## Spearman School Lunch Program Is Explained

Schools open their doors for the 67-68 school year, the National School Lunch Program, America's largest, single food service operation, will begin serving nutritious adequate meals across the nation. The meal pattern for the Type A lunch applies one-third to one-half of the child's daily food needs. To meet these requirements each Type A lunch must contain as a minimum one-half pint whole milk, two ounces protein rich foods, three-fourths cup fruit or vegetable, one slice enriched bread, two teaspoons butter and other foods needed for energy and to satisfy the appetite.

Since studies show that vitamin A and vitamin C are frequently short in the children's diet, special attention will be given to include a Vitamin C food in each lunch and Vitamin A food in lunches twice each week.

For better service for the students and faculty, Spearman Schools have two lunchrooms serving the same Type A menu each day, with a choice of meat items served at the High School Lunchroom. Chocolate or Plain Milk is available at either lunchroom and extra half-pints, other than the one served with the lunch, may be purchased by students for 35¢ under the Special Milk Program. Iced Tea and Ice Cream Novelties, 5¢ variety, are available for students and faculty at the High School Lunchroom.

Prices for school lunches will be: Grades one through eight 35¢, Grades nine through twelve 50¢. Faculty and visiting adults 75¢. (No government subsidies for adult lunches) For convenience, lunchroom tickets are available in 5, 10, 20 lunch boxes, with no reduction made on the number of lunches purchased. Tickets are available at either lunchroom. A refund for the amount of unused lunches on a ticket will be refunded only at the end of the school year or when a student has to withdraw from school, there will be no refund on lost tickets. Present ticket to manager for refund when necessary. High School students may not "charge" for their lunches---one (1) charge will be permitted in grades one through eight-age of student. Tickets for school lunches will be available at the school lunchroom and Elementary school building during registration. Parents are welcome to eat lunch with their children, but with the large number of stu-

dents served at the Elementary Junior High lunchroom it would be appreciated if you would call and make arrangements before your scheduled visit.

Mrs. Joy Ralls, who has been Music teacher in Spearman schools employed on half-time basis, was employed full time, and will be an assistant to Mr. Frank Porter, Band Director.

Mike King of Amarillo was employed as the seventh and eighth grade reading instructor. King is a graduate of McMurry College in Abilene and has recently been discharged from the Air Force. Mrs. Bill Partridge of Spearman was hired as a sixth grade science teacher. She is a graduate of SMU and taught one year in Amarillo.

The board approved putting new lights at the football stadium. These lights, to be installed soon, will greatly increase the brightness of the field.

Sunday's Amarillo paper quotes Margaret Harper as saying: "A lot of people have been dragged out here by friends expecting to see a horse opera in a ravine. But the canyon is no ravine, and Texas is no horse opera."

Palo Duro Canyon is a surprising, spectacular, 130-mile south-easterly slash across the level prairie. Its wind-carved red and buff walls rise 800 to 3,700 feet above the Red River. The out-door amphitheatre (seating about 1800) is built just beneath a beautiful 600-foot canyon wall.

As the sun sets the show opens with a muted trumpet sadly playing the opening bars of "The Cowboy's Lament." Two horsemen appear at the top of the 600 foot cliff and are spotlighted by just one of the many huge lights which play over the canyon walls throughout the 3 hour long show.

The thing which impressed us so much is the way the show takes advantage of the beautiful canyon wall and uses it as part of the stage. All the scenes are impressing and affecting... the Indian fights, covered wagons, building of the railroad, etc.

With a few exceptions, the cast is composed of drama students who enroll for the summer at WTSU. They pay \$15.00, receive two hours credit and \$600.00 in pay.

Spearman's own Bill Devers was one of the cast last year, and this year is one of the stars! To us anyway! He isn't hard to locate for he stands head and shoulders above any one on stage.

The one thing I was surprised about was the lack of signs along the highways directing tourists to the Palo Duro Canyon and/or inviting them to see the show. Of all the advertisement the show has received the past two years, and the way that area is trying to en-

tourists to see and visit the Canyon... not one sign did we see anywhere along the route. If you didn't know where you were going... you would surely have to stop and inquire the way.

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

Beware of instant flour. There's more in the cup than meets the eye.

When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe, says Vivian Warminski, county home demonstration agent.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for making gravy.

In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid. For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agricultural Research Service suggests improving the taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggest that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

Are you on a diet? The first thing many people cut out when going on a diet is potatoes, because they believe potatoes are fattening. No, potatoes are not fattening.

No food is fattening until your body's need for calories has been met.

Surplus food from any source is changed to fat and stored in the body.

One medium-sized potato, 5 ounces, supplies 90 calories. This is about the same as a medium sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a high-calorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two to three times as high in calories as the same weight of boiled or baked potatoes. And the sour cream of butter or margarine added to the baked potato for tastiness also add up in the calorie category.

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

Draft Board Questions Are Being Asked

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q--I received my bachelor's Degree in June. I have been accepted for graduate study in history in September. Will I qualify for II-S deferment?

A--This depends on your board's decision. If it defers you, the new regulations permit it to do so for one year only.

Q--I have completed three years of college and have earned 75% of the units required for my degree, but my class standing is very low. Can I be deferred for my senior year?

A--Yes. You must be classified in II-S (college student) if you are full time and satisfactory. Class standing doesn't matter any more.

Q--I've heard that the deferment of graduate students in medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, osteopathy, and optometry is now mandatory. Is that right?

A--Yes, if the student is satisfactory in his studies.

Q--Who decides he is satisfactory?

A--The school in which he's enrolled.

Q--Who gets classified in Class I-Y?

A--A man who takes the Armed Forces physical and mental examination and is not found qualified for service, but could be later if Congress declared war or national emergency.

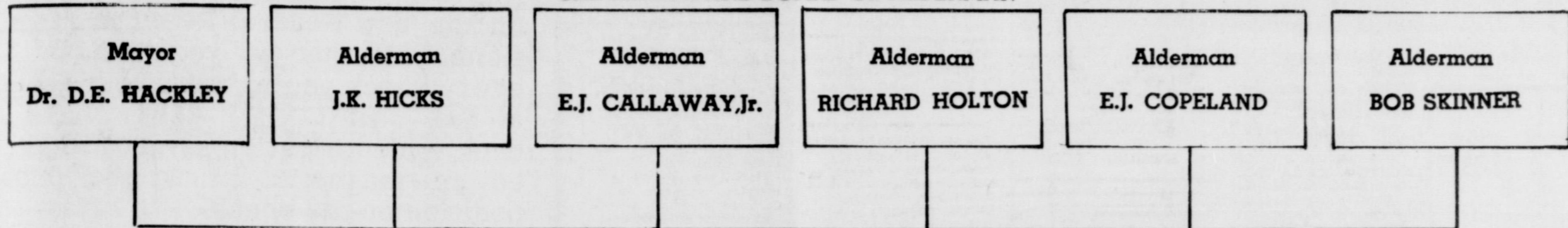

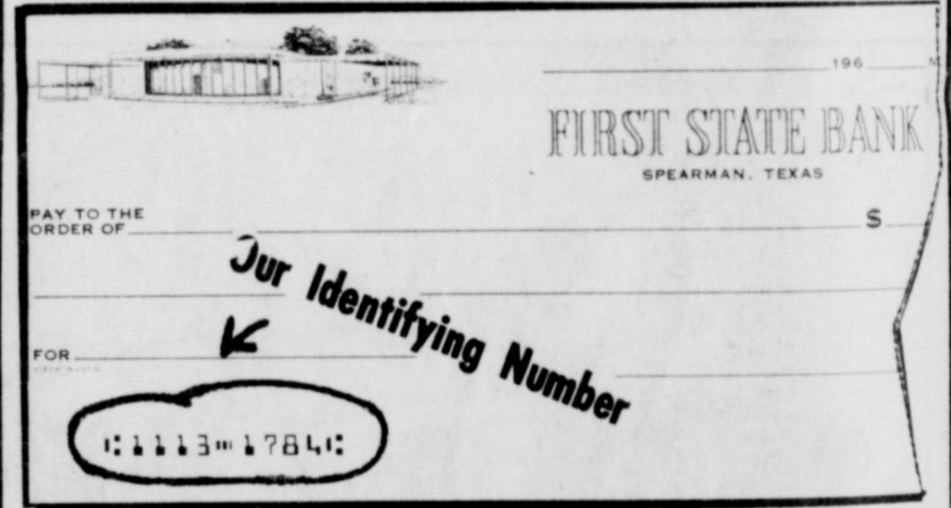



IRRIGATION WATER MANAGEMENT

In order to apply irrigation water efficiently it must be applied according to the needs of the specific crop, the type soil in the field being irrigated, and according to a designed irrigation system. At this time of year grain sorghum is using about 3/10 of an inch of water a day. Pullman soil which is the predominant irrigated soil in Hansford County will hold about 3 inches of available water in grain sorghum's effective root zone. An irrigation system should be designed to water grain sorghum about each ten days, during this peak use period, grain sorghum will use less water so additional acres can be pre-watered on irrigated, but after boot stage maximum yields will come from cutting back acres to that which can be held at medium moisture levels. The Soil Conservation Service can provide you with soils and crop information for your farm and help you develop an efficient irrigation system.

Plant Research Center Will Be Dedicated, 7th

Further plans for dedicating the Knox City Plant Materials Center on Sept. 7, 1967, were announced today by H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple. Donald A. Williams, SCS Administrator, Washington, D. C. will be the key speaker and Smith will be master of ceremonies. The dedication program will start at 11:00 A. M. A catered lunch will be served after the dedication. Smith said tours of the center will be conducted from 8:30 to 10:30 A. M. and from 1:00 to 3:00 P. M. Several hundred seed dealers, growers, conservation district supervisors, farmers, ranchers, city developers, sportsmen, and others interested in the plants being tested will attend. The center serves Texas, Oklahoma and adjoining states. The job of SCS plant materials centers is to find, evaluate, and put into use better plants to solve varied soil and water conservation problems. Planting materials being used include seed, sprigs, and rootstock. After improved plants are identified and proved at the center, they are grown in seed

increase plots. After harvest, seed is used to make trial plantings on district cooperator's farms. After final tests, superior varieties are identified and released to commercial seed growers who produce seed for public sale. These growers produced about two million pounds of grass seed in Texas last year, mostly from strains released by SCS plant materials centers. Tickets to the lunch following the program are being sold by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce for \$1.75. People who plan to buy tickets at the center are being asked to notify the Chamber of Commerce or local SCS offices so a crowd estimate can be made.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows: "Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor,

or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks. "While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. "From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. "All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks." ### Higher Standards Required For 1968 Auto Inspection

Texas motorists will find higher standards will be required in automotive safety inspections starting August 28. Captain Alan Johnson, in charge of the Texas Department of Public Safety's Motor Vehicle Inspection Service in the northwest Texas area, said the vehicle inspection period starting late this month will continue through the usual deadline, April 15.

Quickest to catch the eye of the Texas motorist will be the new seat belt regulations. Another new provision is the inspection fee itself, raised to a \$1.75 from the previous rate of \$1.00.

The state legislature has ruled that front seat belts must be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. Captain Johnson points out that seat belt anchorages are threaded holes in the vehicles' structure suitable for receiving seat belt attachment fittings. "And seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on all American made passenger cars beginning with 1962 models," the captain explained.

Seat belts also will be required on foreign made cars in which seat belt anchorages were original equipment. In addition, the new regulation requires that seat belts must be in serviceable condition, that attachment fittings are not damaged or loose, and that seat belt buckles are operative.

The new safety regulations also take in two more new areas--calling for mechanics to inspect steering, wheels and rims.

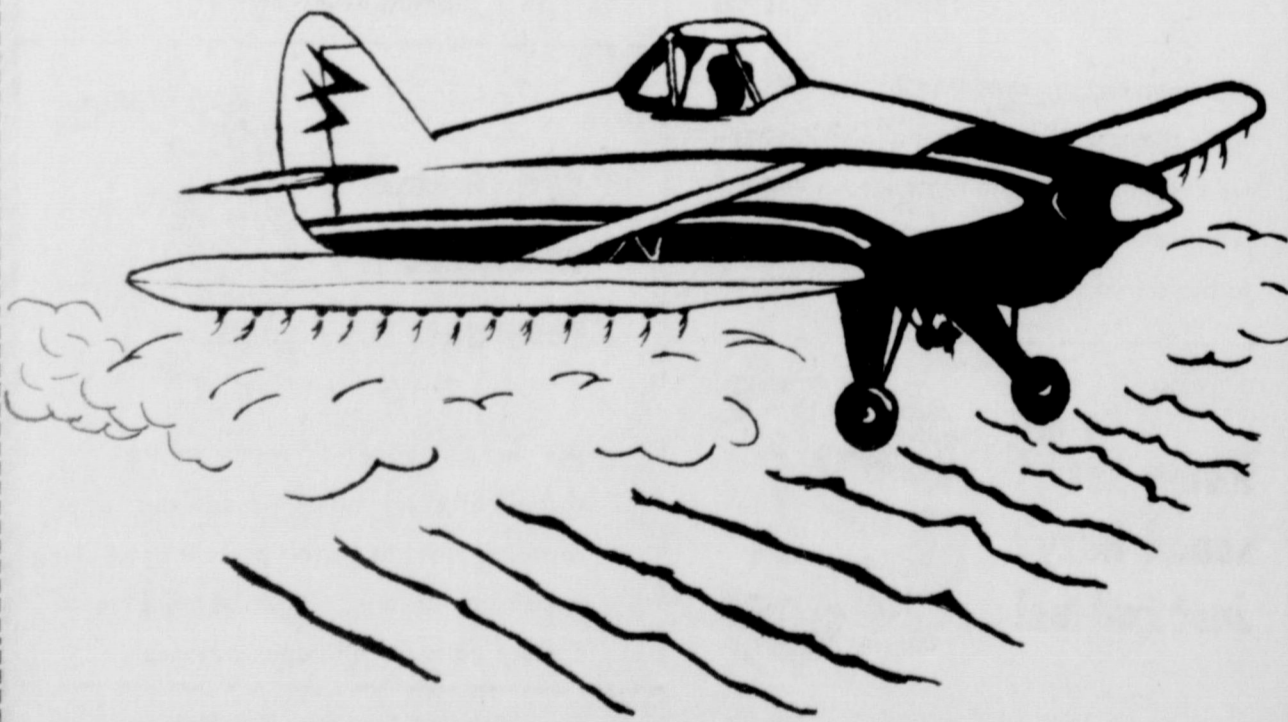
Safety inspection stickers will not be issued to vehicles with loose steering, in which the steering wheel can be moved more than two inches (measured on the outside rim) without movement of the front wheels.

Also rejected will be those vehicles in which the steering wheel cannot be turned from full right to full left without jamming, and those in which the power steering fluid is below the recommended level.

In inspecting wheels and rims, mechanics are forbidden to issue safety stickers to vehicles with defective or bent rim flanges; or loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs; or rims with defects and cracks that may impair the safe mounting and proper retention of tires.

Captain Johnson urges that residents of Hansford County obtain 1968 safety inspections as soon as possible, since more than 6,200 vehicles must be checked at official inspection stations by the April 15 deadline.

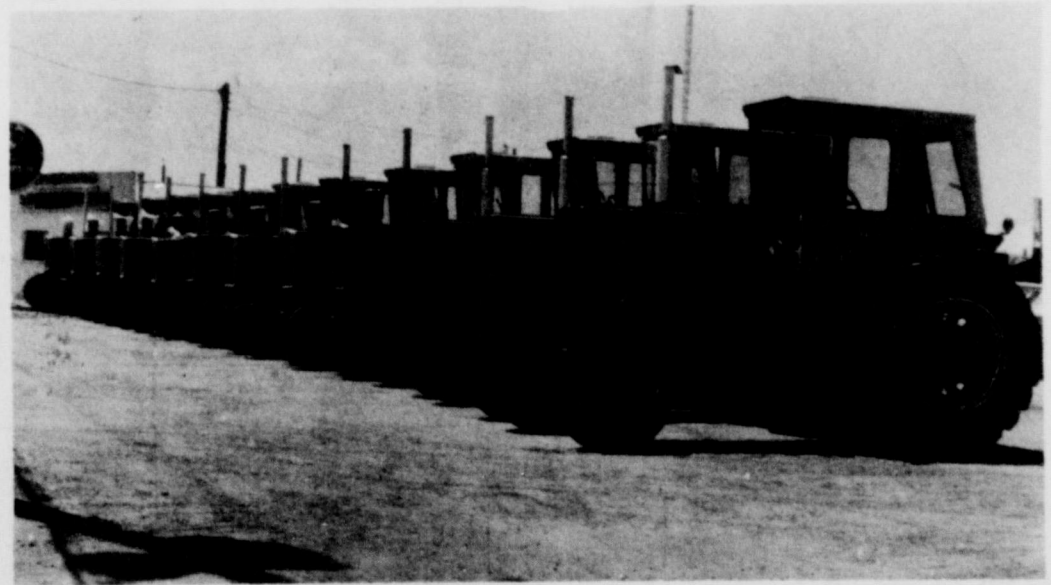
