

Hansford County Stock Show sets new record

Another record setting Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and sale wrapped up this past weekend with \$126,858.20 paid out by buyers. This is over \$10,000 more than the \$116,415.20 for last year's show and sale and the largest ever recorded for the annual event.

Over 100 4-H and FFA members showed animals. There were 245 entries in the show held last Friday and Saturday at the Spearman County Barn.

Quentin Harper, for the second time in a row, claimed the Grand Champion Steer award. Leslie Latta, also for the second year in a row, claimed the Grand Champion Lamb and Jennifer Burnam showed the Grand Champion Pig.

Harper's Grand Champion Steer brought the largest amount for any single animal at the sale with

\$4,487.00 total price bid by Dean Cluck.

Latta's lamb brought \$798.00, bid by First State Bank of Spearman, and Burnam's grand champion pig brought \$1,060.00 bid by Paul Aduddell, of Stratford.

Reserve championships were won by Stacey Williams for her steer, Lance Sparks for his pig, and Tommie Latta for her lamb.

Showmanship awards were given in all three divisions with Brandon Vanderburg winning in steers, Tek Ferguson in swine, and Brent Wagner in lambs.

In commercial steer judging, Kyla Nelson of Spearman and Coby Barkley of Gruver tied for first and Weslyn Maupin, of Gruver won 3rd.

Ten teams participated in Team Judging. Gruver FFA won

first. This team consisted of Lance Sparks, Justin Armes, and Brent Wagner. Second place winner was Guymon FFA#2 consisting of John Fast, Marshall Haight, and Darren Browning. Third place winner was Guymon FFA#1 consisting of Rheit Heflin, Edward Reust, and Richard Kimsey.

The High Individual for Judging was Edward Reust, second was Justin Armes and third was John Fast.

"thirtysomething" begins today

FCA's "thirtysomething," a program that is designed to help young people cope with problems they face, will begin today. Teen leaders have arrived in Spearman from Arkansas, Georgia and different Texas cities to present the program to local youth.

There will be 117 area youth, 7th through 12th graders, participating in the event. Activities for the youth include learning sessions, fellowships, and dinners at host homes that local residents have donated the use of during the program. Ten homes have been offered for this use. At the end of the program, the youth will gather at the Lyric Theatre for the "Main Event."

The "Main Event" will include testimonials and music presented by different teen leaders. All of the teen leaders are experienced in youth ministry work.

The sessions prior to the "Main Event" will have the youth divided into smaller groups of about ten to fifteen young people. Each group will meet in one of the host homes for learning sessions and meals during the 30-hour event.

The curriculum for the event will be **Back to Basics**. It is designed to inspire self-esteem in youth. This is shown to help youth resist negative peer pressure.

Teen leaders for the event include Brian Briley of Little Rock, Ark., Alan Daniels of Marietta, Ga., Pat Farmer of Amarillo;

Rusty Teeter of Lockney, John Rech of Borger, Beth Brown of Abilene, Brent Gentzel of Abilene; Harold Kline of Amarillo, Andy Dietz of Borger and David Walker of Canadian.

Varsity track teams take second at W.T.

Both Spearman High School track teams traveled to Stinnett last weekend to compete in the West Texas Track Meet. Both teams came away with a second place win. The girls had a total of 121 points, behind Perryton's 177. The boys had 125 total points which was only two points behind W.T.'s first place with 127 points. The third place went to Perryton with 94, followed by Fritch with 86, then Canadian with 69, then Highland Park with 19.

The girls third place went to Fritch with 107, followed by Canadian with 58, then W.T. with 54 and Highland Park with 23 total points.

Matt Tucker set two more meet records at the meet, one in the shot put and one in the discus. He had a 60'2 1/2" first place throw in the shot put and a 172' 5" throw with the discus.

Other team members that placed were Lance Swan with a third place shot put of 47' 3". He also had a second place with a 163' 10" discus throw. John Hughes had a sixth

place throw in the discus, 143' 5".

In the long jump, Shawn Cook took first with a jump of 20' 8 1/2", and Tim Dooley took sixth with 18' 3 1/2".

In the high jump, Ron McCown took third with 5' 8" and Cook was fourth with 5' 6".

In the 3200 meter run, Jerold Blan took first with 10:46.84. Chad Riggins was sixth with 12:11.2. In the 400 meter relay the team of Ron McCown, Chris Williamson, Tim Dooley and Haskell Garrett was third.

Blan had a first in the 800 meter run, 2:05.52. Chris Williamson was fifth in the 100 meter, 11.53.

In the 110 high hurdles, Cook claimed second with 15.25. In the 400 meter run Dooley was sixth with 54.7. In the 300 meter hurdles Cook took first with 39.9. In the 200 meter, Williamson was fourth with 23.87. In the 1600 meter Jeff Hutchison and Brandon Baker were fifth and sixth respectively, with 5:31.2 and 5:39.2.

In the 1600 relay, the team of Garrett, Cook, Dooley, and Blan

took a fourth place finish with 3:37.2.

The girls placed as follows: Heather Murrell claimed a first place in three events, high jump - 5' 0", 100 m hurdle - 15.54, and 400 m dash - 58.98. She also had a second place finish in the long jump, 16' 11". Suzanne Sanders took a second in the high jump, 4' 10", and a fifth in the long jump - 14' 6 1/2".

Laci Lasater took second in the triple jump and third in the 100 m hurdles. She had 33' 7" in the jumps and a time of 17.24 in the hurdles.

Shannon Holton took sixth in both the triple jump and the 800 m

run. She had jumps of 30' 1" and a time of 2:45.16 in the run.

Sonya Nitschke took fifth in the triple jump, 30' 4". Laurie Lieb took fifth in the 200 m dash, 30.16. Krista Kirkland took fourth in both the 160 m run and the 3200 m run, with times of 6:00.68 and 13:22.00

Haley Shieldknight was sixth in the 3200 run with 13:39.88.

The relay team of Mendy Lasater, Joy Gafford, Sonya Nitschke, and Suzanne Sanders was third in the 400 m run. M. Lasater, Gafford, Nitschke, and L. Lasater took second in the 800 m relay. And the team of Nitschke, Holton, L. Lasater, and Murrell took second in the 1600 meter relay.

SBA offers disaster loans to area businesses

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has announced that small concerns in several West Texas Counties, including Hansford County, may now be eligible to apply for financial assistance under the Agency's Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.

Damages and losses caused by drought conditions which occurred January 1 through August 31, 1988, prompted the disaster designation in Crosby, Floyd, Garza, Hansford, Hutchison, Moore, Ochiltree, Roberts, Sherman, Briscoe, Hale, Lubbock and Swisher Counties, according to Walter Fronstin, district director of Lubbock's SBA office.

"Since SBA is tied to Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) designations, the filing deadlines for amended designations, such as this one, are different," Fronstin said.

"The deadline for filing applications in Briscoe, Hale, Lubbock, and Swisher Counties is Nov. 3, 1989. The other nine counties in this designation have a filing deadline of Oct. 23, 1989," Fronstin said.

SBA is authorized to accept and process applications for EIDL loans from small business concerns without credit available elsewhere and

from agricultural cooperatives without credit from other sources. In addition to the credit elsewhere factors, Fronstin stressed that the program is available only to small businesses which meet SBA's size standards. "Agricultural enterprises are not eligible to apply for the EIDL loans," Fronstin said.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent.

"Deadlines for filing applications under this or any EIDL declaration is subject to requirement changes of the Federal budget," Fronstin said.

The EIDL program is intended to assist agriculture-related businesses--such as fertilizer and seed dealers or implement dealers, etc. who suffer a decrease in sales or other forms of economic injury directly attributable to the crop losses incurred by farmers to whom the dealer usually sells, or to the inability of farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels.

Admission to Stephen F. Austin's colony at San Felipe was very strictly regulated. The head of each family had to provide an affidavit attesting to his good character, industry, and sobriety. Drunks, vagrants, and other undesirables were literally thrown out of the settlement. As a result, San Felipe in its early days was peaceful and literate. One visitor was startled to hear a farmer reciting Tacitus while slopping his hogs.

Austin did tolerate one vice — horse racing. He thought it would encourage selective breeding to improve the stock.
