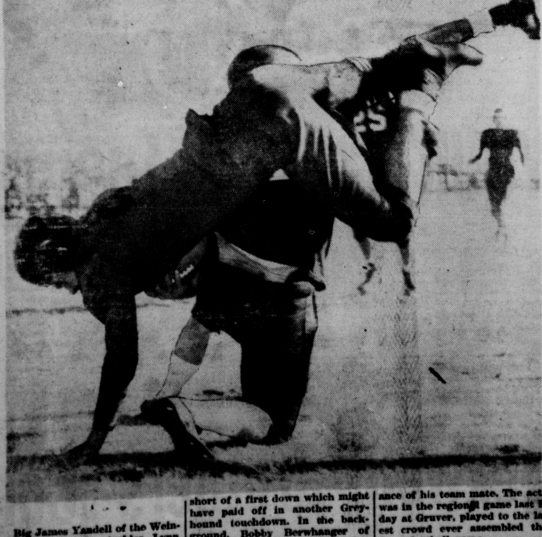
Borger & Dalhart Are Favorites
