5,000 Exes Expected For Scheduled Activities

The 24th Homecoming celebration will officially begin for about 5,000 Tech exes at 2 p.m. Friday. Alumni and exes will register at this time and again Saturday morning in major campus buildings and downtown hotels. But a variety show by the Tech Veterans Club at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Union Ballroom will be the first event on the program. The show is directed by Odis Echols and Glen Cary and tickets are available through any member of the Tech Veterans group. Proceeds of the show will go to the Child Training Center for Mentally Retarded Children of Lubbock and the South Plains.

Parade Drawing Ends Tomorrow

Tomorrow at 5 p.m. is deadline for organizations to draw for positions in the annual Homecoming parade Saturday. Drawing may be done in the Student Council office. Float chairmen will meet Friday at 5 p.m. in the council office to receive numbers for their floats. Chairmen who do not draw for positions will have their floats placed at the discretion of the Homecoming committee, said Max Preston. He added that extra cars wishing to enter the parade must pick up maps and position in the Student Council office by Friday. The annual parade, which will begin at 10 a.m., will have 37 entries. Entries will be judged in three groups—beauty, humorous and descriptive. Winners will be announced at the Administration Building parking lot immediately following the parade. Trophies will be awarded during the half-time of the Homecoming game. See PARADE, Page 4

Ticket Sale for Houston Trip to End; Council Reports 'Lagging' Response

If you wish to take the special train to attend the official out-of-town game at Houston Nov. 21, you must buy your ticket before Friday.

Ticket sales are lagging and students are reminded by J. C. Chambers, Student Council president, that 180 tickets must be sold to insure the train.

Chambers added that if train trip fails this year the railroad probably will not make such an offer again.

Tickets sell for \$17 and include round-trip fare to Houston and admission to the game. The train will leave Lubbock 8 p.m. Friday, Nov. 20 and return Saturday night following the game.

A baggage car will be added to the train for those who wish to dance while enroute to Houston. Students will also have an opportunity to sight-see in Houston, following the game until 10 p.m., time of departure for the train.

"The Miser" the speech department's first fall production, will open at 8:15 Monday night in the Speech auditorium under direction of Ronald Schulz. The play will run through Nov. 14. Advance performances will be given by the cast Saturday and Sunday. Tech To Have Hard Job Saturday; Arizona Primed for Homecoming

With a 27-20 upset victory over the Mississippi State Maroons under their belts, the Raiders began preparations this week for the Homecoming tilt with the University of Arizona at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in Jones Stadium.

Tech's victory over the Maroons at Jackson, Miss., Saturday was more impressive than the final score indicates. The Raiders gained a total of 450 yards as compared to State's 177. The Maroons failed to reach Tech territory until the final play of the first half, and trailed in the fourth quarter 27-7.

Tech held the highly touted Jackie Parker to an average minus-three yards rushing.

Cats Hit Stride

But that game is history. Another problem faces the Raiders now—how to stop the fast improving Wildcats of Arizona. After a slow start this season the "Cats" hit their stride last week. While the Raiders were playing in Mississippi, Arizona knocked off the Buffs of West Texas 34-6. This is actually a more impressive score than the 40-14 win by Tech over West Texas since the Wildcats held the Buffs to one touchdown while Tech allowed two scores.

While Tech was able to stop Parker, Mississippi State's All-American candidate, the boys from Tucson boast another star that may prove harder to stop. He is

Tailback Kenny Cardella. Before the West Texas game, Cardella was ranked third in the nation in rushing offense with 534 yards net gain on 91 rushes.

The speedy 160-pound senior who received All-Border Conference honors last year may be higher than third in the nation now. He made 146 yards in 15 carries against the Buffs.

There's further proof that the Wildcats are not a one-man team. Bobby Fry, a returning letterman from the 1952-53 squad, will be at a starting wingback position. Glenn Bowers, 235-pound junior, will be at the center post. Both men will bear watching.

At Fall Strength

The Wildcats were hampered by injuries but appear to be at full strength for this game. Quarterback Barry Bleakley has recovered from the injury to solar plexus muscles received in the Marquette game and is expected to be in top form. Don Beasley, Wildcat fullback, who has seen only limited action since receiving a knee injury in the Colorado game, will start the Raiders.

Spoiling the Homecoming for the Raiders isn't Arizona's only reason for winning. Last year Tech beat the favored Wildcats, 19-14, in front of the home folks at Tucson.

Saturday will mark the third time that Arizona has been Tech's opponent in a Homecoming contest. The Wildcats, or Blue Brigade as they were called then,

eked out a 7-6 victory in 1935. In 1951, Tech slaughtered the Tucson boys 41-0.

Tech and Arizona are undefeated in conference play, both having disposed of WTSTC and New Mexico A&M. Tech also has a win over Texas Western to its credit.

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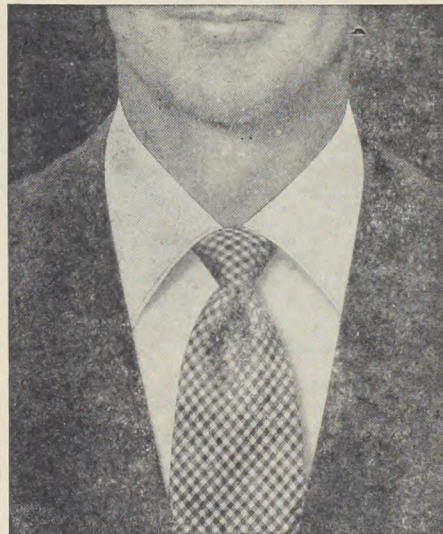
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Intramural Games Shut-Outs Prevail
