AG. PASSERS SPELL DOOM TO MATADORS

BRILLIANT AERIAL GAME GIVES THE FARMERS WIN

The highly touted Texas Aggies whipped an aerial victory over the Tech Matadors, here Friday, to win by a final score of 47-6. The Aggies were not, however, able to put the game on ice until they uncorked their tremendous aerial game, the Matadors holding the Biblemen to a count of 8-6 at the half. The game was played before eight thousand fans assembled in Lubbock for a view of the first Southwestern Conference team ever to invade West Texas.

The heralded Joel Hunt was as helpless as the remainder of his mates in the first frame, an unfortunate safety county for the Farmers' first points.

The slashing work of "Ox" Reed, captain of Tech's hopes, DeWitt and Vermillion kept the Aggies from scoring on at least three smashes against the Matadors, in the early part of the fracas.

The Tech forces made their way down the field and to a touchdown, which Fate decreed was to be their last, in the first quarter.

In the second, Joel Hunt, captain of the famed Aggie aggregation was able to slip over the first touchdown for the men from College Station.

Throughout the entire first half Tech was able to count on Nicklaus to bend the Aggie line and make from three to ten precious lines. Nicklaus hurled himself against Sprott, all southwestern right tackle in '26, time and time again for good gains until Coach Bible, thinking there were a few things he had not taught the afore-mentioned Sprott, called that gentleman from the play.

After the rest period the Aggies returned to the fray with an entirely new style of play. With their backs to the wind they were able to smash over a stellar exhibition of aerial work and were able to count four of their seven touchdowns in this session. Work of Sikes, Alsbrook and Hunt in the passing performance was well worth mention.

Walker was unable to produce as he has in the past but his remarkable defensive work blasted the hopes of many an aspirant to the Aggie Hall of Fame. Jennings, likewise, seemed to be all arms, often reaching an incredible distance to floor an enterprising Farmer.

Despite the un-wieldiness of the final score the Aggie bunch was kept constantly on their toes and the Matadors at no time assumed the air of helplessness.

First Quarter.

The Aggies won the toss and elected to defend the south goal. A strong wind from the south was sweeping over the field. Hunt kicks off, out of bounds, and the play was called back. Hunt kicked off to Wooldridge who made a nice return of 16 yards, being downed on his 32 yard line. A pass from Walker was intercepted by Pett for the Aggies, Aggie ball on their own 41 yard line. Conover hit right end for 25 yards. Hunt circled left end for 14 yards, down by Hamilton. Aggie ball on Tech 40 yard line. A pass, Hunt to Sikes, was completed for 25 yards. Alsabrook hit left tackle for six more. Hunt went around right end for six yards, stepping out of bounds. Alsabrook was stopped at left tackle with a 3 yard gain. Alsabrook crawled off left tackle for 3 more. Vermillion stopped Hunt at the line of scrimmage. The Tech line held Alsabrook on fourth down and the ball went over to Tech on the 5 yard line. A bad pass from center rolled, untouched, over the Tech goal line and gave the Aggies a safety. Score, A. and M. 2; Tech 0.

The ball was brought back in play on the 20 yard line, and Jennings punted 45 yards to Hunt, who fumbled, and was down on his 25 yard line. Conover mad 3 yards in two line plunges. Hunt circled the right wing for 5 yards. Hunt punted 25 yards, the ball being killed on the Tech 40 yard line. Nicklaus smashed left tackle for 5 yards. Nicklaus picked up a yard at right guard. Wooldridge punted 48 yards, out of bounds on the Aggie 6 yard line. Alsabrook hit left tackle for a yard. Hunt was thrown for a yard loss at left end. A pass, Hunt to Richter, was intercepted by Wooldridge on the Aggie 18 yard line. Nicklaus made a yard at left tackle. Nicklaus ripped the Aggie left guard for six yards. Nicklaus crashed left guard for 11 yards. On another line plunge Nicklaus made a touchdown.

Aggies made 1 yard through line. Hunt punted high, and the wind carried the ball back to the Aggie 22 yard line. Tech ball on the Aggie 22 yard line. Wooldridge hit left end for a gain but the ball came back and Tech got a 5 yard penalty, off side. Walker broke over right tackle for 6 yards. Aggies threw Wooldridge for a 6 yard loss. A pass, Walker to Nicklaus, was incomplete. A pass, Walker to White, was grounded, and

the ball went to A. and M. on her own 30 yard line.
