Allred Bases Campaign On Issues Rather Than Mere Personalities

Consistently holding his campaign on the plane of "issues rather than personalities," where he set it in his opening speech, Governor James V. Allred continued his campaign for a second term in office through West and Central Texas this week.

"The Allred record" includes: Inauguration of the first comprehensive social security program in the history of Texas, including of course, old Age assistance payments which began July 1 to more than 40,000 of the state's aged under an actual ad valorem tax reduction of 15 cents on the \$100 valuation that cut \$4,787,400 from the tax bill of Texas tax payers during 1935; advocacy of a natural resources tax increase, but limited so as not to handicap Texas products in the world market; establishment of a clemency-by-merit-only policy and of the voluntary parole board system as forward steps in convict rehabilitation work; highest appropriations for schools and rural aid in the history of the state.

Rally To Be Held In Amarillo July 23

Ernest is a home town boy who made good in a big way and who has done much for the Panhandle as well as for the rest of the state. He is the first state official from the Panhandle to be up for re-election since I can remember. I say re-election, because he is one of the few men in history chosen from the Panhandle to a state office and his first term as a member of the Texas Railroad Commission has been marked by such unusual efficiency and statesmanship that the Texas Commission is now looked upon by the nation as the leader in this field.

Vice President Garner Picks Allred For Next Lone Star Governor

Vive President John N. Garner broke his traditional silence on political matters here today with a brief statement endorsing Governor James V. Allred and expressing a hope that the Governor will win renomination in the first primary without the necessity of waging a run-off campaign.

Less Than 50 Per Cent Hansford Old Age Have Received Pension Check

Of the estimated 75 Hansford county people who applied for old age assistance under the new pension law, approximately 41 per cent have received their check in the first rush payment or disbursements sent out from Austin July 1, it is estimated.

The amounts vary from \$5.00 the lowest to \$30.00 the highest, the average for the county being near \$16.00. It is understood that of the 75 who applied some will not be accepted. Special investigators, several of whom have made surveys in Spearman must approve cases before applicants can be placed on the rolls and it is explained that many who will receive have not yet been interviewed.

The placing of this pension law in operation represents months of work on the part of Orville Carpenter, director and his assistants.

Carpenter and the Commissioners worked steadily conferring with Washington frequently to ascertain if their organization as it was built step by step, was in line with the requirements of the Social Security Board. This board required that the Texas set-up be approved before Federal funds were forthcoming to match State money.

Another problem faced by Carpenter was the attitude held by old people who had been given too high aspirations by the Townsend plan movement. Contrary to the working of the Texas Old Age assistance Amendment and to the wording of the Texas law, a number of old people in Texas believed that everyone regardless of wealth and condition should be given a pension if they were 60 years of age. The Texas law in accordance with the State Amendment and the Social Security law set the age limit at 65 years and made the provision that aid should go only to those in need.

Finally after three months of investigation the Social Security Board on San Jacinto Day gave official approval to the whole Texas set-up and granted \$1,181,250 to the State as one half of estimated payments to be made during the months of July and August to old people. After the most recent prorating of funds there was \$1,550,914.21 available in the Texas Treasury from State sources in addition to the Federal grant.

Carpenter has followed a humane policy of investigating the most needy cases first; so the 40,000 checks represent the old people of Texas who are in need. Other applicants will receive their first check as soon as their cases are approved. Payments to those who applied before July 1 will be such as if they had been approved before this date; in other words, if a person of his application until August 1, he will receive two checks—one for July and the other for August.

"We have had marvelous co-operation from the old people in the State" he continued "because they have done everything in their power to help the investigators who called upon them."

24,985 Acres County Land Has Been Terraced And Contoured

24,985 acres of farm and grass land in Hansford county have been either contoured or terraced since April 20th, when the Assistant county agent began work. Of this acreage 9,730 acre lines were run by the Assistant agent. The other 15,255 acre lines were run by several helpers furnished by the Soil Conservation service and who worked under the supervision of the Assistant agent. A large part of the lines run by the Asst were run as demonstrations in order to teach more farmers the use of the farm level.

The eight farm levels, owned by the county are being kept busy by those who have learned to run their own lines. Up until the beginning of the wheat harvest it has been impossible to take care of all the demand for running contour and terrace lines. After harvest there will be quite a demand for running lines, and if those wanting lines run will please leave their name, number of acres and section number at the Agents office, time will be saved and farms will be taken care of in regular order.

Grasshoppers Storm Arrives Tuesday Nite

It comes time for the Panhandle of Texas to begin complaining about the grasshopper storm, as those citizens in states north and west complained when the dust gave them trouble. Tuesday night about 10 p. m. a regular wave of grasshoppers arrived in Spearman and they became so dense and persistent that three local firms locked their doors in the down town district. It was impossible to keep the pests out of the house, and the sidewalks were literally a mass dead hoppers.

When it is possible to locate the exact home address of the pesky creatures we are suggesting that that section of the nation be referred to as the grasshopper bowl, as the people have dubbed this country the "dust bowl". Considerable damage is being done to gardens in Spearman and some small amount of damage done to growing feed crop, according to information current on the streets.

Douglas' Friends Are Confident He Will Be Next Senator

Panhandle, July 16—Curtis Douglas is ahead today in the race for state senator from the 31st senatorial district, believe friends who have made a thorough study of the campaign during the past week. His friends feel sure that Douglas will win the nomination for state senate from the 31st senatorial district. As his opponent is making his third race for this office and has held it for 8 years, many voters feel that it is time to get newer and younger blood in the office.

Peak Of Harvest Arrives With Up Trend In Prices

Figures secured from the 14 elevators in Hansford county reveal the fact that more than 200,000 bushels of golden grain have been purchased on the present market. These figures include elevators at Spearman, Gruver Burnstein, McKibben, Hitchland and Morse. While some of Hansford county wheat has been serviced at Waka and border locations, the most optimistic estimate only gives the county a quarter of a million bushels harvested to date. Estimates of the total production for the county this year vary largely according to the source of information. The most optimistic estimate current at this time give the county three quarters of a million bushels. The last crop harvested in the county was a short production in 1934 when something more than 2 million bushels were harvested.

Ship Only Nine Cars

Due to the up trend in the wheat prices at this time, very little wheat is being shipped out of the county, records at the Santa Fe office show only nine cars have been shipped from Spearman to date, with 13 cars shipped from Farnsworth. Perhaps a total of 20 cars will catch all the car load shipment that have been shipped out of the county. The price for wheat ranges about the dollar mark for the past three days, with most producers favorable to a higher price.

Reports from various elevators over the county indicate the grade of wheat has improved the past week. The average is about 58 at the present time, with some wheat weighing up to 60. Perhaps the Kimball community in the North part of the county is establishing the record for the best wheat this year. Some fields in this community are averaging 12 to 14 bushels with a rare case of limited acreage producing 20 bushels.

tors duty to vote for the passage of the tax refund bill, and any senator who represented this district would have voted for this legislation.

The senator has told you loudly and often about the legislation he felt would impress you favorably. Let's look at the record and see about some of the legislation that he might not want you to know about.

1. Senator Small voted against disclosing his corporate retainers as shown Senate Journal page 20 41st legislature, Senate Journal page 240, 44th legislature.

This means that Senator Small opposed the resolutions that would compel members of the state legislature to list the large corporations they represented, so that you as a voter might intelligently decide whether or not it was to your interest to continue in office a man who served for fees, those opposed to your common interest.

2. Senator voted against a mortgage moratorium bill, house bill 231 page 1541.

This means that you boys of Hansford county who have mortgages against your farm land and who have been at the point of distraction because you were constantly in fear of large insurance companies taking your land, were offered a breathing spell from fear and undue hardship by the proposed legislation. Normally one would have supposed that a man elected to represent you, who has been honored signally by

4. Voted against general utility regulation bill, house bill No. 65.

5. Voted against chain store tax bill (house bill 18). Read up on this bill. It was a reasonable and legitimate regulation limiting chain stores to 55 in number, after which time taxes would become rather burdensome. It was to help keep that great American institution, The Independent Merchant. Why should OUR senator kill this sort of legislation, that would relieve a small part of the burden of taxation on you and me, and then advocate a SALES TAX, that will COST you and me? ? ?

During a period of five legislative sessions in the Senate Small was absent 770 times when different laws were voted on for passage. In his talks at Spearman,

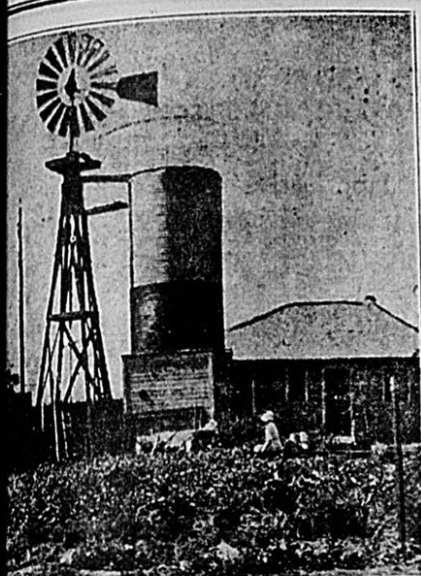

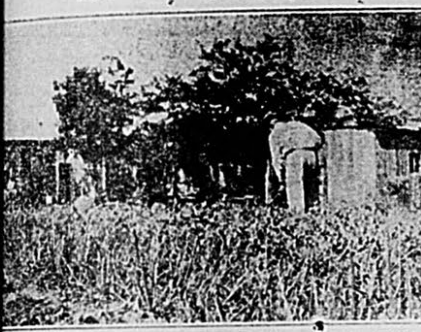

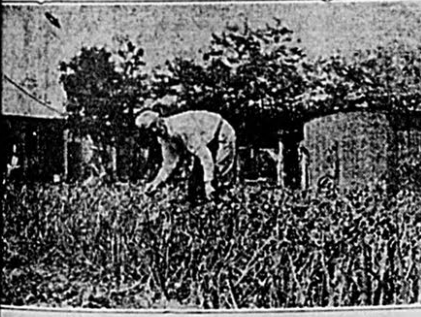

WHO IS SLINGING MUD?

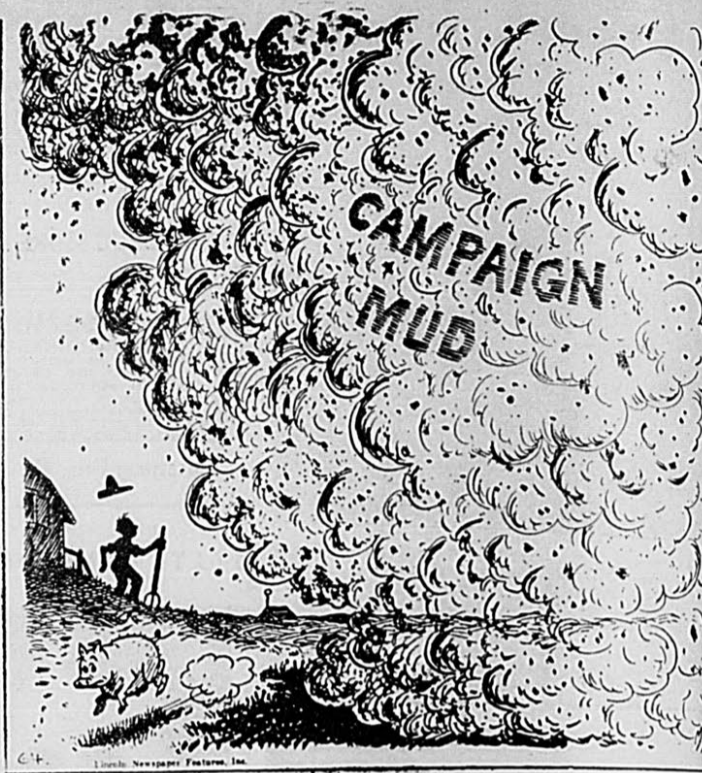

International Sunday School Lesson

By DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic:—Christian and social service.

Scripture Lesson:—Acts 4:32-35; Cor. 8:1-9 Acts 4:

32. And the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and one soul: neither said any of them that aught of the things which he possessed was his own but they had all things common. 33. And when great power gave the apostles witness of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus and great grace was upon them all. Neither was there any among them that lacked, for as many as were possessors of lands or houses sold them and brought the prices of the things that were

acknowledged his acceptance of Christ's work upon the cross as a full atonement for our sins. The power which these men had in their preaching was the power to make clear what they had to say, the power to convince men of the reality of their message, and to convict men of sin. This was not the power of oratory or the power of human argument or the power of great personality, but the power of the Holy Spirit visiting upon them which is available for every sincere minister of the word of God.

They had All Things in Common.

"For neither was there among them any that lacked: And distribution was made unto each according as any one had need. This common possession of goods in the early church has often been used as an argument for socialism and even communism, but this is misinterpreting the passage. A number of things must be remembered: in the first place it was strictly a voluntary matter. There was no law about this in the early church, and no believer was compelled to sell his possessions if he was not led to do so by his own conscience. This condition prevailed only among believers. Furthermore, it does not appear that every man in the church sold all of his property nor that even those who did so sold all that they had. Moreover, when the fresh warmth of Pentecostal life departed this practice was given up. It is never referred to again in the New Testament, and never seems to have been practiced outside of the city of Jerusalem.

The need for Deacons

In chapter 6 we are introduced to the church as it grew and multiplied. Persecution and threatening and flogging only served to make multitudes turn to the new faith. Gamaliel in the Sanhedrian had done his part to help the new faith keep its footing. While all of this growth was taking place there arose a murmuring of the Grecians against the Hebrews."

The Grecian Jew were Hellenists from outside of Palestine because of their contact with the Gentile world. These Hellenists grumbled and complained because the Grecian widows were being neglected. Evidently there was jealousy between groups of Jews. The daily distribution.

The First Seven Deacons

"The church itself voted on the election of seven men to be deacons in the sense that they were to minister to the needs of the members. These men were to be of good character and full of the Holy Spirit. They needed much wisdom as they were called upon to act discreetly in all emergencies. They were to be men of good reputation as well as men with spiritual gifts. They elected seven men each of them with a Greek name. Upon the election of these men to serve tables the apostles promised We will give ourselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word. These deacons were to be ministers of tables. The Apostles were to be ministers of the Word. Preaching publicly from house to house. The ordination service followed immediately upon the election. The laying on of hands was a symbol of the impartation of gifts and graces which they were to qualify them for. It was the nature of the gifts that God would bestow upon them rather than

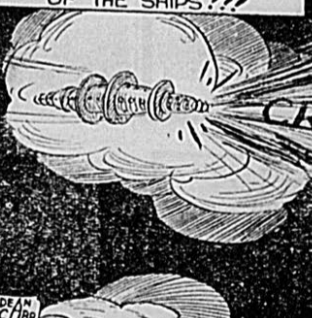
