### McIntyre Child Loses Fingers Mary Katherine McIntyre,

3-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ben McIntyre of rural Spearman, is in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo following a serious accident which happ-ened late Monday.

The child had accompanied her father to the feed lot where Ben started the water pump to wash down some feeding pens. He had just started the pump and anice to do another chore when he saw his small daughter reach for the shaft.

The shaft caught the child's right hand, severing the tips of the fore and little finger and the two middle fingers above the second joints.

She was rushed to the Am-arillo hospital where plastic surgery was performed immediately. In this type of surgery the fingers are sewn to the abdomen until new skin growth begins.

Physicians say she will regain ructure and future budget hand. She will be hospitalized for several days.



### Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . By Vivian Warminski Hansford Co. Home Demonstration Agent

Beware of instant flour. There's more in the cup than

meets the eye.
When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each of cup of flour ca-lled for by the recipe, says Vivian Warminski, county home demonstration agent.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as la-rger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for ma-

king gravy.
In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid. For example, in popovers, the batter do-esn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly. The Agricultural Research

Service suggests improving the taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggest that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant

flour to soak up water.
Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

Are you on a diet? The first thing many people cut out when going on a diet is potatoes, because they believe potatoes are fattening. No, potatoes are not fattening.
No food is fattening until

your body's need for calories has been met. Surplus food from any source is changed to fat and stored in

One medium-sized potato, 5 ounces, supplies 90 calories, This is about the same as a medium sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a highcalorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two to three times as high in calories as the same weight of boiled or baked potatoes. And the sour cream of butter or margarine added to the baked potato for tastiness also add up in the

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

A--Yes. You must be classified in II-S (college student) if you are full time and satisfactory. Class standing doesn't matter any more. Q -- I've heard that the defer-

ment of graduate students in medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, ostepathy, and optometry is now mandatory. Is that right?

A -- Yes, if the student is satisfactory in his studies.
Q--Who decides he is sat-

isfactory? A -- The school in which he's

enrolled. Q--Who gets classified in Class I-Y?

A -- A man who takes the Armed Forces physical and mental examination and is not found qualified for service, but could be later if Congress declared war or national em-

IRRIGATION FROM NEWLY INSTALLED IRRIGATION PI

IRRIGATION WATER MANAGEMENT

In order to apply irrigation water efficiently it must be applied according to the needs of the specific crop, the type soil in the field being irrigated, and according to a designed irrigation system. At this time of year grain sorghum is using about 3/10 of an inch of water a day. Pullman soil which is the predominent irrigated soil in Hansford County will hold about 3 inches of available water in grain sorghums effective root zone. An irrigation system should be designed to water grain sorghum about each ten days, during this peak use period. on pullman soil. Prior to this peak water use period, grain sorghum will use less water so additional acres can be pre-watered on irrigated, but after boot stage maximum yields will come from cutting back acres to that which can be held at medium moisture levels.

The Soil Conservation Service can provide you with soils and crop information for your farm and help you develope an efficient irrigation system.



## Higher Standards Required For 1968 Auto Inspection

Texas motorists will find higher standards will be required in automotive safety inspections starting August 28.
Captain Alan Johnson, in charge of the Texas Department of Public Safety's Motor Vehicle Inspection Service in the northwest Texas area, said the vehicle inspection period starting late this month will continue through the

usual deadline, April 15.

Quickest to catch the eye of the Texas motorist will be the new seat belt regulations. Another new provision is the inspection fee itself, raised to a \$1.75 from the previous rate of \$1.00.

The state legislature has ruled that front seat belts must be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment, Captain Johnson points out that seat belt anchorages are threaded holes in the vehicles structure suitable for receiving seat belt attachment fittings. "And seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original eqon all American made passenger cars beginnng with 1962 models," the captain explained.

Seat belts also will be required on foreign made cars in which seat belt anchorages were original equipment. In addition, the new regulation requires that seat belts must be in serviceable condition, that attachment fittings are not damages or loose, and that seat belt buck-

les are operative.

The new safety regulations also take in two more new areas--calling for mechanics to inspect steering, wheels

Safety inspection stickers will not be issued to vehic-les with loose steering, in which the steering wheel can be moved more than two inches (measured on the outside rem) without movement of the front wheels. Also rejected will be those vehicles in which the steer-


ing wheel cannot be turned from full right to full left without jamming, and those in which the power steering fluid is below the recommended level. In inspecting wheels and rims, mechanics are for-bidden to issue safety stickers to vehicles with defect-ive or bent rim flanges; or loose or missing bolts, nuts

Captain Johnson urges that residents of Hansford County obtain 1968 safety inspections as soon as possible, since more than 6,200 vehicles must be checked at official inspection stations by the April 15 deadline.






