Everyone is welcome to come enjoy their music.

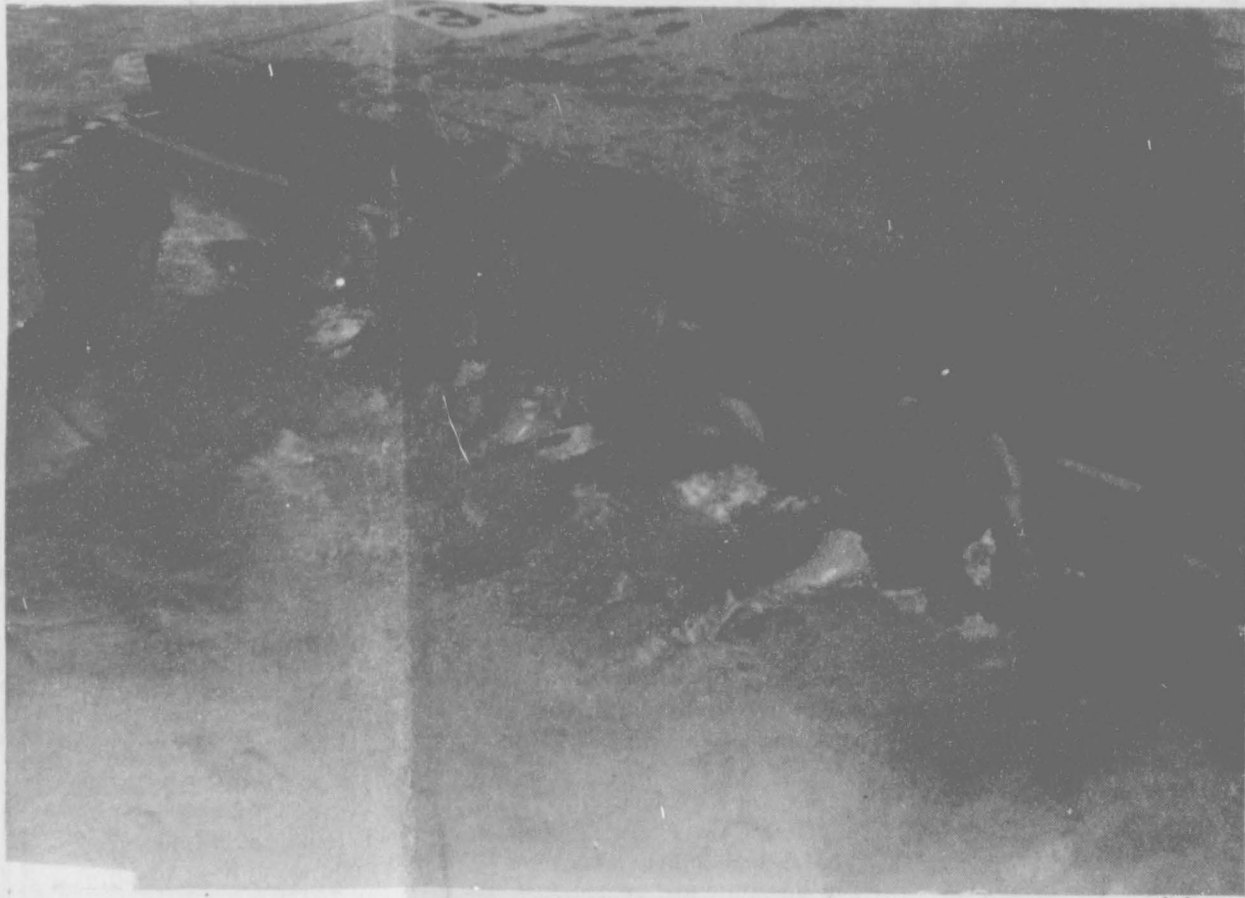

PDRA to advertise for bids Aug. 24

Palo Duro River Authority officials voted July 12 to advertise for construction bids on the proposed dam near Spearman. Bidding will open on August 24.

Freeze and Nichols, a Fort Worth engineering firm, redesigned plans for the dam. Their redesigned plans will bring construction costs down to about \$14 million. The new design eliminated approximately \$3.2 million in cost overruns that had previously threatened to split the authority.

According to Johnnie Lee he expects the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Water Development Board to approve the redesigned dam proposal within a few days.

The Palo Duro River Authority consists of Moore and Hansford counties and the city of Stinnett. The dam, when built, will hold 60,900 acre-feet of water, the lake will cover 2,500 surface acres and be approximately 85 feet deep at the dam.

In late 1987, the Authority passed a bond to gain monies to help costs to pay for land, settle well conflicts and establish recreation areas around the lake.

SCS needs plans for farms with erodible soil

All farm operators should, at this time, be aware of the Food Security Act of 1985. One of the provisions of the Act which affects farmers in Hansford County is the Conservation Compliance provision. Under this provision, farmers producing agricultural commodities on fields designated as highly erodible must develop conservation plans which are approved by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and the local Soil and Water Conservation District prior to January 1, 1990 and must have these plans fully operational by January 1, 1995 in order to maintain certain USDA benefits.

The SCS determines which fields are highly erodible based on soil type. If one-third of the field or at least 50 acres in the field consist of a designated highly erodible soil then the field in question is considered highly erodible.

Currently, the SCS has mailed out Highly Erodible Land determinations to all farm numbers in the county on which producers have completed and signed the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation Certification form at the ASCS office. This determination identifies highly erodible fields or the absence of such. Producers who have received determinations and have highly erodible fields and wish to maintain USDA program

benefits should get in contact with SCS personnel as soon as possible to develop a conservation plan on these fields. If a determination has not been received for each farm number, the producer should contact ASCS personnel to complete the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation Certification form which will be forwarded to the SCS office for requisition of a highly erodible land determination.

SCS urges producers with highly erodible fields to promptly contact the local office and begin developing conservation plans on these fields if you have not already done so.

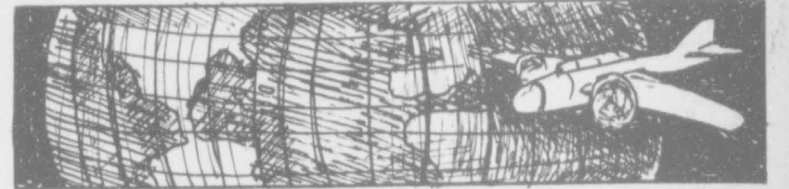
Host families needed for exchange students

Hundreds of bright-eyed, well-educated students throughout the world are looking forward to living in the United States for the upcoming school year. There's only one problem -- finding families here who will "adopt" the students as one of their own for nine months.

Host homes are urgently needed so that students can be suitably matched with families and schools before their August arrival. It takes several weeks to organize the match and to orient students and host families.

Host families benefit greatly from the cultural exchange, and the exchange students carry their memories back to their homelands to share with their countrymen. It is the hope of Youth Exchange Service (YES), the nonprofit organization which arranges the cultural exchanges, that world peace will be enhanced through its efforts. Since 1974, YES has brought more than 6,500 students together with host

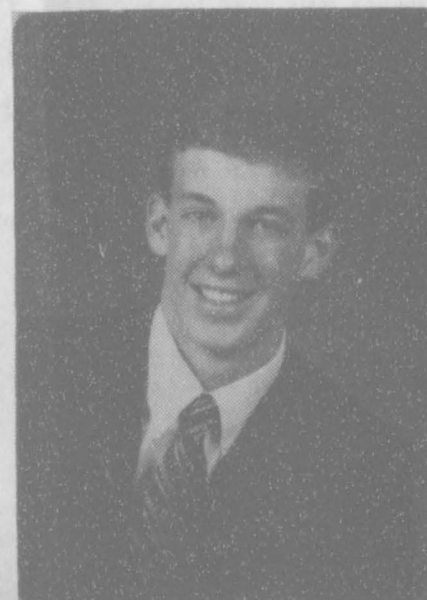

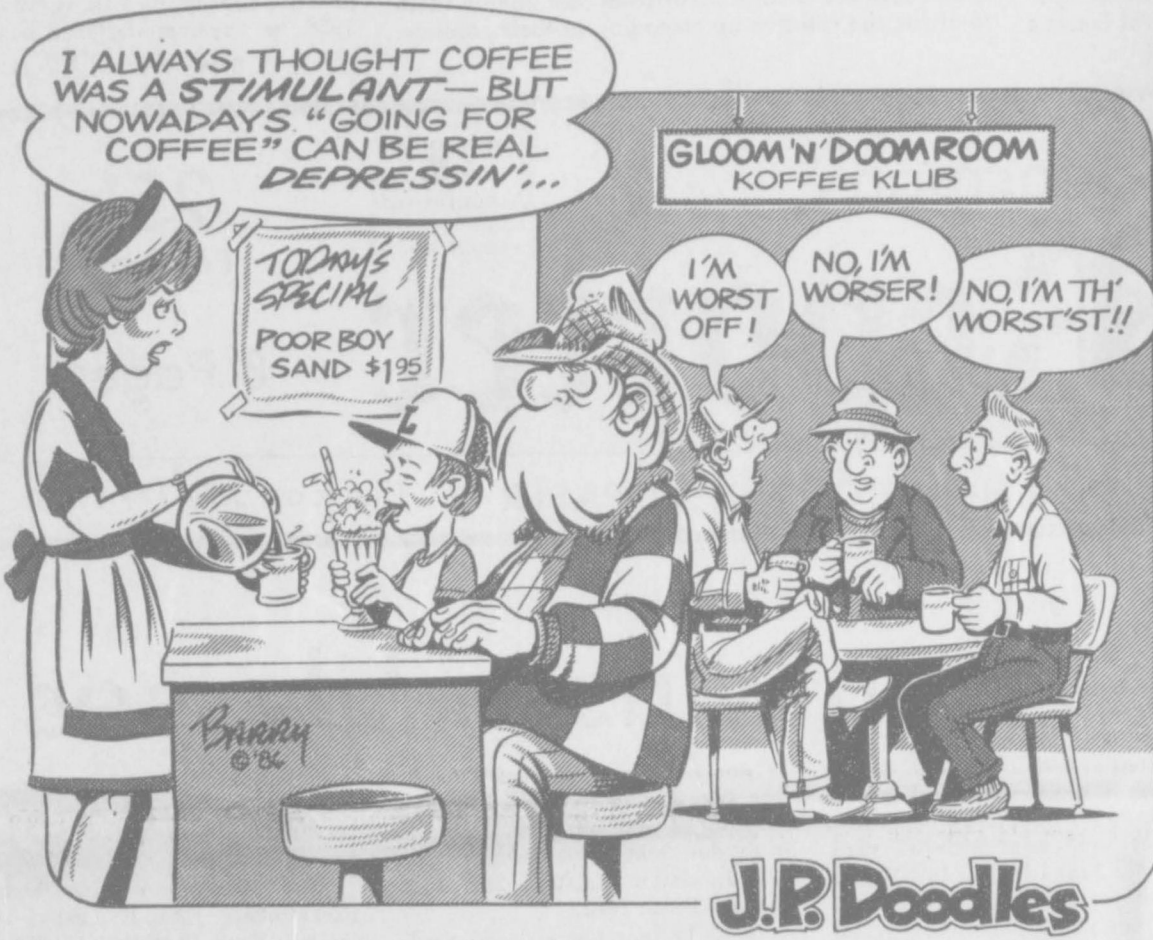
Garnett to serve mision in Puerto Rico
