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Don Smith, is son of former Spearmanites Diver plans search for airplane

A "professional hard-hat diver" with a business at Cape Canaveral, Fla., and New Orleans, La., plans to search Lake Meredith for a plane and its two occupants, missing since Jan. 28, 1984.

Don Smith, a former Dumas resident and Panhandle native, says he is "100 percent positive" that the single-engined airplane is there because of information from "the people I have talked to."

He will use a 19-foot long mini-submarine, equipped with special electronic gear, for the search operation. The mini-sub, similar to one he has based in Florida, is being built by W. D. Jones Drilling Company of Dumas to the diver's specification.

The information, collect-

ed by Smith, has come from National Park Service officials at the Meredith recreation area, Federal Aeronautics Administration investigators, and from the search team which looked for the aircraft.

Apparently the small private plane, rented from an aircraft service at an Amarillo airport, crashed in the lake on Jan. 28, 1984, a Friday.

The pilot was identified as Steven D. Lampke, 24, his passenger was Larry Lucas, 23. both of Amarillo.

The only evidence of the crash was a nose wheel and landing gear strut from the plane and a leather coat, belonging to one of the plane occupants.

Searchers at the lake on

Jan. 30 also reported picking up a "very weak signal" from an emergency location beacon from a transmitter believed carried aboard the aircraft.

"Those men are still in that plane," Smith believes. "I'm from this area

- Spearman -- and feel it would be an appropriate thing to do for their families. I'm doing this search on my own."

The search operation in 1984 was conducted by scuba divers who were hampered by frigid 40-degree water temperatures, and by sonar units aboard surface craft.

Aboard the 2-man minisub, professional diver Smith will be using a deep-water technique to locate the submerged aircraft.

He exlains that the direc-

tional sonar aboard "is very accurate" and designed for divers working in "black" water with no visibility.

"This sonar is so accurate you know exactly where you are and what's in front of you," he explains. "It will look forward, to each side, down and up."

The mini-sub, under construction at W. D. Jones, is being built to Smith's specifications with a 5-16th-inch thick steel pressure hull to house the 2-man crew. It is a standard design, used throughout the diving industry and will have a gross weight of some 7,000 pounds.

It's running gear, remote control mechanical arm, sonar, and batteries will be in-

stalled by Smith. He notes the search and rescue submarine will be similar to, but smaller than, another craft he has based at Cape Canaveral.

"If I brought the one from Florida to Dumas, the cost would be unreasonable," he explains. "There is a call for the equipment there at all times and I don't want to lose a job there because the sub is

He expects the sub will take 30 days to build. Then he will begin installing equipment to conduct the search operation.

Smith has been considering the dive at Lake Meredith for some two months and investigating evidence of the crash. He has also made two explorative dives at the Panhandle lake.

"The visibility now at Meredith in deep water is nil," he declares.

The son of Donald and Wanda Smith of Dumas, the professional diver began diving in Lake Meredith as a hobby before becoming a professioinal and is familiar with the Canadian River lake.

"Sometimes visibility is good -- you can see four to five feet in deep water; on the next dive, nothing," he says. "But, it's paradise compared to the Mississippi River."

Smith's work basically involves "any type of offshore oilfield work" and salvage

The unit being built here is not for extremely deep underwater work, but Smith reports it will dive "easily to a depth of 350 feet." Driven either electronically or hydraulically by propeller, the craft will have five forward and reverse speeds, up to four knots -- about 10 miles an hour.

"I plan to leave this sub here for emergency work in the Panhandle and neighboring states," Smith explains. 'You don't have the equipment in this area to locate something in the water




