

Texas Tech President R. C. Goodwin laid the facts on the line and told the visiting legislators Friday this school is a growing multi-purpose university.

Dr. Goodwin also said in no uncertain terms that it is a "necessity for colleges to have a dependable source of income" and added "we need additional funds."

He told the legislators they probably only had time to see the exterior of Tech and he compared water.


Biologists Plan Research Area

Tech biologists Drs. Earl Camp, Don Tinkle and Lyle Kuhnley are working on a project designed to convert the north portion of the top floor of the Science Bldg. into a faculty and graduate research

"This new research space will accommodate six faculty members and several graduate research assistants as well," said Dr. Camp, head of the biology department. According to Kuhnley, the con-

version will turn this area into a plant, animal, and microbial research complex.

The project should be completed by April 1.



Texas State University headed the list for a proposed name by receiving 48.96 per cent approval in a survey conducted by the marketing department.

Texas Tech University followed in the poll with 17.91 per cent. Texas State University of Arts, Sciences, and Technology received 9.25 per cent. Other choices were Texas Technological College and State University 8.96; Texas Technological College 4.78; and University of the Southwest 3.28; others 6.86.

Concerning the future major function of Tech, more than 80 per cent held that Tech's destiny lies in being a multiple purpose university incorporating a law school and a school of medicine.

Other views were as follows: 13.13 per cent favored a university status for the school as it exists; 4.18 per cent believed in other emphasis; 1.79 per cent supported a technological school with emphasis on engineering and agriculture; and a liberal arts school with little emphasis on engineering and agriculture received 1.20 per cent.

More than 40 per cent of the students in the School of Agriculture felt the name should be changed to Texas State University.

The object of the survey was to determine why students chose Texas Tech for their college education, opinions concerning the name change and student awareness of Governor Connally's plan for higher education.

The 350 students questioned were chosen at random by 70 statistics students under the direction of Charles Riter and Lewis Wood of the marketing department.

New Blood Required In Honors Program

When Texas Tech's School of Arts and Sciences began its honors program in the fall of 1961, 97 freshmen were invited to participate.

Today, only nine of the original 97 remain. What happened to the dents have the aptitude to qualify, a more complete program will be other 87?

"The biggest reason for the large dropout rate is that some departments do not have honors courses," dents. according to Prof. Ivan Little, chairman of the honors council.

Dr. Paul Prior, director of the A&S honors program, said most students withdraw from the program in their freshman year. Presently enrolled are 64 freshmen, 27 sophomores, nine juniors and nine seniors.

Prior said some students drop the honors plan because it is too difficult, but agreed with Little that lack of honors courses in various departments caused many qualified students to quit.




