NACURH meet begins today

The National Association of College and University Residence Halls (NACURH) convention begins today.

Some of the basic purposes for this convention according to Katie Upshaw, convention co-chairman, are to elect officers for next year, to discuss the organization as a whole and to have a general meeting of the minds.

"In effect," she said, "it serves as a basis for an exchange of ideas between students of different schools."

Discussion in the meetings will mainly consist of ideas revolving around the idea that a residence hall should be an integral part of the educational process.

SPECIFIC TOPICS to be discussed are coed dorms, visitation programs, a student bill of rights, judicial boards and architectural designs for residence halls.

Miss Upshaw said she feels this meeting

will help in changing some of Tech's dorm rules because of the number of Tech students involved. She said, "Everyone at Tech has helped. Actually, this is Tech's conference for residence halls, not a conference of residence halls for Tech."

The opening addresses of the meeting will be given by Dr. Grover E. Murray, Tech president and H. J. (Doc) Blanchard, state senator. Murray will welcome the delegates to Tech while Blanchard will welcome them to the state.

OTHER SPEAKERS will include Carl D. Jones, representative of the Association for College and University Housing Officers (ACUO) and Earl Nightengale, radio commentator. Jones will speak on the relationship between ACUO and NACURH while Nightengale's topic will be "Check List for Tomorrow."

After various meetings throughout the afternoon, the delegates will be entertained by a mock casino sponsored by Murdough

Hall. The casino which will feature blackjack, dice tables and roulette wheels will be in the Student Union Ballroom at 8:30 p.m.

Packets of play money will be sold at the rate of 1,000 play dollars for one real dollar. A \$50 prize will be given to the person with the most play money at the end of the evening and the second highest will get \$30 and third will get \$20.

Tickets will be sold at the door for chances at prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10.

IN ORDER to have the NACURH convention at a school, the school puts in a bid for it and gives a presentation. The presentation gives information about the particular school.

For instance, Tech's presentation included letters from Murray and Lubbock's Chamber of Commerce, and slides showing the campus as well as 52 delegates from Tech supporting the bid. The decision is made by the Executive Committee which consists of all the regional presidents, the conference chairman, national president and national vice-president.

The delegates that attend the conference are selected in different ways, but are usually chosen or elected from members of the residence councils. The delegates will be staying at Robby's while the advisors will stay at the Rodeway Inn. A \$45 registration fee is required of each delegate.

Changes in dorm areas recommended in report

Women's hours, compensation of residence hall officers and hall staff improvement are some of the areas cited for change in a report made by the Residence Hall Commission.

Headed by Doug Williams, president of the Men's Residence Council, the Commission was charged by Jay Thompson, Student Association president, to study the area of residence hall problems and deficiencies and to make recommendations for improvement.

In the area of women's hours, the Commission's investigation found Tech's system to be "outdated and fails to serve the needs of the residence hall women."

The recommendation stated in the report that upper class women, those with 32 hours or above, with parental permission, should be allowed selective hours.

This program is presently being used for senior women living on the 12th floor of Coleman Hall.

"Debbie Dickerson, member of the

Commission, checked with Mrs. Dorothy Garner, coordinator for women's residence halls, and with the dorm supervisor at Coleman," Williams said. "The dorm supervisor said she did not see that it would be any harder to use the same system for all floors as that being used for the 12th."

The report also said this recommendation was based on the fact that the Coleman Hall program had been considered successful and that allowing women students to assume the responsibility of their personal life should be part of the education process.

Part two of the report dealt with compensation for residence hall officers. Findings of the Commission indicated a lack of effectiveness in residence hall government and added that incentive is necessary to encourage students to participate.

The recommendation for compensation was threefold. First was the suggestion that the presidents of the halls and all officers of the Men's Residence Council and Women's Residence Council be provided with a reserved parking space adjacent to the space provided for the hall supervisor. Second, that they be allowed a permit to enter and park on the campus proper without penalty in a collective area.

The third recommendation was that they be provided with a meal ticket valid at any hall cafeteria in order to "facilitate communication between officers and students and knowledge of campus problems."

The recommendation also stated that the vice presidents of the halls should receive all three of the privileges and that the secretary and treasurer should receive the privileges of parking on campus and the meal ticket to all dorms.

Williams said that Andy Norton, member of the Commission, who had worked on this part of the report, has spoken with George Rhoads, coordinator of the men's residence halls, and Frank Church, traffic and parking counselor, and that spaces could probably be provided in the lot by the infirmary which is presently being expanded.

The Commission investigation also found the residence hall staffs to be "ineffective and wasteful" in many circumstances.

Reasons for this were cited as the fact that the staff is "spread too thinly" and because the "organization that presently exists is more conducive to division than to a corporate effort."

The recommendation made by the Commission called for the hall staffs to be reorganized along three lines.

First, there should be full time area supervisors to handle the bulk of the work for several residence halls or a complex and that this person should be a professional and not a student.

Second, there should be Head Residents to oversee the individual residence halls, to work with student government and to refer counseling or disciplinary problems. This person should also be a graduate student and be allowed to take a full course load.

Third, the wing advisor position should be made more lucrative and based on seniority.

Williams said this area of staff improvement was a serious problem and would take some work.

"Before students can have these improvements, they must have an effective administrative system. There are severe difficulties in the present housing administration as well as in the hall staffs," Williams said.

A fourth area studied by the Commission was facility improvement. Sneed, Gordon, Bledsoe, Horn, Weeks and Doak were listed in the report as in need of improvement.

Suggestions for improvement were carpeting the halls, room furnishings, paint, flooring and lighting be renovated and that water pumps be installed where necessary to eliminate fluctuation in water pressure.

The last area studied by the Commission was the system of meal tickets for dorm residences. The study showed that the method of monthly tickets was ineffective and a nuisance.

The Commission recommended that the meal tickets be issued for the entire year and would be similar to the ID in that it would have a picture and a color coded sticker for the individual cafeteria.

Thompson will make recommendations and possible modifications of the report in an open letter to be published in The University Daily, Thursday.

Senate elections set for today; student services fee postponed

Seventeen student senators from seven schools will be elected here today, but the controversial increase of student services fees will not be on the ballot.

The proposed raise in the student service fee and the building use fee will not be

included in today's election, said Jay Thompson, Student Association president. It will be on the ballot during the cheerleader elections.

"The reasons for the delay in presenting the raise to the students are so the students may be informed about what the raise would include. The Student Association wants a chance to investigate what the increase will do, where it will go," said Thompson.

"We want to investigate the idea of part time students only paying a percentage of the student service fee as they do with the building use fee.

A TOTAL raise of \$12 in both fees has been suggested. The maximum student service fee by state law is \$30. Tech students pay only \$23. It is proposed to raise the fee by \$7. Of this \$4 will go to intramurals, \$2 to health center, and \$1 to counseling. The building use fee would be raised \$5, all of which would go to the Union.

The election polls for today's election will be in the Union, Ad Building, BA Building and C&ME Building all day. Voting will also be held in all dorm lobbies from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Also on the ballot will be a special Union referendum to find the students' opinions of Union speakers, University Speakers Series, and special events.

STUDENTS MAY select five from each category or list other preferences.

Included in the special events are Biff Ross; Chambers Brothers; Chicago Transit Authority; Charley Pride; Crosby, Stills and Nash; Dionne Warwick; Flip Wilson; Glen Yarborough; Jackson Five; Peter, Paul and Mary; Richard Pryor; Santana.

Tech progress aided by committee system

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of a five-part series to examine the value of Tech's student-faculty committees and the committee system. This segment looks at those committees which are active, but contribute only to a moderate degree.

Although not among the most active, the following committees contribute a major part to the betterment of the university and the students.

The Budget Advisory Committee, composed of six faculty and no students, makes recommendations concerning the use of Tech's financial resources.

"I have no known objections to students being on this committee," said Dr. Arthur Roberts, chairman. "I can see no advantages as such."

This committee has discussed insurance rates for the student association.

The campus planning committee, composed of four faculty members and one token student member, is concurrently considering the key points of their long-range plan.

The key points are the university farm facilities, allocation of the museum area and recommendations concerning parking lots.

Haskell G. Taylor, chairman, said future meetings would deal with streamlining and improving the building program at Tech.

Also under consideration by the committee is the recommendation that the ranch houses west of Tech campus be moved south to the farm area.

Positions open on annual staff

Applications are now being taken for students interested in a position on the La Ventana.

Positions open are that of co-editor, magazine editor and art editor. Applications may be picked up in room 102 of the Journalism Building from 8 a.m. until noon and from 1-5 p.m. daily. Deadline for turning in applications is 5 p.m. Monday.

The one student member has graduated so the alternate member is supposed to take his place. Rick Hamm, alternate student member, said he was working and couldn't go. "They don't schedule their meetings for students."

One committee which is really student oriented is the Parking Violations Appeals Board which meets weekly. It is chaired by student member, Robin L. Anderson.

Each ticket is considered individually and the committee tries to understand the situation. "If there is a shadow of doubt in our minds, we walk or drive over to look at signs," said Lynn Green, student member.

The Parking Violations Appeals Board determines individual appeals. This board consists of two faculty and two students.

Hearing appeals from organizations and reviewing petitions for recognition are two of the duties of the Student Organizations Committee, which meets once each month.

Developing and recommending policies affecting student organizations, including acceptable standards for their operation and procedures, is the charge of the committee.

So far this year the Student Organizations Committee has reviewed the Women's Residence by-laws and the Policy Manual and Procedural Guide.

Dr. Mary L. Brewer, chairman, said the students are the backbone of the committee. There are three student members on the committee.

Organized under the new Code of Student Affairs, the University Faculty and Student Discipline Committee investigates discipline problems.

According to Billy Windsor, student member, when a student commits an offense, a faculty member from the Office of Student Life investigates the offense. The faculty member then files charges if necessary.

The student offender is then interviewed by another member from the Office of Student Life. The interview is taped and the tape is sent to the committee. The committee then hands down their decision after a thorough study.

Editorial Top candidates

Today's elections will be critical to the performance of next year's Senate.

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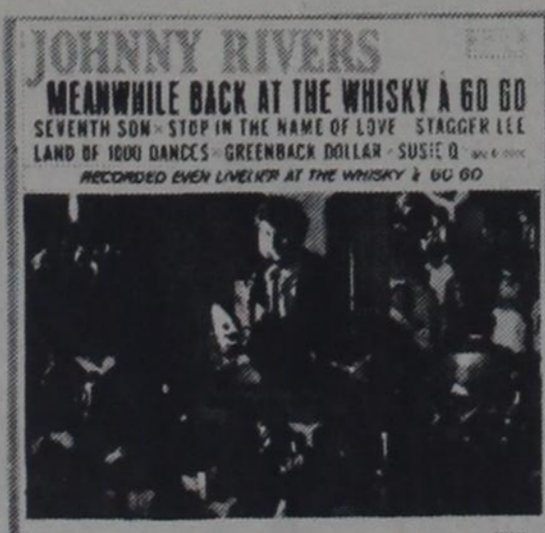
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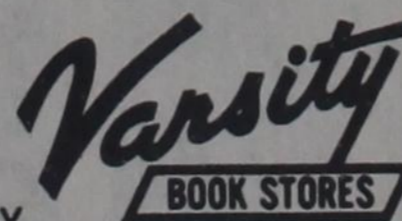
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Senate applicants air platforms

 been talked about before—but only at election time and then rapidly forgotten. When elected, these issues will be acted upon, not forgotten at my convenience. Last year over 7500 students participated in intramurals, making Tech one of the highest ranking schools in intramural participation. In intramural activities, 69.8 per cent of the student body took part. More and better facilities are desperately needed.

Better medical care should be available for the 18,000 plus students. Expansion of the staff and the addition of beds should take place immediately. Health of the students should be of prime concern.

It is a shame when students pay for seats and then have to wait two hours before the gates open to be assured of a seat. As Jones Stadium has consistently been

overfilled, it should be evident that additional seating is needed. When students can fill more than 1/3 of the stadium, they should be allowed more than 1/4 of available seats. I realize the Senate can only pass resolutions supporting these measures and cannot go out and authorize construction of more IM facilities, the addition of twenty new beds to the Health Center, or let bids on additional seating at Jones Stadium. But positive student action can bring results.

Bill Zimmerman
 Bill Zimmerman, BA senator, proposes in his platform to: Coordinate ideas with the free speech committee for better location and facilities, and to investigate restrictions.

This isn't a Carl Perkins album. Nor is it an NRBO album. It's by a new group, Carl Perkins—and—NRBO.

A new group? Maybe that's misleading. There's Carl Perkins—and he was playing rock and roll before they had a name for it. The other five guys have been listening to that kind of music since they were old enough to sit up—and they've recently made a name for themselves because of the personal manner in which they perform it.

So, here is an album—by an established artist and an established group, who never before performed together—that makes sense, for a change. If most of those "super session" things fail to come off, this one is a notable exception. Carl and NRBO have never been more at home separately than they are together.
