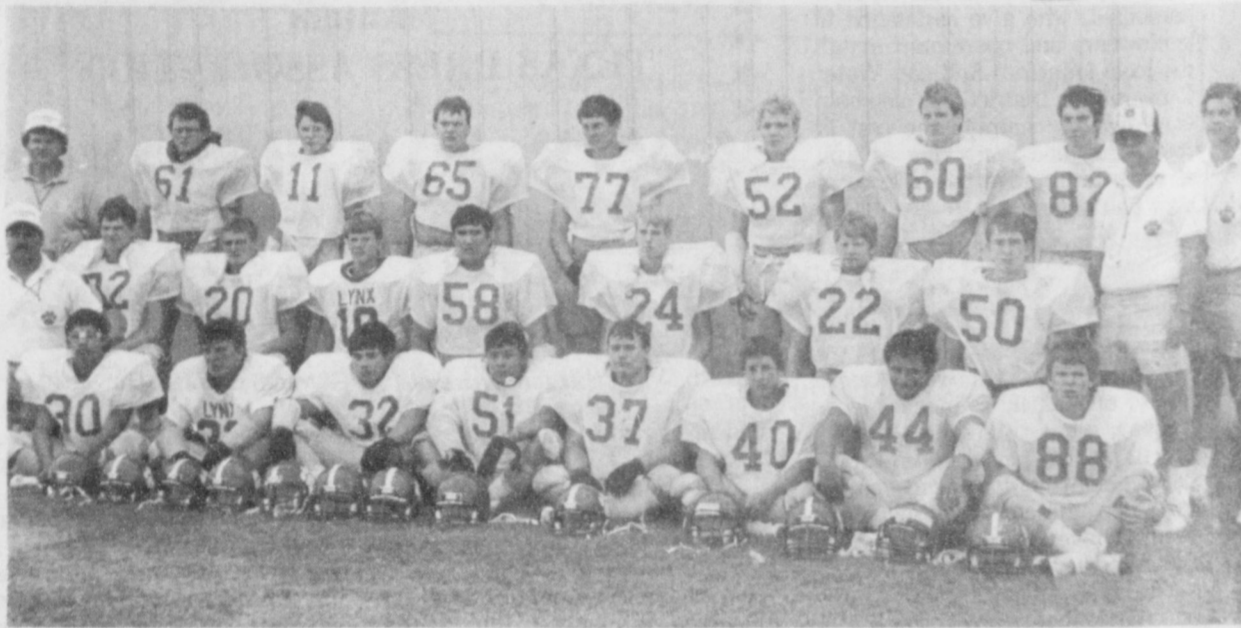

The Spearman Lynx will travel to White Deer Friday night as they open deer season. The Lynx will meet the White Deer Bucks in one of the best football games in the area. The White Deer Bucks are rated No. 68 in the Harris Rating System with 137 power points and the Lynx are rated No. 144 with 125 power point rating.

The White Deer Bucks will be a 7 point pick over the Lynx according to the Harris Rating System.

School bells rang Tuesday morning in the Spearman schools and as of Tuesday noon, 828 students had been enrolled. With an anticipated rush of late registrants this coming week, enrollment in the Spearman school system is estimated near 850 students.

The elementary school has 347 students this year, compared to 334 last year, the junior high has 242 this year, compared to 249 last year, high school has 239 students this year, compared to 236 one year ago.

Good time to remove fish

If the fish population in your pond is hopelessly out-of-balance, September is a good month to remove these fish with rotenone. During October and November after water temperatures decline, your pond can then be safely restocked.

Rotenone kills fish by constricting blood vessels in the fishes' gills, suffocating them. The warmer the water, the more effective rotenone; thus, August and September are usually the best months to apply it.

Some fish are more difficult to kill than others. Bullheads (mudcat, polywogs) require more rotenone than sunfish (bream, sun perch), and crappie. Bullheads inhabit the pond bottom and when maximum water depths exceed five feet, rotenone must be applied with special care to kill all the bullheads.

Soil Conservation Service personnel at Spearman can provide technical assistance in obtaining and applying rotenone. SCS personnel, who give assistance to landowners and operators through the local Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District, can also help pond owners compute the cost of rotenoning and restocking as well as ways to improve the balance of your fish population.

Ayres accepts WBU position

PLAINVIEW - Bruce D. Ayres, farmer and music evangelist from Gruver, has accepted an appointment as assistant development officer and city campaign director at Wayland Baptist University, according to Dr. David L. Jester, president.

The appointment will be effective immediately, Jester said. Ayres, 43, will also serve as director of denominational relations and coordinate Wayland's Active Americans Program.

As city campaign director, Ayres replaces Ron Mooney, who was named associate vice president for development earlier this month following the resignation of Dr. Bill

Burkett. In that position, Ayres will oversee the University's fund-raising efforts in several West Texas cities.

"We have been familiar with Bruce's work for several years now and have been impressed with him," Jester said. "His many years as a music evangelist in this area has acquainted him with pastors and other denominational leaders in this area, and we feel he will be a great asset to us as a result."

A native of Gruver and graduate of Gruver High School, Ayres holds the bachelor of science degree from

Hardin-Simmons University. He formally taught in the public school system in Morton, Texas, and has been self-employed since 1971.

Ayres has been involved in music evangelism since 1977, served for two years as part-time music director at the First Baptist Church of Gruver, and is presently interim music director at the South Georgia Baptist Church in Amarillo.

He and his wife Martha have two sons, including Barris Ayres, a junior Bible major at Wayland, where he is a member of the music group, Spirit of America.

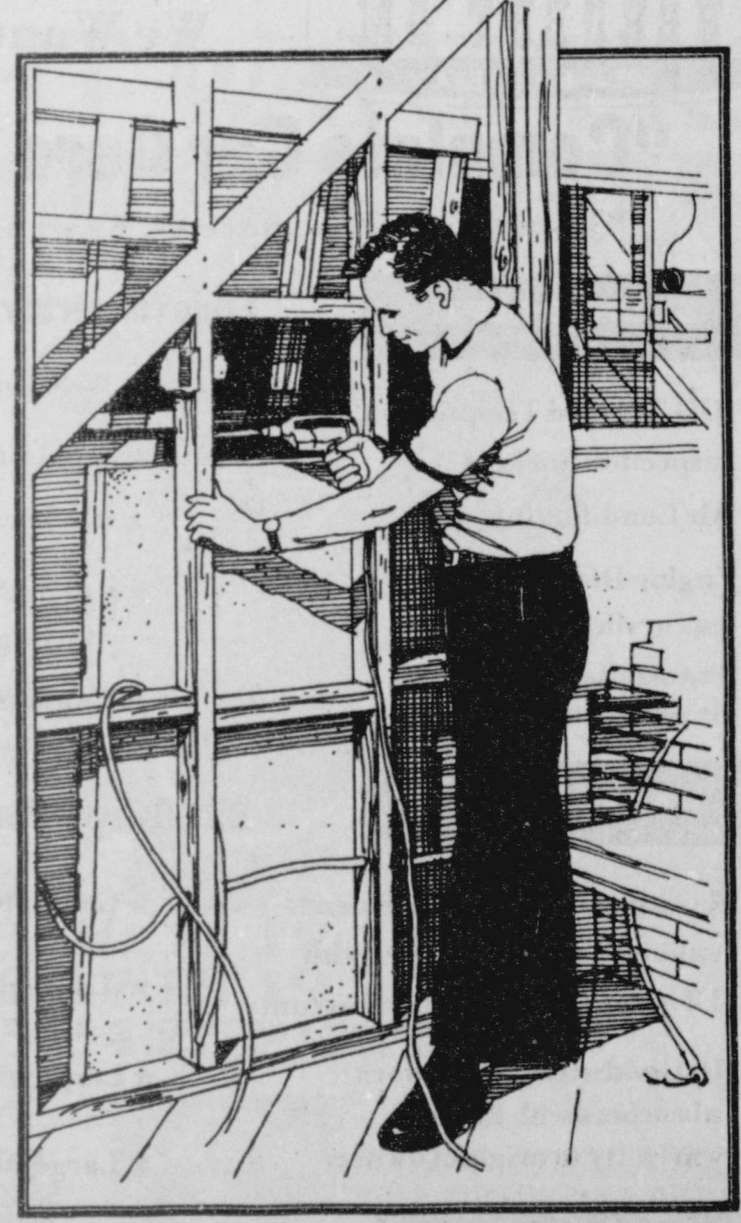

On August 19, 1812, the American frigate "Constitution" encountered the British frigate "Guerriere" east of Nova Scotia. The two countries were at war and the British public and press had expressed a low opinion of the U.S. Navy.

The British frigate opened fire on the American ship at some distance, but Captain Isaac Hull of the American warship held his fire until very close and then ordered: "Now, boys, pour it into them!"

the British ship devastated; three hundred British officers and men were either killed or wounded; only 34 Americans were hit.

On Captain Hull's return to Boston he was hailed as a national hero; Congress voted him thanks and a gold medal. And the British public and press ended their sneers about the U.S. Navy.

"Old Ironsides," as the "Constitution" was called by Oliver Wendell Homes, is still to be seen and appreciated at the South Boston Navy Yard.

How do you save money, get your wash load clean and protect your apparel investment?

According to the American Apparel Manufacturers Association, the answer is to launder clothing the right way. So what is the right way?

First, soil removal is affected by water temperature. Hot water is needed to remove body soil, which is often not visible, and to remove other visible particulate and oily soiled. As water temperature decreases from 130 F (hot) to 100 F (warm) to 70 F (cool), soil removal is reduced - sometimes to unacceptable levels.

Soil is also more easily removed in soft water than in hard water.

The rate of mechanical action of the wash solution affects cleaning too. Regular agitation in an automatic washer provides better soil removal than gentle and gentle is better than hand washing.

With these factors in mind, consider what you buy and will eventually need to launder. Sturdily made clothes with colorfast dyes and appropriate trim can withstand hot water washing with regular agitation - the best conditions for soil removal. Items with non-colorfast dyes require lower water temperatures to help reduce color loss, so cleaning is limited. Fragile items, such as those with unfinished seams or open fabric structure, need

reduced wash action like gentle agitation which hinders soil removal.

With non-colorfast dyes, fragile apparel construction and medium to hard water, there are three strikes against getting maximum cleaning.

How do you know whether or not an item can ever be laundered to get best results? The Manufacturers says it on the care label. With care labels recommending machine wash, hot water, regular agitation, you'll know the right washing conditions can be used to achieve good cleaning. On the other hand, care labels recommending cool water or gentle agitation suggest the garment will fade, shrink, abrade, pill, wrinkle, or ravel if washed under conditions right for good soil removal.

Unfortunately, these clothes also get soiled and stained. So unless the garment can be returned to a wearable condition, your apparel investment could be short lived.

Crime Rate Increases

AUSTIN--The crime rate and number of major crimes reported in Texas during the first half of 1985 increased, according to statistics furnished by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Compared to the first six months of 1984, the crime rate for the first half of 1985 was up eight per cent to 3,111.7 crimes per hundred thousand population," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "The number of major index crimes reported for the same period was 497,524, an increase of almost 10 per cent."

All major crime categories showed increases in the number of offenses reported.

Rape led the four violent crime categories, increasing 13.8 per cent. Aggravated assault, murder, and robbery were up 9.6 per cent, 8.7 per cent and 3.1 per cent respectively.

"Motor vehicle thefts rose 12.4 per cent," Adams pointed out. "Burglary increased 8.3 per cent and theft was up 10.6 per cent."

Of the total index crimes reported, 21 per cent were cleared by arrests in the first half of 1985. The value of property stolen during

the commission of the index crimes was estimated at over 585 million dollars, with approximately 230 million dollars in stolen property recovered by police.

"Two Texas law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty by criminal action in the first six months of this year," Adams said. "Two officers lost their lives in duty-related accidents."

The DPS also said a total of 1,733 assaults on officers were reported.

DWI arrests in the first half of 1985 were up 2.6 per cent, totaling 68,717. Drug arrests increased 14.4 per cent to 31,913.

The crime statistics were derived from reports submitted by 790 law enforcement agencies in the state.
