Stephen F. (Steve) Cross, 37, of Borger today announced he is seeking re-election to the office of District Attorney for the 84th Judicial District.

"I have enjoyed serving the citizens of Hansford and Hutchinson Conties, and I am proud of the accomplishments of the District Attorey's office during the past 10 years," he said. "During my terms as your District Attorney, I have successfully tried hundreds of criminal cases, including everything from hot check cases to Captial Murder, and including the successful prosecution of the "Traveling Rapist."

Since I took office, we have dramatically reduced the pending back-log of cases and have decreased the average time in getting a defendant to trial. Still, much needs to be done in these areas, and I ask the voters to give me the opportunity to continue the progress that has been made.

Cross was born in Borger April 15, 1946, attended school and graduating from Darrouzett High School. He is a 1968 graduate of West Texas State University, earning a B.S. degree in government. He attended the University of Texas Law School, graduating with Juris Doctor degree in 1971.

He practiced law briefly in Perryton, and after serving in the U.S. Army as an infantry officer, he came to Borger, and presently practices law with the firm of Cross and Milner.

Cross and his wife, Suellen, and their two children, Michelle, 10½, and Mark, 8, reside at 1603 Primrose.

Cross has been elected by his fellow District and County Attorneys as a Director of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, serves on the advisory board for the Prosecutor's Counsel, has taught and published articles on Ethics for prosecutors, and has taught and sponsored educational programs for law enforcement officers.

The Hansford County Grand Jury returned the following indictments March 2, 1984.



MANHATTON--Some 3,000 residents in the six-state High Plains area are receiving questionnaires to determine public perceptions of the water depletion problem and to ask how they would like to see it handled.

Two Kansas State University, Manhattan, professors are conducting a two-year study as an independent supplement to the contorversial, federallyfunded High Plains Ogallala Aquifer Study, released a year







Tree Windbreaks Benefit Livestock

Well planned tree windbreaks can significantly reduce stress on livestock and feed requirements. This results in better animal health, lower mortalities, and lower feed costs according to Monnie Edwards, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Recent research information has been compiled and released by the Midwest National Technical Center. The research points out that the effect of cold temperatures on beef animals is basically one of an increased need for energy. Animals must increase their intake of feed as temperatures fall below certain critical temperatures or windchill indexes

to get the energy to keep their body temperatures within a specific comfort range. A good dense, well established tree windbreak becomes important for reducing feed and maintenance energy costs for cattle because they reduce wind velocities and, therefore, reduce the effect of windchill. The Midwest National Technical Center quotes research information from Kansas State University which shows a savings of 28 percent in feed or maintenance energy costs when sheltered by a tree windbreak as compared to a similar case in the open without a shelter.

All windbreaks must be

designed to keep drifting snow out of feedlots and to elevate winds over the feedlot which will reduce wind velocities from 50 to 70 percent within the feedlot area.



Green Thumbers---Not Merely Workers

The Green Thumbers in Spearman are like their nation-wide counterparts and they offer more than just the work they provide at their varied worksites. Spearman has recently read of one of its local "institutions", and Green Thumber, Ernest Newcomb. The other two Green Thumbers, Alma Remy and Floydean Gatlin, work at the Golden Spread Center under direction of Pearl Pierce, the Center director. These Green Thumbers along with other enrollees of the program offer their experiences of age, life, insights both practical and spiritual, and friendship and perhaps more important--the worth of the individual regardless of age.

This latter mentioned aspect is one of the ulterior aims of the Farmers Union Green Thumb program which hopefully will become more evident to all of society. Green Thumb is sponsored by the National Farmers Union and in Texas by the Texas Farmers Union. The program offers low-income persons age \$5 or older employment and wages to supplement their social security in many cases. Green Thumb is the largest and oldest national contractor of the Senior Community Service Employment Programs with the Department of Labor through which funds are received under Title V of the Older Americans Act.

Nationally, Green Thumb started in 1965 after Farmers Union had organized the program. A few years earlier at the National Coference on Aging, one of the many items of interest expressed by the delegates was that many retired persons still wished to continue working but there were no businesses or programs willing to hire "retirees." The government agreed to go into contract and help provide funds if an organization could develop a reasonable and feasible employment program. Farm ers Union was the first to do so, since they already had a similar idea in planning. The pilot states were Arkansas and in Washington D.C. One of the first projects was

Thus came the name "Green Thumb" for this program. Nowadays the name is implied for "Growing and Going", and has expanded to numerous and varied work projects. Green Thumb is now in 45 states.

To be eligible for the program, an applicant must be 55 years or older, physically able to work, and their family income meet the income guidelines as set by Department of Labor. The guidelines are for low-income families. The majority of the enrollees have only their social security checks on which to live, so for those accepted the program adds to their montly income.

An enrollee is employeed by Green Thumb but works in a non-profit community service organization that has an available job which the organization is unable to fill themself. Such organizations are considered host agencies and include city, county, or state offices, libraries, community action centers, senior citizen centers, schools, museum, hospitals, nursing homes, and other similar services. The actual work can and could involve secretarial, filing, cooking, nurse's aide, teacher's aide, museum curators, maintenance, and weatherization of low income homes. The workers are hired for part time at about 21 hours a week at minimum wage. Their specific work hours and work days are mutually agreed upon by the host agency and the worker. The host agency provides the job and day to day supervision. In many cases, the host agencies have reported that once the Green thumber knows what his duties are the host agency hardly has to supervise them. Depending on their position in the organization. This is because the worker is such a devoted and reliable employee that the worksite benefits and is improved by the Thumber.

Rarely is their a complaint from either the worker or the host agency that the job is not beneficial to either party. If there is a complaint, either the worker or host agency can request that the worker be removed from that organization. Then the Green Thumb Area supervisor will help the worker find another host agency. If this does not help, Green Thumb tires to find employment for the worker in the private sector which in such a case, the Green Thumber becomes hired by the private business and is no longer on Green Thumb program. This in turn helps Green Thumb reach its goal of unsubsidized placement which for the worker can result in better employment and pay than if they stayed with the program and it provides another opening for another applicant to try Green Thumb for help. No worker is ever put to do a job that he/she can not do. Green Thumb workers from the enrollee's capabilities

and then finds an organization which can provide that type of job. However, Green Thumb does help needy organizations find a worker, but first consideration is the applicant. Many are willing to learn a new skill even at their age. And they do learn-slowly, maybe, but they do learn! As one Green Thumb said, "Age don't stop you from learnin' t'do new things. You stop verself."

Green Thumb began in Texas in 1970 with one of the pilot counties being Swisher county and several east Texas counties. At present, Green Thumb operates in 110 counties, four of those being Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree, and Moore, in this part of the panhandle. Green Thumb maintains only one office which is the state office in Waco. The various other area "offices" are the eight area supervisors homes and cars. Each area supervisor covers several counties in their territory from about eleven to seventeen counties. The area supervisor for the panhandle region is Derrell Hale from Plainview. He covers seventeen counties. He is helped by having three area leaders who cover 5 or 6 counties each. The area leaders and supervisors check with the host agencies and workers regualrly to help with any difficulties that may have developed such as the workers timesheets or pay checks.

Once every twelve months each worker's income is checked to see if he is still eligible for the program and is given a very basic physical exam which Green Thumb pays. During their tennure on the program, the worker is covered by workman's compensation for on the job injury. Also the worker is paid sick leave benefits when necessary. Although not paid, they are allowed to take a vacation leave as long as it is arranged ahead of time with their host agency, and Green Thumb is notified.

Green Thumb started in Hansford county in June, 1980. Jerry Gee and others of the Hansford County Farmers Union asked the program to begin in Spearman. Ernest Newcomb and Edna Hays were the first enrollees on Green Thumb. Of course, Ernie is still with the program and at the Stationmasters House Museum. Edna worked at the Golden Spread Center until her resignation because of poor health.

Ernie is one of the best example of a Green Thumb worker. He is so interested in the museum that it overflows to anyone willing to take a tour of this area's history with Ernie as guide and story teller. Having lived in Spearman area for the majority of his life, he knows a great deal about its past and past citizens. He takes care of the museums displays and ground area. At present he is most anxious for the new annex to be completed, "so new displays can be made and get the town interested in visiting the museum again." so states Ernest. "Working," says Ernest,

"is one of the best things one can do for oneself. It keeps you from sitting around the house growing old and feeling sorry for yourself." Without Green Thumb, many workers have not had anything to do. Besides many business fail to realize that people of this age group do have much experiences to offer. They are more consistent workers and dependable than many younger workers. They believe in a day's work for a day's pay.

Everyone knows about Ernie's penchant for photography. Although he claims himself as an amateur, like a professional he does try to keep up with the developments in his field. This past summer, at the age of 80, he attended a three-week course in photography at Amarillo College. So much for the argument that it is needless or useless to attend college in one's "old age."

Helen Boyd, president of the museum board, is very glad that Ernie is working for them. Now she states they do not have to depend on volunteers to keep the museum open. With Ernie there, the museum is at least open regularly for twenty-one hours a week. Also they know the museum building itself is being taken care of properly, so they do not have to worry as much. On a recent interview at a local radio station, Helen was asked what the museum's prize posession was. She replied, "Ernie Newcomb." because of the Green Thumb program, which she is very grateful for being in Spearman to help out people like Ernie.
