Political filings slow

The deadline for filing for county and district offices is nearing and so far activity has been light. While the deadline to file for these offices is just around the corner, filing for local offices in the city, and school board is about to begin.

The filing deadline for county and district offices is Monday, February 6. On that same date, filing opens by the other local governmental entities.

In the county elections incumbents, Helen Dry, Tax Assessor-Collector; R.L. McFarlin, Sheriff; John Hutchison, County Attorney; Garland Head, Commissioner Precinct 1; B.J. Renner, Commissioner, Precinct 3; W.L. Johnson, Chairman Precinct 7 and Carl Archer for Democratic County Chairman.

So far none of these have opponents, or if so they have not announced in this newspaper.

The office of district attorney and district judge is also up for re-election. Stephen Cross is the incumbent district attorney and J.E. Blackburn, incumbent district judge. Neither have filed for re-election although it is thought that Blackburn will be seeking another term of office.

For state representative of the 86th District, incumbent J.W. (BUCK) Buchanan has filed for re-election. He has no opposition or at least no one has announced. The same is true for Bill Sarpalius, who has his sights on returning to the State Senate, representing the 31st District.

Politics on the local level may be dull but national and state election promise enough fire for everyone.

Sign-up for city, school and hospital district elections opens February 6 and runs through March 7.

Spearman school district voters will elect two trustees with the terms of Jim Davis and Tommy White expiring.

Pringle-Morse school district will also be voting on two trustees with terms of Jon Jarvis and Bob Womble expiring.

Wayne Garrett and Ronnie Williams terms will be expiring in the Gruver school district.

In the city of Spearman election, terms are expiring for mayor Ralph Blodgett and councilmen Ed Garner and Jim Nicholson.

Mayor Blodgett and Garner have announced that they will be running for re-election.

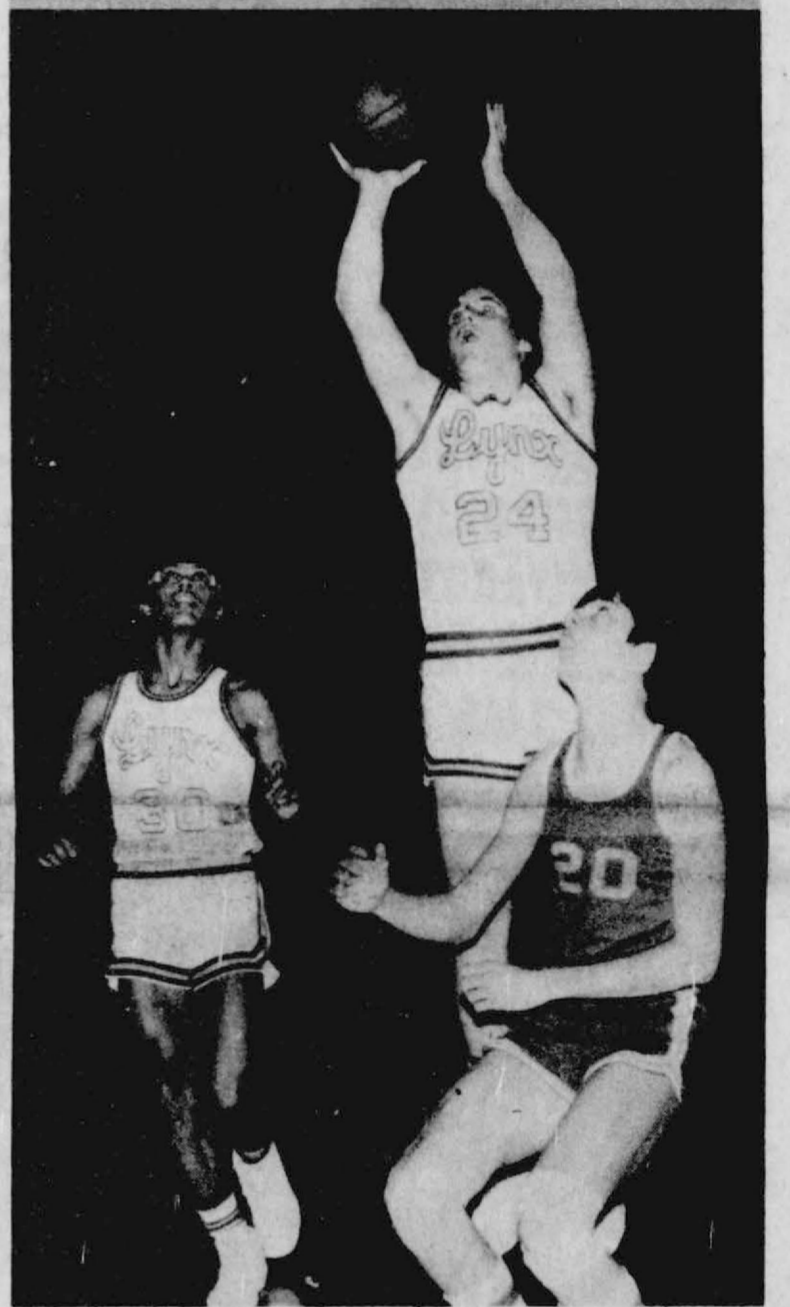
Spearman boys lead District 1-AAA teams with 6-0 record as of Tues.

The Spearman Lynx are not necessarily the surprise of the district, as the coaches in the district had picked the Lynx to win but the fans still are reeling over the success of the fabulous purple team. In fact, it takes an awfully good team to go 6-0 through this district...

In summarizing the district play, most fans think that the schedule actually favors the Lynx the second half, because they will have both Perryton and Dalhart at home to close out the schedule. Gas bills: Read 'em weep

Are you ready for a big gasp? Don't hold your breath, but it is coming.

The ouch is the February 1 billing of natural gas by the city of Spearman. With the frigid temperatures we had during the billing period, Dec. 20 through January 20, together with the high cost of natural gas spells high utility bills for the consumer.

According to Jim Murray, city manager, the city billed out 43,514 mcf for this period. The consumer pays \$14.01 for the 3 mcf and \$4.56 for each mcf thereafter.

The gas charge this billing period was up from the rate used in the November-December billing for which they billed \$4.39 mcf.

Murray said that when the demand gets higher for the natural gas, the distributing company, High Plains Gas, has to buy a better type gas to meet their needs, and when usage is down they can buy at cheaper prices.

Cheap...as compared to what? Can you believe that in January 1979, just five years ago, the cost of natural gas was \$1.60. That's an increase of 265 per cent in five years.

The city really can't be seen as the culprit in this, as the cost of gas is simply out of their control. Better than 85.6 per cent of your gas statement goes to the supplier via the city, with the city retaining the remaining portion.

Bank deposits reach 74 million

Sarpalius conducting school survey

AUSTIN--State Senator Bill Sarpalius said today that he is asking parents, students and others interested in the state's education system to provide him input on a proposal to lengthen the school day throughout Texas.

A subcommittee of the Select Committee on Public Education has recommended that the public school day commence at 8:30 a.m. (with an appropriate break for lunch) and end at 5:30 p.m., five days a week, for grades kindergarten through 12.

Sarpalius said he was talking with school officials throughout the Panhandle and South Plains about the proposal, but would like to know the feelings of those who would be directly affected by the proposal.

"While this is a subcommittee recommendation at this time, the final work product of the Select Committee will have a definite impact on what future direction public education will take in Texas. If there is a majority in our district who adamantly

oppose this idea, then I would like to be armed with that knowledge if we are to oppose it before the Legislature," Sarpalius said.

The Senator said he had already received some comments critical of the idea. "I have heard from some who say it would put their children before sunup and they wouldn't get home until after dark. They are also disturbed that youngsters who work in the afternoons would be unable to continue their jobs or helping on family farms. They have also mentioned destruction of non-school activities and the opportunities to learn social skills. A number of other interferences with daily life have also been talked about."

Sarpalius said he was asking newspapers in the 29 county area of the 31st District to provide the opportunity to respond. He said he would research the results and provide a district and county breakdown of how those who respond feel about the proposal.

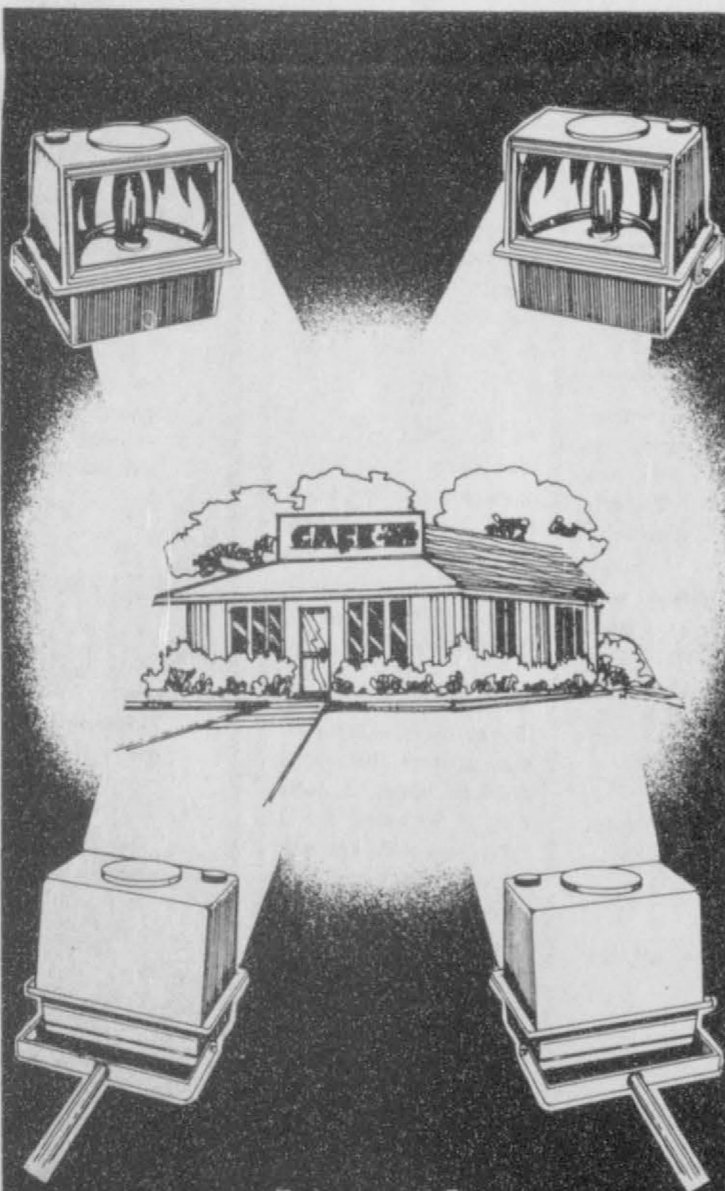

Parks issue free entrance permits

Lake Meridith Recreation Area Superintendent John C. Higgins said that anyone planning to visit national parks, monuments, or recreation areas administered by the Federal Government this year may want to consider getting a Golden Age, Golden Access or Golden Eagle Passport.

These permits are entrance permits to those parks, monuments and recreation areas administered by the Federal Government which charge entrance fees. They are issued to citizens or permanent residents of the United States.

The Golden Access Passport is a free lifetime entrance permit. It is issued to citizens who have been medically determined blind or permanently disabled and as a result, are eligible for receiving benefits under federal law. The passport admits one carload of accompanying people and also provide a 50% discount on use of charged for facilities and services such as camping, boat launching, parking, etc.

The Golden Age Passport is a free lifetime entrance permit. It is issued to persons who are 62 years of age or older

and citizens of the United States. The passport admits one carload of accompanying people and also provides a 50% discount on use fees charged for facilities and services such as camping, boat launching, parking, etc. Proof of age is required. The Golden Eagle Passport is an annual entrance permit

and costs \$10 and admits one carload of accompanying people.

The Golden Age, Golden Access, and Golden Eagle Passports are available at the headquarters building of Lake Meredith Recreation Area, Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., a unit of the National Park Service in

Fritch. For more information call (806) 857-3152.

man with a very serious message."

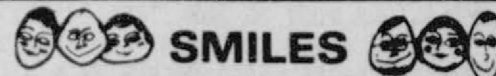
