## Dr. Pearce Conducts Self-Study

Tech's faculty is conducting a survey of colleges and universities in the southern part of the oountrys to determine where Texas Tech stands educationally and what role it will play in state development.
The two-year program, directed by Dr. W. M. Pearce, academic of faculty, student personnel, research, special activities, library, organization, financial resources and educational program. Pearce introduced his program at a called faculty meeting Thursday, Oct. 13. Pearce emphasized that the faculty will conduct the survey with the counsel of the Southern Association for Colleges and Secondary Schools. The institution hopes to eliminate unnecessary
