Green light is on for Equity's sales expo

The Perryton Equity's giant sales exposition-farm and home show will be held Wednesday and Thursday at the new county exposition center. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. both days and the even promises to be the trade show happening of the year in Perryton.

Altogether, there will be 60 suppliers showing their wares at the show. About a third of the suppliers are local businesses in addition to the Equity. In addition, there will be a number of demonstrations and exhibits as well as special entertainment and prizes. Grand prize will be a trip for two to Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas.

"We're excited about it," said John Aston, who heads up the Equity's Sales Expo '84. "A lot of long hours have been put into it and we think we're going to have one of the top farm and home shows in the area. We're also very pleased to be able to take advantage of the county exposition center. It's a tremendous building and one that was built with versatility in mind.

In the way of demonstrations, there should be something of interest to everyone. North Plains Electric will be putting on a demonstration of farm safety.

Shafer Satellite Systems will have a satellite disk on hand and will be showing how it works. Texas-New Mexico Power Co. will be giving a demonstration on energy savings tips, for the home and business.

The Oster Company will be in town, demonstrating practical home canning and food processing. Farmland Industries also will have a demonstration area set up, dealing with winterizing of petroleum products. North Plains Water District will have a demonstration on irrigation practices. The Equity will be zeroing in on computers for the home and small business. General Telephone will be set up to show telephone systems.

The sales exposition will feature the A to Z of farming and agriculture products and equipment as well as products for the home. What do they mean by the A to Z? Well, for instance, there's Atrazine, bale feeders, chains, dog food, entertainment, fertilizer pumps, grain bins, hot tubs, irrigation supplies, jersey gloves, kerosene heaters, liquid feed, motor oil, nylon rope, oat seed, paint, quail sales, rubber tires, sprayers, tractor tires, underground tanks, Versatile tractors, weed killers, X-tra discounts, yard care products, and a Zillion more.

Aston and his work crew promise there will be some super buys on many of the items.

There will be a variety of displays to capture the attention of expo-goers. The Equity has recently purchased two pieces of video equipment and

these will be extensively used. Aston explained that that most major suppliers are now into the video world, as a way of bringing their products to the public. Farmland Industries, which is assisting the Equity in putting on the show, has recently started a video cooperative, to be known as Coop Video Network. There will be advertising, farm information, and employee training methods. The computers will be hooked up by phone live with the new Ag-Net as well as the Dow Jones Stock Exchange.

To debut at the sales exposition is a new slide show, fresh from production, on the history of the Perryton Equity. The show is complete with script and will show continuously throughout the exposition.

In the way of entertainment, the Equity is bringing in "Boots," the 10 ft. cowboy from Dallas. There also will be gun-fighters putting on shows every other hour, both days.

A good deal of information has gone out on the farm and home show, with the Equity sending out some 15,000 letters. The show is expected to draw people from a 150 mile radius.

Working on the expo committee have been Randy Tucker, Billie Smith, Jim and Ann Turner, and Cal Hildreth. They are being joined by most of the Equity's employees in the work. Bobby Cook, branch manager at the Huntoon station, will be master of ceremonies both days.

Firms from Perryton in addition to those mentioned above who will be a part of the giant sales show are Panhandle Irrigation Equipment, Maxwell Water Well Service, Pools Etc., C. R. Anthony's, Sperry New Holland, Panhandle Implement, the Soil and Water Conservation District, and Creative Advertising Ideas. The implement dealers are planning to bring some equipment, for display.

Trucks suspected of hauling stolen grain

The Texas Department of Agriculture has requested that all state and local law enforcement agencies in the area stay alert for grain trucks that might be suspected of hauling grain stolen from Panhandle elevators.

"In spot checks by our inspectors," Angela Lamb, District Supervisor of the Texas Department of Agriculture, said, "We have found that some of the elevators are missing grain. We suspect much of that storage can be blamed on grain thieves. The thefts are not on a scale yet to get alarmed about, but we want to put a stop to them."

Lamb has asked law enforcement officials to alert their patrols to be on the lookout for suspicious activity around elevators and to try to keep a reasonably close check on documentation of grain truckers to make sure they have the appropriate elevator weight tickets for grain loads.

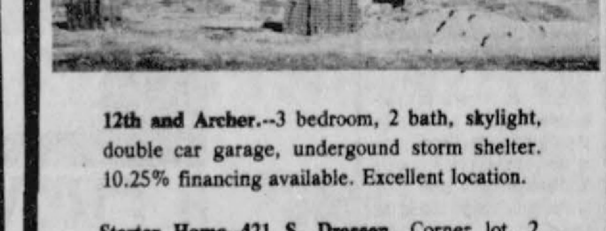

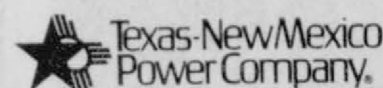

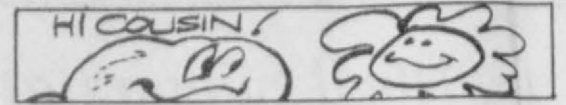

State Board of Education calls for hearings

AUSTIN—The State Board of Education has called for public hearings to be held throughout the state on a proposed rule regarding student absences for extracurricular activities.

The hearings will be held between February 21 and March 14, 1984, at the 20 regional education service centers. Two hearings will be held at each site. Members of the State Board of Education will sit on each hearing panel.

The proposed rule to be discussed as follows:

Student Absences for Extracurricular or Other Activities
School districts shall not schedule, nor permit students to participate in, any school related activities on or off campus that would require, permit or allow a student in grades seven-12 to be absent from class in any course more than five times during the 175-day school year (full year course) or more than three times during any one semester (full year and semester courses). Class missed for UIL and state-approved participation in extension of the academic curriculum (subject-related fairs, assemblies, field trips, and other subject-related activities) in

English/language arts, reading, mathematics, science, social studies, fine arts, or other languages, or student organizations, shall not count as any of these absences.

Each student who participates in these activities must have and maintain at least a 70 average in at least four of the courses in which the student is enrolled for that semester.

Districts shall develop a policy which implements the stipulation of this rule.

The proposed rule has been accepted for first reading and filing authorization by the State Board of Education.

Board Chairman Joe Kelly Eutler of Houston, 7th Congressional District, described the rule as a very important issue and said individuals who have concerns regarding the rule should plan to attend one of the hearings.

Individuals who desire to speak at a hearing should contact the education service center director in their area.

A hearing schedule, including hearing locations, dates and times, is attached.

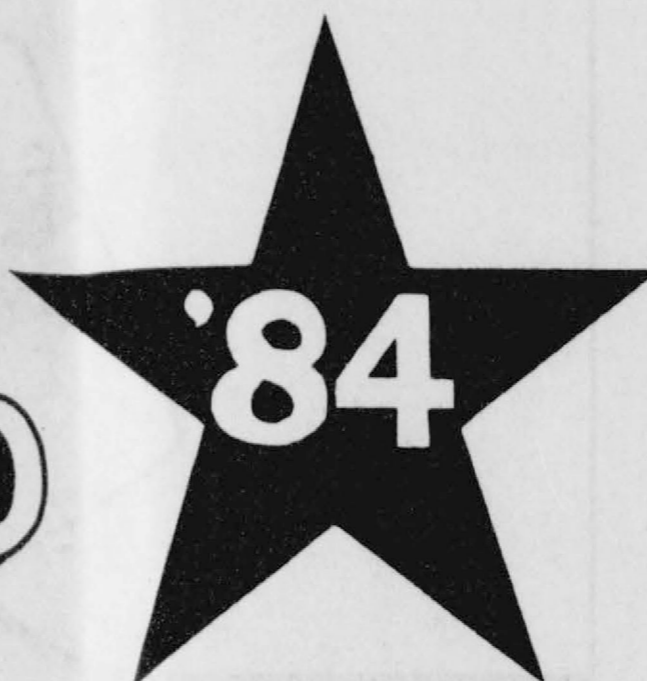
