



The Spearman Lynx and Lynxette Booster Club would like to invite everyone to enjoy homemade ice cream at 8 p.m. this Thursday at the football field. Coaches, football players, cheerleaders parents, friends and fans are all encouraged to attend.

At 5 p.m. Thursday the junior varsity and varsity football teams will be in uniform for pictures. Parents, organizations, etc. who would like to photograph the team are encouraged to come at this time. Coach Mullins would like to give everyone this opporing individual pictures for Lynx picture buttons. These buttons will have each player in uniform and will be sold to friends, relatives and fans. On Thursday, each member of the junior varsity and varsity teams will need to know how many buttons his friends and family will need. The buttons will sell for \$2⁵⁰ each.

Plan now to bring your camera and most of all your appetite and come on out to the football field this Thursday evening. There will lots of fun and fellowship for everyone. Also, if you are not already a member of the Booster Club, plan to join this Thursday.

Voters will decide on August 26th whether to authorize the Palo Duro River Authority to sell \$22.3 million in bonds to construct a new reservoir 10 miles north of Spearman, Johnnie C. Lee, the Authority's general manager, announced.

The Authority's board of directors set the election during a special meeting on Tuesday, July 22nd. The Authority covers Hansford and Moore counties and includes Spearman, Gruver, Sunray, Cactus and Dumas, as well as Stinnett in Hutchinson County.

The reservoir would provide water service and recreation opportunities in the Authority's district.

"The reservoir is needed to ensure that our cities have sufficient water resources for the future," Lee said.

"We currently get all of our water from municipal wells in the Ogallala Aquifer, but we anticipate that these wells will be depleted by the years 2000 to 2030," he said.

If approved by voters, the \$22.3 million in general obligation bonds are expected to be sold to the Texas Water Development Board at a fixed 7.6 percent interest, maturing over a 25-year period. This would cost property owners a maximum of 15 cents per \$100 valuation, or about \$75 a year for a home appraised at \$50,000, excluding exemptions.

This would mark the first use of bond monies approved by voters last year in the new state water plan, Lee said.

"This is an excellent financial opportunity for us right now. In addition to the attractive interest rate, we also believe that we can obtain favorable construction bids," Lee said.

The 2,413-acre reservoir would be owned by the Palo Duro River Authority, whose nine member board is composed of representatives from Moore and Hansford counties and Stinnett.

According to engineers, there are no acceptable alternatives to meeting future water needs in this area other than building a surface lake. The lake would serve as an auxiliary source to the dwindling Ogallala formation.

"In additions to providing water, the Palo Duro Reservoir would increase property values, foster economic growth and offer recreational opportunities," Lee said.

"It will provide some assurance to our communities and businesses that the water will be there in the future," he said.

The Palo Duro Reservoir would be completed by 1993. It would be filled by runoff from Palo Duro Creek and its tributaries.

"Engineers say there is on the average enough runoff to fill the lake every three and half years. We feel that according to the history of our runoff we won't have any problems filling the reservoir," he said.

The second phase of the reservoir project would be built as the municipal wells begin to diminish and other sources of water are needed,

This second phase, estimated to cost about \$31 million, would involve building a water treatment plant, pumps and transmission lines to serve member communities.

Voting on the bond issue culminates more than 50 years of planning. The earliest recorded mention of the project is August 1935 when the Spearman Lions Club asked the Hansford County Commissioners to investigate the project.

A major milestone occured in June 1973 when the Texas Legis!ature created the Palo Duro River Authority and gave it legal powers to build a dam and reservoir. Planning for the lake has closely involved the US. Army Corps of Engineers.

"We are not in a water crisis yet, but we need to think about what is going to happen to our communities in 10 years. We can't wait until the up runs dry before starting to build a lake," Lee said.

PALO DURO RESERVOIR WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The Palo Duro Reservoir, if approved, would provide water resources for

the future as well as recreational opportunities for the present. On August 26, 1986, residents of Moore and Hansford counties and the City of Stinnett will vote on whether to authorize the Palo Duro River Authority to issue \$22.3 million in bonds necessary to construct the dam and reservoir on Palo Duro Creek. The following are some key questions and answers about the project.

WHAT IS THE PALO DUNO RESERVOIR

The Palo Duro Reservoir is a proposed 2,413-acre lake to be built on Palo Duro Creek. When completed, it would provide water resources to member communities of the Palo Duro River Authority and recreational opportunities for the entire Texas Panhandle. The proposed reservoir is included in the current state water plan, "Water for Texas, a Comprehensive Plan for the Future."

WHERE WOULD IT BE LOCATED?

The Palo Duro Reservoir would be located on Palo Duro Creek, north of Spearman in Hansford County. The dam site is 13.6 miles north of the State Highway 207 crossing between Spearman and Gruver, or at mile 34.7 on Palo Duro Creek. According to state planners, this is the only suitable reservoir site north of the Canadian River. tunity so all pictures can be taken at one time.

WHAT CITIES AND COUNTIES WOULD THE RESERVOIR SERVE?

Hansford and Moore counties and the City of Stinnett in Hutchinson County would be served by the reservoir. Cities within the service area include Dumas, Cactus, Spearman, Gruver, Sunray and Stinnett.

WHY DO WE NEED A RESERVOIR?

The cities in the service area currently obtain water from the Ogallala Aquifer. This underground formation is being drained over the entire High Plains region. While the area's population and water use are expected to grow, the existing municipal well fields will be depleted between the years 2000 and 2037. The only long-term solution to the water supply needs of the area is development of a surface water reservoir. It is intended to operate the reservoir in a manner that maximizes available water. Based on studies of runoff between 1940 and 1982, Palo Duro Reservoir would yield 7.290 acre-feet of water per year (about 2.4 billion gallons) and provide 60,900 acre-feet of conservation storage. Studies based on weather patterns since 1982 indicate that some years could yield lesser amounts. Palo Duro Reservoir would also provide recreation outlets for the area.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT NOW?

Building the Palo Duro Reservoir now will save money in the future as weil as ensure that the area has adequate long-term water resources. If approved by voters, the Texas Water Development Board is expected to purchase the bonds for a fixed 7.6 percent interest payable over 25 years. Whether such a favorable financial arrangement could be obtained at a later date is an unknown factor. All of the necessary permits already have been approved for the Reservoir, and failure to act on them could mean a costly re-permitting process. Due to the current economic climate, it is also anticipated favorable construction bids could be obtained now.

WHAT EXACTLY ARE WE VOTING ON?

Residents are being asked to authorize the Palo Duro River Authority to sell \$22.3 million in bonds to the Texas Water Development Board. The board is expected to purchase the bonds at a fixed 7.6 percent interest, maturing over a 25-year period.

HOW MUCH WILL CONSTRUCTION OF THE PROJECT COST?

Construction of the dam and reservoir would cost \$22.3 million. At a later date, a second phase of the project would involve constructing a water treatment plant, pumps and transmission lines to serve member cities of the Palo Duro River Authority. It is estimated that this second phase of the project would cost about \$31 million.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN TO TAXPAYERS

The \$22.3 million in bonds would be paid off through ad valorem property taxes amounting to about 15 cents per \$100 valuation.

WHEN WILL IT BE BUILT

The Palo Duro Reservoir w be completed by 1993.

WHO WILLOWN THE RESERVOIR?

The Palo Duro Reservoir would be owned and operated by the Palo Duro River Authority.

WHAT IS THE PALO DURO RIVER AUTHORITY?

The Texas Legislature created the Palo Duro River Authority in June 1973 with the legal authority to construct a dam and reservoir on Palo Duro Creek in Hansford County. The Authority is located in the northern Panhandle and includes Hansford County, Moore County and the City of Stinnett in Hutchinson County. Member cities include Gruver, Spearman, Dumas, Sunray, Cactus and Stinnett. The Authority is governed by a nine-member board, with representatives appointed by each city or county in the Authority service area. The Authority also employs a general manager, who is responsible to the board of directors.

Entitled "Texas Legacy", the Monument depicts two cowboys on horseback herding six longhorns. Modeled at one and one-half times life size, the work stands 40 feet long, 20 feet wide and over 17 feet high, and weighs roughly 20 tons. When completed, it will be one of the largest cast bronzes in the United States.

The Sesquicentennial Monument has been in the planning stages for over two years and will require several additional months to complete. When finished, it will be transported across the State in four large flatebed trucks.

Labor Day Weedend



Both car makers and tire manufacturers are contributing to the tragic death toll on U.S. roads and highways.

In an effort to sell cars and tires to the young--avid motor enthusiasts in many cases--ads and commercials featuring cars traveling at a high rate of speed on curving, wet roads are utilized.

Youngsters (including girls) who might not realize the inevitable limitations of even the finest products in dangerous driving conditions conclude from watching these commercials that they can do almost anything on the road. They conclude their tires will hold them on a curve, even in the wettest weather, or that they always have the power to zip around the car ahead in the face of oncoming traffic.

Every week, however, one reads of victims, usually youngsters, who thought their equipment could do more than it could do. No tire will hold a speeding car on a curve beyond the limits of

nature's laws. All tires will plane at a certain speed, losing their gripping capacity.

The firstest and most powerful cars will swerve off the road when too much power is applied in a turn, in wet weather, or in violent maneuvers.

Day after day and week after week we watch these commercials, about foreign cars and about GM and Ford cars of late, racing along this curving road or that. We are told they are a driving "experience" and the camera shows them

Judge Escapes to Mountains

One after noon we decided to get away for a few days. We discussed going to North Carolina and Alabama to see Joanna, Chris, Cristi, and Doug and Becky and Gary, Debby and C.B. but the hot weather made the mountains very inviting.

Then came the dicision of which vehicle to take: the Van, Buick or Aspencade (Honda full dress touring bike). The motorcycle is much more comfortable.

Many orthopedic Surgeons have discussed the advantages of motorcycles for people. A vehicle with four wheels jostles a person from side to side. This is only a very small force to the side; but, after riding all day in a car person is tired to say the least. The Aspenade has air shocks that can be adjusted from the dash with an on-board compressor giving a ride as stiff as a tractor with lugs plowing wheat stubble; or, as soft as a 1939 Buick without any shock absorbers. So! Because we can ride all day and not be tired (later in this article that statement will be corrected) we took the cycle.

Joanne packed our clothes and we were off to Raton. We went by way of Gruver and Strafford to Dalhart. That road is a little bit safer in the afternoon and we can make better time than going thru Sunray. The mileage is only 3 miles different going via Strafford or Sunray. We had a very pleasant trip to Strafford; however the air was hot between Spearman and Dalhart.

We began to pick up some traffic after we left Straford. A few 18

From Alamosa we head East through the canyons. We soon discover we are the front door for some 8 wheelers.

Laveta Pass, and others, are no problem for 1100cc flat cycle developing about 80 H.P. (the little 1200cc. V.W. Bug developed about 30 hp).

From Walsensburg we head south to Raton. Rain clouds appear ahead. Just before Raton Pass we stop beneath an underpass and put on our bright orange rain jackets. Climbing up Raton Pass, keeping the correct distance was not any problem; however, going down the other side was a different story. We kept the speedometer on about 55 mph, as a result every one passe us sprayed the cycle generously with water standing in the highway. Very little water got on us and in a few miles we were bone dry. When we arrived in Raton about 4

p.m. we planned to continue on to Spearman (212 miles); however the cloud that rained on us on Raton Pass

had now moved across the Raton to Clayton highway. We stayed at our friendly Motel and enjoyed a nice quite evening.

The next morning the storm clouds had moved away and the ride back to Spearman was extremely pleasant. Apparently the rain the night before had traveled along our route to Sunray. making our trip home wonderful as the aroma of the grasslands and newly plowed panhandle soil slowly drifted across the highway. The cycle averaged 50.1 mpg on this

trip Floating along the highways around Spearman on a still moonlight night in the summertime and glide down through the canyons and back up on the caprock where you can see forever and the lights of Spearman, Gruver Morse and all those beautiful farm homesteads makes you know why we are blessed to be able to growup, learn, work, live and play on this portion of God's earth where the most wonderful people in the world live.

That is a nice ride and the aroma of the cool mountain air is beginning to emphasis their wonderful outdoor mountain air available at the door step of Spearman as the cycle glided over Raton Pass with ease from Trinadad to near Walsenburg over the side rode pass Monument Lake. We stopped accasionally for photographs with the mountains in the background and of course the cycle.

> We then went north on staying East of the San Cristo Range. A nice ride while staying off the main traveled highways. With the intercom amplifier and connection between our helmets and microphones build into the helmets we can discuss the many, many rubber rafts we see floating down the rivers, usually 4 to 6 people in the rafts bouncing along the rapids.

When we enter the highway that runs between Canon City and Durango we see two cycles heading west and visit them by C.B. radio. They are extremely nikce and belong to the Gold Wing Riders of America as do most Gold Wing Riders. This is simply a group of touring bike riders trying to help each other when break downs, etc. occur, and of course help automobile drivers in distress also.rgwt They ride a few miles and drop off going their various ways. We keep in touch via C.B. radio for a few miles. We arrive at Salida tired, check into a nice motel. Three other couples on Gold Wings check into the motel, one from Illinois and two from Ft. Worth. We visit an hour or so discussing cycles, various beautiful scenic highways and places to eat, then to go to the local Pizza Parlor and have a delicious supper. We always sleep good in the Colorado mountains. The next morning we decided to ride awhile before we eat breakfast. We go east of Salida and to make a decision whether to go west toward Monarch Pass and on to Silverton and Duranja; or, south to Alamosa; or, north to Leadville. We elected to go North to Leadville. That is such a beautiful ride on a cycle; gentle turns and steady climb perfect for a motorcycle. We arrive in Leadville, find a nice restuarant and eat a delicious ham and egg breakfast. The cold morning mountain air is making itself evident by the steam from the coffee as the cold air glides down off the slopes of the mountains covered with snow. Later in the day the process will repeat itself in reverse as the warmer air rises, condenses and mountain showers develop. Because other touring cyclists stated the high temperature in the Estes Park was 40% yesterday, with snow the night before, we decided to head back south. We enjoyed the ride back even more than the trip up to Leadville. The trip up was the first time over that road since 1950 and we had to be alert for road construction, damaged highways and the driving habits of the local people going to work. We had a beautiful ride from Leadville to Salida with the mountains on our right and rubber rafts bouncing along the Arkansaw River on our left, such real beauty.

The trip from Dalhart to Clayton is alway pleasant as we watched the combines harvesting wheat with two large trucks, geared for pulling thousands of pounds out of the fields moving toward the highway while we glided efforrtlessly along the highway with a 80 H. P. horziontally opposed liquid cooled flat four providing the power.

We stop at Texline for gasoline and a coke. The cycle will run of regular or unleaded, so we use unleaded in an effort to help the environment etc. The cycle has a 4.8 gallon tank located below the seat. The center of gravity was lowered and the location of the convential tank provided a handy location for electronic modules etc.

The ride between Clayton and Raton is always extremely pleasant with ranch land, plenty distance, and hills with volcanic rock to observe; and, imagine what it must have been like millions of years ago when dinosaurs roamed the area where we are traveling. Now a motorcycle glides quitely and effortlessly along-not touching the earth itself but on a blacktop surface keeping us a few inches above the earth.

As we approach Raton at sunset, the skyline is beautiful with flashing signs and homes nestled in the hills. The electricity provided by generators in turn powered by coal from train loads of coal which are every present on the railroad between Clayton and Raton. We stop at a very friendly, motel where we have stopped on previous trips by motorcycle. The trunk on the cycle can be carried like a suitcase into the motel room. The top is then opened and removed and set to one side. The half shell container thats left contains Joannes overnight case and other items that make a trip seem like a person is at home.

We rode on South for Salida to Alamosa on 17, straight as an arrow and flat as a pancake. The motorcycle engine whining like a turbine the air flowing over the windshield developing a still air pocket for the passenger

That a substantial copy of this Resolution shall serve as proper Notice of said election, and the President of the Board of Directors shall cause said Notice to be published one time a week for two consecutive weeks with the first publication to be at least 21 days prior to the election, with such notice not being published earlier than the 30th day or later than the 10th day prior to the date set for the elec-tion, in a newspaper published in each City contained in said Authority or, if none is published in said City, the Notice must be posted in three public places in such City.

7. That at said election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

8. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

All new students must have records from previous school(s) attended, such as report card and immunization records.


Registration for grades K thru 4th will be August 29th from 8:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m.


Arts Dollars

While economizing on some things, Congress is increasing the millions given to the National Endowment of the Arts.

The House recently voted to give this agency \$165 million to spread around the country, mostly to urban theater and other "art" groups. This is \$20 million more than the Reagan Administration requested.

The truth is that it's a sort of welfare for urban "arts" organizations, the product from which is often not art but entertainment, of which we have an overabundance in the U.S.


