The football career offense total of Hargis and Morris is so close that it is almost unbelievable. Hargis had a total of 336 offensive plays for 1751 yards. Morris had 335 offensive plays for 1763 total yards. Hargis averaged 5.2 yards per carry and Morris averaged 5.3 yards per carry. Hargis scored 120 points, and Morris scored 74 points. These are career statistics and are very interesting.

36 games, made 1 interception, caused or recovered 5 fumbles, and sacked the quarterback 1 time. Cunningham averaged 6 tackles per game, played in 33 games, intercepted 2 passes, caused or recovered 4 fumbles and sacked the quarterback 2 times. ### North Plains Farmers To Testify

The North Plains Energy Consumers Association, a group of irrigation farmers, is urging farmers and agri-businessmen in the area to join them on a trip to Austin next week to testify at the Senate Committee hearing on natural resources and energy conservation. The group is in favor of two bills which will be introduced when the legislature opens in January by Senator Max Sherman of Amarillo and Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock.

Monday morning, Nov. 29, and will be returning Tuesday night. The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday. The bus fare is \$40 and any farmer or businessman interested is encouraged to go on the trip whether or not he is a member of the Association. 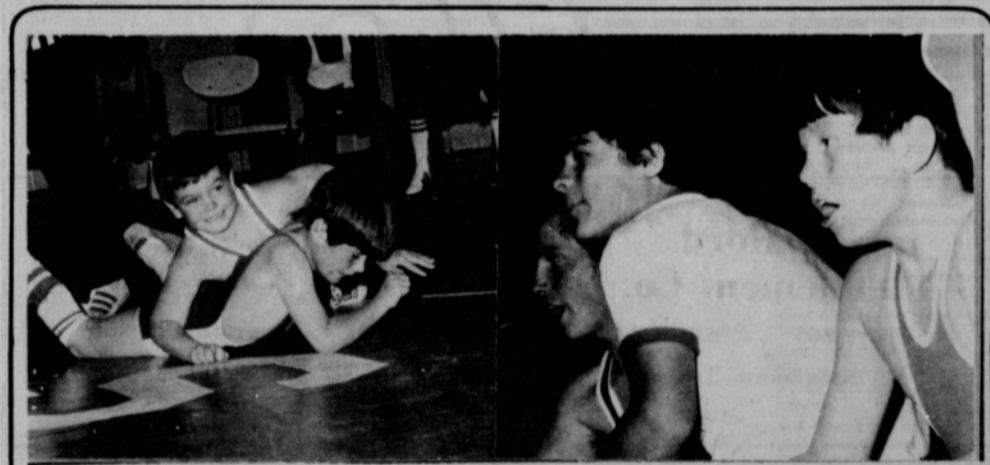

## Pause And Give Thanks

Over three hundred years have transpired since the first Thanksgiving in America and 't would be nigh to impossible to count not only our present blessings but those which have accumulated before 1976.

Like their colonial ancestors, Americans today also have reserved more than one day to celebrate the blessings of a bountiful harvest for the first Thanksgiving in America, by order of Plymouth Colony's Governor William Bradford, set aside three days for the festival to commemorate their harvest in the autumn of 1621, along with his decreeing that December 13 be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer to show the gratitude of the colonists.

Edward Winslow describes the celebration in a letter dated December 11, 1621:

"Our harvest being gotten in, our Governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a more special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruit of our labours. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with little help beside, served the Company almost a week. At which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and amongst the rest their greatest king, Massasoit, with some 90 men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted. And they went out and killed five deer which they brought to the plantation and bestowed on our Governor and upon the Captain and others."

Other Colonies followed suit and in Massachusetts Bay Colony, the first civil Thanks-

giving was celebrated July 8, 1630 after the safe arrival of all of John Winthrop's ships. Harvest festivals became an annual custom in Connecticut in 1649 and in Plymouth in 1668 but little Rhode Island was a "hold-out" and did not adopt the practice until the Revolution. By the end of the 18th century celebrating Thanksgiving was an established institution all over New England.

The American Revolution brought with it special days of thanks and November 26, 1789 was proclaimed by George Washington as the first national day of thanksgiving. Gradually the idea spread to the West by New England migrants. Though the South was a bit hesitant about adopting this "Yankee" custom, most of the northern states

had accepted the idea and President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national festival on November 26, 1863 and from that time on Thanksgiving has become one of the truly rare national holidays in which most everyone participates.

The time has been tampered with a bit but in December 1941, Congress issued a proclamation making the fourth Thursday of November a national holiday. Little change has actually occurred in this one day of thanksgiving for the emphasis is still on family, friends, and the bountiful harvest. Turkey is still the traditional piece de resistance for the Thanksgiving dinner much the same as in the day of the Pilgrims and pumpkin pie, cranberry sauce and all the fixings are just as important then as now.

Thus, three hundred and

fifty-five years after the first American Thanksgiving, we are prompted to pause in this year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and seventy-six on November 25 to pause in our busy lives to count our many blessings and to give grateful thanks to our God from whom all of our many, many blessings flow.

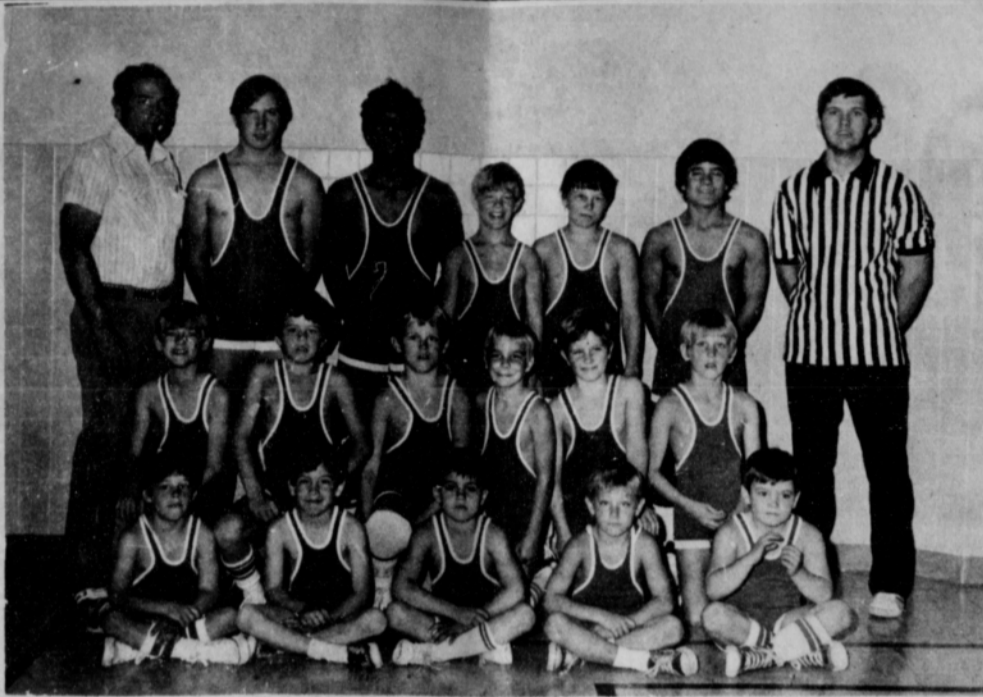

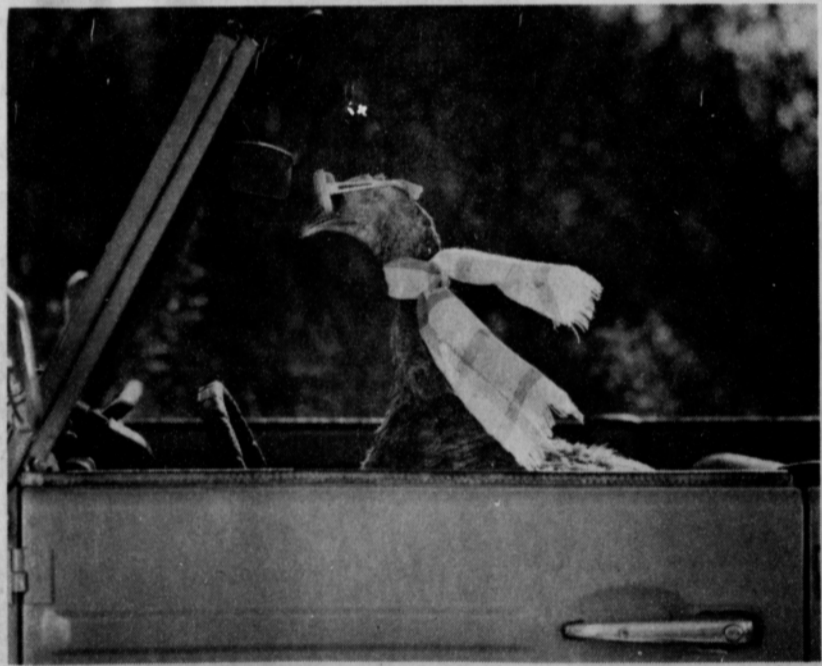

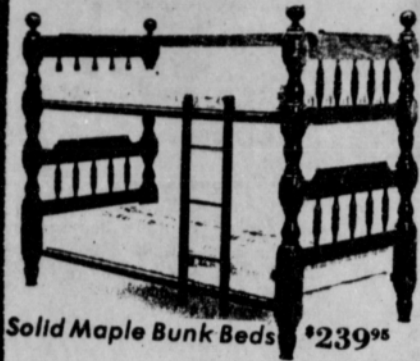
