large onions
2 cloves
2 teaspoons allspice
2 teaspoons peppercorns
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups boiling water
5 tablespoons lamb fat
1-3 cup flour
Have the forequarter boned and rolled. Dredge meat with flour and brown in salt pork fat. Place bones and meat in large kettle. Add the onions which have been stuck with the cloves, allspice, peppercorns, salt and boiling water. Cover tightly and cook for four to five hours over low heat, adding more water when needed. Remove meat to hot platter. Skim off fat and add to liquid remaining in pot enough water to make two cups. Mix the lamb fat with flour and when blended stir in liquid and bring to a boil, then cook for five minutes longer, stirring constantly. Strain into a gravy boat.

Creamed Mushrooms For Meatless Tuesday

1 pound mushrooms
1 1/4 cups milk
1/4 cup mushroom liquor
3 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
Salt and Pepper
4 slices toast
Peel mushrooms and remove stems. Make mushroom liquor by stewing skin and stems in one and one-half cups water until the liquid is reduced to one-half cup. Sauté mushrooms in margarine rooms carefully, add flour and stir until well blended. Add milk and mushroom liquor and stir constantly until thickened. Add mushrooms and serve on toast.

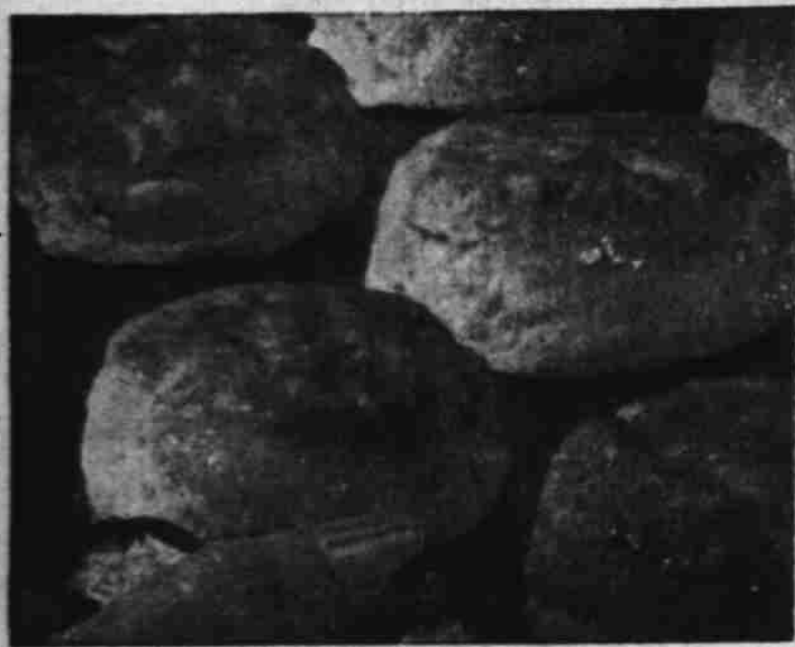

LABOR LAW INVOLVED

Strained Truce Is Called In Nine Week UAW Strike

GALION, O., Oct. 23. (AP)—A nine-week strike, climaxed by a 12-hour siege of the block long plant of the North Electric Co., came to a strained truce early today and 350 superfluous men and women went home.

The struggle over union recognition and 20 per cent wage increase demands, with a possible test of the Taft-Hartley Law involved, is to resume Monday in a meeting of officials of the Telephone Equipment company and the United Automobile Workers (CIO).

But even while an automobile and motorcycle led the procession of cars out of the plant grounds to take the non-striking workers to their homes, under a union promise of safe conduct, company officials announced that they had agreed to nothing more than a "meeting."

"We have not agreed to arbitrate," said Robert Jamison, company counsel, after a night marked by sporadic rock throwing and window breaking, rumors that hundreds of sympathizers were coming in from other cities, talk of reading the riot act, and erroneous reports that the strikers themselves were preparing to force their way into the big factory. One pistol shot was reported fired during the evening.

The company policy had been to refuse to negotiate until all UAW-CIO officers had signed a non-communist affidavit required by the Taft-Hartley Act. However, this was amended late yesterday to a flat refusal because of alleged acts of vandalism at the company's nearby Kenton plant and also because of developments here during the afternoon and night, Jamison said.

Lt. Col. R. V. Graham, who acted for Gov. Thomas J. Herbert, after the latter's refusal to order out the National Guard, called the Monday meeting simply a "discussion."

"The company agreed to talk to us," Walter Murphy of Toledo, assistant regional director of the UAW-CIO, told a union meeting held about 1 a. m. in the yard of the Erie railroad depot.

"We have agreed to let the people in the plant go home without any name calling or harm. The plant will be closed until the Monday meeting. It accomplishes our purpose."

"Those who don't live here please leave town and leave town quietly. I'm not kidding."

Company officials said the 350 non-striking, about half of them women, had been in the plant since their noon recess. Three were removed in ambulances early in the evening over pickets' protests, because of heart attacks. All went without food, except possibly candy bars, from noon on.

SOIL CONSERVATION

Head Of State Hospital Farm Leaves Stubble After Harvest

Guy Moore, farm superintendent of the Big Spring State Hospital farm, harvested grain sorghum this fall leaving 12 to 14 inches of stubble. Moore set the binder to cut the sorghum high on the farm one mile north of Big Spring to leave as much crop residue as possible on the fields. The crop residues were left on the ground to protect the land from blowing and add organic matter to the soil as a part of a well rounded soil and water conservation program followed by Moore on the State Farm, in co-operation with the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation district.

Moore is filling two 300-ton trench silos with the bundle feed produced on the farm to provide a high quality feed supply for his dairy herd.

Planting of 100 acres of Abruzzi rye and hairy vetch started this week on the R. L. Warren farm in the North Big Spring conservation group. Warren, who lives a mile north of Big Spring, is planting the rye and vetch in a field of beggar for winter cover crops and soil building. He has calves on the beggar and will control grazing to leave plenty of stubble for soil protection and improvement.

Dick Simpson, rancher co-operator with the district who lives northwest of Vealmoor in the Vealmoor conservation group, deferred 700 acres of pasture land this summer. Simpson took livestock off the pasture in May to give the grass a chance to grow and produce seed. This will improve the cover of grass and help the better grasses to spread Simpson says. With more cover on the ground the soil is protected from erosion and with more of the better grasses in the composition an increase in the amount of high quality forage can be expected.

Simpson also completed a 5400 cubic yard stock tank last week to improve the watering facilities on his ranch. The tank is 25 feet deep which will give him a permanent water supply. Two thousand feet of diversions were also constructed to put additional water in the tank.

Terrace construction started last week on 80 acres of farm land on the R. T. Shafer ranch in the Vincent ranch group. Shafer, who lives 5 miles west of Vincent, is building the terraces with a whirlwind terracer as a part of his conservation program to hold all the water that falls on the land and to prevent soil erosion. The terraced land is on wheat stubble left on the land as another measure in his complete soil and water conservation program. Assistance in his terracing work was furnished by the SCS, which ran the lines for terraces.

Willis Winters, Jr., also of the Vincent conservation group, will build approximately a mile of new terraces to complete the terraces needed on his cultivated land. Application for assistance in planning and applying soil and water conservation programs were received by district supervisors last week on the farms of Homer Thorp, Walter Robinson and Eddie Carpenter.

Conservation plans were approved by district supervisors at their regular monthly meeting in Stanton on 37 1/2 acres of farm and pasture land including the place of B. R. Cline, Monroe Johnson, W. J. Rogers, J. E. Buchanan, L. J. Painter, O. H. McAllister, Ethel Weaver and E. A. Richters.

STILL FOUND NEAR TRUMAN RETREAT

BALTIMORE, Oct. 23. (AP)—Federal alcohol tax unit officials would like to meet up with the moonshiner who had the temerity to set up a still on the grounds of Shangri-La, Maryland mountain retreat of President Truman and the late President Roosevelt.

Tax unit agents here disclosed they have found and destroyed the elaborate still on the Catoctin reservation last month. It was in deep woods, less than a mile from the cabin where President Roosevelt held important conferences with Winston Churchill and where President Truman relaxes occasionally.

Coahoma FFA Unit Wins Fair Award

The Coahoma chapter of the Future Farmers of America has received a \$100 prize award from the State Fair of Texas for having sent the greatest number of boys the greatest number of miles on Farm Youth Day.

Fifty-five members, accompanied by their advisor, M. T. Jenkins, and several other adult sponsors, were in Dallas on Oct. 4, paying particular attention to livestock judging. Enroute they stopped at Grand Prairie, Texas, naval base to spend the night.
