MUST WAIT 30 DAYS TO APPEAL ODT WAR CERTIFICATES

Truck operators who have already received their Certificate of War Necessity from the Office of Defense Transportation were reminded Friday that NO Appeal can be filed until 30 days after the Certificate is received.

"The tires we are trying to save are being burned up all over the region by truck operators rushing in to the district ODT motor transport offices as soon as they get their Certificates. District offices are working under terrific pressure in issuing all these Certificates for commercial motor vehicles, and everybody is human enough to make an occasional mistake. These are few, however. In most instances, the Certificate has been correctly tailored according to the application filed by the operator.

Appeals may be filed with the ODT district offices of motor transport 30 days after the Certificate of War Necessity has been received by the operator. His appeal must prove clearly, however, that the needs of the war or the maintenance of essential civilian economy require a change in the Certificate. The appeal must also show records for a period of 7 consecutive days within the 30-day period. These records, submitted under oath, must show the origin and destination of each trip, the miles operated on each trip, the total units of freight carried on each trip. The commodity transported and the use to be made of it, and the maximum capacity of the vehicle for that commodity must be shown also.

Some reduction in mileage must be made, otherwise there is no point in Order 21.

334 NAT'L. FARM LOANS MADE IN HANSFORD COUNTY

The Hansford National Farm Loan Association has had a big part in the 100,000 Federal Land Bank loans closed in Texas. According to P. A. Lyon, secretary-treasurer, 324 loans have been made in this territory to farmers and ranchmen.

"The recent closing of loan No. 100,000 in Grayson County through the Sherman National Farm Loan Association makes us proud of the service rendered by the Land Bank system in its 25-year history. This loan was only a few miles away from loan No. 1 in 1917, and today in good standing, well on the road to being paid off through systematic payments out of earnings of the farm under a long-term, low interest rate loan," stated Mr Lyon.

The Hansford National Farm Loan Association has closed 334 Land Bank loans, and 227 Land Bank Commissioner loans for a total of \$2,619,360.00 out of which \$792,000.00 has been retired. Mr Lyon said that the national farm loan associations in Texas owning the Federal Land Bank of Houston have closed approximately \$344,000.00 in Land Bank loans and \$83,000,000 in Land Bank Commissioner loans. Of this amount, about one-third of the number and one-half of the face amount of loans closed have been repaid.

In the passing of Mr Wilbanks, our county has lost another of its real pioneers, who did his share toward developing the county and making the Panhandle a better place in which to live.

Funeral services were held at the family home in Spearman Wednesday, Nov. 25 at 2 p. m.

Mr Gulley, minister of the Perryton Church of Christ read the obituary. A public address system carried the services to hundreds of friends.

Floyd Daniel Wilbanks was born Aug. 11, 1865 at Cleburne, Johnson county, Texas. He was united in marriage to Miss Susan Bowden, March 17, 1889. The family celebrated Susan and Floyd's 50th wedding anniversary March 17, 1940. His death was the first one in the entire family.

Floyd and Susan were the proud parents of six children: Hiram, Lawrence, Mrs J. C. Klutts, Spearman; Virgil and Henry, Dumas; and Mrs W. S. Bradford, Tulsa, Okla.

There are four grandchildren Glenn Raye Bradford; Marguerite, H. Allan and Jane and a friend of the family for 46 years T. H. Moon.

He is survived also by two brothers, Ernest of Spearman; M. B. of Fort Worth and one sister Mrs Norman Fox, Walters Oklahoma.

He was a member of the Church of Christ.

The family moved to Hansford county in 1903 where Mr Wilbanks engaged in farming and stock raising. A few years later he moved to Cimarron county, Oklahoma where he helped to settle that county by hauling prospective residents out to file on the land.

He retired about 20 years ago and had lived in Spearman since.

Mr Wilbanks enjoyed the best of health until 2 years ago. His condition was not considered critical until the past 3 months. He became seriously ill Sunday Nov. 15 and in spite of all that kind friends and relatives could do he passed quietly away Monday, Nov. 23 at 9:10 p. m.

30,000 TEXANS BURN TO DEATH IN 3-YEAR FIRE RECORD

The loss of American lives by fire, when compared with death lists during three years of war in bomb-battered England, is described by Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner as deplorable. The comparison he said, presents a "very unpleasant picture."

In a vain effort to defeat the British, Nazi planes rained flaming hell from the skies over England. War casualties in the first three years ending Aug. 1942 show that German air raiders killed 45,871 persons in England.

Approximately 30,000 civilians burned to death in America during the same period.

"Fatal fires are almost a daily occurrence in Texas," Hall said. "They result from acts of carelessness—our failure to consider either the safety of others or our own safety. If as many of our people in Texas were killed by bomb as there are by fire, we would do something to stop it. Yet, a life lost by fire is just as horrible a tragedy as one lost by an enemy bomb."

Cause to be Thankful! Hansford county produced 4,093,557 bushels of wheat in 1942.

Of this amount 3,324,685 bu. was produced from 129,000 ac. for an acre average of 25.3. The remaining 768,872 bu. was produced from 49,704 acres of volunteer wheat. The acre average for volunteer was 15.5

Average price for No. 1 wheat through the AAA loan program was \$1.08.

This year's crop is the biggest ever grown in Hansford county, with exact records available. The 1928 crop is supposed to have been bigger, but no official records were kept on it.

Experts estimate the beef cattle population of the county at 125,000 head. Probably 75,000 head will winter here. One producer cleared over \$100.00 per head on 150 steers.

At least four wheat producers of this county raised over 100,000 bushels of wheat each, with the biggest production 175,000 bushels.

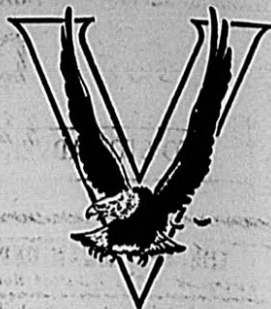

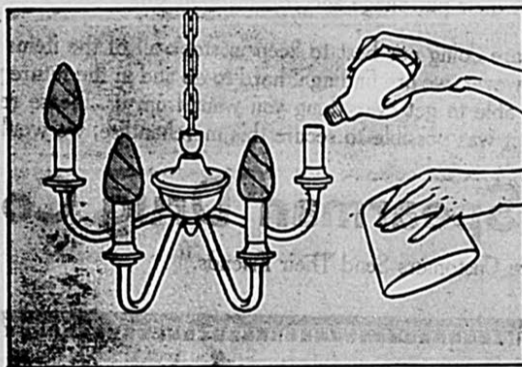
