## Lynx zoom by Perryton and Dalhart: 5-0!!

If ever a team had to take a lickin', and keep on ticking, the boys from Spearman qualify...they have been scared to death by Canadian, River Road and their arch rivals, the big red team from Perryton...last Friday night in fact the Lynx had took their usual lickin' at Perryton, but kept on tickin', trailing 51-42 with only 3 minutes left. It looked like a cinch Ranger victory. However, Coach Crofford proceeded to wind up his "Lynx Timex Team," and all kinds of things happened, almost too much for the average fan to stand.

With just over 3 minutes to play, the Rangers were leading 51-42.

The Lynx put on their unbelievable last minutes defense, and literally shut down the Rangers for 3 minutes, and from that point on Donahue and Company went on the warpath. After baskets from Steve Burke and Mark Pearson, Donahue took over. Up until then the 5-11, all around athlete was having a sub-par 5 of 17 baskets for the night. However, he stole the ball and made a lay-up. This brought the Lynx within 4 points. His next trip down the court ended with another bucket, this time from 30 ft. out. Moments later he would be fouled on a fast break effort and sank both ends in a 1 in 1 to tie the game for the fourth time at 51 all.

With 1:15 left in the game, Coach Crofford called a time-out, and set the "Timex Team" up for the last shot of the night. Sure enough the Lynx held the ball until 4 seconds and Donahue popped the ball on the rim, it bounced straight up in the air, and didn't look like a good shot at all, but as the clock hit 1 second in the game, the ball bounced through the hoop and the hapless Rangers and all of their fans tasted the typical "Lynx Shock" for the evening.

Donahue led all scorers with 18 points, followed by Pearson's 13 and Steve Burke, the 6-4 rock of granite inside, with 11. For the Rangers, Smith and Lane Schollenbarger were in double figures with 16 and 12 points, respectively. Randy Brown and Damon Palmer both had 8 while Clint Dear finished with 7.

The Rangers were 24 of 49 from the floor, bettering Spearman's 21 of 58 effort. In rebounds, the Rangers enjoyed a 31-27 edge. Spearman sank 11 of 20 freethrows, as compared to 3 of 9 for the Rangers, and in turnovers, it was Spearman with 8 and the Rangers with 17. The latter two categories spelled the difference.

### Commissioners buy pickup

Hansford County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, January 23.

After approving minutes of the previous meeting, they authorized payment of bills presented.

They set the holidays for county employees. They will have 9 days in 1984, a day for Easter, Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day, 2 days for Thanksgiving and two days for Christmas, and one day for New Years.

Commissioners accepted a bid for a pickup for Precinct 2 in the amount of \$11,695.00 for a Ford 4 wheel drive pickup from Crawford Motor

Company of Spearman. They approved a road crossing by Phillips pipeline in Precinct 3, north of Bernstein.

Discussion was held on new requirements for revenue sharing. Judge R.L. McClellan anticipates the county will receive \$73,000 for 1984. The commissioners use this money for the sheriff department expenses, repairs to courthouse, place \$5000 in each road and bridge fund and regularly donate to the Hansford Library, Golden Spread Center in Spearman, Golden Age Center in Gruver and Station Master's Museum.



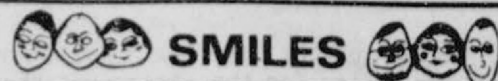

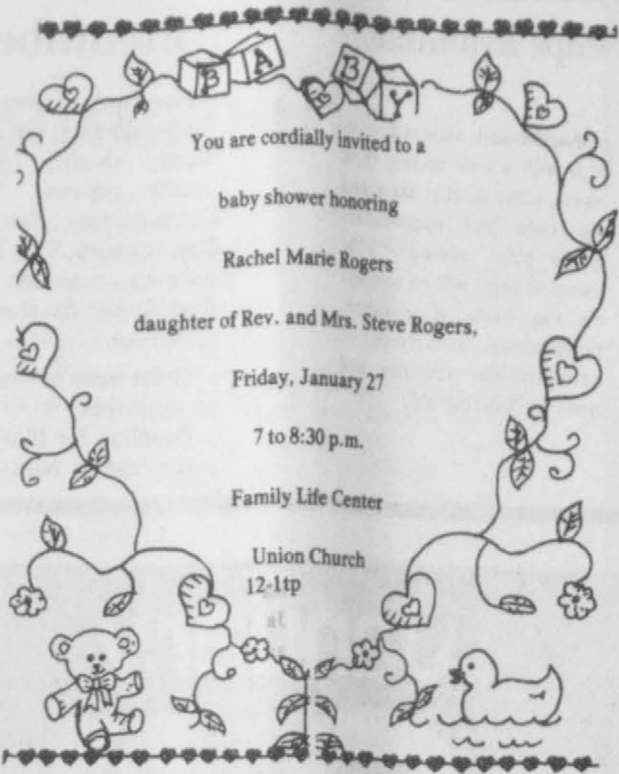
Each garment entered in the show must be made of a minimum blend of 50% cotton or 50% wool and/or mohair, says the home economist.

Since the 1960's there has been a dramatic increase in the number of working mothers and a corresponding concern about the effects on their children. About 19 million women, including 7.4 million women with preschool children, now work outside the home.

Research on the effects of maternal employment on children has been limited. However, "latchkey children," or children who care for themselves for a portion of the day, are now being studied.

In 1976, the Census Bureau reported that 13 to 15 percent of children aged 7-13 with employed mothers care for themselves and, in some cases, for younger siblings as well, for a part of the day. This percentage has probably increased in the last few years.

New patterns of family make-up intensify the problem of child care. Mobility contributes to an increasing number of nuclear families where uncles, aunts or grandparents are seldom found.

In addition, housing trends contribute to more age-segregated neighborhoods. This means the opportunity for intergenerational support and interaction has been greatly diminished. Modern urban environments also tend to create social isolation, so fewer adults taking on responsibility for other people's children.

Whether a child is safe in a self-care situation depends on a number of factors. Parents should consider the crime rate, availability of support persons in the neighborhood, age of the child, accessibility to the telephone by both the parent and the child, amount of time the child is alone, and the emotional climate of the home.

Some children find a challenge in self-care while others may be harmed. Each child needs to be assessed as an individual with special

talents and special needs.

Parents can play an important role in improving the self-care environment for their children and other children in the community. For example, a group of neighbors may wish to establish a cooperative after-school center, a PTA or other parent group can start a "hotline" phone service for youngsters at home alone. Older residents may open their homes to neighborhood children from 3 to 6 p.m.; and use this service to supplement their incomes.

The possible options for neighborhoods support are unlimited. But parents must plan and organize to develop successful after-school options for their children and the neighborhood.

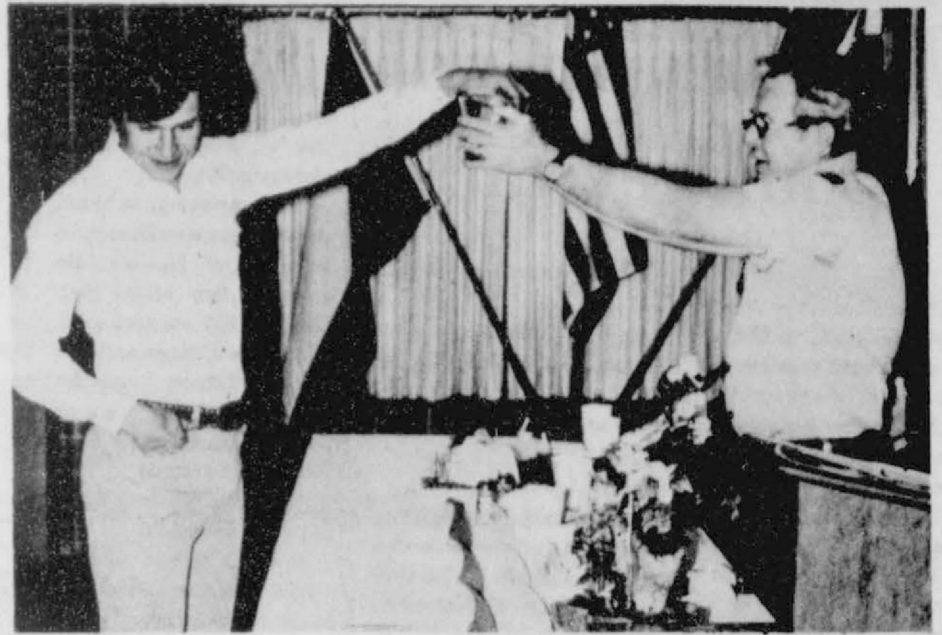

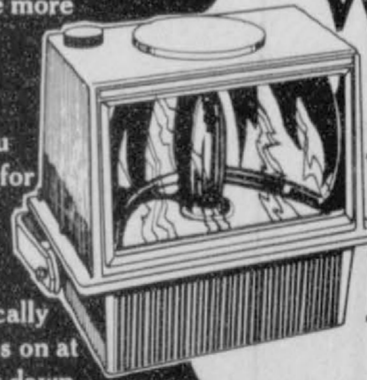

1 pound (3 medium or 2 large) potatoes  
4 tablespoons butter  
1 small onion, quartered and thinly sliced (1-3rd cup)  
1/4 pound mushrooms, thinly sliced (about 1 1/2 cups lightly packed)  
2 cups cubed (1/2 inch) cooked turkey breast (lightly packed)  
8 ounces (1 cup) heavy cream  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs  
Paprika  
Pare potatoes and quarter; boil in a small amount of boiling water until tender — 20 to 25 minutes; drain; cut into 1/2-inch cubes — there should be 2 1/2 cups. In a 10-inch skillet melt 3 tablespoons of the butter; add onion and mushrooms and cook over moderate heat, stirring often, until onion is golden. Off heat stir in potatoes, turkey, cream, salt and pepper. Turn into an oblong 1 1/2-quart baking dish (10 by 6 by 2 inches). Melt remaining 1 tablespoon butter and mix with crumbs; sprinkle over turkey mixture; dust lightly with paprika. Bake in a preheated 425-degree oven until hot, bubbly and browned — 20 to 25 minutes. If there is more cream at the bottom of the dish than you want, let stand at room temperature for 5 to 10 minutes so it is absorbed. Makes 4 large servings.

The Food Editor of Family Circle has devised a different and delicious sauce for fish.  
1 large cucumber (3/4 pound)  
2 tablespoons (1/4 stick) butter  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
12 ounces fillet of sole, fresh or frozen, thawed  
Flour  
1 tablespoon minced parsley  
Pare cucumber; halve lengthwise and scoop out seeds with tip of teaspoon. Cut crosswise into 1/4-inch slices. Saute cucumber in 1 tablespoon of the butter in a large skillet until lightly browned, about 2 minutes. Stir in the cream, 1/8 teaspoon salt, a pinch of pepper and lemon juice. Cook mixture, stirring constantly, until it is reduced and coats the spoon heavily. Sprinkle the fish with salt and pepper to taste. Dredge lightly in flour, shaking off the excess. Heat remaining butter in a large skillet. Saute fish 2 to 3 minutes on each side, turning carefully with a large spatula. Transfer fish to a warm serving platter. Reheat cucumber sauce. Spoon sauce over fish; garnish with parsley. Makes 2 servings.

### Address your Valentines correctly

If you want your Valentines to be delivered on target and on time, you can help the Postal Service by addressing them properly. Officer-in-Charge John Hayes of Amarillo Post Office said today. "A return address should be the first address a person puts

on an envelope," he said. "If there is a delivery problem, it will allow us to return the letter, card or parcel to the sender."

Both the return address and mailing address should contain complete address information. This includes all of the

following elements that apply:

- Full name of recipient.
- Apartment mailbox number or apartment number.
- Rural route number and box number.
- Street name and number

or post office box number.

- City, state and--very important--ZIP Code.

Officer-in-Charge Hayes also urged use of: legible handwriting, a ball point pen (felt tips smudge easily) and

correct postage (oversized cards require extra postage.)

"Proper addressing is especially important around holidays such as Valentine's Day, when many people do not use their return address in order to

momentarily surprise the recipient. But when the card or letter is undeliverable, the one who is surprised is the sender when he or she discovers it was not received," Hayes

said. "Use a little care, and we'll get it there."
