State funds to decrease!

# Taxable values drop \$12,977,780

The Hansford County Appraisal District has certified the taxable values for Spearman I.S.D. to be \$266,370,885. That compares to a 1984 \$ value of \$279,348,665 or a loss of \$12,977,780. The bulk of the drop in values appears in the category of oil, gas and minerals, which was expected due to the economy of this industry.

To complicate the matters even further the funds the school district receives from the state will also decrease as part of the new finance and equalization package that was engineered and pushed by Governor Mark White and Ross Perot. Governor White proclaimed no new taxes, but in essence the local people will pay for his folly. State funds for Spearman I.S.D. will result in a change from the 1984-85 school year to the 1985-86 school year of \$186,000 less, due to the

equalized funding. This figure leaps to \$218,000 in 1986-87. In looking at percentages for state and local revenues the figures become depressive. In 1984-85 the state and federal funds amounted to 33.9% of total anticipated revenues, and the 1985-86 amount drops to 27.3% of total revenues. These figures clearly depict the direction of the Governor's program—make the local taxpayer carry the load, not the state.

New Superintendent of Schools, Larry Butler, feels the people of Spearman and the entire Panhandle have been railroaded by Governor White's program and will suffer the most from his "no new tax" package. True, no new state taxes, but plenty of local taxes, fees and additional registration charges. Another political charade.

## L.J. Hornsby rites held

L.J. Hornsby, 63, died Sunday. Graveside services were held Tuesday, July 16, at 2 p.m. in Hansford County Cemetery with David Fultz, minister of the Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was held by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Mr. Hornsby was born in McLean and had lived in Spearman since 1942. He was an Army veteran of World War II. He had retired from Baker and Taylor Drilling Co. He married Violet Tucker in 1945 in Spearman.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Larry of Canyon and Clifford of Canadian; a daughter, Mary Ellen Goodwin of Divide, Colo.; three brothers, Roland of Canyon, Eddie Joe of Amarillo and Alvin of San Jose, Calif.; and five grandchildren.

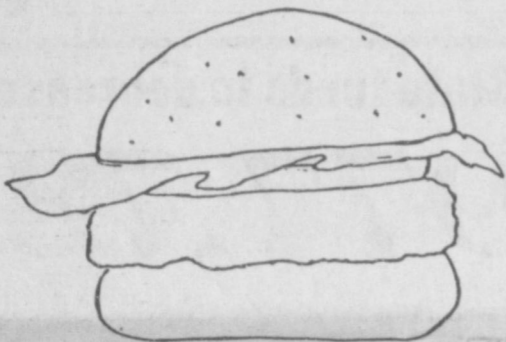

the Panhandle area who are on  
dialysis will have the funds that the  
government provides them for  
medicine and travel to Amarillo 3  
times a week out in September.  
This will affect from 150 to 200

people in the 26 counties of the  
Texas Panhandle and surrounding  
area of Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Some of these people will not be  
able to continue coming to Amarillo  
for dialysis as they will have to  
choose whether to continue treat-  
ment or feed their families and they  
will choose to feed their families. A  
person whose kidneys do not  
function properly has to be put on  
the dialysis machine which consists  
of going to Amarillo 3 times a week  
for treatment which means sitting  
in a chair for 4 hours three times a  
week having their blood running  
through a machine to clean the  
poison out of their systems so they  
may live. A person whose kidneys  
have failed will only be able to live  
2 weeks without dialysis.

The family members of some of  
these patients have gotten together

to form the Panhandle area Kidney  
Patients Auxiliary. This is a non-  
profit organization with all the work  
being volunteered. We hope that  
we will be able to raise funds to be  
used for our patients in our area so  
that they may continue to live.

We urge everyone to come out  
and help us help this group of  
people and have a great time and  
enjoy some great bargains so we  
can help some not so fortunate  
people live.

This year, the exempt amount is \$5,400 for those under 65 and \$7,320 for those 65 to 70. There is no limit for those 70 and over. And income from investments and pensions doesn't count, only wages you earn.

## To God: A note of thanks

My dear friends the head-line of these weekly articles you read in the Spearman Reporter tells you to whom the praise and thanks go for Mrs. E.A. Greever does not possess only that given by him. By his grace I am what I am and the world today would say as they did of the Apostles chosen by Jesus where did she get her lesson.

Then I was completely made a new creature born of the spirit and so desirous to tell others the experience could be theirs and in studying Gods word was told to tarry for the Holy Ghost that would give the power to witness for

him; and in a tarry service in the home of Joe Davis in Range Okla. community He came in to abide.

How did I know he came in? Answer-He took complete control of my vocal organs and I spoke for two hours in a language I did not know and during the full two hours I was preaching or singing Gods praise. Gods word tells us when He the Holy Ghost abides we can be a witness unto the uttermost part of the world. This experience I received was in 1921 and by Gods grace I have been very careful not to grieve this teacher out of my life and How marvelous the zeal burning with in me to tell others the story of Father Son and Holy Ghost. In this life I have heard or known about many things and not know them and this is true about the knowledge of the Heavenly Father and his Son our Saviour. A vast difference in knowing them and knowing about them and now nearing 97 years of age I am still growing in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and expect by Gods grace to finish this course of study when Jesus comes for me and this mortal body puts on immortality and glorious hope.

The following is the words of a song I wrote several years ago.

My Redeemer Liveth  
I know that my Redeemer liveth,  
I know in whom I trust today,  
I know he'll give me and glory,  
Until I have immortality.  
I know he shed his blood on Calvary,  
I know it saves from sin today,  
I know he'll come in clouds of heaven,  
To catch his waiting bride away,  
I know that he arose triumphant,  
I know he's at the throne today,  
I know he enterscend and blesses,  
And some day I'll in his image stay.

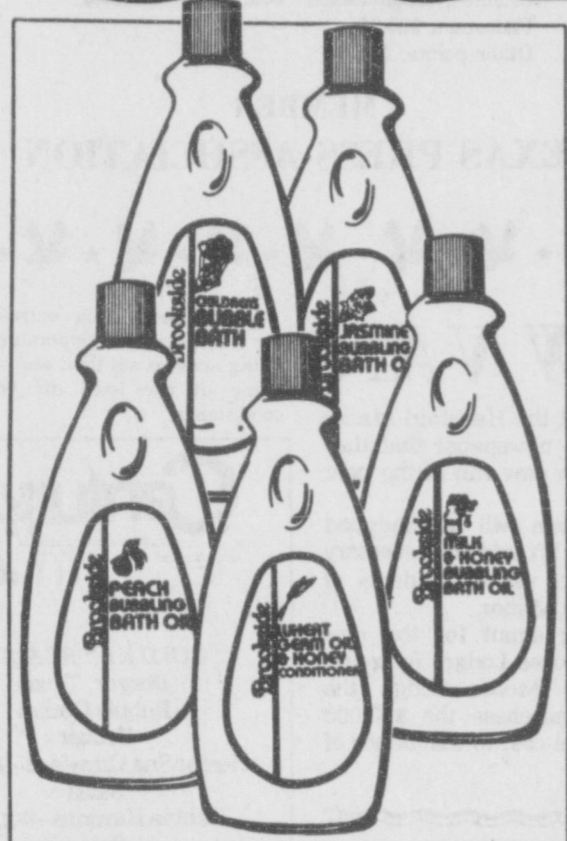

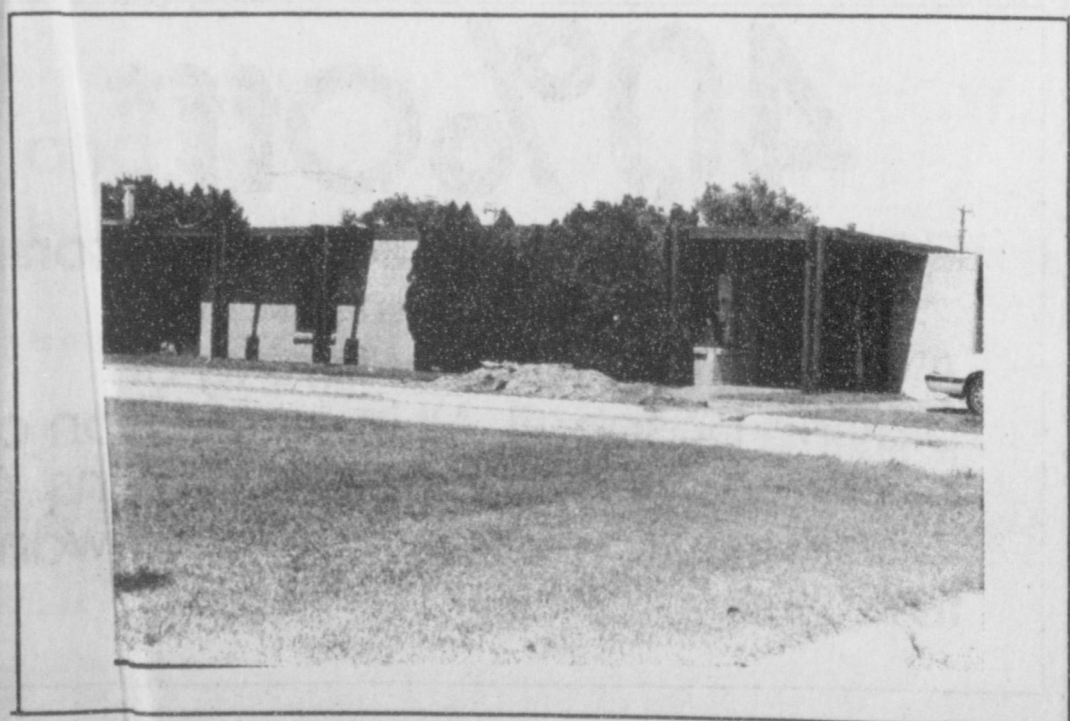

### Boulter sees signs of hope in Budget Negotiations

After an Oval Office meeting which lasted almost two hours, Congressman Beau Boulter said he felt that "there may still be hope for a true deficit reducing budget before the end of the fiscal year."

Boulter was one of 26 House/Senate Budget Conference Committee members who met with President Reagan in an attempt to break the logjam that the Conference had come to over two primary issues: Social Security Cost-Of-Living-Adjustments (COLAs) and Defense. While no concrete agreement resulted from the meeting, Boulter noted that the Conferees seemed to have reached agreement on a budget "framework."

"We have now got four critical points under control. First, COLAs will not be frozen. Defense spending will be maintained at 1985 levels, which actually means about a \$6 billion cut from the President's original request, but spending authority will increase with inflation. Various domestic spending programs will be reduced, and finally, the President once again assured us that there will be no tax increase."

Boulter, who delivered a letter to the President in April with 146 House Republican signatures promising to

uphold a Presidential veto of any tax increase legislation, said he was particularly pleased by the President's strong assurances against tax increases. "The President told us that in 1982, he was promised that for every \$1 in taxes, he would get a \$3 reduction in spending. That didn't happen—in fact, just the opposite happened. And he will not let that happen again. We simply cannot continue to increase taxes that wind up going to finance domestic programs that have minimal public support, but are protected by big spenders in the House of Representatives", Boulter said.

When the Conference Committee reconvenes this week Boulter said the real battle will be over the ability of House Conferees to "bite the bullet" and begin consideration of federal program terminations and phase outs. The Senate budget had proposed 13 programs for termination, while the House budget contained only one. Boulter noted that "any real structural reform, and concrete deficit reduction, will have to include termination. The people in the 13th District have told me they want to see programs terminated, and I plan to make that voice heard to the Budget Conferees."

### Hot, dry weather hikes water use

Summertime heat and lack of rain are pushing water consumption for Spearman in July above most of our average days. On July 10, 1985 Spearman set a record water consumption of 2,344,000 gallons. The old record, ironically enough was set July 10, 1980 which was 2,302,000 gallons.

On most July days — the summer holiday is an exception — city water customers are turning on faucets daily to give thirsty lawns and gardens a drink.

Daily consumption and city well pumping to meet the demands have consistently run at hot weather levels, city manager Jim Murray reports.

It is interesting to note that the lowest pumping day for 1984 was

Nov. 23 with 376,000 gallons. On December 31, 1978 Spearman consumed only 283,000 gallons. The last twelve months, from July to July Spearman has averaged 771,000 gallons of water daily.

With use up to summertime levels the 4 active city wells are being pumped to keep storage tanks full, says Murray. Pumps are often running several hours a day to fill the cities 360,000 gallon elevated water storage tanks plus 1,000,000 gallons ground storage tanks.

Total storage is 1,360,000 gallons. The capacity is necessary for two reasons: to meet the water needs of city residents and provide adequate fire protection.

The newly crowned Tex. State Winner will go on to compete with 49 other state finalists in the New York City National Finals where she will be competing for \$10,000 in awards.

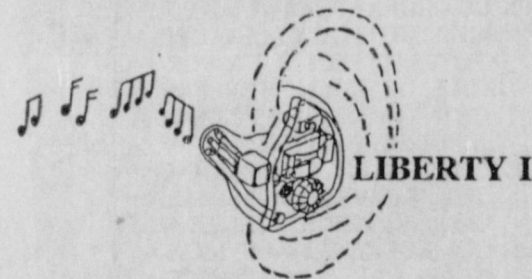

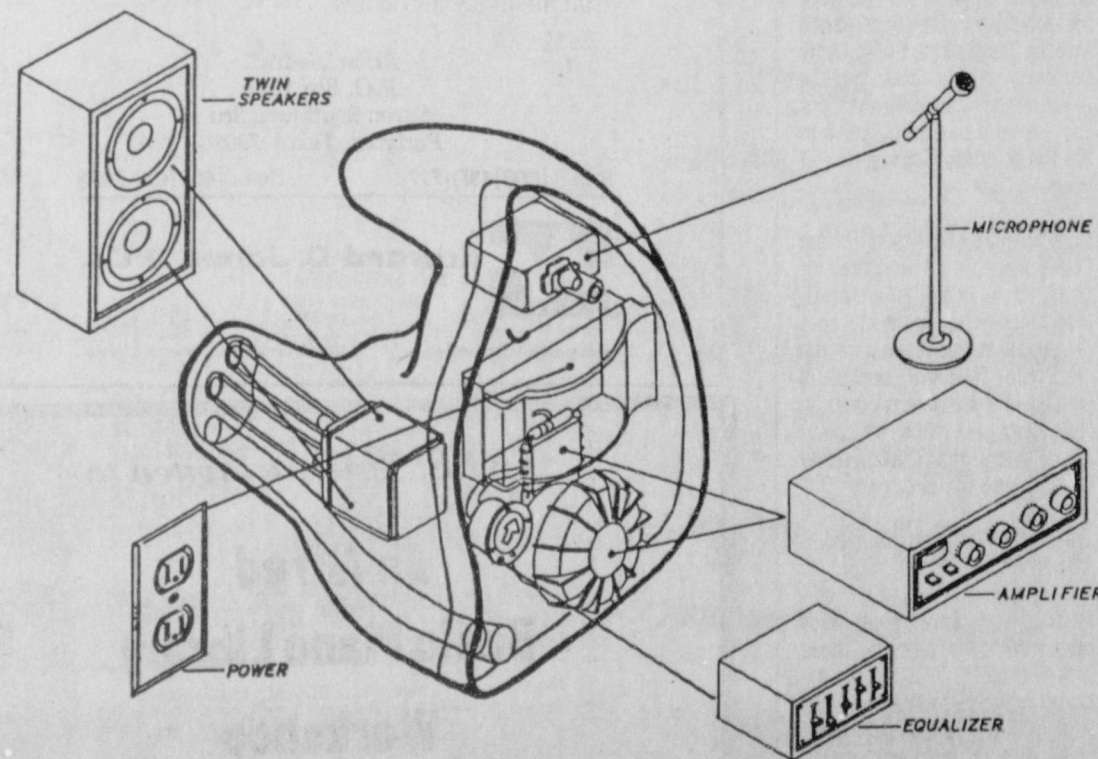

If you need information about how to apply for a social security number... or how to get social security payments... or if you have a question about social security, here's a good suggestion. The best place to get accurate, up-to-date information is directly from your social security office. You can call or write. Someone there will be glad to answer your questions and send you a free copy of any social security pamphlet.

Do you employ a household worker? If so, you may have to deduct social security taxes from the wages you pay. You must deduct social security taxes and report the wages if you pay \$50 or more cash in a 3-month calendar quarter to a household employee. Remember, wages as little as \$4 a week add up to \$50 a quarter. For more information, call any social security office.

# County gets job training funds

Under JTPA, local elected officials work in partnership with private industry councils composed

of business and community representatives to design and implement job training programs that are tailored to meet the needs of area residents.

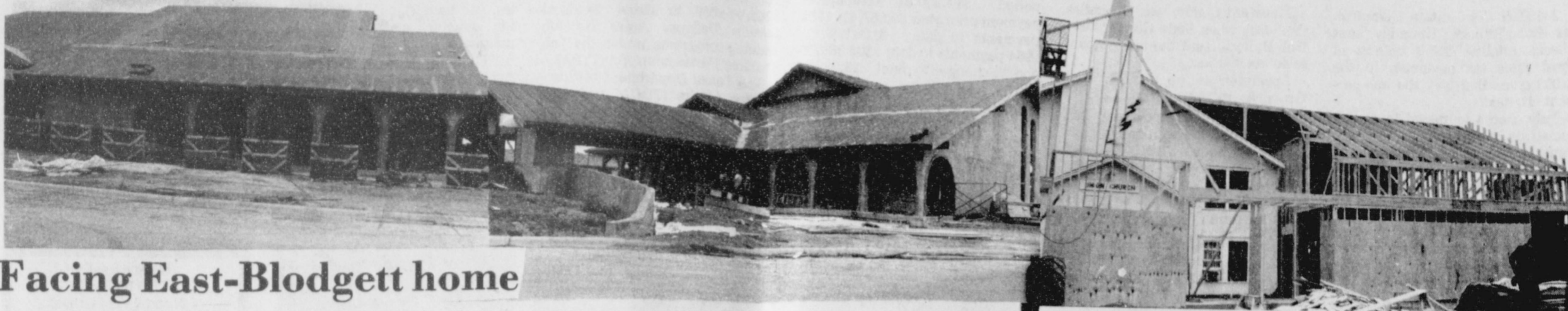

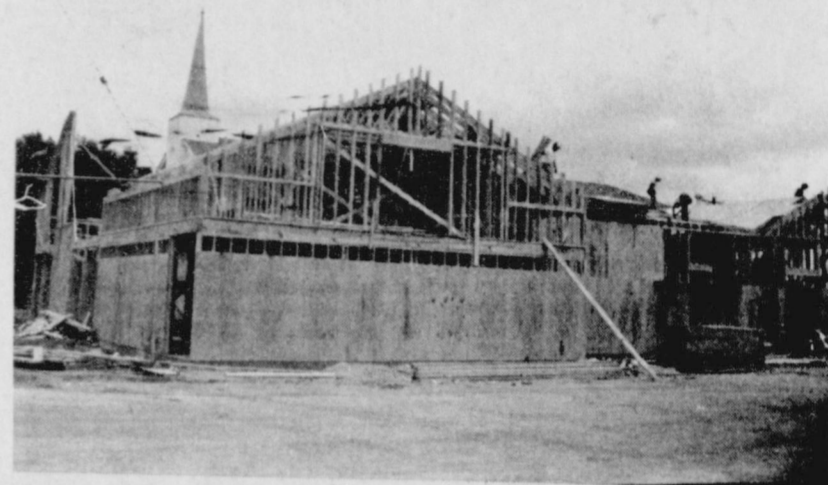
