Financial cutback forces reduction in activitities

An obviously frustrated Dean Killion, director of the Goin' Band from Raiderland, issued a statement Wednesday concerning a 30.2 per cent cut back in the band's budget for the year.

Killion stated the budget breakdown started with the trip to the Arkansas-Tech football game last year. He said administrators felt the band should appear on the nationally televised game.

He said the meals for band members at the game had to be catered - but could not be catered at the \$1 per student which was allocated to the band.

killion statement page 1was allocated to the band.

The band leader said he did not want to cut back pep rally performances, basketball game performances, track meets or any other student functions, but there were costs for every performance, such as depreciation on equipment, loss of items, library work and time.

"Just as the University Daily must either reduce the number of issues when the budget is cut, or go out and sell extra advertising (which drains the manpower-work time itself to make up any deficit), so must we." We have no means of making up the deficit or of securing funds, or the time to do so," Killion stated.

He said a set budget must be secured for the band, orchestra and choir just as for athletics, Student Health Center and other organizations. "We cannot guess in the spring how to contract the new year's funds, when funds are not allocated until Oct. 22," he said.

(Under the existing budget system at Tech, departments must submit a proposed budget in the spring and wait until the following fall for the budget to be approved.)

"Even a token operating expense fund to hold the line until the actual budget is released does not work because we must contract, schedule and figure percentages on the entire year's expenses. We must be put on an adequate budget in a business-like manner."

In defense of the budgets he has submitted in the past, Killion said the past 11 budgets he has turned in - non-padded were used to the last penny, every year, to build and maintain a fine program which the university, city and state should be proud of. "This seems to me to be an accurate basis for the twelfth year's budget (to be approved)."

He said Wednesday that the Tech band would play for ths TCU pep rally at 7 p.m. Friday, but that would be the last football pep rally the band would play for this year. He also said that other band functions for the year would be cut by 30 per cent to keep in line with the budget cut.

Autumn's chill has an extra bite for some Murdough residents this year as their air conditioning is running full blast. This condition is only on the west wing of the dorm though; the south wing is sweltering as their heating is working extremely well.

Bill Kerns, a resident of the west wing, said the noise the air conditioner vents made in his room (from air rushing

around the stack of books he and his roommate have stacked over the vent) made it nearly impossible to study at night. The air conditioner was clearly audible on the second floor Wednesday

The vents also spew dirt and ashes in copious amounts although this condition isn't as prevalent in the upper floors as it is in the lower floors.

"They could have filmed 'True Grit' in here," said Gary Gimbel, another second floor resident, "the dust just builds up quick, we were ordered to keep the vents uncovered but there's no way to do that and keep the room clean."

Kerns said the wind started about 11 a.m. Monday, "When it (the wind out of the air conditioners) started Monday, it blew a record cover I had over the vent clear across the room."

Monday marked the beginning of the wind and dirt, but Tuesday the air from the vents turned cold. "We can hardly sleep, it's so damn cold in here," said

Things on the south wing are different though. Jesse Ballew Murdough president complained of the heat, "It's hot as hell, its got to be about 130 in my

Robert Scott, another resident of the south wing said the temperature was erratic in the dorm. "The temperature is nice now, "Scott said, "it's a little warm but nice. About three weeks ago, though, it was about 40 degrees outside and the air conditioning was still going."

Things have been worse in Murdough though. "I lived on the seventh floor last year," Scott said, "and smoke got so thick in the halls that I couldn't see two doors down the hall."

Officials questioned about the situation in Murdough said it had been rectified Wednesday afternoon.

"To my knowledge the situation has been corrected," said Richard Richards, an official in the maintainance depart-

"I talked to the air conditioning man this afternoon (Wednesday) said Richards;" he seemed to think the problem was solved."

Reports from Murdough Wednesday night indicated that the problem appeared to be solved and that Murdough residents were no longer being exposed to the air conditioner's whims.

Jones, Brown inducted into Athletic Hall of Honor

Names of this year's inductees into Tech's Athletic Hall of Honor were announced Wednesday by V. A. Clements, Jr. of Longview, president of the Dad's Association.

Dr. Clifford B. Jones of Lubbock, President Emeritus of Texas Tech; and Marshall Brown, head basketball coach at Stephen F. Austin State University, will be inducted in ceremonies arranged by the sponsoring Dad's Association

Saturday. The pair will bring to 23 the number of such inductees.

Jones, who is chairman of the Board of Lubbock National Bank, served as treasurer of the Tech Board of Directors from 1923-27, chairman of the Board of Directors from 1927-38, and served as the third president of Tech from 1938-44.

Often described as "West Texas' No. 1 Citizen," Jones has a deep interest in young people and athletics. Tech's football stadium, the Clifford B. and Audrey Jones Stadium, bears his name.

Jones is a past president of the Tech Foundation and serves as a trustee of the Tech Law School. He also heads numerous other boards and committees throughout the Southwest.


Long a civic leader in West Texas, Jones moved to Lubbock from Spur in 1939 where he was the manager of the Spur Land and Cattle Co. His name appears in Who's Who in the Western Hemisphere, Who's Who in Texas, and Who's Who in Commerce and Industry. Brown was a member of the Tech basketball team from 1938-40 and was named All-Border Conference during the 1929 season.

That season he led the team in scoring

with 258 points in 18 games. He scored 24 points in 37-36 loss to Oklahoma A&M in finals of the All-College Tournament at Oklahoma City and was named the most valuable player of the tournament. Coach Hank Iba used four different men trying to guard him. Brown was ambidextrous and shot with

equal accuracy with either hand. Brown's 1970 SFA Lumberjacks compiled a 29-1 season record and were ranked as the No. 1 team in the nation in the college division of all three major polls-Associated Press, United Press International and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. He was named "Basketball Coach of the

Year in the Lone Star Conference. A native of East Texas, Brown is in his 11th year as head basketball coach at SFA. Brown began his coaching career in 1940 at Sterling City where he won his first district championship.
