This display has attracted a great deal of attention, not only of sight-seers, but also of the judges.



Humming Birds as Pets

Coal is Still Supreme

The tendency to spontaneous combustion of coal when stored in bulk-in masses of, say, 1,000 tons or thereabouts—may appear to be a somewhat unusual point to make in favor of the gas engine as a large size power unit for central station work. It was, however, made as such recently by a central station engineer, whose contention was that the nearly always present danger of spontaneous ignition in the large reserve stock of coal expedient for a power station of any considerable size to carry, to tide over possible temporary interruptions in the supply, from strikes or other causes, was entirely eliminated by the use of gas engines which took their gas from central gas plants.

Curiously, however, the fact appears here to have been overlooked that

with the large gas engine plant will come, as an almost inseparable adjunct, the gas producer, taking the place of the steam boiler now accessory to the steam engine installation, so that the large coal pile will remain in evidence as before, and the spontaneous ignition troubles as well, even with certain precautions against them, in the way of selecting and storing the coal. SPEED OF TORPEDO BOATS.

Depth of Water Has a Great Effect
Upon Power Needed in Operation.
The recent tests of torpedo boats in
the Bay of Dantzig, Germany, have resuited in the ascertainment of some

In California Chinamen are considered the most efficient domestics, but they are also the most independent. On the Miller & Lux ranches, on whose ground it is said to be possible to travel from one end of the state to the other, Chinese cooks are only allowed to remain six months. This general order was given years ago to prevent the cooks from obtaining too firm a tyranny over the individual ranches.
