Our New Constitution

BEFORE this academic year is finished, Leon Ince, president of the Student Council, will submit the revised constitu-tion to the enrollees of the institution for

tion to the enrollees of the institution for approval.

While in the main the new set of by-laws is intended merely to simplify, bring up to date, and do away with a number of inconsistencies of the one under which we are now operating, there are a number of changes that have been included for the express purpose of making possible a more complete control by students over their own affairs, and of insuring that council officers will be representative of the student body as a whole rather than of any particular group.

Numerous changes have been made. The publications committee regulations are being included in the governing document. Unenforceable classes such as that concerning wearing high school letters on the campus that are more of a tradition have been removed. But topping this list of changes is a step toward the democratic system that Tech so proudly boasts of—allowing all students to cast a vote in student elections without paying any poil tax. The Toreador commends President Ince and Student Council members on this wise step toward better student government.
