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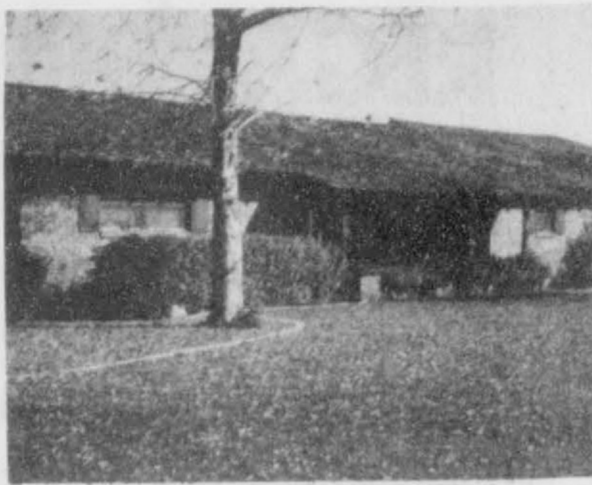

B-ball tourney underway

It's tourney time in Spearman.

A Spearman squad that could be one of the strongest Lynx teams in years, and the surprising Lynxettes will each host seven teams in boys and girls division play during the three day annual Spearman Invitational Tournament.

Competing along with the Lynx in the boys division will be a strong field composed of the Gruver Greyhounds, the Sanford-Fritch Eagles, the Stinnett Rattlers, the Clarendon Broncos and the Guymon tiger "B" team.

In the girls division players from the same schools will be competing except for Guymon, which has been replaced on the girls slate by Pampa.

Tournament action gets underway at 9 a.m. this morning (Thursday) when the Fritch girls take on the

Phillips girls. The boys tip off tourney action at 10:30 a.m. when the Greyhounds square off against the S-F Eagles.

At 12 noon, the Canadian girls are scheduled to play the Lady Greyhounds, and at 1:30 p.m. Canadian's Wildcats will collide with the Blackhawks of Phillips.

It'll be the Clarendon girls vs. Stinnett at 3:30 p.m. Stinnett against the Clarendon boys at 5 p.m., the Lynxettes facing Pampa at 6:30 and the first day's play will wind down with the Lynx playing the Guymon "B" beginning at 8 p.m.

Play will resume Friday at 9 a.m. with losers bracket play in both divisions, with winners bracket play

to pick up at 3:30 p.m. The consolation finals, the battle for third place and the championship games for both boys and girls divisions will be played Saturday afternoon.

The highly regarded Lynx recorded impressive lopsided wins in their first two starts and will be one of the favorites to win in the strong boys division. The Lynxettes are supposedly in a rebuilding year with no starters back from last year's squad and only four returning lettermen.

But the Lynxettes have a powerhouse winning tradition to inspire them, and they too have been impressive with two victories in as many starts.

(Both the Lynx and Lynxettes were to have played a third game, against Stinnett Tuesday night, but this was after press deadline.)

County declines State relief; increases employees' benefits

Hansford County commissioners "thumbs downed" a state offer for up to \$1,000 per year in matching relief funds and amended bylaws of the Industrial Development Corporation during a regular commissioners court session Monday.

The commissioners also passed two measures to benefit county employees, voting to increase insurance coverage benefits and to upgrade retirement benefits for county employees and to upgrade retirement benefits for county employees. The retirement upgrade will allow county employees with the

longest service records—say 20 to 25 years—to retire with "a little more money" than under the former retirement plan.

After discussion, the commissioners decided to turn down state relief funds for the needy because the state half of the match was such a small amount, yet would require so much "red tape" that those really needing emergency help would be delayed in getting it.

The commissioners decided the county could take care of such emergency needs much faster by handling the matter on a strictly

local basis without involvement in the state program.

A resolution amending the bylaws of the Industrial Development Corporation was passed upon recommendation of the Industrial Development Board. Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett is president of the board.

The board's recommendations were presented to the commissioners by J.L. Brock, secretary-treasurer of the board, who told the court the changes in the bylaws were

leaving Hansford County," Smith remarked. "This is the best wheat producing county in the state, and before I came here I worked in Texas County, the largest producing county in Oklahoma.

"I've really enjoyed it up here. I've had the very best people to work with and the commissioners court has been just excellent, so it was a hard decision to make.

He said that as far as career is concerned, the move to Potter County is a definite advancement.

He explained county agricultural extension offices are rated by the state according to size, with pay increasing according to size. Hansford is in size category 4, while Amarillo is size 6, the largest category in the state.

As for a replacement in the Hansford office, Smith said, "It'll probably be awhile before the position is filled. The State office will have to put out vacancy and job description notices."

Smith said his new office as Potter County Agent will be located at the fair grounds in Amarillo, "right in front of the Coliseum and in the same building as the fair office."

He said he invites all his friends in Hansford County and the area to drop in and see him there.

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- The question arises anew every year at this time--whether there should be a playoff of top-ranked college teams. This year Washington plays Illinois in the Rose Bowl, for example. Few think these teams are playing a national championship game.

Nebraska, New Year's Day, will be in the Orange Bowl. But the number-one Huskers won't be playing Texas, or Auburn. What the nation would like to see would be either Auburn, assuming the Tigers get by Alabama, or Texas, going to Nebraska.

Auburn-Nebraska would actually be a better matchup. Auburn's great defense would be pitted against Nebraska's awesome offense. Clemson took the fire out of Nebraska with a great defense two years ago in the Orange. Auburn would have a chance to do that--and make a game of it.

Few teams in the nation can play Nebraska a close

game.

It's unlikely that post-season bowls among number one and two, and number three and four, can be arranged any time soon. The bowls have their tie-up with the various conferences and, after all, college football is supposed to be a fun sport among student players--not a pro playoff for a national championship.

Nevertheless, we have something like this in college basketball and why not in football? If there were a playoff this year, one team that might surprise is Clemson. The Tigers have gotten better since they tied Georgia and lost to the Boston College Eagles. Their defense jelled about midway in the season and their offense seemed to get into high gear by year's end, when they scored 52 points against tough Maryland.

But the Tigers are on probation. Fans will miss a great performance this club could give.

Crime Prevention Training

SAN MARCOS--The Texas Crime Prevention Institute at Southwest Texas State University will be among crime prevention training week in December.

A National Broadcasting Co. network production, the "Today" show is carried by most NBC affiliate television stations in this time zone from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. weekdays. An ABC News program, it originates from New York City.

The Texas Crime Prevention Institute (TCPI) is funded by a grant from the Criminal Justice Division of the Texas governor's office. Through the program, crime prevention practitioners from law enforcement agencies throughout the state can receive basic, advanced or specialized training without paying tuition. Participating Texas agencies must pay only portions of their personnel's room and board. Part of the Institute of Criminal Justice Studies at SWT, the institute also offers training to out-of-state agencies on a space available, client-funded basis.

Since TCPI began in 1974, crime prevention training has been provided officers from 37 states, Canada and Guam. Out of state agencies sending officers to the program have included the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Southwest Texas institute staff have made presentations in both Guam and Saudi Arabia.

A "Today" show film crew under the direction of field producer/writer Peter Johansen filmed portions of a 40-hour basic TCPI school in Houston Nov. 7. Institute program director Leland Wood (Leland was chief of police in Spearman from 1966 to 1974), and Houston Police Chief Lee P. Brown were interviewed and classroom sessions were filmed. Forty-three officers from Houston and the surrounding area attended the basic school conducted in Houston Police Department facilities.

Wood, who became one of the institute's first full-time instructors in 1975, has been invited to fly to New York Dec. 1 for a Dec. 2 "Today" show appearance. Wood said the segment on the Southwest Texas training program will be part of a three-day "Today" show series on crime prevention programs that work that will begin Nov. 30.

George Landry, director of SWT's Institute of Criminal Justice Studies, said the "Today" show producer's interest in TCPI was stimulated by the recently published "Fifteen Report Part IV: Reducing Crime in America: Successful Community Efforts." The report was sponsored by Figgie International, Inc., a diversified "Fortune 500" company headquartered in Willoughby, Ohio. Research was conducted by Research and Forecasts, Inc. of New York City.

The first part of the report, issued in 1980, was titled "America Afraid." It focused on how fear of crime was affecting American lifestyles.

"Part II, The Corporate Response to Fear of Crime," published in 1981, focused on the crime concerns of "Fortune 1000," company senior executives. The fear of crime from the point of view of community leaders in major urban centers across the country was explored in "Part III, A Fourteen-City Profile," which was published in 1982.

Part IV in the series addresses questions raised in the previous volumes by identifying some promising trends in crime control today. The report notes that "a principal focus for crime avoidance on the state level in Texas has been to train and educate local law enforcement officers in establishing crime prevention programs and to provide materials and direct assistance for them."

It continues, "This idea has been 'put on wheels,' or institutionalized, through the efforts of the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office and through the Institute of Criminal Justice Studies at Southwest Texas State University."

The report notes that TCPI has become a "leading world center for law enforcement and information about crime prevention," with over 5,000 Texas police officers having been trained through the SWT based institute.

The Figgie Report also identifies the success of another SWT Institute of Criminal Justice Studies program, the Texas Juvenile Justice Center, formerly called the Texas Center for Juvenile Delinquency Prevention. The juvenile justice center for Juvenile Delinquency Prevention. The juvenile justice center received state-wide attention last summer for its special Governor's Office grant-funded classroom disciplinary strategy and management program.

Shop Early-Mail Early

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love. Send your gift parcels and cards early enough to insure their delivery before Christmas, not after," the Postmaster advised today.

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule:

1. Greeting cards and gift parcels addressed to overseas destinations should be mailed no later than November 30th.

2. Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by December 10th.

3. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 15th.

4. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

5. Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than December 15th. Cards going to local and

nearby areas should be in the mail by December 18th.

The Postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It takes only a couple of extra seconds, but pays big dividends.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of an illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem very important," the Postmaster noted, "but last year over 32 million pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of these pieces at 25 cents, including postage, postal customers lost over \$8 million last year to dead letter offices. None of this would have happened if the envelopes had contained a return address."

Reagan's 1984 Politics

President Reagan is reportedly set to make two major policy shifts, obviously with the 1984 presidential election in mind. They are thought likely to make his re-election more certain. But both are dubious precedents.

A quiet effort now is being pushed through Congress, to authorize the United States to send an ambassador to the Vatican, seat of the Roman Catholic Church. Those who believe in more careful interpretation of the Constitutional amendment requiring separation of church and state have promised to sue to block this move in the courts.

But the result of that suit will not likely be known until after the presidential election in 1984. There's now a law barring official diplomatic relations with any church--Catholic, Protestant or Jewish. The National Council of Churches, Americans United For Separation of Church and State, the Baptist Joint Committee and Jewish groups all oppose such a departure from U.S. tradition, and law. (The law dates from 1867.)

President Truman, also with an eye on the politics of such a move, attempted to appoint General Mark Clark as ambassador to the Vatican in 1951. But he had to withdraw the proposal in the face of strong Protestant and Jewish opposition. Opposition also came from constitutionalists.

Senator Richard Lugar (R-Indiana) is behind the current Vatican ambassador push.

Concurrent with this political ploy, the Reagan Administration is quietly moving to align U.S. policy and military action more closely with that of Israel.

While there may be short-term political gains for the president in such a move, it's an about-face from the policy of Presidents Ford and Carter, and even Mr. Reagan, who went on television in 1982 to stress adherence to a firm, neutral stance by the U.S. in the Mideast. Reagan said this was the only hope of bringing about a general settlement in the area.

The change in U.S. policy, to an even more partisan backer of Israel, with less emphasis on urging Israel to halt its takeover of the West Bank from Palestinians, and to make other concessions to open the door to a peaceful area-wide settlement, is fraught with danger.

Former National Security Advisor Zbigniew Brzezinski warned recently that such a move by Reagan is likely to mean more U.S. casualties.

A narrow Mideast policy of staying in Lebanon as a protagonist against Syria will bring on alienation of Arab states everywhere and an eventual confrontation with Syria backed by Russia. Bringing a strong Russian presence into the volatile Mideast, with all the dangers that implies, is the likely result, Brzezinski says.

The irony of these two moves is that Mr. Reagan appears positively set now to win the 1984 election handily--without such controversial, short-term political gestures. Both moves are, in the long-term view, fundamental departures, contrary to U.S. policy over many years.

Political expediency seems to be the current justification for them, but even expected political gains could be canceled if the general public assesses, and understands, the long-term implications.

There's a condition we're seeing that relates to exercise, recreation, and sports. It's called lateral humeral epicondylitis.

It involves the humerus bone (the upper arm); it occurs on the side of the end of the upper arm; and it's an inflammatory process. Another name for this condition is "tennis elbow".

The official definition of tennis elbow is "a strain of the lateral forearm muscles

near their origin on the lateral epicondyle of the humerus."
Strangely enough, the cause is not from overworking the elbow—rather, stressful wrist action brings it on! When there is strenuous and repetitive "out-turning" of the wrist against a resistant force—or when the wrist is extended vigorously while turned in, the muscles in the forearm just below the epicondyle of the humerus (the elbow area) are strained and pulled—and a disabling and crippling misery can occur.

Seek Clean Air

In Australia, the state of New South Wales is doing something about cigarette smoking and pollution of the air. Three years ago it began a pilot project involving only one town, seeking to convince its citizens to "quit for life."

Using a variety of methods to persuade, including advertising appeals, bumper stickers, banners, posters, telephone counseling, lectures and grim warnings, state officials succeeded in reducing the number of smokers in that town—Lismore—by a healthy 12 percent.

With that success, state officials (Sydney is the capital) launched a statewide "quit for life" anti-smoking campaign. It's believed to be the largest of its kind in the world. In addition, a ban on cigarette advertising is being considered.

Cigarette advertising is banned on television in the U.S. and bans on smoking in both private and public facilities in this country are increasing. San Francisco passed an anti-smoking city ordinance this month.

While few challenge the right of individuals to smoke, even though it's a very serious health risk, more and more question the right of smokers (addicts) to pollute the air nonsmokers are forced to breathe. This is especially true since recent studies have shown that nonsmokers inhaling smoke-polluted air suffer damage to their health as a result.

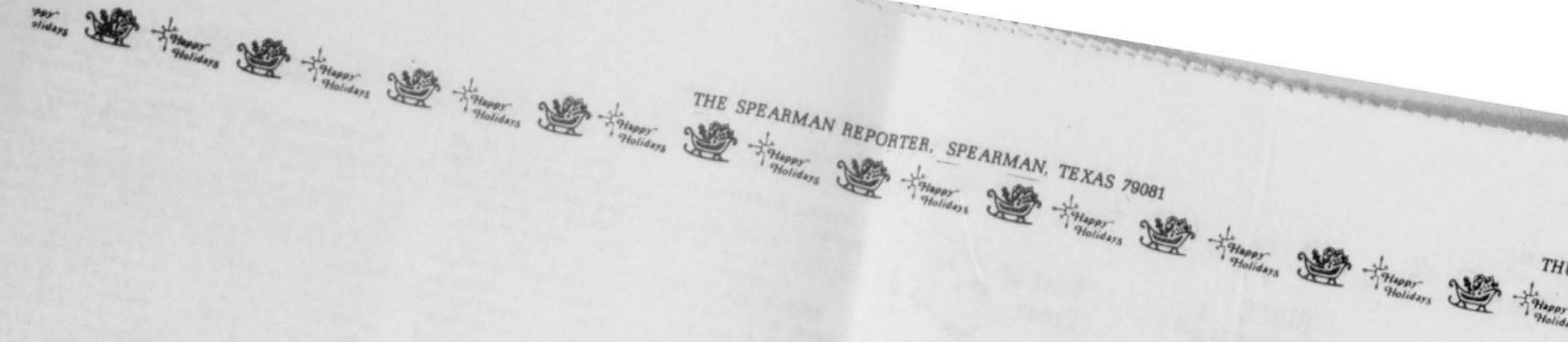

Pearl Harbor

Forty-two years ago December 7—a Sunday—the radio broke the news that the U.S. naval base at Pearl Harbor, and air fields in the vicinity, had been suddenly bombed by Japanese aircraft.

President Roosevelt knew such an attack was possible. Military commanders there had been periodically warned. An enlisted man on radar watch picked up the incoming raid. And an intelligence colonel in Washington had concluded the attack was imminent, was desperately seeking to warn Pearl. Yet the attack was highly successful.

The battleship fleet was wrecked. Thousands were killed. Many aircraft were destroyed. But, by good luck, the few U.S. aircraft carriers in the Pacific were not in the harbor that morning.

As it turned out, the carriers were the vital ships in the resulting war, and they turned the tide in June of 1942, at Midway, six months later.

In this 1941-45 war, the U.S. was attacked; either the nation fought or surrendered. (Hitler declared war on America four days after the Japanese attack.) Few Americans proposed surrender; thus the nation was united. In that sense alone, it was a good time to be an American—if one survived the war.

The nation was behind its fighting men; the overwhelming majority of citizens sought to do their part. And unity achieved miracles.

In three and a half years the effort of unified Americans produced the world's mightiest military force. The lesson is obvious. Unified, the nation can overcome practically any obstacle or problem.

Washington died on the 14th in 1799. On the 15th, in 1791, the Bill of Rights became a part of the United States Constitution. The Boston Tea Party was staged on the 16th in 1773.

Over 55?

Currently a push is underway to require the federal government to withhold federal highway funds, as provided by law, from states which don't successfully enforce the 55-mile-an-hour speed limit within their borders.

A court suit was filed in recent days by the Auto Safety Council, and others, to stop the allocation of funds to Massachusetts—which the plaintiffs say isn't making a successful effort to enforce the 55 m.p.h. limit.

Five other states are reportedly in jeopardy, presumably most of them western states, where opposition to the 55 m.p.h. limit has always been strong. One western state, Nevada, has a policy of a \$5 fine for energy wastage for those caught driving between 55 and 70 m.p.h.

Included in the 1980 G.O.P. platform, of course, was a plank opposing the 55 m.p.h. limit. So those seeking strict enforcement of the law, and the withholding of funds, feel there has been little enthusiasm in this administration for enforcing the 1974 law. Congress acted then in response to the Arab oil embargo—to save fuel.

The Federal Highway Administration's enforcement policy is at issue in this controversy. Critics cite surveys which show that more than half the traffic measured on certain highways is moving at speeds in excess of 55. They also cite highway fatality statistics, highly impressive, which show that 50,000 lives have been saved in the ten years the lower limit has been in force.

The saving of 5,000 lives a year fully justifies the lower limit, in addition to the fact that laws, until repealed, should be enforced as a matter of principle. The proper course if any change is needed might be to provide for certain exceptions on long stretches of sparsely-traveled highways.

Martin Luther, 1983

While much political activity, and official honor, has concerned Martin Luther King in this country in recent months, in West and East Germany, and other European countries, the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's birthday this month has been big news. For centuries, Luther's reformation of the church—he was Roman Catholic priest—was condemned by Rome. But Pope John Paul recently admitted the church erred in its treatment of Luther. In addition, he agreed to preach in a Lutheran Church in Rome. This is movement in the right direction and while Protestants and Catholics still have a way to go in reconciling their views, in this year and month of the 500th anniversary of the birthday of Martin Luther, the

two churches in Germany, at least, are improving relations and cooperation. One must hope that the primary remaining differences (individual relationship to God, and the degree of democracy, in church government) will be eventually reconciled, that at some future time all Christians can be united under one general banner, and fully cooperate. Christians are, after all, a minority religion in the world. Almost 1900 years after the birth of Christ, Christians are still seeking to spread the word and faith to a majority. United, they would, of course, be more effective.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

By Edward Thorlund

One of the best known and most successful investment services is Value Line, which over the years has compiled a good record and has, on average, beat the average gains of the stock market. Arnold Bernhard founded the firm many years ago, after witnessing the great crash on Wall St. in the 1929-32 period. Value Line forecasts are based on a thorough study of past performance, among other things, and is one of the more popular and respected investment services.

Like any other forecast, the Value Line forecast can be wrong, and had sometimes been wrong. Nevertheless, what does Value Line see for the next few years? In the short term, Value Line thinks the stock market will be higher next year. The Dow average of leading industrials should be in the 1300's or the 1400's, it's said, and may go higher thereafter.

The long-term prognostication is that by the end of the eighties (1986-1988), unemployment will be down to 7.8 percent. Productivity will be increasing at a rate of about two percent a year. Inflation will be running at five percent a year. The

corporate income tax will be 45 percent. This is, of course, a generally optimistic forecast of the economy—and more and more optimism has been in evidence this month. If Value Line is correct, recent nervousness in the stock market is only temporary. There are, however, some who continue to argue

that the bull market will be ended by high federal deficits. But some of the weight has been removed from these arguments in recent days as heavy U.S. bond sales have not pushed interest rates up as expected. In fact, they have declined slightly in recent weeks.

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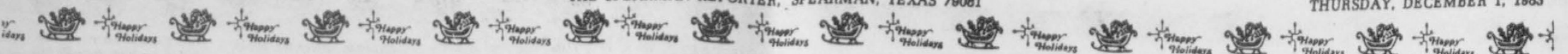
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Kennedy Film

In recent days the nation has been engulfed in a sentimental outpouring of Kennedy nostalgia. This is understandable. The late President John Kennedy was young, handsome, and tragically and brutally assassinated. From such broken dreams, myths and legends are created, also understandably. The case of Abraham Lincoln is an example. This lanky, fundamentalist, Puritan, whose wife understandably suffered mental depression, was also assassinated. From then the legends mushroomed. John Kennedy, unlike Lincoln, had an infectious, open sense of humor and fun. He and his wife were swingers (which the myth makers often overlook). But the public forgives swingers their fast-track life when they exhibit sex-appeal, charisma, humor and good-natured charm. Jack Kennedy had all that, and a fine sense of style. Few presidents have. In a sense, it was a brief, shining moment, and there was some Camelot in it.

Cronkite Says

Walter Cronkite recently admitted he had sometimes thought of running for political office. But, he said, he might not really be qualified. More important, he thinks it's a poor precedent for TV commentators who become household names to cash in on that fame by running for political office.

Television personalities, even weather forecasters, become household names and faces. Such exposure, or advertising, would cost others huge sums of money. A few have parlayed this into public office.

In exceptional cases, perhaps it's a plus for the electorate. On the other hand, a good reader of news, with a good appearance on the tube, isn't necessarily qualified for public office. The two jobs are vastly different.

A reader of news, who knows how to act "on camera" may not really understand the issues. He or she may not really want to work hard to solve little people's daily, often minor, problems. He or she may not be willing to pay the price successful politicians pay.

Finally, if on top in the news commentator business, as Cronkite was, changing jobs to that of a senator or congressman means a hefty reduction in pay--perhaps tenfold.

LOOKING GOOD?

Inventories held by U.S. business increased 0.7 percent in September but sales rose by 1.5 percent, a development that might lead to production increases, the Commerce Department reported recently.

RESHAPE WORK FORCE

The White House is preparing to reshape the federal work force by downgrading 40,000 jobs in the GS-11 through GS-15 range over the next four years through attrition.

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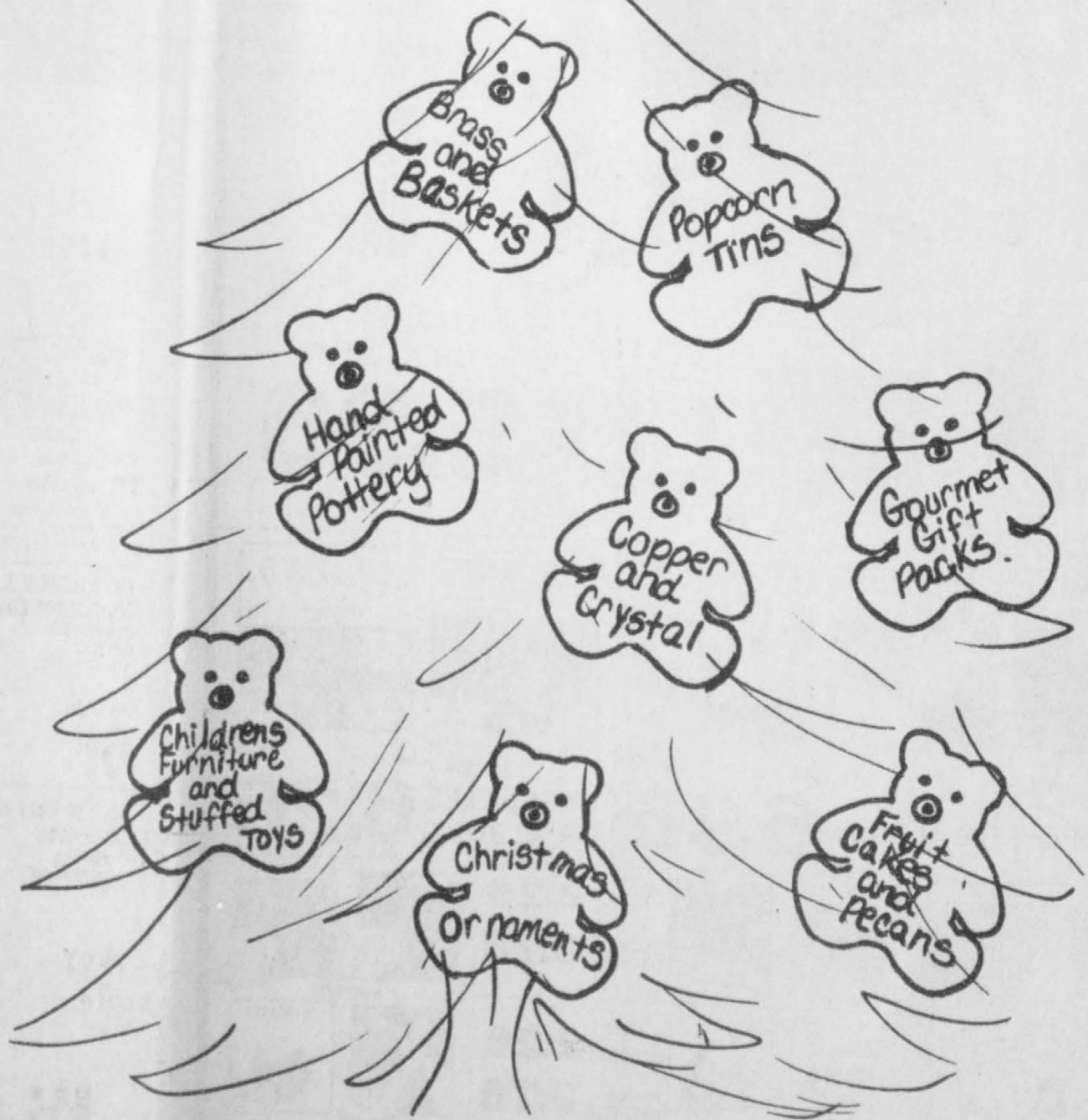

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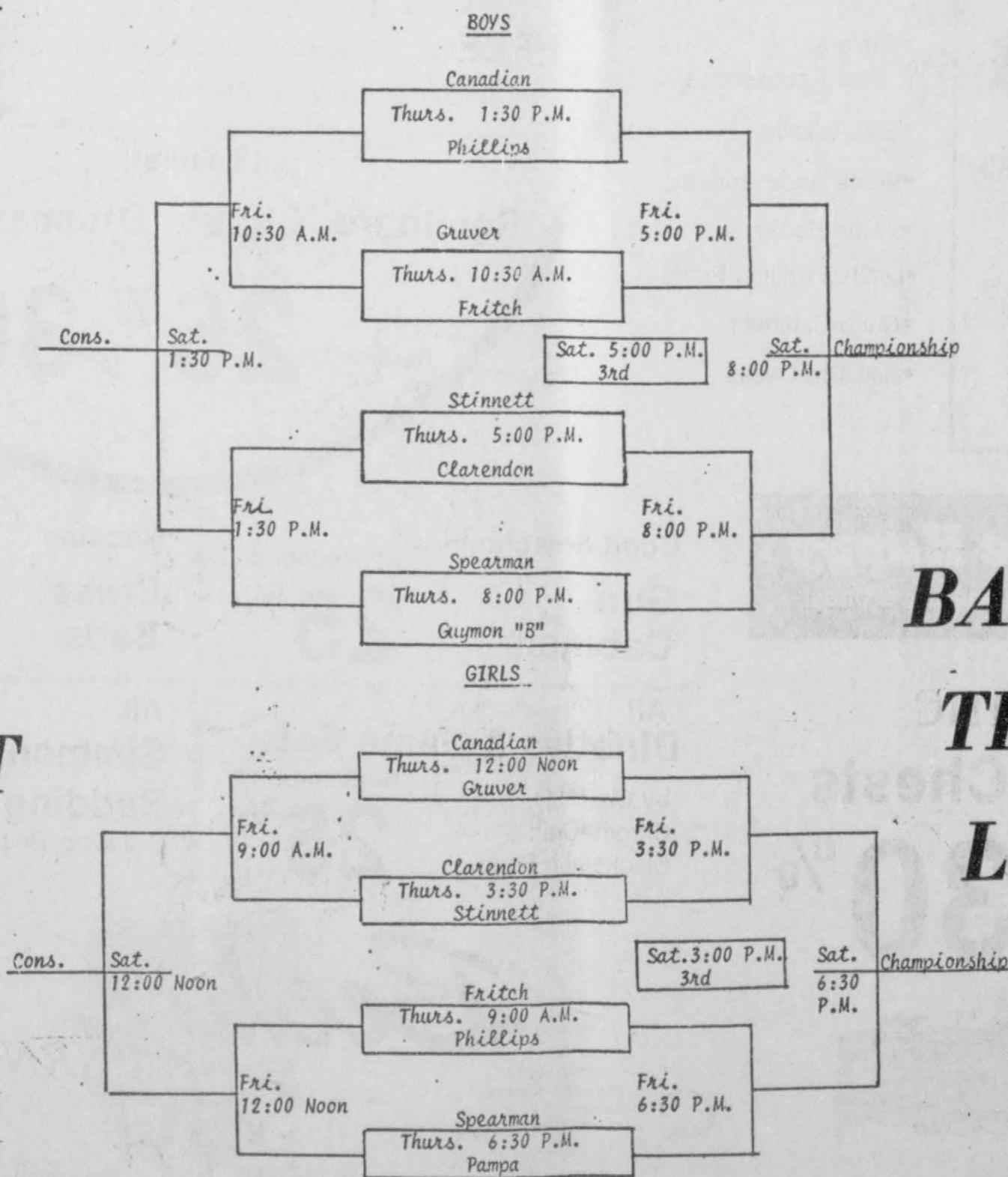
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
