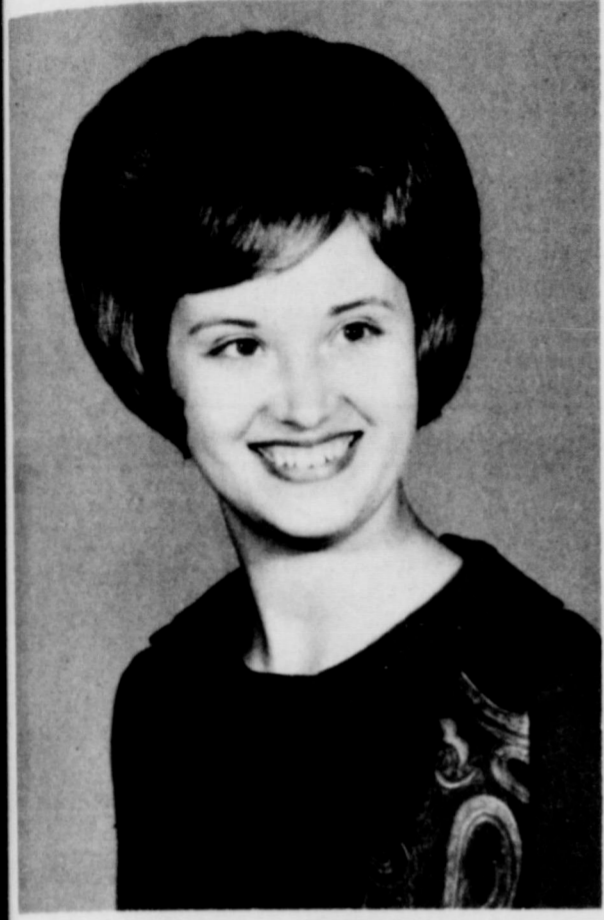

Rebecca Hutchison Named "First" In State Of Texas



Rebecca Hutchison, 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delight Hutchison, Spearman, Hansford County, has been named winner of the State 4-H Bread Award for 1967.

The state 4-H Club office announcement said she would receive a trip to National 4-H Club Congress to be held in Chicago, Ill., Nov. 26-30. Standard Brands Inc. is donor for the award program.

Rebecca is a senior in Spearman High School and an eight year member of the "4-H Clover" Club where she has held local and district offices since 1959. She has been an active participant in many of the club's projects, and has completed projects ranging from food and nutrition to soil conservation, doing 22 projects in Foods alone.

Her interest in bread stems from her background of living on a wheat farm with her parents.

"Naturally I am interested in what be comes of the product which my family makes its living from... learning how important the bread and cereal group is in keeping bodies healthy," she decided to enter the bread program, says Rebecca.

And enter she has. She won the ribbons in the State 4-H Bread show in 1965 and 1967.

In her eight years of club work she has baked more than 1,160 loaves of bread for her family and many other goodies.

Vivian Warminski, county home demonstration agent, who now supervises Rebecca's 4-H projects, says: "Rebecca is always willing and eager to take her part in helping other 4-H members with their projects as well as doing a most commendable job on her own work."

The award winner is a member of the National Honor Society, active in school, church and community affairs and a top junior 4-H leader. She plans to become a bio-chemist in nutrition and credits 4-H with influencing her decision.

Miss Hutchison will leave for Dallas Thanksgiving day to attend the 35 other Texans. The next day the group will leave for the Santa Fe Chief for Chicago and will return home December 2nd.

"This first in state" award is the top award any 4-Her can receive besides the Washington Trip. Rebecca has worked toward this goal for a long year. It is a real honor for the talented young lady and for Hansford County, and is the highest 4-H award ever won by a 4-Her. There is just one in the state of Texas who can win this contest and Hansford County is very proud to share the honor with Rebecca.

Mrs. Etta Haralson has gone home for the week. She has company from California visiting here so she went home to be with them.

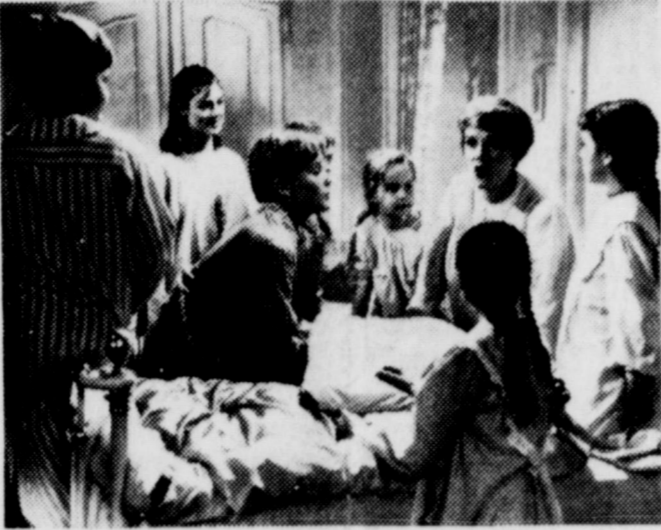

Flea Beetle Invading County Wheat Fields

Robert Adamson, Hansford County Agent, reports that flea beetles have caused damage to wheat in the county. These small, shiny, black beetles are about the size of a pin head and jump readily when disturbed, reports the agent. Their hind legs are distinctly enlarged and thickened, resembling those of a grasshopper.

The wheat leaves are skeletonized, giving the injured plants a bleached appearance before they wilt and die.

Generally, if the flea beetle infestation is found early enough, the treatment along the border of a field is sufficient to prevent extensive damage. Adamson says the treated area should extend at least fifty yards beyond the damaged area and into the healthy wheat.

Flea beetles can be controlled by applying Malathion at the rate of 1 pound actual material per acre or 1/2 pound of Parathion.

Farmers Urged To Donate Maize For Proposed New Library Bldg.

A campaign to raise \$75 thousand dollars for construction and equipping a new Library in Spearman began moving this week.

The campaign to raise the money by public subscription is being started with a campaign to get farmers to donate grain during the current harvest season.

Farmers will be able to take a "double deduction" from their income tax if they donate grain. Tax accountants and Library board members have looked into this and invite farmers to inquire about the deduction from their CPA.

All four of the Spearman elevators have agreed to help with the drive and anyone wishing to donate grain for the Library building fund may do so just by telling the elevator to credit the grain to Hansford County Library building fund. Planning to build the library began this year after a petition for a bond election was refused by county commissioners.

A committee composed of members of the library board, Chamber of Commerce Members and Club women have been working on the finance plan. It is expected the fund campaign will take from three to five years to complete.

STUDENTS TO HELP WITH LIBRARY

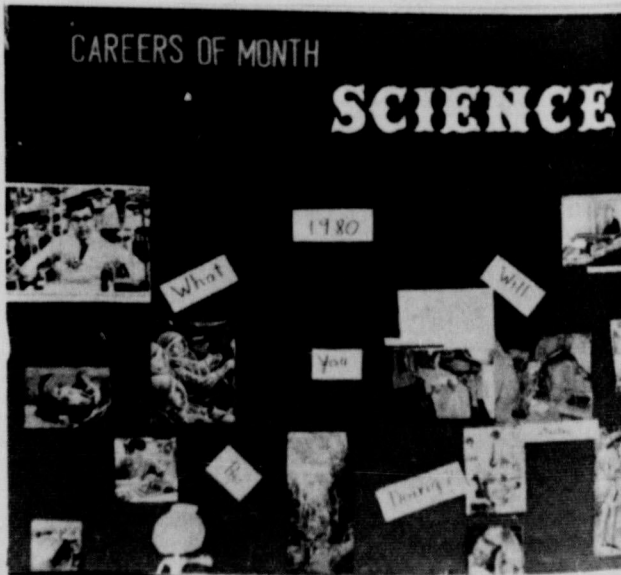

Let Me See ... by Sybil

Noticed in Perryton's Sunday newspaper where workers are busy trying to raise \$40,000 for the Ochiltree United Fund drive. The money will go to Perryton YMCA, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, plus a minor amount for the USO. The effort was a well organized one planned to get each contributor to pledge at least a day's pay a year or an hour's pay per month.

Now I don't know what the average pay scale by the day or hour would amount to in Perryton (nor in Spearman either for that matter) but I quickly took mental note of how much I would be pledging if I gave a day's pay one time a year, or an hour's pay once each month. Boy they won't collect much from the laboring class if their salary isn't any more than MINE is. \$6.00 a year isn't giving very much it seems to me and that would be my "days pay once a year" pledge. But an hours pay once each month (75 cents) seems even less... but in the long run would amount to \$9.00 per year so that would be the pledge United Fund Workers would prefer me to give.

See how simple that is? Just think, 75 cents per month is all I would have to take up. Let's say there are 5,000 working people in Ochiltree County (I am sure there are many more than this). And let's say they all get paid peon wages like I do and can ONLY give 75 cents per month! BUT if they all will give 75 cents per month for 1 year they will go over their goal by five thousand dollars!

This seems like peanuts... 75 cents, I would want to give at least two dollars that month. Did you know that this is exactly the kind of pledge - scheme that we are trying to work out for the proposed Hansford County Library? A \$75,000 goal seems large. But we have 3 to 4 years in which to raise this amount.

The finance committee has prepared pledge cards, or subscription blanks if you prefer. The idea is to get EVERYBODY to GIVE. Dollars... thousands, hundreds, fifties, fives, AND ONES. Even 75 cents per month will be gladly accepted, and this money won't be going out of town... it's for a big beautiful Library building in Spearman, something for our use, for our children, our children's children, etc., etc.

If every citizen in Spearman (\$7,000) would give one dollar per month this would bring in \$84,000.00 per month, or \$1,008,000.00 in ONE YEAR.

If 1,000 people would give \$4.00 per month, this would equal the same figure as above. If 500 people would give an out-right donation of \$50.00 this would be \$25,000.00 or one-third of our goal.

If 100 people in the county would give \$500.00 each, this would be \$50,000.00. See how this works out? The point we are trying to make is this... YOUR LITTLE BIT helps... 75¢ per month even.

Our local postmaster doubts that his department can persuade everyone to put zip codes on all their letters. After all, he explained, there's still a good-sized group which can't remember to put on the stamp.

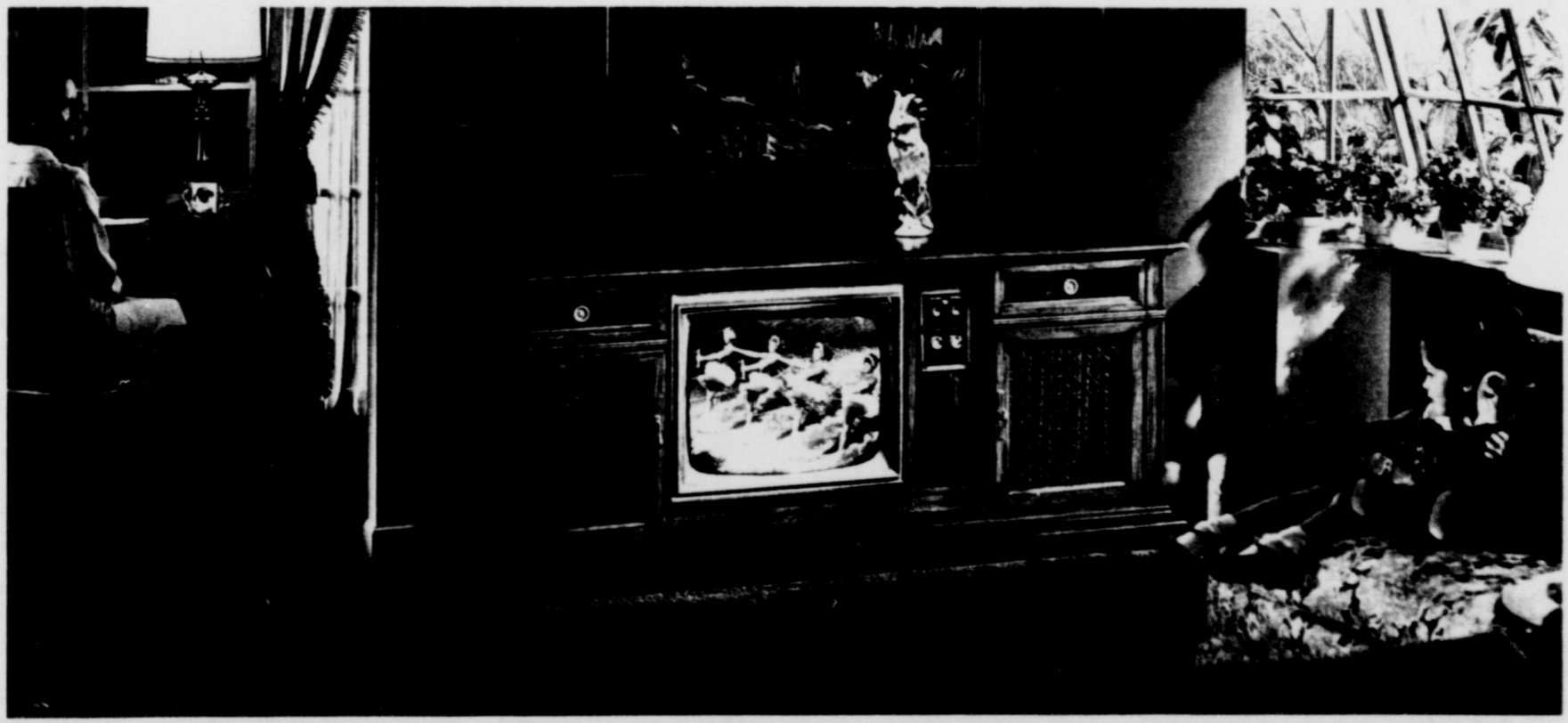

through the eyes of chet wise

Several days ago, I started setting up a dark-room for photographic work in the spare room at our house.

I had most every piece of equipment needed for the operation except for 3 things: I needed some method of blocking off a door-way and two windows in the room where I planned to operate. I went to a place of business here in Spearman and asked the manager what he could suggest for the job. I told him I needed something that I could put up and take down quickly. He mentioned a number of wall boards and other things he could supply from his stock. Each time he mentioned something that would do the job he would shake his head and remark that the cost would run into several dollars. He had the measurements of the door and windows and after much figuring on various materials he suddenly came up with just the thing I needed. It's a black plastic used for tarps and laying cement. He showed it to me and I went away with much more than enough material to do the job and it cost me 51 cents.

I also needed a tub of some kind for washing finished prints. I went into another Spearman store and told the boss what I needed. He had several metallic tubs but they were pretty expensive, so he asked if I couldn't do the job with a plastic container. When I answered yes, he supplied me with a tub that would do a perfect job for \$1.50.

BOND SALES IN COUNTY

Mr. C. A. Gibner, chairman of the Hansford County Savings Bonds Committee announced today that sales in Hansford County totaled \$1,274, during the month of August. Sales for the first 8 months of 1967 totaled \$35,324, and this is 39 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$90,000.

Series E & H Savings Bonds and Freedom Share sales in Texas during August totaled \$13,863,163, which is an increase of 8.3 per cent over the same period last year. Sales for the

first 8 months totaled \$111,942,171 and this is 62 per cent of the 1967 sales goal of \$181.3 million.

Nationally, new purchases of E & H Savings Bonds during August amounted to \$392 million which is 1.3 percent over the \$387 million a year ago. The January-August sales totaled \$3,420 million; 3 per cent above sales last year and an 11-year peak for 8 months' sales.

Vets In School Get More Money

Veterans now in school will soon receive automatic increases in their GI Bill education checks, Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said today.

The new amounts will be included in checks scheduled to arrive in November, the new rates having become effective October 1.

The rate increases were provided in Public Law 90-77 signed last month by the President. Single veterans taking full-time courses have been increased from \$100 to \$130, veterans with one dependent from \$125 to \$155, and veterans with two dependents from \$150 to \$175. An additional \$10 will be provided monthly for each dependent in excess of two.

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

By Vivian Warminski
Hansford Co. Home Demonstration Agent

Nature offers the best materials for dried arrangements, and now is the best time to collect them.

Dried plant materials are ideal for creating designs for fall and winter with an outdoor or nature theme. Almost anything available is good to use, some suggestions are grain, weeds, flowers, tree branches and driftwood and drying roses, marigolds, zinnias, salvias, pansies, and carnations in a box of sand.

Place an inch of sand in the box. Carefully place the flowers on the sandy surface, and slowly pour additional sand over the flowers until covered. Put only one layer of flowers in a box, and allow two weeks for them to dry. At the end of this time, pierce holes in the bottom of the box and allow sand to drain.

Hang milkweed, poppy, yucca, celosia, goldenrod, strawflower, and baby's breath upside down to dry. Preserve branches of magnolias, oaks, maples and some woody type flowers in glycerin and water. Stand freshly cut branches in 2 inches of equal parts of glycerin and water for about two weeks. Branches will have a glossy, fresh appearance and remain pliable. Place leaves, ferns and grasses between sheets of newspaper and press with flat boards. Spray dried materials with plastic or wax aerosols for prolonged keeping qualities.

HELPFUL HINTS:
When selecting neckties for your husband, remember that not every shape and design looks well on every man. A man with a long, thin face needs polka dots and circular patterns, while a man with a round face appears less round-faced if wearing diagonal or vertical stripes. And, if you happen to be selecting a hat for that male species, remember hats should blend with the coat - not match.

ANOTHER USE FOR TALCUM:
When rubbed on and left overnight, often removes soap spots and other greasy nature foods from ties. When the powder is brushed away, the spot usually goes with it.
KEEP ICE CREAM FRESHER LONGER: Ice cream packed in ordinary waxed-cardboard cartons will keep quality longer in a home freezer if the car-

ton is wrapped in heavy aluminum foil, say U. D. Department of Agriculture food specialists. Also, make sure the freezer is holding a temperature of 0 degrees F. or below.
CLEANING QUIZ FOR BLANKETS: Should electric blankets be dry cleaned? No, report U. S. Department of Agriculture electric specialists. Also, it's best not to use dry cleaning fluids on electric blankets because the fluids can damage the insulation on the electric wiring. Follow laundering directions that come with the blanket. They usually suggest short wash, rinse and spin cycles. Use cold or warm water and don't dry the blanket in a dryer.

Draft Board Questions

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q--We have a farm, most of which is planted in wheat. Should there be a shortage of wheat this year, would this be a factor for receiving an agricultural deferment?

A--Under the new law, surpluses and shortages of agricultural commodities may now be considered by a draft board in reaching its decisions on agricultural deferments.

Q--How do I apply for deferment as an undergraduate college student?

A--You can get a convenient form called "Request for Undergraduate Student Deferment" (SSS Form 104) from your draft board. Some college registrars also have it. A letter to your draft board requesting student deferment will also be accepted.

Q--My father, an Army sergeant, is being transferred outside the U.S. I won't be 18 until after we've departed the country. What do I do about registering with Selective Service?

A--On your 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter, present yourself to the nearest diplomatic or consular officer of the United States and he will register you.

Q--Are 18 year-olds inducted first under this new law?

A--No, not now; but they could be later.

Farmers Union St. Convention Is Scheduled

Outstanding speakers of state and nationwide reputation will headline the program of the 64th annual state convention of Texas Farmers Union scheduled to begin its three-day meeting on Thursday, October 26, at the Ko Ko Palace in Lubbock.

Young wives--tell the computer about your new name.

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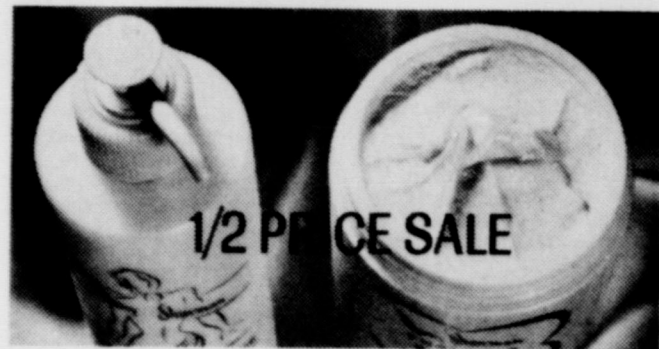

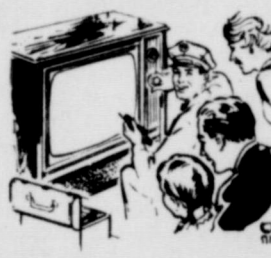
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
