### The Megaphone

"On to Cowtown" is the slogan that can be heard on almost every corner of the campus this week. It looks now as if there will be at least 500 on the special Friday night.

The Matadors will leave Thursday night at 9:30. By so doing they will be able to get in an afternoon of practice on the T. C. U. grid. Prior to their departure, there will be a big bonfire on the campus, followed by the box supper at the Gym. After the supper every one will go to the station to give the Matadors a send-off.

The special train bearing the Matador supporters will leave Friday evening at 7:00 and arrive in Ft. Worth at 9:00 the next morning. In trying to figure the cheapest way by which a poor struggling college

student could make the trip we find that the figures run something like this: The round trip fare, not including Pullman, is \$13.35; adding 75 cents for the ticket to the game and \$1.00 for meals, the minimum expense would be \$15.10, provided the individual can get by on 25 cents per meal, and provided further that the individual can "hang a ride" from the Texas to the Stadium (distance of 4 miles). To be absolutely safe, we would suggest that an extra 20 cents be included for car fare. For those who desire to catch a little "shut-eye" en route we will quote the Pullman prices: Lower berth in a tourist car, round trip is \$4.50; the rate is the same for two persons in the same berth—\$2.25 each. Upper berth is \$2.80 and the trip for only \$1.80 more the figures quoted above and still have the benefits of the Pullman.

Headquarters for the Tech delegation will be the Texas Hotel, on the corner of Main and 8th streets.

## REGENTS DISCUSS ENLARGING SUMMER SESSIONS AND PLAN FOR STATE HELP HERE TODAY

DIRECTORS OF INSTITUTION HIGHLY PLEASED WITH RECORD ENROLLMENT OF 1,801, THEY SAY IN BUSINESS MEETING TUESDAY

## HOPE TO MAKE SUMMER SESSIONS LARGE

FIVE OF NINE REGENTS ATTEND MEET CALLED FOR DISCUSSION OF ROUTINE BUSINESS; CHAIRMAN C. B. JONES PRESIDES

Planning for the greatest summer session in the history of the institution, discussing its remarkable growth and studying minutely the program of expansion which will be laid before the next session of the state legislature for official approval, the Board of Regents of Texas Technological College held a regularly called business session here Tuesday. Session took up most of the morning and part of the afternoon and was held in the executive offices of the administration building with Clifford B. Jones, of Spur, chairman of the board, presiding.

In addition to Mr. Jones, members of the board present were John W. Carpenter, Dallas street traction and power magnate; Frank E. Clarity, Fort Worth, vice-president and general manager of the Fort Worth and Denver lines; Henry T. Kimbro, Lubbock, grain broker, and G. G. Comegys, McKinney, capitalist. Ernest O. Thompson, Amarillo hotel owner; Houston Harle, San Angelo newspaper publisher; R. A. Underwood, Plainview banker and Mrs. F. N. Drane, Corsicana were absent from the session. Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, and E. W. Providence, business manager, met with the board and made their reports.

One Visitor Present  
In addition to the college officials present, C. A. Jones, of New York, father of Clifford B. Jones and a visitor in his son's Spur home at the present time, also attended the meeting as a visitor. The elder Mr. Jones was formerly a resident of Spur and is associated with a group of New York capitalists in the Spur ranch and other properties to the east of the South Plains area.

The regents went on record as being extremely pleased with the enrollment of the institution and were particularly happy over the announcement that 1,801 students had been enrolled in the college this far this fall. The total enrollment is believed to be a record-breaker for a college the age of Texas Tech, the institution having just begun its fourth school year.

Believe in Summer Expansion  
Dr. Paul W. Horn told The Journal that plans for the 1929 summer session, which were being worked on this afternoon, had not been completed by the regents but that members of the board were united in the

lege authorities are of the opinion that the summer terms will soon be boasting the largest enrollment of any of the quarters.

Particularly stress was laid upon the plans of the college for the expansion and upon the request which will be laid before the coming session of the legislature for financial support throughout the coming biennium. No facts concerning the regents' plans were announced.

The college directors planned to leave for their homes late today and tonight. They were guests of the Home Economics department at a luncheon served at the college at noon.

## DeWitt Kicks Field Goal Saturday To Defeat McMurry Indians 3-0; Score Is Lowest Victory For Year

### Lassiter Makes Longest Run For Tech Without Any Interference; Ransom Walker Plays Good Defense

A thrilling field goal, by Chubby DeWitt, in the final quarter brought the Matadors a 3-0 victory over the McMurry Indians at Tech Field Saturday. The two teams had fought on even terms for the three preceding quarters. This score came in time to dispel what seemed to be another scoreless tie between the two teams. It was a rather listless game except for an occasional long run and a fumble now and then.

Both teams were unable to get their pet plays into working order. McMurry, heralded as a great passing machine, was able to complete only 10 passes and it went only 5 yards. Tech, on the other hand, was unable to gain consistently from any formation. It was largely a punting duel with Tech getting the best of it. McMurry averaged 29 yards on 9 punts and Tech averaged 32 on 10 punts. Both teams came within scoring distance several times during the first quarter only to fumble and lose the ball. Both teams fumbled to a pitiful degree. High school teams seldom do worse. Breaks came often with both teams unable to take advantage of them.

### Lassiter Makes Longest Run For Tech

Lassiter made the longest run for Tech when he circled left end for 30 yards without any interference. Aside from the line plunging of Woodriddle and Hill and the defen-

sive play of Percy Walker and Amel Payne, there was nothing about the work of Tech to write home about. The line yielded more to the thrusts of the Indian backs than it has in any game of the season with the possible exception of the Texas University game. In fact the Indians made nearly all of their yardage through the line. Only when under the shadow of its own goal posts did the line stiffen and show a semblance of its real self. It was anybody's ball game until the fourth quarter when DeWitt made the field goal. From then on the whole team came to life, outplaying the Indians for the first time during the game. Three first downs one after another came thick and fast. In fact one first down was made just before the game ended.

### Tech Holds Slight Advantage

In punting Tech held a slight advantage. In first downs Tech made 9 to 5 for McMurry. In penalties McMurry drew 50 yards to 25 for Tech. In total yardage Tech had a slight advantage. But Tech was able to make hardly any at all through the line till the last quarter. In direct contrast McMurry made nearly all of hers through the line.

The Matadors were expected to win by at least 12 or 14 points and to outplay the Indians from start to finish. It was expected to be the easiest game of the season for Tech. As it turned out it was the narrowest margin of victory for Tech during the season so far. It is easy to see that Tech was having an off day. And when a team is in the midst of a slump such as this anything can happen. It made for a good game so far as the fans were concerned, for, as has been stated before, it was anybody's game until the final quarter.

### THE GAME PLAY BY PLAY:

First Quarter.  
Tech wins the toss and chooses

to defend the south goal. Patterson kicks off to Walker on his 16 yard line. Walker returns the ball 20 yards. On the next play Tech fumbles the ball and McMurry covers on the Tech 32 yard line. Sidney Knowles tackled Thorpe after he had made a yard through the line. DeWitt threw Thorpe for a yard loss. McMurry tries a place kick but it is short and wide. It is Tech's ball on her own 20 yard line. Percy Walker tries left end but fails to gain. Parks broke through and threw Walker for a 2 yard loss. Brothens punts to Ledbetter on his own 45 yard line. Ledbetter returns 7 yards, before he was downed by Hempel. Patterson hits the line for 2 yards. Payne rushed Ledbetter for a 6 yard loss.

Patterson kicks to Walker who fumbles and McMurry recovers on Tech's 12 yard line. Hays through the line 1 yard. Payne again broke up a McMurry play, throwing Thorpe for a loss of yards. It is McMurry's ball on Tech's 14 yard line. Hays fumbles a pass and Brothens recovers. Percy Walker went through tackle for 5 yards. Walker fumbles and Miller recovers on Tech's 30 yard line. Patterson plowed right guard for 4 yards. Hays busted the line for 7 more, and a first down. Hays brushed left tackle for 11 yards and another first down, placing the ball on Tech's 6 yard line. Hays fumbles but recovers for a net loss of 2 yards. On Hays' fourth attempt he gets 1 yard over left tackle. Ledbetter fumbles and Percy Walker recovers 25 yards back of the line of scrimmage. Percy Walker is forced out of bounds after a gain of 19 yards. Hill tested center for 1 yard. Tech is penalized 5 yards for off-sides. It is third down. Brothens punts 35 yards to Ledbetter, who is downed in his tracks by Percy Walker. Thorpe circles left end for 5 yards. Patterson made 1 yard over DeWitt. Ledbetter punts 25 yards out of bounds to Tech's 45 yard line. Mitchell throws Buddy Brothens for a 2 yard loss. Score, McMurry 0, Tech 0.

### Second Quarter.

Percy Walker goes over right tackle for 2 yards. Hempel gets Ledbetter in his tracks, after he catches a Tech punt. Ledbetter punts 33 yards to Lassiter, who is downed in his tracks. A pass Percy Walker to Lassiter is grounded by Hays. Hill made 1 yard over left tackle. Hill plows center for 5 yards. Tech is penalized 5 yards for being off-side. On the fourth down Buddy Brothens punt is blocked. He recovers but as it is fourth down the ball goes over. Hays hits the line for 5 yards. Hill busts center wide open for 4 yards. Hays punts 2 more at the same place. Patterson hits it again for 3 yards. It is second down and 7 to go. McMurry is penalized 5 yards for being off-side. A pass is incomplete. McMurry passed 3 yards to Roberts, but his pass is grounded. The ball goes over. Brothens falls to Tech. Percy Walker goes over left tackle for 1 yard. McMurry's tackles are holding better than any part of the line. Brothens punts 25 yards to Hill, who returns 15. Hays fumbles and Percy Walker recovers. Percy falls to gain at tackle. Mitchell gets Brothens before he can gain. Levi Walker's punt is partly blocked but it carries 10 yards before Patterson catches it. McMurry is penalized 15 yards. Patterson fails to gain. A pass by Pool is incomplete. Patterson punts 37 yards to Lassiter. He is downed in his tracks, on his own 13 yard line. Woodriddle goes in for Hill and shows the boys a few tricks in plowing the line. He

hit center for 3 yards. He was not content with this and hit it again for 5. He discovered that those McMurry tackles were closed, so far as Tech plunges were concerned, as his mates had already found out. Levi Walker punts 45 yards to Issacs, who returns 5 before Carpenter tackled him. Pool stepped off 7 yards around left end. Hays hit tackle for 1 yard. Patterson punts 29 yards to Lassiter who is downed in his tracks. It is Tech's ball on her own 30 yard line. Woodriddle goes under left guard for 2 yards. Levi Walker gets 6 yards at left tackle. Percy storms center for 2 yards and a first down, as the gun end of the half. Score, McMurry 0, Tech 0.

### Third Quarter

Woodriddle kicks off to Seagall on his own 15 yard line. Seagall returns the ball 40 yards to Tech's 45 yard line. Pool added 13 around left end. McMurry is penalized 15 yards for unnecessary roughness. Percy Walker intercepts a pass on his own 35 yard line and returns it 5 yards. Levi Walker made 2 around left end. Woodriddle hit center for 7 yards. Woodriddle makes 3 more at center. A Tech play is smeared before it gets under way. A pass by Percy Walker is incomplete. Another is also incomplete but a McMurry man is roughing the pass receiver so the ball is retained by Tech, giving them another first down. Percy Walker brushed tackle for 5 yards. Woodriddle hits center for 3 and 2 yards respectively for another first down. Percy Walker brushed tackle for 4 yards. These McMurry tackles are weakening under the powerful thrusts of Walker and Woodriddle. Marr fumbles and loses 10 yards. A pass from his brother Percy to little brother Levi nets 18 yards and another first down. Percy Walker fails to gain. Brother Levi gets 1 through the line. A pass Percy to Walker to Marr is grounded. A place kick by DeWitt is blocked. It is McMurry's ball on her own 20 yard line. Pool plunged center for 2 yards. Thorpe does the same thing. Patterson punts 21 yards to Marr who returns 17 to McMurry's 45 yard line. Levi Walker punts 36 yards out of bounds on McMurry's 10 yard line. Seagall makes 1 yard around left end. Patterson kicks out of bounds to Tech's 48 yard line. McMurry is playing a defensive game. Percy Walker passes 10 yards to Woodriddle. Levi Walker brushes left tackle for 1 yard. He adds another through center. Percy Walker's pass is incomplete. Levi Walker punted out of bounds on the McMurry 2 yard line. Patterson punts 32 yards. The ball is touched by a McMurry man but he fails to hold it. A Tech man recovers. On the next Tech is penalized for pushing on the offense. It is Tech's ball on her own 40 yard line. Percy Walker passes to Woodriddle for 5 yards. Percy Walker again passes to Payne for 16 yards. Levi Walker loses 2 yards. A place kick from the toe of DeWitt soars over the goal post, for the first score of the game. Woodriddle kicks off to Hays on his own 20 yard line. Hays passed to Patterson, who in turn passed to Pool, who is McMurry's fast quarter. Pool returned the ball 10 yards. A pass is incomplete. Hill smashed the line for 3 yards. Patterson made 1 more. Patterson punts 32 yards. McMurry is penalized 15 yards for talking. Percy tries the line without success. Levi Walker loses 4 yards. He punts 30 yards to Patterson, who is tackled in his tracks. Seagall hits the line for 5 yards. Pool sidestepped his way for 4 more.

Patterson made the necessary yard for a first down. Pool circled the left end for a gain of 6 yards. Seagall fumbles but recovers for a 2 yard loss. Pool made this back by taking 2 yards off tackle. Patterson punts 40 yards to Lassiter, who returns the ball back 4. Satch Hill hits left tackle for 3. He takes 3 more through center. Lassiter makes the longest run of the evening when he gets away around right end for 20 yards. If he had had interference he might have crossed the goal line. Hill makes 1 at center. He makes 3 more at tackle. A pass Levi to Lassiter does not gain anything. Levi Walker punts 40 yards, over the McMurry goal line. The ball goes over to McMurry on her own 20 yard line. Ledbetter intercepts a McMurry pass on the 40 yard line. Hill tears through guard 6 yards. Percy rips out 4 at center, the gun ends the game. Score, McMurry 0, Tech 3.
