## Supporters Chosen Committee Members

More than 200 Texas Tech campus leaders announced their support of Senator Barry Goldwater, Republican party presidential nominee Tuesday, according to Glenn Looney, member of the national steering committee of Young Americans for Goldwater.

Members of this group, including Democrats, Republicans and Independents, represent phases of campus activities and many organizations on campus.

Twenty-five of the 200 have been chosen to serve on the steering committee for the group known as Young Texans for Goldwater.

## Phi Mu's Sponsor Election

Techsians will have an opportunity to express their preference for president of the United States in a mock campus election Friday.

Mary Harrison, president of Phi Mu, announced Tuesday Phi Mu will sponsor the election with the full cooperation of The Daily Treador and the Student Council.

Polling places are on the main floor of the C & O Bldg., Tech Union lobby, and Ad Bldg. foyer.

Polls will be open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Ballots will contain candidates for president, vice president, senate and congressman-at-large and there will be spaces for write-ins.

Students must show their ID's to vote.

Representatives from the Tech Young Democrats, Tech Young Republicans and the Treador will be present during counting of ballots at the Phi Mu Lodge.

Election results will appear in the Saturday issue of the Treador.

A mock presidential election was sponsored in 1960 by the Treador and Alpha Phi Omega, men's service fraternity.

Tech students chose Richard M. Nixon over John F. Kennedy in the 1960 mock election, Nixon drawing 1,498 votes to Kennedy's 936. A total of 2,434 votes were cast.

Also included are Frank Clements, governor of Tennessee, Brooks Hayes, advisor to Lyndon Johnson, Bill Moyers, chief aid to Johnson, Richard Niebuhr, German theologian and Karl Barth, German theologian.

Many of these people live in states far removed from Texas and in foreign countries and may not be able to speak at Tech for several years. They are invited to come and speak at their convenience.

Cheryl A. Terry, 21, of 5007 42nd St., died at 9:10 a.m. Wednesday in Colonial Manor Convalescent Home of injuries she received last fall in an auto accident.

A junior at Tech at the time of the November accident, Miss Terry was a graduate of McAllen High School and had attended Texas A&I for three semesters before transferring to Texas Tech.

Miss Terry had been in a coma since the accident.

Another Tech coed, Gail Scales, also injured in the same accident, is currently receiving therapeutic treatment at a Gonzales hospital.

Miss Terry is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Amos Terry of Lubbock; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Bryan of

Houston; two uncles, O. A. Terry of McAllen, and N.B. Terry of Wichita Falls.

Services will be today at 4 p.m. in Second Baptist Church, with

burial in Resthaven Cemetery.

The parents request that no flowers be sent to the funeral and that donations be made to the United Fund instead.

## British Poet Queries, What Is Modern Art?

Stephen Spender, world-renowned British poet will speak on the question, "Is Modern Art Really Modern" today at 7:30 p.m. in the Coronado Room of the Tech Union.

Born in England in 1909 and educated at Oxford, Spender and his contemporary W. H. Auden formed the nucleus of the literary

movement for socialism evident in Great Britain during the 1930s.

Today Spender is considered to be a Romantic poet, best known for his works in the realm of modern lyric poetry.

Some of his notable works include "The Destructive Element," a book of criticisms and "World Within a World," his autobiography.

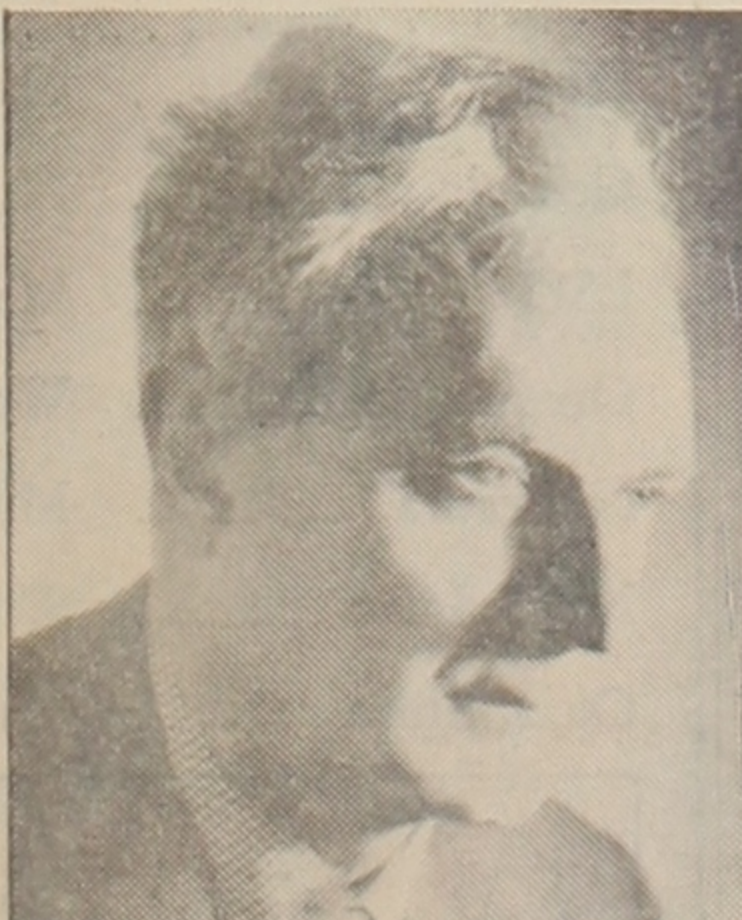
## Cheerleader Petitions Due

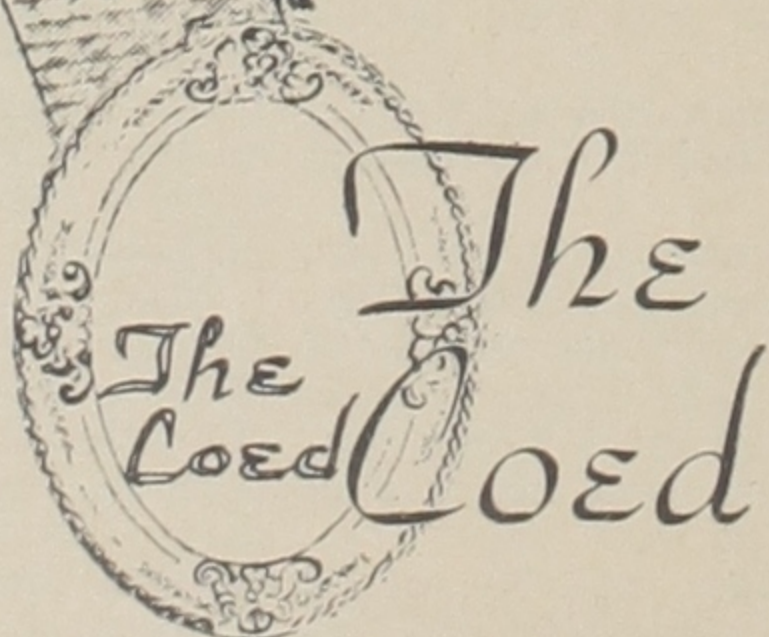

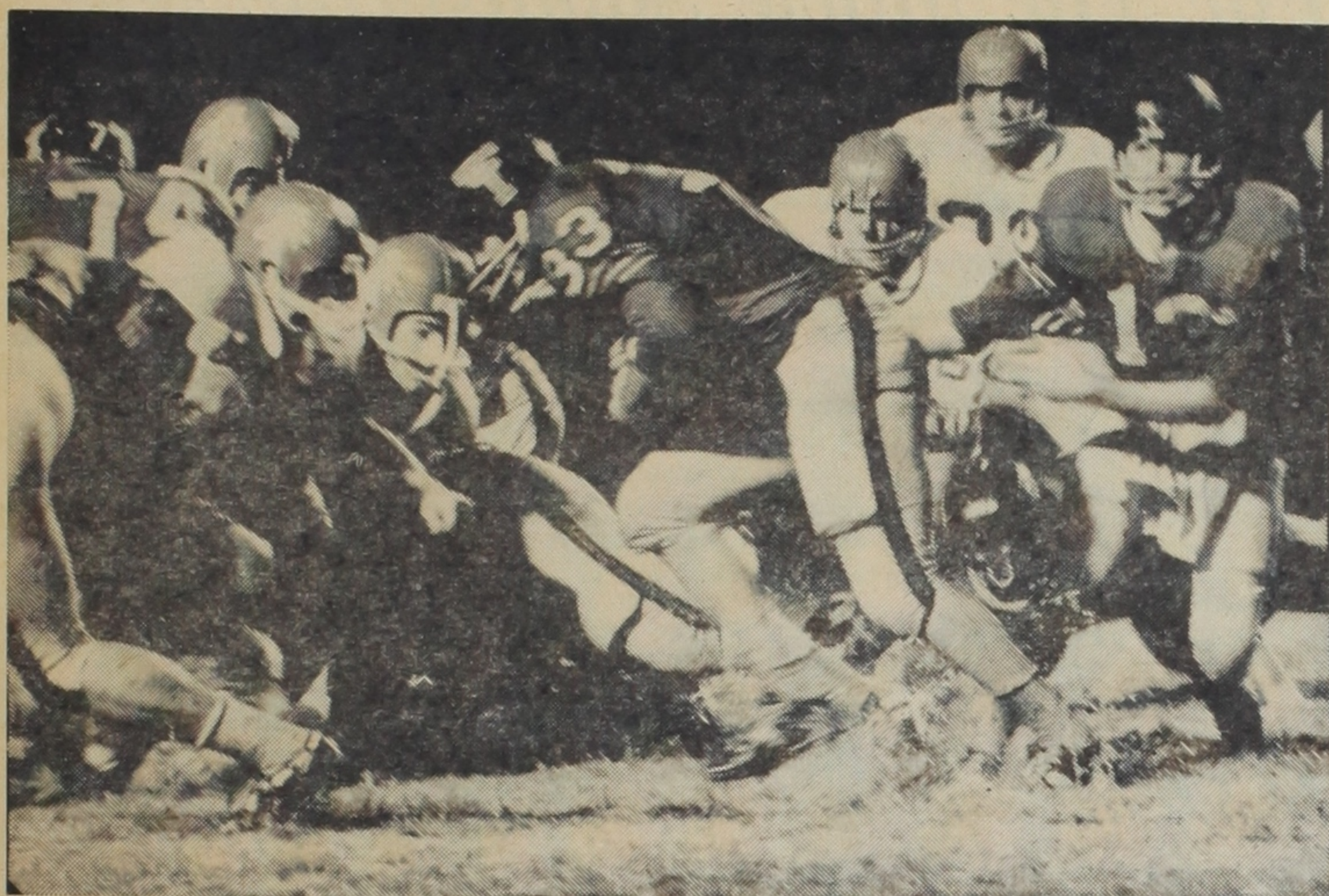

## Wesleyans To Discuss Local Racial Problems

A series of reports on racial problems in the Lubbock area will be presented by the Wesley Foundation, Methodist student organization, today at 7 p.m. in their weekly forum hour.

Reports will include six major areas from the overall theme of "Church, Community and the Civil Rights Movement." Information for the reports was derived from interviews with varied groups throughout the community including the mayor's office, Negro population, public school officials, the press and civil rights organizations such as the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People.

The reports were initiated as part of a program designed by the Texas Methodist Student Move-

ment to present forums on major topics affecting students and the nation.

## For The Movie Sophisticate — 'Breathless' — A New - Wave Film

"Breathless," a French film directed by Jean-Luc Godard, will be the second presentation of the Tech Cinema Society at 6 and 9 p.m. Friday in the Biology Auditorium.

For the film sophisticate, it is the most novel of the "new wave" movies, and one of the most widely discussed on many levels. Leopoldo Torre Nilsson, the famed Argentinian director, wrote from the Berlin festival:

"'Breathless' introduces in Jean-Luc Godard a talent as positive and vigorous in its own way as

that of other (foreign) directors, such as Truffaut or Resnais."

For American audiences, the most obvious surprises are Godard's experiments in improvisation, as to cutting technique, footage, sequence jumps and the content of the film.

The film appears to play both sides of the street. Producing an atmosphere of dedication, it depicts a rather pert sign of parody. At the same time it is most disquieting if taken "straight:" it has existentialist overtones.

The story is essentially a Bogart-type thriller about a young French gangster (played by Jean-Paul Belmondo, currently the hottest box-office sensation in France), who takes what he wants when he wants it. He kills a cop (pardon, "un flic"), and holds up in the apartment of the American girl friend (Jean Seberg), who betrays him in a momentary fit of pique.

Tickets are now on sale at the English office, C&O Bldg., room 125.
