The same thing happened all over again in case of the San Francisco-Tech game. Nobody on the Tech end of the thing could give out any information; yet reporters in San Francisco got the information from coaches there, wrote it for their papers, and put it on the Associated Press wire for papers all over the country.

The athletic council approved eight games at its meeting last week, but refused to tell when and where they would be played. We expect any day now to hear from Stillwater, Missoula, Milwaukee, Miami, Shreveport and Albuquerque regarding time and place for Tech's 1940 games.

Back to the black side of the ledger, the council cannot be praised too heartily for inviting the Cowboys to play Tech some more. Tech has lost money on every home game it has played this year, but we'll wager a little of our good hard-earned cash nobody loses any money on a Cowboy-Raider game.

The Cowboys are climbing in the football world since Frank Kimbrough went there to coach. Tech is climbing also, we hope, so the game is in all respects a "natural."

We'll be seein' yah, Cowboys!
