Bill Gaither Is Working Again....

Battle Won By Determination

Bill Gaither is back on the job at Jr. Lusby Cats after being injured in a pickup accident in June and many months of hospitalization and rehabilitation.

Bill suffered a spinal cord injury in the pickup accident which occurred on June 24 and was in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for several months. The injury left him paralyzed below the waist. He was sent to Bivins Rehabilitation Center in Amarillo. Doctors thought he would be in a wheel chair as a result of the injury but Bill's determination that he would walk again proved them wrong. He began his road to recovery by learning to crawl.

He was discharged from the rehabilitation center at the end of October and came home with leg braces from the hip down. He is now wearing braces from the knee down and walking with cutches, and is running a road grader with Jr. Lusby Cats and working on Saturday in the Spearman office answering the telephone.

Gayle Bell, registered nurse of Lubbock, with the Texas Employers Insurance Co. was in Spearman Tuesday to check on Bill and stated that he was one of the most determined and dedicated persons she has ever met. She also said the personnel at Bivins said that Bill was always happy and had a smile for everyone. Bill was covered by workmen's compensation with Texas Employers Insurance.

The spinal cord injury was not the only thing Bill faced during these past few months. He underwent eye surgery and had his teeth pulled and dentures which would be plenty for most anyone in a few months period.

His employer, Junior Lusby, was commended by the nurse, for his help in working with Bill in his rehabilitation. She stated that Lusby was one of the few employees she had come in contact with in her work that was so interested in an employee during his recovery and seeing that he had work when he was able to go back to work.

Bill is a native of Spearman, and worked for many years for Hansford County before going to work for Jr. Lusby Cats of Spearman. Before Bill returned home members of the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department constructed a ramp at his residence and widened some doors, etc. so that he could get around the home in his wheelchair.

Bill was aided in his many months of recovery by his faithful wife, Georgia. Needless to say, they both worked long and hard to fulfill Bill's determination that he would walk and work again.

1975 Moisture Below Normal

The official rainfall in Spearman, as measured by U. S. Weather Observer Billie Haden, for the year 1975 was 18.17 inches. This is quite an improvement over moisture for 1974 which totaled only 14.40 but still is below the average yearly rainfall which is 21.53.

Rainfall by months for 1975 is as follows:

January - .53; February - 1.58; March - .47; April - 1.06; May - 2.97; June - 2.46; July - 2.91; August - 2.76; September - .72; October - None; November - 2.57; and December - .14.

The record for dry weather in the Spearman area was in 1930 when only 7.86 was recorded. In the past ten years, 1974 was the drier year with 14.40 and 1965 was the wettest with 28.52 being recorded.

The weather pattern for this area shows that May and July are the wettest months, and that when rainfall is received in the fall, followed by rain in the spring, a wheat crop results. Dry fall weather without adequate spring rains are a fatal combination for wheat in this country.

This past fall the dryland wheat crop was dusted in, and November rains gave it a boost. There has been but one small snowfall, however, and no rains to encourage the growth of the principal crop for the county.

Two Men Sentenced

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin reported that District Court was held and Charles Huben Beegle, White Male, 50 years of age, and Charles Ringwald, White Male, 19 years of age, were sentenced by District Judge Richard N. Counts to two (2) years each in the Texas Department of Corrections on the 23rd day of December, 1975. Charles Beegle is still in Hansford County Jail awaiting to be transferred to Huntsville Pen-

itentiary, and Charles Ringwald has been released to the Hemphill County Sheriff's Office where he will stand trial for forgery. Both these subjects are charged with Auto Theft. Beegle stole a pickup which belonged to Wright Hale about two (2) years ago. Ringwald took a grain truck which belonged to A. C. Burke which was stolen sometime in the early part of November.

Lynxettes Capture Third Place At Duncanville

The Spearman Lynxettes brought home the third place trophy as they defeated a team from Carroll, Texas by the score of 61-54. This win by the Lynxettes even their record for the year at 7-7.

The first quarter saw the Lynxettes behind by 3 points as the quarter ended. The Lynxettes scored 13 points while allowing Carroll 16 points. Scoring for the Lynxettes in the first quarter was Carla Harper with 6 points followed by Shelly Schumann with 3 points and Janyth Lackey with 4 points.

RUG MAKING WORKSHOP - Will be held on January 22 from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. at the La Casita Room of the Gnuver State Bank. We will be demonstrating hooked rugs, punch hook and braided rugs. Decide what you want to make and bring your supplies and spend the day working with us. You may get a kit for a pillow top for practice if you don't want to make an entire rug.

Unfortunately stains on tablecloths are often a post holiday problem. Most can be removed if treated while still fresh. General hints are to test a stain remover on a corner of fabric first, do not add chlorine bleach to an enzyme pre-soak product. When blotting stains work from the outside to the center to avoid spreading and treat stains from the back of the fabric with the spot on paper towels.

Now for some specific stains. For FRUIT pour boiling water thru the stain (if fabric allows it). If stain remains sponge with lemon juice solution or hydrogen peroxide. If boiling water can't be used, sponge well in cool water, work glycerine into stain. Let stand several hours, then add a few drops of white vinegar and rinse thoroughly. Launder.

For GRAVY or MILK use an enzyme pre-soak with cool water or make a paste of detergent and water and work that into the stain. Then launder. If stain remains, use a dry cleaning solvent. Sponge WINE or SOFT DRINK stains immediately with cool water, then glycerine and water. Rinse with vinegar water followed by a clear rinse. Launder. Some drink stains are invisible after they dry but turn yellow with aging or heating. This yellow is impossible to remove.

For COFFEE or TEA stains stretch cloth (if safe for it) and pour boiling water through the stain. Launder using bleach or an enzyme pre-soak.

For CANDLE WAX scrape off as much as possible, then place stain between paper towels and press with a warm iron. Next, place fabric, stain side down, on paper towels and sponge the back with a dry cleaning solvent. Let dry, then launder. If stain remains launder again with an oxygen bleach.
