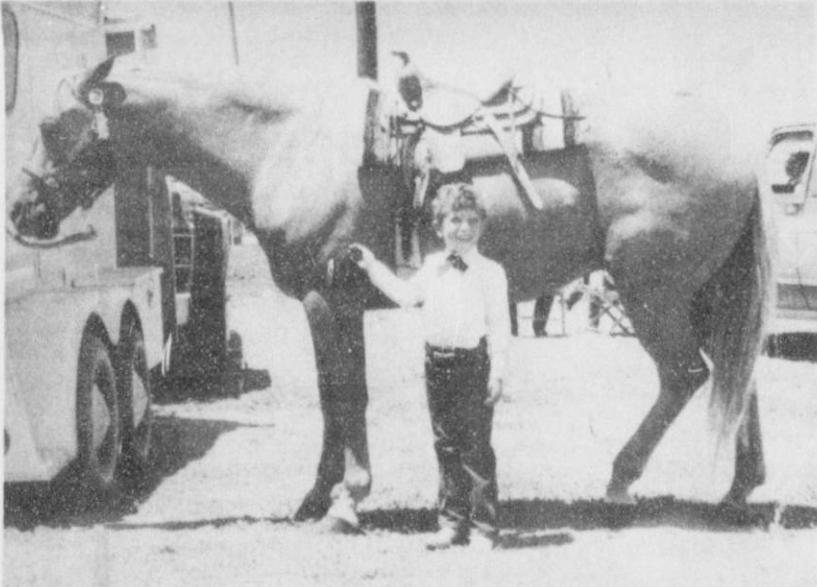

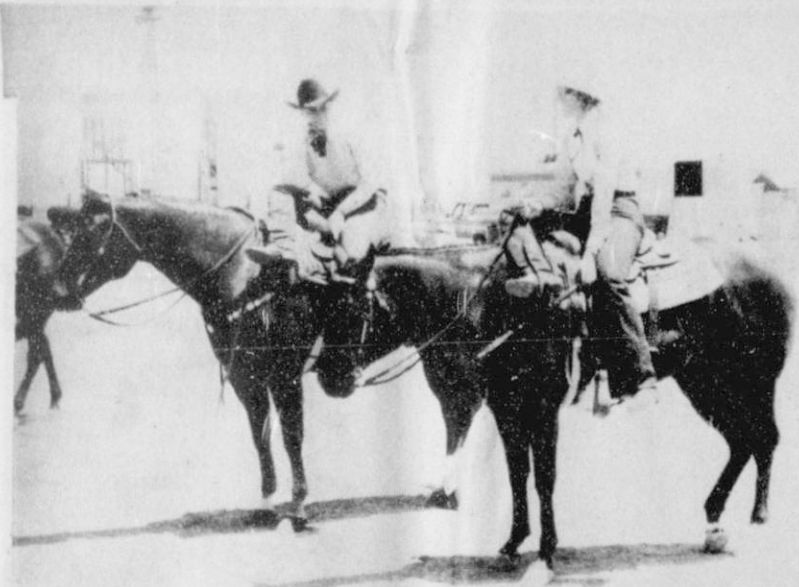

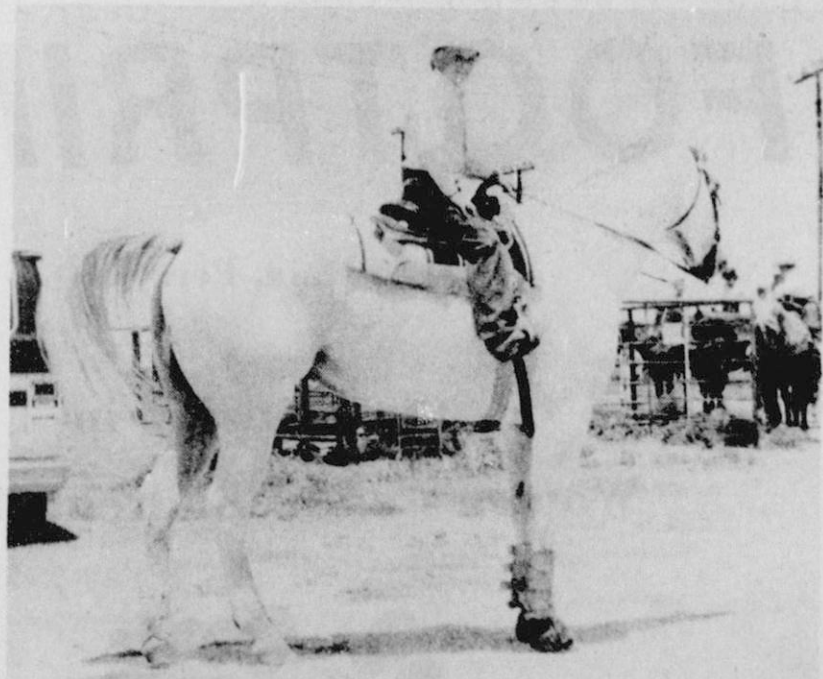

Schools to receive funding

Both Spearman and Gruver Independent School systems will receive increases in state aid funds according to the 1st year conference committee report of the Texas Education Agency. Spearman schools are scheduled to receive an increase of \$225,200, Gruver \$227,800. Pringle-Morse School District will receive less from the state, the figure from the report being \$23,800 less than in previous years.

Apparently beginning and teachers with little experience will get the largest salary increase and more experienced teachers and those with masters degree will receive less of an increase while older teacher will receive no increase or less in salary and some will receive below what they are getting now.

School administrators stated that the reform in education may require schools to spend more than they currently are spending for courses, etc.

Hansford County Appraisal district apparently has done a good job with their appraising because there has been no equalization proposed, while other districts face changes.

Economic changes are just a part of the reform bill. Such issues as competency testing for school teachers, graduation tests, early childhood programs,

reduced class sizes, and other improvement efforts.

Other school measures include a ban on social promotion and tighter control of extra-curricular activities.

Texas lawmakers passed a \$4.61 billion tax hike last week. It is the first tax increase in the state for 13 years. The tax package includes a one-eighth of a per cent increase in the state sales tax, a doubling of the states' 5 cent motor fuels tax, and an ent to some exemption to the state sales tax.

Local representation was divided on the issue. Sen. Bill Sarpalus voted for the measure, while Rep. Buck Buchanan voted against the tax increase.

New water supply for area . . . Moore may vote on dam

Moore county residents may be asked later this year whether they want to join the Palo Duro River Authority and participate in a major project -- construction of a new \$50 million water reservoir and municipal distribution system.

Plans for the ambitious water project were outlined to Moore county commissioners Monday morning by the executive director of the PDRA, Johnnie Lee.

The proposal calls for construction of a 2-mile long dam, north of Spearman, at the junction of Palo Duro and Horse Creeks.

In addition to the dam, which would impound some 60,900 acre feet of water, the project includes a water treatment plant and a 90 mile pipeline to provide water to six cities, including Dumas, Sunray, Gruver, Stinnett, Spearman and Perryton.

For Moore county to join the authority, at least 50 residents must sign a petition to call an election and voters must approve the proposal.

The election is required because PDRA is a taxing entity. The tax rate now is one cent per \$100 of value. Lee and others involved in the project expect that the rate might climb to two cents per \$100.

PDRA now includes only Hansford county and a mile-square parcel of land in Moore county, the location of the Diamond Shamrock McKee Plants complex, which voted into the authority in 1977.

The PDRA executive reports, though, that Ochiltree county also may become a member, increasing both the membership and the tax base. With the three counties, the base could be more than \$2 billion, Lee adds.

"Moore and Hansford counties together could build the lake, though," Lee believes.

The push to develop the project comes after a June 29 meeting between Lee and representatives of the Texas Department of Water Resources in Austin.

Lee says the TDWR is willing to commit \$15 million to the project, part of \$32 million the department has on hand for water development projects.

Location of the dam is 9 1/2 miles north of Spearman and the lake is anticipated to cover a surface area of 2,400 acres. Depth at the dam could be 106 feet, says Lee.

"This is the only location north of the Canadian River where a lake can be built, according to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers studies," Lee continues.

"The Palo Duro authority has a permit to build a dam across the creeks but it expires on June 6, 1986 -- we have to get something started by the dam" adds the executive director.

A lake on the Palo Duro Creek has been considered since the late 1950's. The proposed site would catch runoff flowing east from Moore and Hartley counties on the Palo Duro system and from Hutchinson county along Horse Creek.

A revenue bond issue, based on water sales, will be necessary to finance the development, along with the contribution from the state, Lee points out.

The state funds may be used to "buy revenue bonds, purchase excess water in storage at the lake and for front-end money for the project," he notes.

Based on a rate of \$2.14 per 1,000 gallons of treated water and average annual sales of 5.7 million gallons of water a day to member cities, Lee expects revenues of \$5,858, - 250 annually for the bond pay-back over a 20-year period.

Dumas residents currently pay \$4.10 for the first 3,000 gallons of water used and \$1.10 for each additional 1,000 gallons. The rate in Sunray is \$2.50 for the first 2,000 gallons and 75 cents for each additional 1,000 gallons used.

Another source of revenue for the water district would come from recreation fees, charged for lake use.

Conservative estimates by the Corps of Engineers project 209,000 visitors a year, which would produce \$600,000 in income for the Palo Duro River Authority.



Sales tax rebate off from last year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks Friday totaling \$55.2 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax. "We've sent Texas cities nearly half a billion dollars this year," Bullock said. "That's more than 17 percent over what these cities had received by this time last year. Every one of the 20 biggest sales tax cities is ahead of last

year's totals." The City of Spearman received a check for \$9,967.41 sales made in May. This is up from the 1983 figure of \$8,563.81 for the same period last year. However our sales tax payment to date this year are \$84,389.75 down 21.37% from last year's figure of \$107,328.03. The City of Gruver received

\$1,810.42 for this period compared to \$666.31 in 1983. Gruver's payments to date this year are \$20,283.07 up 2.01% from last year's \$19,883.25.

How is your PULSE? Coming August in our new building

Banker Jim Shirley, First State Bank Spearman, stated this week that some 75 million plus people in Texas were doing their banking with a plastic card. Shirley said that the new PULSE cards would be available at First State Bank in Spearman around August 1st.

And if a Texan was using the card, which looks like the usual credit card and is issued by a bank or savings and loan institution, it was likely to be emblazoned with the word Pulse, a Houston-based automated teller machine network which has become the largest and fastest-growing of some 150 ATM networks in the country.

Pulse has 1,251 automatic teller machines representing 751 financial institutions in Texas.

And it's getting bigger. Pulse and the Mpac automatic teller network have agreed to give customers access to each other's machines. The two organizations will offer access to about 2,100 automatic tellers in Texas and surrounding states, officials said.

More than 1 million times a month now, Pulse cards are used to pay bills or withdraw or deposit money from savings and checking accounts.

"Primarily, the service is designed for consumer convenience," says Stan Paur, executive vice president of Financial Interchange, Inc., Pulse's corporate name. "Through sharing, financial institutions extend the reach of a customer to his funds."

Paur describes the network as a "cooperative venture."

"No single institution had to make a single large investment," he says.

Its members range from Houston's multibillion-dollar Interfirst banking organization to new charter banks with assets of just a few million dollars.

"A financial institution with one ATM would pay Pulse initially \$1-200," Paur says. "After the first fee, they annually are required to pay \$200 to belong to the program and pay any transaction fees."

All transactions with a Pulse card are funneled to a computer in Houston.

"Imagine a gigantic electronic traffic cop," Paur says.

Transaction fees — the cost of the electronic switching equipment — may or may not be passed along to the card user, depending on the philosophy of the user's bank, savings and loan or credit union.

Pulse was born in August 1981 after the Texas Legislature cleared the way for such non-profit organizations. Its first transaction was made in March 1982. Since then, it has processed 12 million transactions and hopes to be making 1.3 million a month by the middle of this year.

"Twelve hundred ATMs and 1 million transactions are milestones not only for Pulse but for all Texas financial institutions," Paur says. "No other shared ATM network combines so many locations with this level of activity."

The name itself was selected because it referred to life and vitality, or when referring to the human body, a pulse is always there, Paur says.

Buzzard to represent heart association

Buzzard will be among over two hundred delegates, board members and directors who will review the activities of the American Heart Association in Texas during this meeting. Policies for guidance of the Board of Directors will be formulated and officers and directors will be elected for the 1984-85 fiscal year.

A Leadership Conference and a Stroke Club Conference will also be held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting. The Leadership Conference will feature noteworthy speaker Una Loy Clark, widow of artificial heart recipient Dr. Barney Clark.

The Stroke Club Conference will focus on the rehabilitation of stroke victims. Principal speaker is William F. Bingham, M.D. from the Department of Medical and Surgical Neurology at Texas Tech University Health Science Center. His topic will be "Blood Clots Within the Brain."

The opening Session of the Annual Meeting will feature Dr. Robert Leake of the Utah State Office of Education, whose presentation will center on the importance of prevention of cardiovascular disease and youth education.

At the Delegate Luncheon on Saturday, July 14, The Lyndon Baines Johnson Award for the highest ranked researcher will be presented to Dr. Benjamin Perryman from the Baylor College of Medicine, Houston. Following the presentation of this award, Robert O'Rourke, M.D., of the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio will speak about the fine cardiovascular research conducted nationally through grants from the American Heart Association.

The highlight of the Annual Meeting will be the Awards Dinner Saturday evening. Awards

presented to outstanding nurse professional, physician and lay volunteers will be made.

The American Heart Association, of which the Texas Affiliate is a part, is the only national voluntary health organization in the United States devoting all of its human and financial resources to one mission: reducing premature death and disability from cardiovascular disease. The mem-

bership of the American Heart Association in Texas consists of lay and professional volunteers from all walks of life. (Additional information on the delegate from your area may be secured from the individual himself or by contacting the local office of the American Heart Association.)

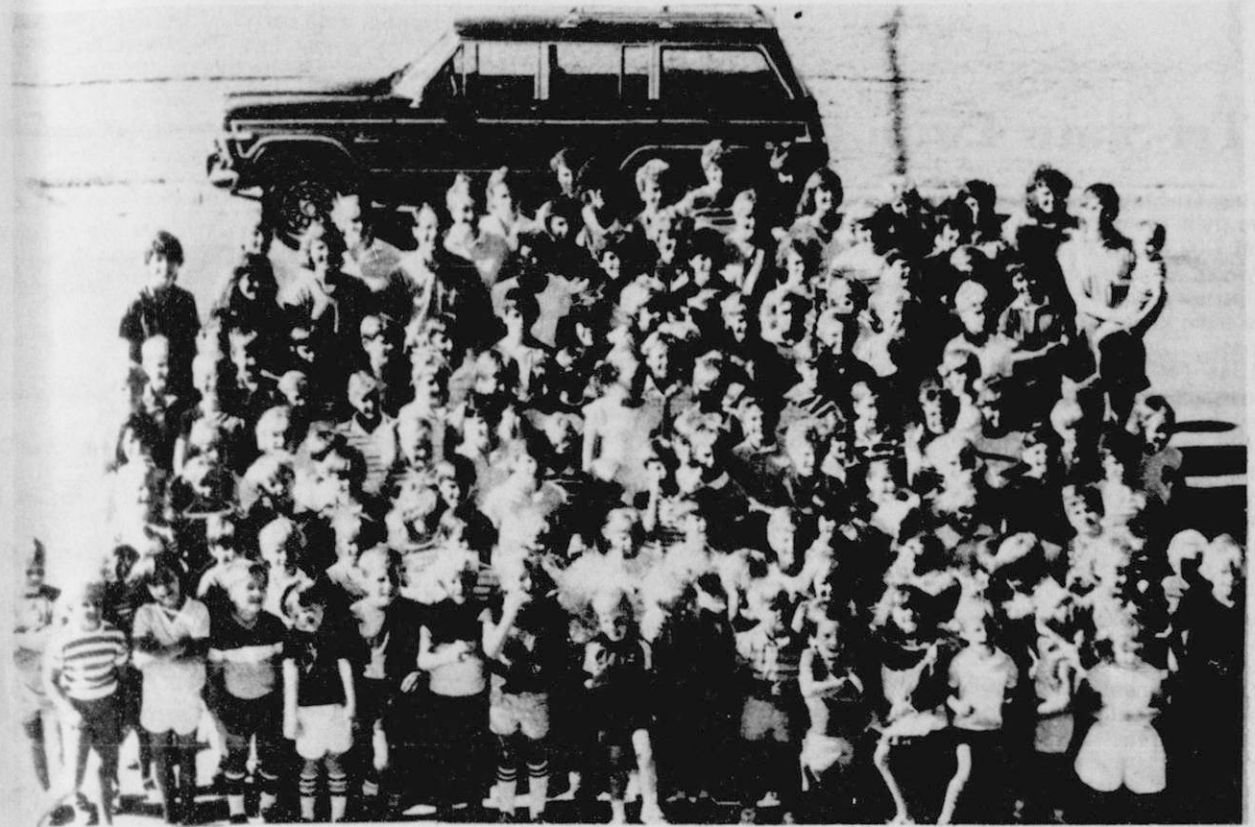
