Don Smith, is son of former Spearmanites Diver plans search for airplane

A "professional hard-hat diver" with a business at Cape Canaveral, Fla., and New Orleans, La., plans to search Lake Meredith for a plane and its two occupants, missing since Jan. 28, 1984.

Don Smith, a former Dumas resident and Panhandle native, says he is "100 percent positive" that the single-engine airplane is there because of information from "the people I have talked to."

He will use a 9-foot long mini-submarine, equipped with special electronic gear, for the search operation. The mini-sub, similar to one he has based in Florida, is being built by W. D. Jones Drilling Company of Dumas to the diver's specification.

The information, collect-

ed by Smith, has come from National Park Service officials at the Meredith recreation area, Federal Aeronautics Administration investigators, and from the search team which looked for the aircraft.

Apparently the small private plane, rented from an aircraft service at an Amarillo airport, crashed in the lake on Jan. 28, 1984, a Friday.

The pilot was identified as Steven D. Lampke, 24, his passenger was Larry Lucas, 23, both of Amarillo.

The only evidence of the crash was a nose wheel and landing gear strut from the plane and a leather coat, belonging to one of the plane occupants.

Searchers at the lake on

Jan. 30 also reported picking up a "very weak signal" from an emergency location beacon from a transmitter believed carried aboard the aircraft.

"Those men are still in that plane," Smith believes. "I'm from this area - Spearman - and feel it would be an appropriate thing to do for their families. I'm doing this search on my own."

The search operation in 1984 was conducted by scuba divers who were hampered by frigid 40-degree water temperatures, and by sonar units aboard surface craft.

Aboard the 2-man mini-sub, professional diver Smith will be using a deep-water technique to locate the submerged aircraft.

He explains that the direc-

tional sonar aboard "is very accurate" and designed for divers working in "black" water with no visibility.

"This sonar is so accurate you know exactly where you are and what's in front of you," he explains. "It will look forward, to each side, down and up."

The mini-sub, under construction at W. D. Jones, is being built to Smith's specifications with a 5-16th-inch thick steel pressure hull to house the 2-man crew. It is a standard design, used throughout the diving industry and will have a gross weight of some 7,000 pounds.

It's running gear, remote control mechanical arm, sonar, and batteries will be in-

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

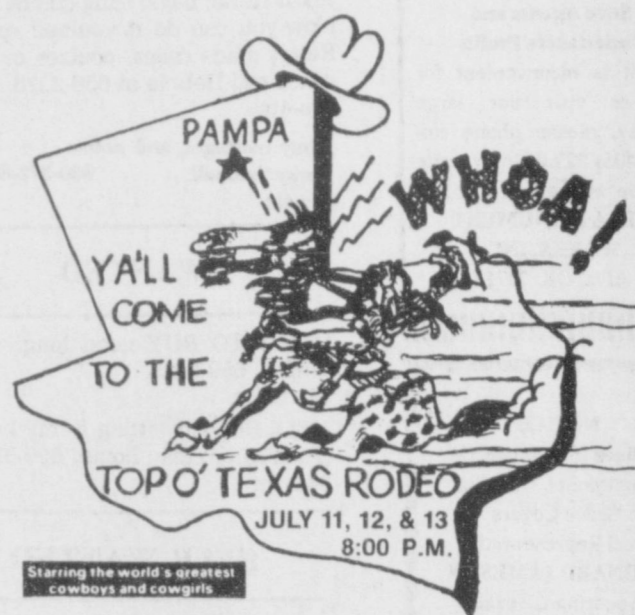

John Deere to waive finance charges

MOLINE, ILLINOIS—John Deere has announced a new program to waive finance charges for up to 10 months on all new farm tractors -- utility, row-crop and 4-wheel drive -- purchased through the John Deere finance plan. Finance charges will be waived until April 1, 1986.

Waiver of finance charges reduces the interest paid during the term of a retail financing contract. Additionally, the program permits a faster buildup of the buyer's equity in the tractors since all payments during the waiver of finance charges period apply entirely to principal.

The company has also announced a discount schedule for buyers of new John Deere tractors who choose not to use the waiver of finance charges. Discounts range as high as \$1,025 on utility tractors, \$2,575 on row-crop tractors and \$4,450 on 4-wheel drive tractors.

Land acquisition may become easier

Beginning next year family farmers and ranchers may find it easier to acquire land or expand their holdings under the provisions of HB 196, which Governor White signed into law earlier this month.

The bill, sponsored by Representative Pete Patterson and Senator Bill Serpalius, establishes a low-interest loan program with rates fixed for up to 40 years for the purchase of farm and ranch land. It will be administered by the Veterans Land Board using procedures similar to those of the Veterans Land Program.

The Farm and Ranch Finance Program becomes effective Sept. 1, 1985, if Texas voters approve a constitutional amendment this November authorizing the sale of general obligation bonds by the state to fund the program.

"The program's low, fixed interest rates and low down payment requirements make it a boon to young farmers acquiring their first acreage and to established family farmers and ranchers who want to expand their holdings," Governor White said. "The Farm and Ranch Finance Program poses no financial risk to the state since it retains title to the land purchases until the loans are paid off, so I hope Texans will vote their approval for the program in November."

(Continued from page 1) stalled by Smith. He notes the search and rescue submarine will be similar to, but smaller than, another craft he has based at Cape Canaveral.

"If I brought the one from Florida to Dumas, the cost would be unreasonable," he explains. "There is a call for the equipment there at all times and I don't want to lose a job there because the sub is here."

He expects the sub will take 30 days to build. Then he will begin installing equipment to conduct the search operation.

Smith has been considering the dive at Lake Meredith for some two months and investigating evidence of the crash. He has also made two explorative dives at the Panhandle lake.

"The visibility now at Meredith in deep water is nil," he declares.

The son of Donald and Wanda Smith of Dumas, the professional diver began diving in Lake Meredith as a hobby before becoming a professional and is familiar with the Canadian River lake.

"Sometimes visibility is good -- you can see four to five feet in deep water; on the next dive, nothing," he says. "But, it's paradise compared to the Mississippi River."

Smith's work basically involves "any type of offshore oilfield work" and salvage jobs.

The unit being built here is not for extremely deep underwater work, but Smith reports it will dive "easily to a depth of 350 feet." Driven either electronically or hydraulically by propeller, the craft will have five forward and reverse speeds, up to four knots -- about 10 miles an hour.

"I plan to leave this sub here for emergency work in the Panhandle and neighboring states," Smith explains. "You don't have the equipment in this area to locate something in the water quickly."
