

## Franco-German Pact Expected To End Dispute

ROME (AP)-France and Germany Monday signed "a agreement of peace" over the Saar Basin territory.

By the agreement's term, which is expected to end grave controversy over future sovereignty of district, Ger many will pay France approximately \$59,400,000 dollar and 11,400,000 tons of coal for France's mines and privat credits in the Saar basin.

Germany guarantees equal rights to voters and non voters among all Saar inhabitants, regardless of race, re ligion and language.


