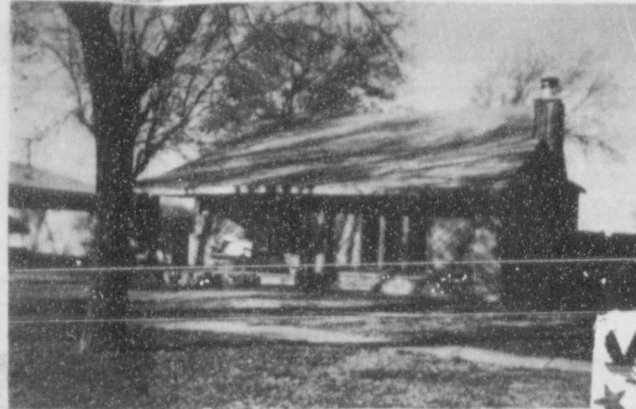

The cost of electricity rose an average of 4.56 percent over the past year, but residential electric bills vary widely from one region of the country to another.

A survey by the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners found that New York City residents pay the highest rates, 15.35 cents per kilowatt-hour, while Lewiston, Idaho, area residents pay the lowest, 3.35 cents per kwh.

The average cost of electricity was found to be 8.92 cents per kwh.

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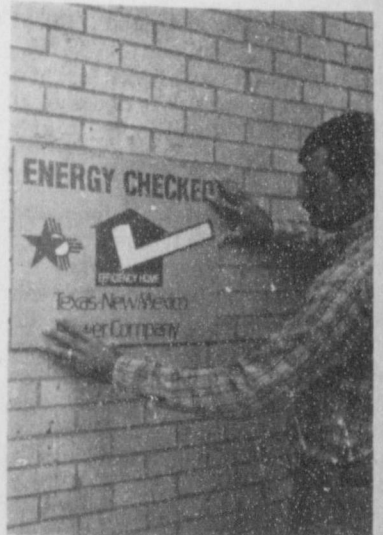

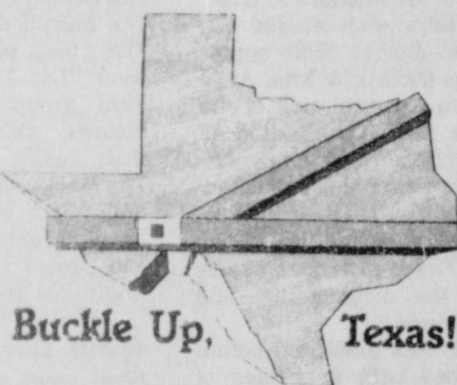

Safety belt law begins

Department of Public Safety enforcement of the new Texas safety belt law begins on Sunday, December 1, 1985. The law, expected to save hundreds of lives a year in Texas by encouraging more motorists to buckle up, took effect September 1. Drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity will be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations committed on or after December 1.

"Informal observations by DPS troopers indicate that two-thirds of Texas motorists are already complying with this law," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "Those motorists who are not observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight."

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be checking for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts. However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety belt should increase the incentive for observing this law, but much greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said.

"What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years of age must be secured in a

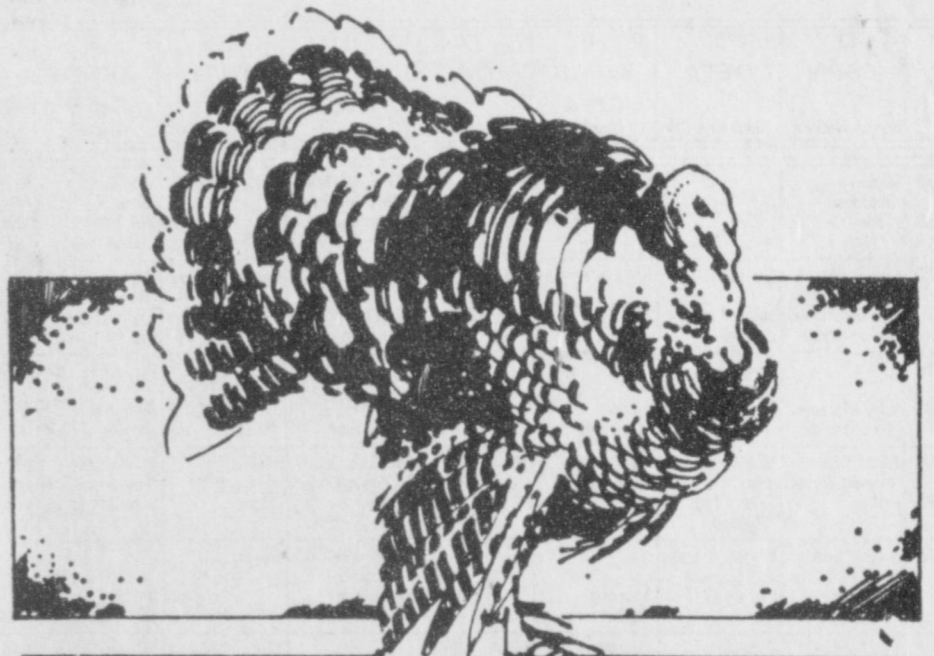

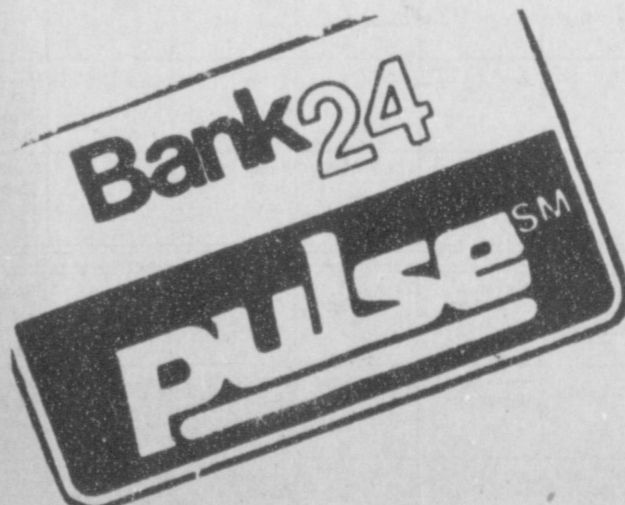

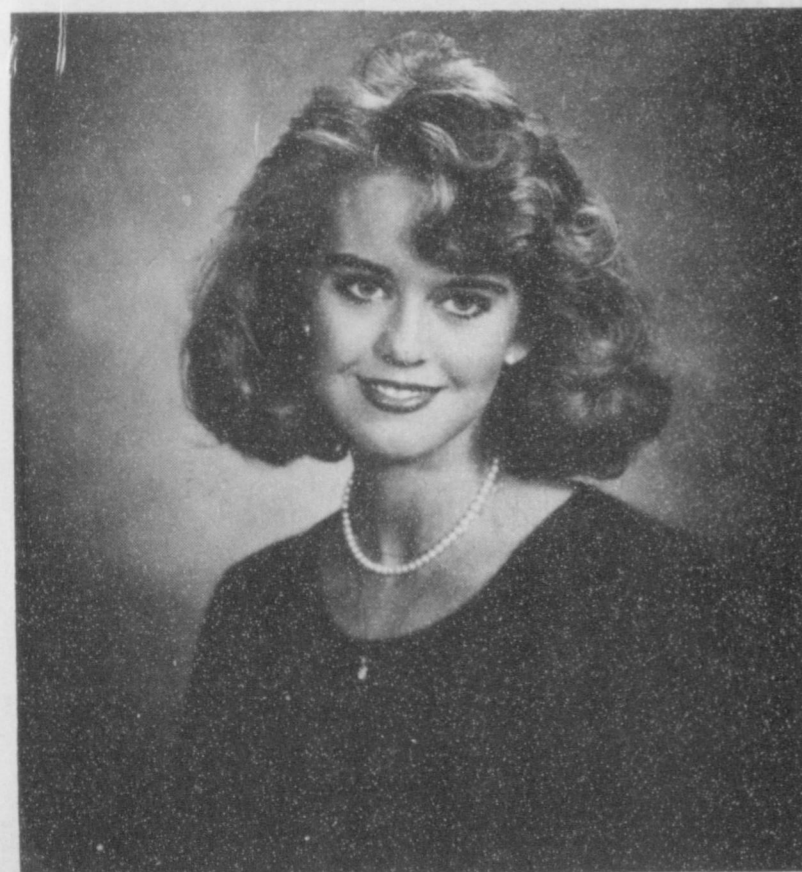

Social Security News

Have you a question about social security? Address it to Jim Talbot, manager of the Amarillo social security office, suite 16, 3601 W. 15th, Amarillo, Tx. 79102. You will receive an answer in this column or by mail.

QUESTION: You have issued me a social security number under two different names. One of them shows my middle name and the other shows just my middle initial. Which name do I use when I apply for benefits?

ANSWER: Your situation is not unusual. All people who have changed their names, for example,

have had two or more cards issued to them. As in your case, there is no problem as long as the different cards show the same number. Therefore, you may use either version of your name when you apply for benefits.

QUESTION: If I decide to take my social security retirement before I reach 65, how much money will I lose?

ANSWER: Your retirement benefit will be reduced 5/9 of one percent (or 1/180) for each month before you receive benefits before age 65. Thus, for example, if you begin receiving benefits 18 months be-

ACSS seeks missing survey forms

To assist USDA's Economic Research Service with a recent study of the feed mill industry, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is contacting feed manufacturers who failed to respond or to return the form to ERS.

In July, survey forms were mailed by ERS to all feed mill operators listed on the ASCS Food and Feed Facility Listing for 1984, with instructions to complete and return by August 5. As of September 30, ERS had not received forms from some feed manufacturers.

"As part of our agreement, we are following up with feed mill operators who did not respond to the questionnaire, and will provide them with an additional form in case they did not receive the first one." Keith Martin of the Hansford County ASCS said.

The purpose of the USDA study is to improve information of feed production and distribution to agriculture. "We encourage feed manufacturers to participate in the ERS survey because they will provide the Department with important information that will be helpful in understanding trends and changes in how animal feed is manufactured, marketed or fed," Martin said. The last USDA feed mill survey was conducted in 1976.

According to Martin, the study is supported by the American Feed Industry Association, formerly the American Feed Manufacturers Association, the National Grain and Feed Association, the National Feed Ingredients Association, and the National broiler Council.

"Feed mill operators who have not completed and returned their survey form to ERS are urged to do so as soon as possible," the ASCS official said.
