



Of the living great, as well as the famous dead, most have eyes of gray or blue. Shakeepeare had eyes of gray; so had nearly all the English poets. Coleridge's eyes were large, light gray, prominent and of liguid brilliancy. Byronis eyes were gray, fringed with long black hashes.
Charles Lamb's giltering eyes were strangely dissimilar in color, one being hazel, the other having specks of gray in the iris. Chatterton's brilliant gray eyes were his most remarkable feature. Under strong excitement one appeared brighter and larger than the other.
As to green eyes, they are for glory, The Empress Catharine of Russia had eyes of this hue.
