### WICHITA BOOSTERS VISIT SPEARMAN

The special train of the Golden Jubilee Trade Excursionists under the auspices of the Wichita Chamber of Commerce, reached Spearman at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning, and for several hours the city had as guests a very live bunch of jobbers, manufacturers, bankers, live stock and grain commission men, lumber men, and others from our most popular wholesale point, Wichita, Kansas. About 125 Wichita men were aboard, including two ministers, Dr. Brodie and Rev. Herring. Bud Graham, official mascot, and his bull dog, were very much in evidence. J. L. Pope, secretary of the Woodward Chamber of Commerce, and Charles S. Martin, a Woodward banker, were with the party. Four 12-section Pullmans, a 10-section observation car, a tourist sleeper, baggage car and two diners, made up the special train. For several hours the representatives of "big business" in Wichita mingled with their customers and friends in Spearman; not attempting to sell anything, but just gettin' acquainted and looking into the prospects for future business from this section. They are a fine delegation of business and professional men, and Spearman is glad they came. They had a good word for our town and community, spoke encouragingly of our prospects and made us feel more neighborly and friendly toward Wichita. The excursionists were detained in Spearman about one hour longer than they intended on account of the engine which pulled their train running off the track in the Spearman yards. It required some heroic work on the part of the train crew, section crew and a corps of volunteer helpers to put the engine back on the rails, and the bunch pulled out for Shattuck about one hour late. They will follow the Santa Fe to Tucumcari and return to Wichita on the Rock Island.

### EXAMINATIONS FOR TEACHERS

Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, has issued the following notice to county and city superintendents:

"Due to the scarcity of teachers, I have authorized a number of special examinations for teachers' certificates during my term of office. I have received numerous requests to authorize contracts with teachers who do not hold valid certificates. Of course, I cannot do this; but in order to give such teachers and prospective teachers an opportunity to qualify by securing legal certificates, I am now announcing the dates on which examinations will be held in all county seats during the remainder of the year. These examinations will be conducted at the usual places for teachers' examinations on the dates named below, except those set for August 16-20 will be conducted only at the recognized summer schools.

Following are the dates: May 7-8; June 4-5; July 2-3; August 16-20; August 27-28; September 4-5; October 1-2; November 5-6; December 3-4.

### Inter-Church World Movement

Chicago, Ill., April 19, 1920.

Dear Mr. Editor: In the Chicago Tribune mailed you today, is a sample of the sentiment one finds emanating from pulpits and press with fast increasing frequency and earnestness, pleading with the Protestant church people of America for a union of forces, in other words a return to sanity before it is too late. Two facts are impending, either one of which is absolutely certain to engulf; one is the present deep-seated dry-rot, the other, too appalling in its consequence to even touch upon here.

Blest beyond compare are those communities like Spearman, just springing into life on the frontiers, where a friendly citizenship have the rarest of all opportunities to start right as regards its religious life for a century on ahead.

Let me again express the hope that wise counsels will prevail and that the very first Sunday school and church organized in your midst will be a federated one, the membership of which will of course have the good sense, the will and the ingenuity to find a place to worship, in school house or movie hall for instance, for say the three or five years necessary to develop a vigorous, harmonious, healthy body (or its opposite), then when conditions are ripe and the movement proven sound, there will come a spontaneous call for, first the funds, then the edifice, one worth while, a joy, a real asset.

Spearman's first task is for a school of generous dimensions, but any proposition to start a little denominational church there at this priceless hour, would, in all probability, kill the larger project now so universally hoped for. Very truly yours,

## STARTS FUND FOR BUILDING

Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce Heads Movement for Memorial and Permanent Headquarters.

The Indianapolis chamber of commerce is raising a fund for the erection of a war memorial building to be the permanent national headquarters of the American Legion which, with appropriations by the city, county and state, promises to run to several million dollars.



"Every citizen of the city of Indianapolis and every organization owes a debt of appreciation and gratitude to the men who so ably and persistently and skillfully carried on the campaign for Indianapolis," said Charles F. Coffin, president of the Indianapolis chamber of commerce, which contributed to a fund to send a large delegation to the Minneapolis convention.

"There is now an obligation as well as an opportunity upon the citizens of Indianapolis to show that they all appreciate the significance of the fact that the headquarters of the great organization are to be permanently located in Indianapolis. It is not enough simply to have obtained them. I think you will agree with me that the least the city of Indianapolis can do is to supply the Legion ample grounds free of charge upon which they will erect one of the handsomest buildings that Indianapolis has ever had.

"Bringing the headquarters of this organization to Indianapolis is not like bringing a factory or industrial plant to the city. With this organization comes a power from which will go influences for law and order and civilization."

The fund started by the chamber of commerce grew quickly. The county commissioners shortly took steps looking to a half million dollar bond issue, the county's contribution to the fund. The state legislature is expected to make appropriation for the memorial and the Legion posts will canvass the state for contributions to what will probably be a \$5,000,000 or \$6,000,000 memorial fund.

A plan is now under consideration to purchase two city blocks lying between two parks which would clear a plaza between the city post office on the south and the city library on the north, which the new memorial building would face.

## POPPY AS MEMORIAL FLOWER

Tacoma (Wash.) Post Adopts Resolution Urging Flanders Fields Blossom Be Made Official.

A request has been received by Franklin D'Oller, national commander of the American Legion, to have the Shirley poppy adopted as the memorial flower of the Legion. The request originated with the Edward B. Rhodes Post No. 2 of Tacoma, Wash., which has adopted a resolution favoring the adoption of the poppy.

The resolution adopted by the Washington post was as follows:

"Lest we in the day's work, surrounded by home and happiness, forget our comrades who sleep in France, and here in the arms of the motherland;

"Lest we forget 'that greater love' of these American boys who 'gave their lives for their fellow men,'

"Lest we forget that 'In Flanders fields the poppies grow, among the crosses, row on row,' and that nature seems to have raised in these simple flowers the most eloquent monument—a waving scarlet blessing over their graves:

"Be it resolved, That the Edward B. Rhodes post, American Legion, inaugurate a movement to have the Shirley poppy adopted as the Memorial flower of the American Legion.

"That the American Legion take steps to assist and urge that every public park, cemetery, and every private garden, in gratitude to the men who made the supreme sacrifice, do, during the coming spring and summer, and every spring and summer thereafter, reverse the memory of our soldier dead by setting aside a plot for continued display of waving red poppies.

"That a red poppy be worn by every member of the American Legion on Memorial day."

It is probable that a similar resolution will be introduced by the post at the next convention of the American Legion, which is to be held in Cleveland, O.

## To Establish Post in China.

The sun never sets on the American Legion. A group of American veterans in Shanghai, China, are now converting their "Service club" into a post of the legion that will have jurisdiction over the entire republic, while in Tokyo, across the Yellow sea, a post is to be organized among Americans living in the flowery kingdom. Charles Burnett, American military attaché at Tokyo, has asked that copies of the constitution and by-laws of the American Legion be sent him, as there are a number of his fellow-countrymen there who served in the late war. The organization of the Shanghai post is being directed by Arthur P. Bassett, military attaché at Peking, who served for a time with the Fifteenth U. S. Infantry.

**RETURN OF ROADS PLEASES FARMERS**

Urge Policy to Insure Best Service at Lowest Cost Consistent With Fair Returns.

**OPPOSE NATIONALIZATION.**

Representative Agricultural Organizations and Rural Press State Farmers' Attitude Toward Railroads. Want Private Operation.

Private ownership of the railroads under a policy of government regulation which will insure the best possible service at the lowest cost consistent with fair returns on money invested in them is favored by representative farmer organizations throughout the country. This policy also is supported generally by agricultural newspapers, which state emphatically that the farmers are opposed not only to government ownership of railroads, but also to all nationalization plans. In a letter to the members of the United States Senate T. C. Atkeson, Washington representative of the National Grange, which is said to be the largest organization of its kind in the world, representing more than 1,000,000 farm owners in the United States, states that the agricultural interests of the country approve of private ownership of the railroads and further declares that persons purporting to speak for the farmers in support of government ownership are neither farmers nor representatives of any considerable number of farmers.

**Favor Private Operation.**

"The Grange," says Mr. Atkeson, quoting the official action of his organization, "approves of the general principles of railroad legislation now pending in Congress to return the railroads to their owners, to bring about the reorganization of the railroad companies into strong systems with capitalization based on actual value, and to create a control commission which may enforce the superior interest of the public to that of any other interest in the operation of railroads as common carriers and effectively protect the public against exploitation or injustice."

Many state and sectional agricultural organizations take a similar stand. Immediately after the National Grange expressed its attitude toward the railroad question the American Farm Bureau, meeting in Chicago, voted for private operation, and the National Farmers' Congress, in session at Hagerstown, Md., voiced like sentiments. The New York State Federation of County Farm Bureau Organizations and the Indiana Federation of Farmers went beyond that and joined the Grange in repudiating the alleged farmer representatives in Washington, who said they spoke for an "overwhelming majority of the farmers."

**Urge Reasonable Returns.**

The railroad policy favored by the New York State Federation of County Farm Bureau Organizations was stated in the following resolution: "Whereas, There have been conflicting statements published regarding the attitude of farmers upon the question of the future ownership of railroads; therefore be it Resolved, That the New York State Federation of County Farm Bureau Associations, representing 70,000 members, in annual session at Syracuse, N. Y., December 19, 1919, hereby indorses the action of the American Farm Bureau Federation in urging Congress to promptly return the railroads to their owners under such conditions as will insure reasonable returns on the value of the property and reasonable rates of transportation throughout the country."

**Views of Farmer Papers.**

The American Agriculturist states editorially that the farmers are "dead set against" the "scheme to enmesh the farmers in the web of radicalism." The Pennsylvania Farmer, discussing the general demand for private operation of the railroads, says: "It is especially true of farmers, in spite of the declaration of a few would-be leaders to the contrary." The Stockman-Farmer adds: "Farmers almost unanimously approve the return of the railroads and the express companies to their owners. The reason is that farmers, as well as other business men, want service of these institutions, and they cannot get such service under public operation as they can get under the operation of corporations, which have a direct financial interest in performing it."

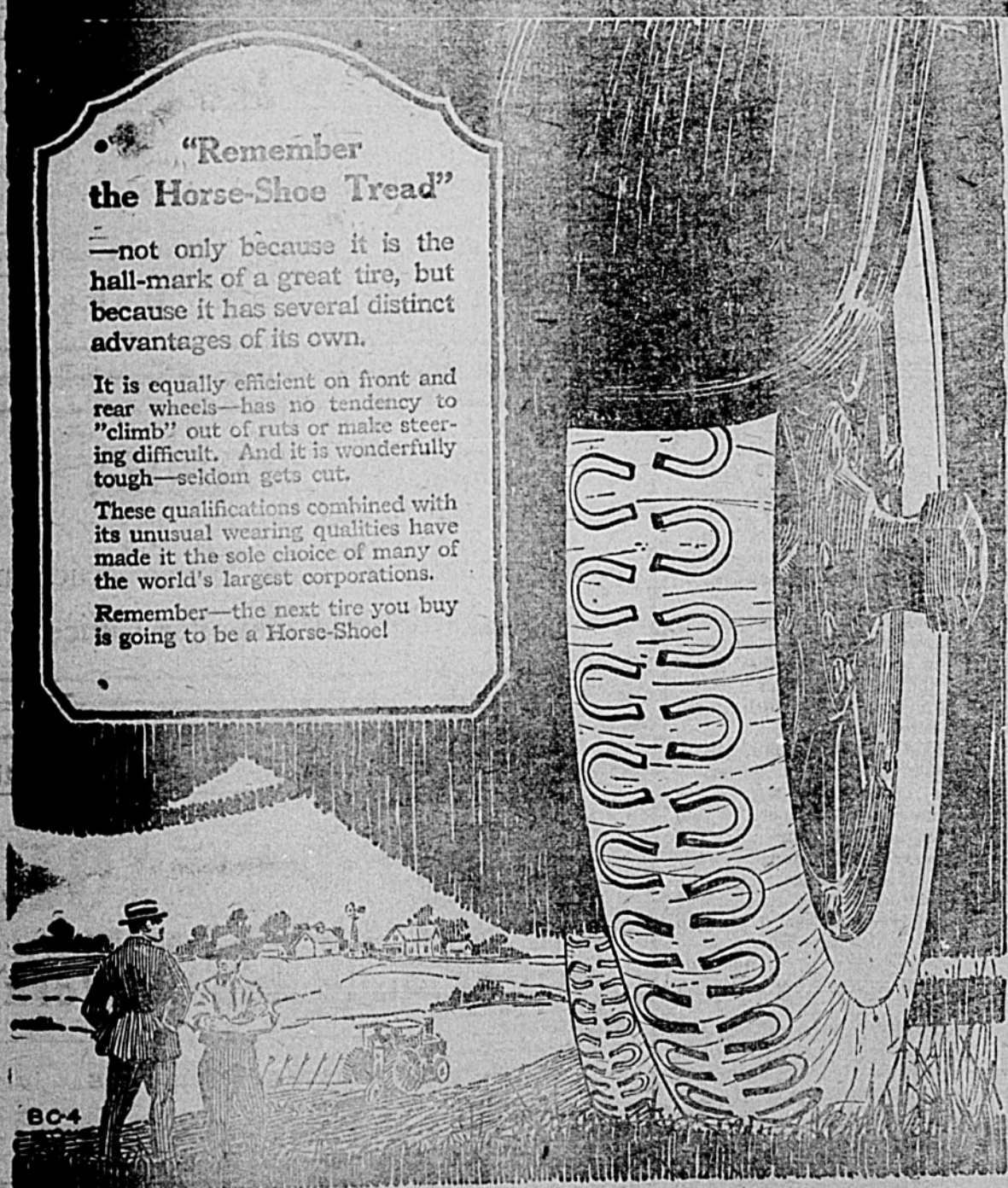

ALONG THE LINE OF MARCH WITH THE NATIONAL SERVICE MEN

IS NOW ASSISTANT ADJUTANT

George H. Rennick Is Named to Aid Lemuel Bolles in Conducting Legion Affairs.

Announcement has just been made of the appointment of George H. Rennick as assistant national adjutant of the American Legion, in which capacity he will assist Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant, in conducting the affairs of the organization.



Mr. Rennick, who is just past thirty, has had varied business interests. Following the completion of his education abroad, he was connected with the Pressed Steel Car company of New York for four years.

Later he became executive assistant to the late Willard Straight, from 1913 to 1917, during the latter's connection with J. P. Morgan & Company, and the American International corporation.

Enlisting as a private of infantry in Washington, D. C., in November, 1917, he sailed for overseas service the next month, was commissioned a second lieutenant and was made a captain a few months before his return to the United States, December 20, 1918. He received a citation for extra meritorious service. In January, 1919, he was made assistant director of the bureau of war risk insurance, which position he held until his connection with the American Legion.

WAR MUSEUM AND LIBRARY

Permanent Institution of the American Legion Will Be Established at Indianapolis.

Announcement has been made at national headquarters of the American Legion that the permanent war museum and war library of the legion will be established at Indianapolis. Provision was made for such establish-

ment at the Minneapolis convention. Indianapolis and citizens of Indiana will erect a war memorial building which will be devoted to the following purposes: First, national headquarters for the American Legion, as an auditorium of large capacity for public gatherings, to house a war library and war museum, and as headquarters for other veteran organizations of previous wars.

Besides being available principally for the American Legion, it will also be open to meetings of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Confederate Veterans and the Spanish-American War Veterans.

It is intended that the museum in this building will contain thousands of articles of military significance used in connection with America's participation in the world war—pieces of field artillery, hand grenades, gas masks and other ordnance and equipment. Prominent among these relics will be the first American flag to go over the top, which was presented to the American Legion at Minneapolis by the Canadian War Veterans' association.

The popularity of such exhibits has been demonstrated abroad, where thousands are seen daily examining closely the different objects of interest. In addition to the field pieces displayed along the Avenue Champs Elysees and Place de la Concorde, the museum in the Invalides in Paris contains airplanes of popular French aces, marine mines and other relics, including pictures of war scenes depicted through various art media. The Mall in London, as well as British museums, have been utilized in a similar way.

The library will contain everything available pertaining to the history of the great conflict. This will include not only histories and other books telling of the struggle, but files of newspapers and magazines, complete sets of posters and propaganda material issued by both sides, reports of war boards and recreational and relief organizations, such as the Red Cross, War Camp Community Service and others.

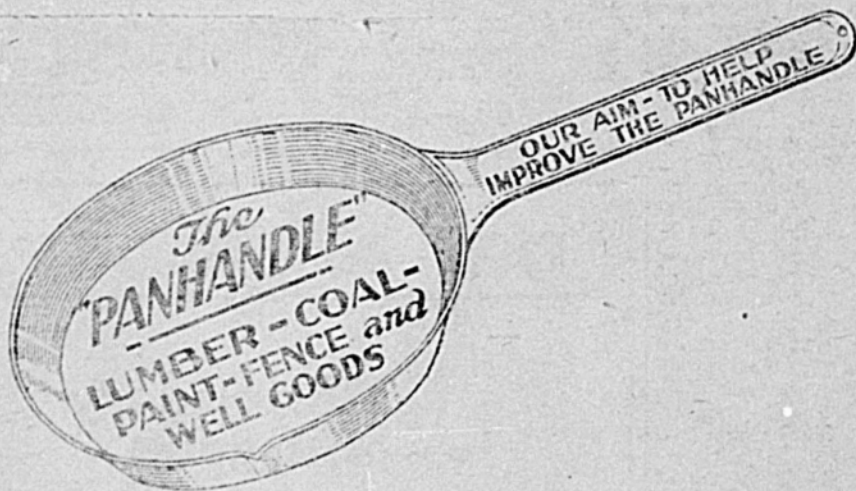
