





A large percentage of the farmers throughout the country can nearly triple the labor income of their chickens, merely by managing the flocks so that at least 25 per cent of the year's egg production comes between October 1 and January 31, according to the reults of this test.

A group of farmers were united for this experiment. Half of them managed their poultry flocks so that 25 per cent of the total yearly production was disposed of in October, November December and The January, when eggs are highest in price. Figures showed that this practice boosted their year-round average price to 38.7 cents a dozen for all eggs sold, and gave them a return of 70 cents for every hour of labor on poultry, after allowing for

all other costs. A second group of farmers, who did not get their pullets In condiion for fall egg production, selling only four per cent of their eggs in the four high-price months, received only 30.8 cents a dozen for their year-round average price, and made only 24.5 cents an hour in labor income.

Reduced Long Distance Rates Go Into Effect

Reduced long distance telephone rates to points 130 to 1,500 miles distant from Big Spring will go into effect tomorrow, according to E. Hooks, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Calls to points located within the above distances wil be lowered 5 to 25 cents in cost, Mr. Hooks said. The decrease will apply on personchanged in all but a few in-

"More than \$5,000,000 will be say ed annually to telephone users in the United States by the reduction,' he continued. "Of this sum, approximately three-quarters of a million dollars will be saved in the states served by the Southwestern Company, Missfouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas,

"The present cut in long distance rates is the third to be made in a little more than two years.

As a result it is estimated that approximately ten million dollars has been subtracted from the nation's yearly long distance bills.

FORMER TREASURER Church Sunday BAPTIST HOME BOARD SENTENCED TO SERVE

Nineteen Other Bills Against Carnes To Be Started Should He Attempt To Seek Pardon.

(By the Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 5.—Clinton Carnes, former treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home, whose disappearance last summer led to the discovery of an alleged shortage of nearly one million dollars in his accounts, and his subsequent arrest in Canada, pleaded guilty in the superior court here today to embezzlement and was sentenced to serve from five to seven years imprisonment.

Carnes 'plea was to one indictment, charging him with the theft of \$80,000.00, and he was sentenced immediately. Solicitor General John Boykin told the court that he had lecided to accept the recommendation of the Baptist Home Mission Board, that Carnes be permitted to plead guilty. He said, however, the prosecution would be started on nineteen other bills, against Carnes, should he attempt to seek
