That was the opinion vigorously expressed at a conference of more than fifty editors held recently in New York City under the auspices of the National Student Federation of America.

"Faculty advisors," said one editor, "usually wind up being autocrats instead of advisors," and the susceptent discussion brought out a smoldering resentment against existing forms of faculty censorship and a wide demand for more freedom of the undergraduate press in many directions.

The Toreador editor is proud to cast his lot among the aforenamed group of student publication heads. Coinciding with the opinion of the New York conference, we do not believe that, with censorship by any member of the faculty or Administration, a student newspaper can be a publication for the students.

In exercising our freedom of the press, statements have been made implying that The Toreador is "fighting" the Administration.
