COLD FRONT HAMPERED HARVESTING

our area over the past week end caused residents to dig out winter coats and call the plumber to turn on furnaces.

Since October 4, tempera-tures have hovered in the low and middle 70's for high and from 35-40 for lows.

The front brought with it only light shower activity. Most Spearman rain guages showed near one-half inch, but 5 miles west at Old Hansford not even a trace was recorded. Perryton to the north east and Panhandle to the south, however, received over two inches

Maize harvesters are not anxious for rain fall at the present. Farmers are hoping the weather will "hold" and give grain a chance to ripen. Hopes are that the weather man will delay frost for 3 more weeks at least.

Harvesting has and will continue to be sporadic for several weeks. Some farmers have finished harvest completely, many will not begin for 3 more weeks. Cutting has been so apotted thus far, no averages are available. However, many farmers b elieve they will have over 8000 lbs. per acre average. If this estimate proves true, this will be a great yield increase over last vear's average.

Flea Beetle Invading **County Wheat Fields**

Robert Adamson, Hansford County Agent, reports that flea beetles have caused damage to wheat in the county. These small, shiny, black be-etles are about the size of a pin head and jump readily when disturbed, reports the agent. Their hind legs are distinctly enlarged and thickened, resem-

bling those of a grasshopper.
The wheat leaves are skeletonized, giving the injured pla-nts a bleached appearance be-fore they wilt and die.

Generally, if the flea beetle infestation is found early enough, the treatment along the border of a field is sufficient to prevent extensive damage. Adamson says the treated area should extend at least fifty yards beyond the damaged area and into the healthy wheat.

Flea beetles can be controlled by apllying Malathion at the rate of 1 pound actual material per acre or 1/2 pound of

Parathion.

This exhibit will be permanent and is displayed to encourage other students to keep up their grades and become members.


STUDENTS TO HELP WITH LIBRARY





Dried plant materials are ideal for creating designs for fall and winter with an out door or nature theme.

Almost anything available is good to use, some suggestions are grain, weeds, flowers, tree branches and driftwood and drying roses, marigolds, zinnias, salvias, pansies, and carna-tions in a box of sand.

Place an inch of sand in the box. Carefully place the flo-wers on the sandy surface, and slowly pour additional sand over the flowers until covered. Put only one layer of flowers in a box, and allow two weeks dryer. for them to dry. At the end of this time, pierce holes in the bottom of the box and allow sand to drain.

Hang milkweed, poppy, yu-cca, celosia, goldenrod, straw-flower, and baby's breath upside down to dry. Preserve branches of magnolias, oaks, map-les and some woody type flower in glycerin and water. Stand freshly cut branches in 2 inc hes of equal parts of glycerin and water for about two weeks Branches will have a glossy, fresh appearance and remain pliable. Place leaves, ferns and grasses between sheets of newspaper and press with flat ooards. Spray dried materials with plastic or wax aerosols for prolonged keeping qualities HELPFUL HINTS:


