## World News ..... at a glance

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Senate, with a 48-45 roll-call vote, turned down an effort Tuesday to grant special income tax deductions to parents whose children are in college.

The Johnson administration scored a major victory in mustering sufficient forces to keep the controversial provision from being written into the \$11.6 billion tax-cut bill.

The final tally showed 26 Republicans and 19 Democrats favoring the proposal. They were outweighed by 43 Democrats and 5 Republicans.

After defeating that proposal by Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., the Senate also rejected with a 47-47 tie vote a proposal by Sen. Winston L. Prouty, R-Vt., to allow tax deductions for working students.

The debate on Ribicoff's proposal centered on whether the people who need such aid would be helped—or whether it would provide a bonanza for the wealthy.

Democratic leaders said the college tax credit would cost so much it would require Congress to cut back the individual tax rate deductions now in the bill — which the senate is not expected to change.

Another major argument against the amendment was that most of the savings would be wiped out by colleges increasing tuition charges in line with the tax credit.

**AMARILLO, Tex. (AP)** — A blizzard raged across portions of five Southwestern states Tuesday, whipping snowfalls of up to 22 inches into drifts nine feet high, paralyzing traffic and isolating scores of cities and towns.

Three deaths in New Mexico were blamed on the storm. A rescue team using a snowplow sought two men missing in the Texas Panhandle.

The storm, moving slowly eastward, continued unabated Tuesday in northeast New Mexico, southeast Colorado, the Texas Panhandle and western portions of Oklahoma and Kansas.

A record 22-inch snowfall covered Roswell, N.M., Tuesday. Search was hampered by drifts nine feet high.

**LONDON (AP)** — President Archbishop Makarios replied formally Tuesday to the British-American plan for a Western Alliance army to keep the peace on Cyprus.

It was made plain that President Makarios and his fellow leaders of the Greek Cypriot majority want the projected army linked in some way to the U.N. Security Council.

The U.S. and British governments specified in presenting the plan that the force—a detachment of about 10,000 to be recruited from members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization—would not and should not be answerable to the Security Council.

The sponsors opposed giving a voice on the future of the Mediterranean island to the Soviet Union, which has exercised its big power vote in the council 101 times, or to the African and Asian members of the council.

Makarios, an archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church, is under conflicting pressures in the crisis that broke out with bloody clashes in December between Greek Cypriots and the Turkish Cypriots — a minority making up about 20 per cent of the island nation's 600,000.

## — Sorry! No More Saving!

The Student Council last night "outlawed" the saving of seats at basketball games in the coliseum.

**COUNCIL MEMBERS** unanimously took the action following a lengthy discussion on the problem. The motion by Garland Weeks, Ag representative, allows the saving of single seats for dates only.

The motion also carried an amendment which provides for enforcement measures of the ruling if students do not voluntarily comply.

**RONNIE BOTKIN**, business manager, brought the problem before the Council by reading a letter-to-the-editor entitled "We Wuz Robbed" which appeared in the Tuesday edition of THE DAILY TOREADOR.

The letter gave an account of a Toreador reader who was denied a seat for the Texas game by several male "thieves" who were saving several rows of seats.

**MANY COUNCIL** members gave reports of similar occurrences of extensive seat saving. Lengthy discussion followed on how the Council could take any action. He said he had talked to Polk Robinson, athletic director, and was told that the authority rests solely with student government and that the Council could make any policy.

**ROBINSON WAS** also reported as saying that students have never been turned away from the games and up to the present could get in to see regardless of how late they arrived.

James Cole, vice president, proposed that the Council authorize the Saddle Tramps, men's spirit organization, to enforce the ruling.

Several objections to having an immediate policing force were raised while other representatives argued strongly for such measures.

Botkin said he didn't think the Council should place a policing

These will be presented Saturday at the 7 p.m. meeting.

The Texoma Province consists of all the colleges and universities in the state of Oklahoma and the northern portion of Texas. This is the second time for the convention to be hosted by Texas Tech.

## U. S. Embassy Bombed

**NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)** — Two sharp explosions rocked the U.S. Embassy Tuesday night, wrecking an office and slightly wounding a Marine guard.

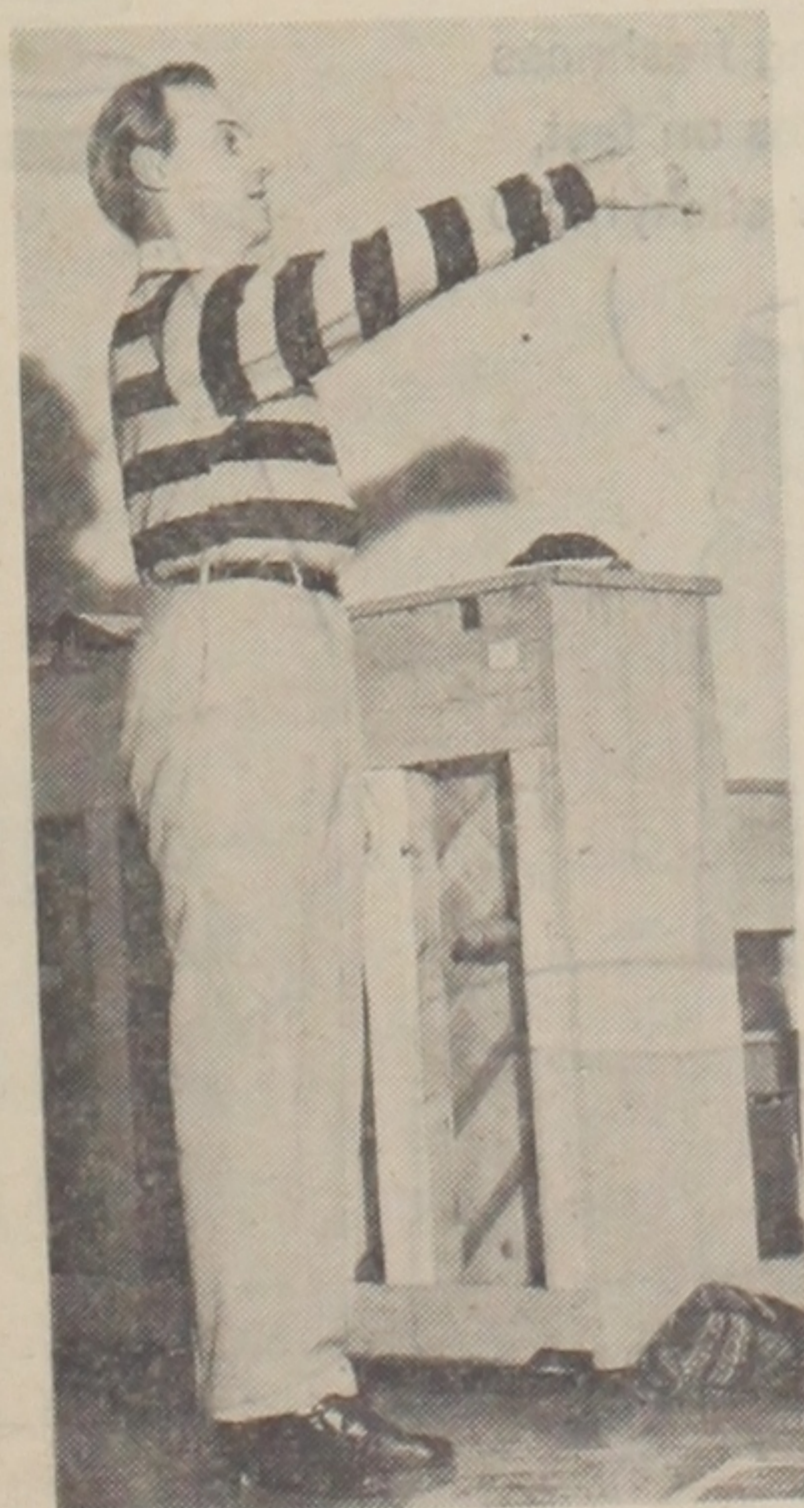
Reports to the State Department in Washington said the first blast was set off just outside the office of Ambassador Fraser Wilkins.

Witnesses said the explosions were caused by bombs.

They went off at two-minute intervals as anti-American sentiment mounted on this embattled Mediterranean island torn by conflict between its inhabitants of Greek and Turkish descent.



**WATCH YOUR STEP!**—Fernand Nault, ballet master of the American Ballet Theater, is shown as he instructs a group of students in the Women's Gym

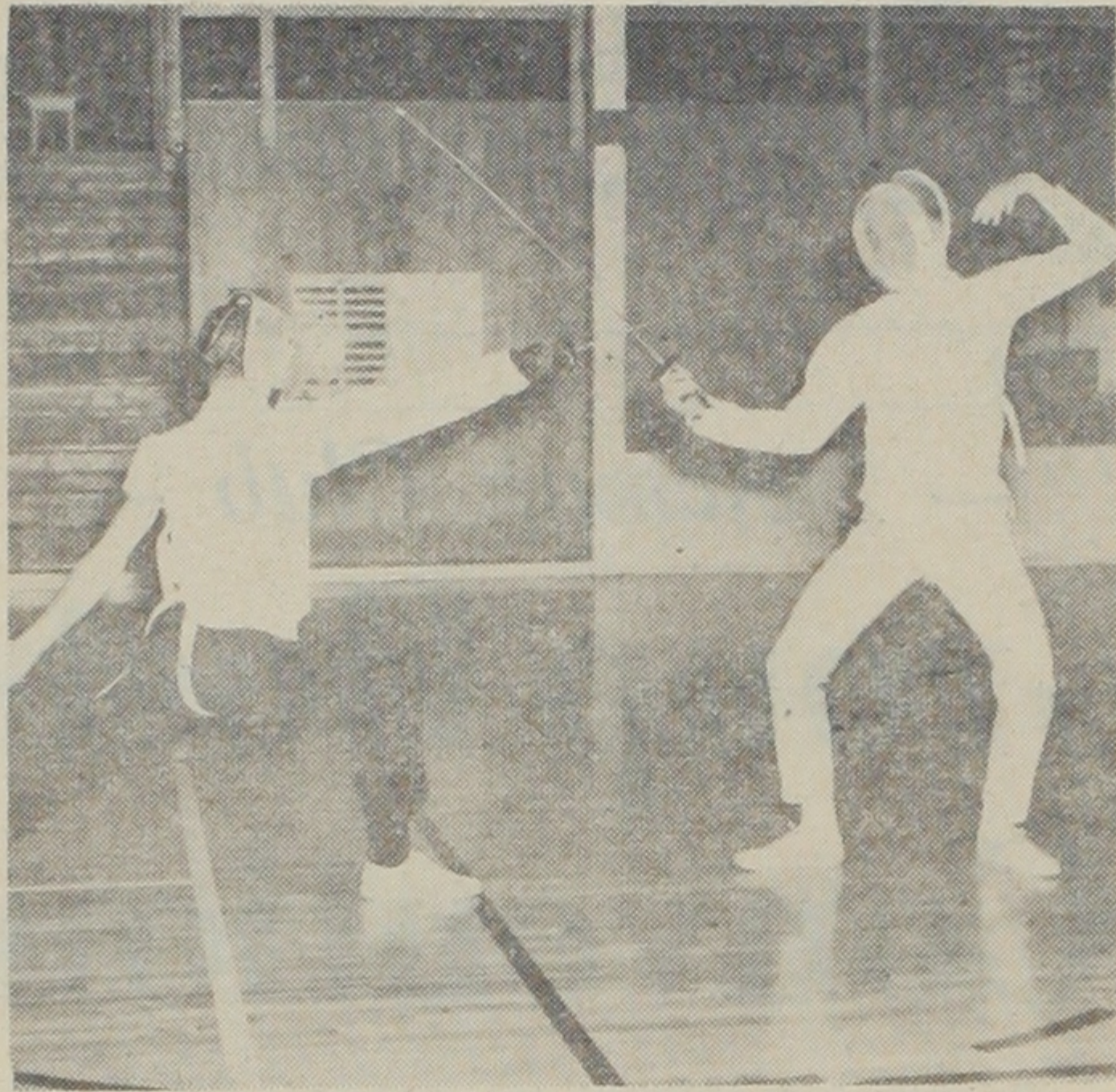

## Fencing Squad Newest College Team 'Knives' Way Into Conference Matches

This year the Texas Tech fencing team will seek its first Southwest Conference victory, participating in its first SWC meet.

Perhaps the most obscure athletic organization on campus, the Tech fencing team is a newly formed unit, spearheaded by a limited number of disciplined devotees to the sport.

Originating locally as an informal club, organized interest in fencing competition became a reality at Tech after successful coordination with the National Fencing League and other established fencing associations across the country.

### No College Financial Support

The Tech team has been gleaned this year from outstanding competitors in intramural competition. Recognized by the college as being "the Tech fencing team," but still in its beginning stages, the five man sword club is not sponsored by the college financially (except for equipment), but members of this nucleus group are willing to pay their own way to fencing meets in order to establish eventual support by the college.

According to one Tech fencer, Perry Langenstein, "We have to prove ourselves—if the team posts a good participating record, then we will gradually get school support. This is what we're pushing for."

Langenstein, fine arts major from Lubbock, was the intramural fencing champ for the fall semester, and is a member of the five-man first team.

### Competition Planned Outside SWC

Competition for the spring semester, he explains, is planned with other colleges, including tournaments outside the SWC. In the works are a spring vacation trip to the California Convention Tournament at Fresno; a meet in Tucson, Ariz., sponsored by that city and the State of Chihuahua, Mexico; exchange meets with the Air Force Academy; and SWC competition at Dallas, participating against Texas, Rice, A&M and SMU.

"The Air Force Academy exchange meets will give us experience for the SWC contest," stated Langenstein, "Actually, the Academy is helping us out—in fencing, they are ranked second in the nation. They'll smear us, but it'll be helpful."

"But even though we're a young team, we expect to post a good record at the SWC meet. The other teams have had far more training and experience, but we still have a chance of winning

the conference—a slim chance, but still a chance."

Langenstein was almost speaking with the romantic idealism characteristic of popular traditional heroes of the blade, in visualizing possible conquest over superior odds.

Fencing admittedly has a romantic appeal, but it has not caught on as a spectator sport because of its subtle maneuvers and the difficulty to detect excellent sword play from sheer slashing.

"Nevertheless," insists Langenstein, "fencing is probably one of the fastest games there is, and it holds great excitement in watching, especially when sabers are used."

### Fencing Not Exclusive Sport

He also refuted the myth that fencing is exclusive in selection of participants: "People think you have to be 'talented' like Douglas Fairbanks or Errol Flynn were, but this isn't true—anyone who is generally physically fit can learn to be a good fencer. It is not true either that fencing is for sissies—it is a very rugged, tiring game. Some say that to be a good fencer, one has to have the endurance of a gymnast, the agility of a dancer, and the mind of a chess player—thinking is very important, as well as physical stamina."

Swordsmanship declined with the invention of firearms and later the abolition of dueling in most countries.

### Glamor Still Maintained

Glamor is illegally maintained, however, in some places, particularly Heidelberg, Germany, where student groups have established dueling clubs of which saber dueling is a regular activity—the purpose not being to kill, but to wound, so that the resulting scar is worn as a badge of honor. This is a test of courage romanticized by the tradition of it, which is possibly the mere differentiation from the "hero code" of the American youngsters who seek proof of manhood through automobile "chicken runs" and knife fights.

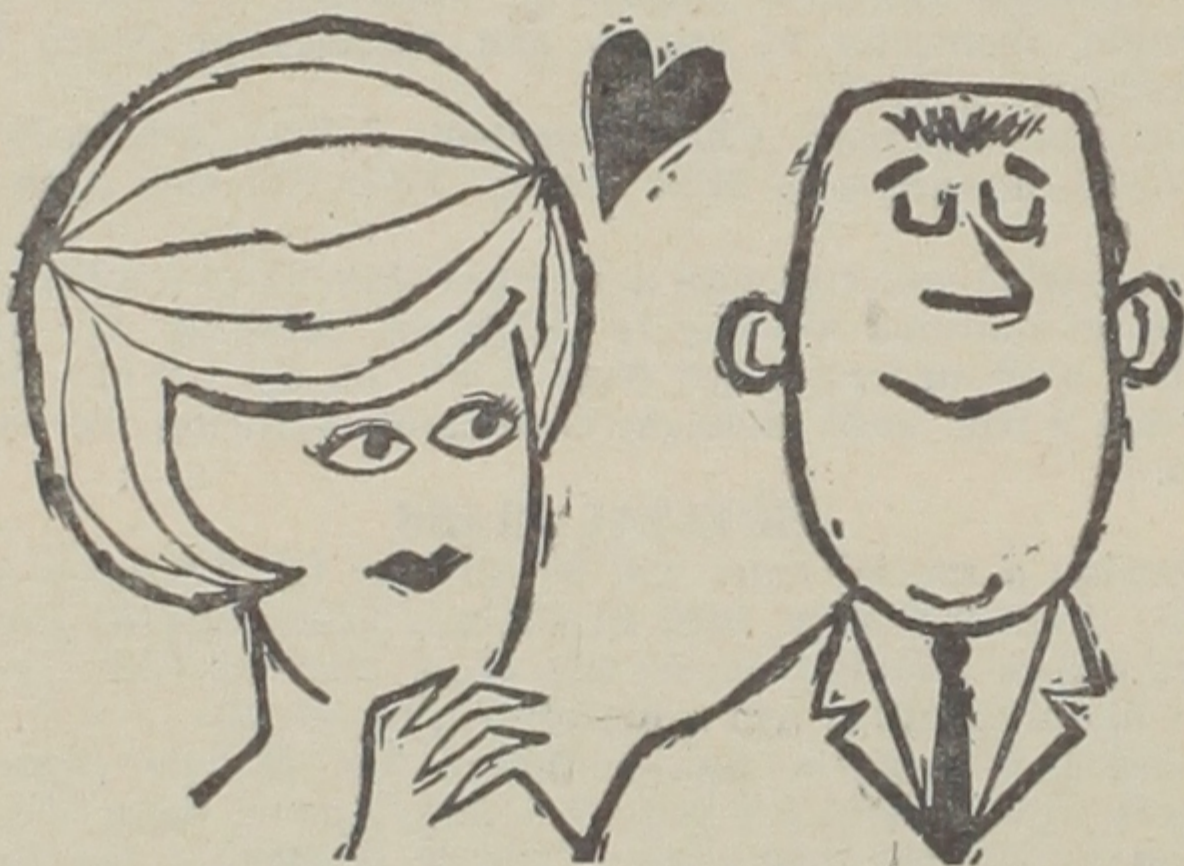
Regular fencing competition involves the use of three weapons: foil, epee, and saber. The foil was traditionally a practice tool substituted for the spee, which was used for actual dueling. The epee today is similar to the foil, but heavier, and the body target area in the epee game is greater.

### Saber Used To Slash, Thrust

The saber is utilized in a slashing motion, as well as the thrusting manner of foil and epee, and the body target area when played with saber is less than that of the epee but greater than that of the foil.

The Tech fencing team will maintain proficiency with all three weapons for competitive participation.

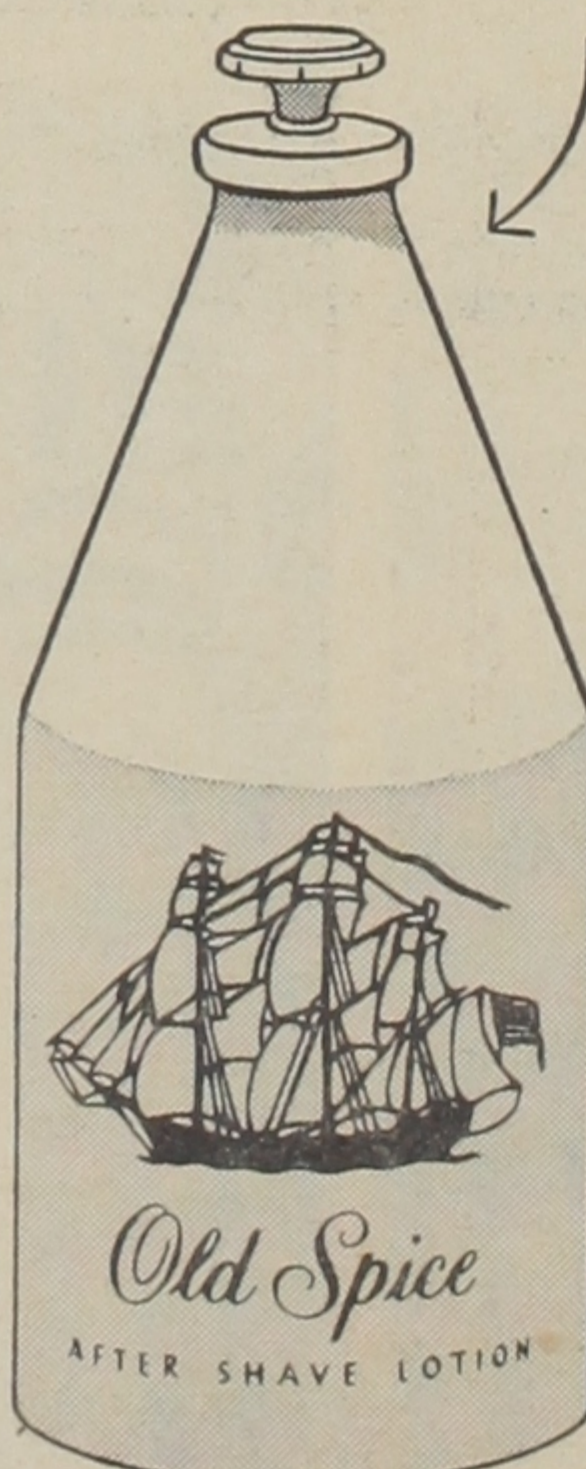

Aside from a short two point lead at the beginning of the game, the Horned Frogs were never able to pass the Raiders, although there was only a six point difference at the end of the first half.

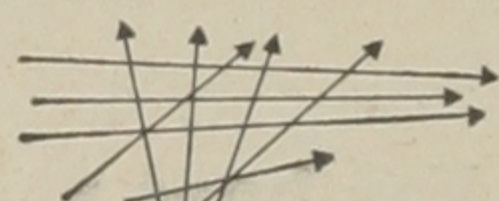

Coming up is Bob Measels of Seminole, currently a red-shirt.

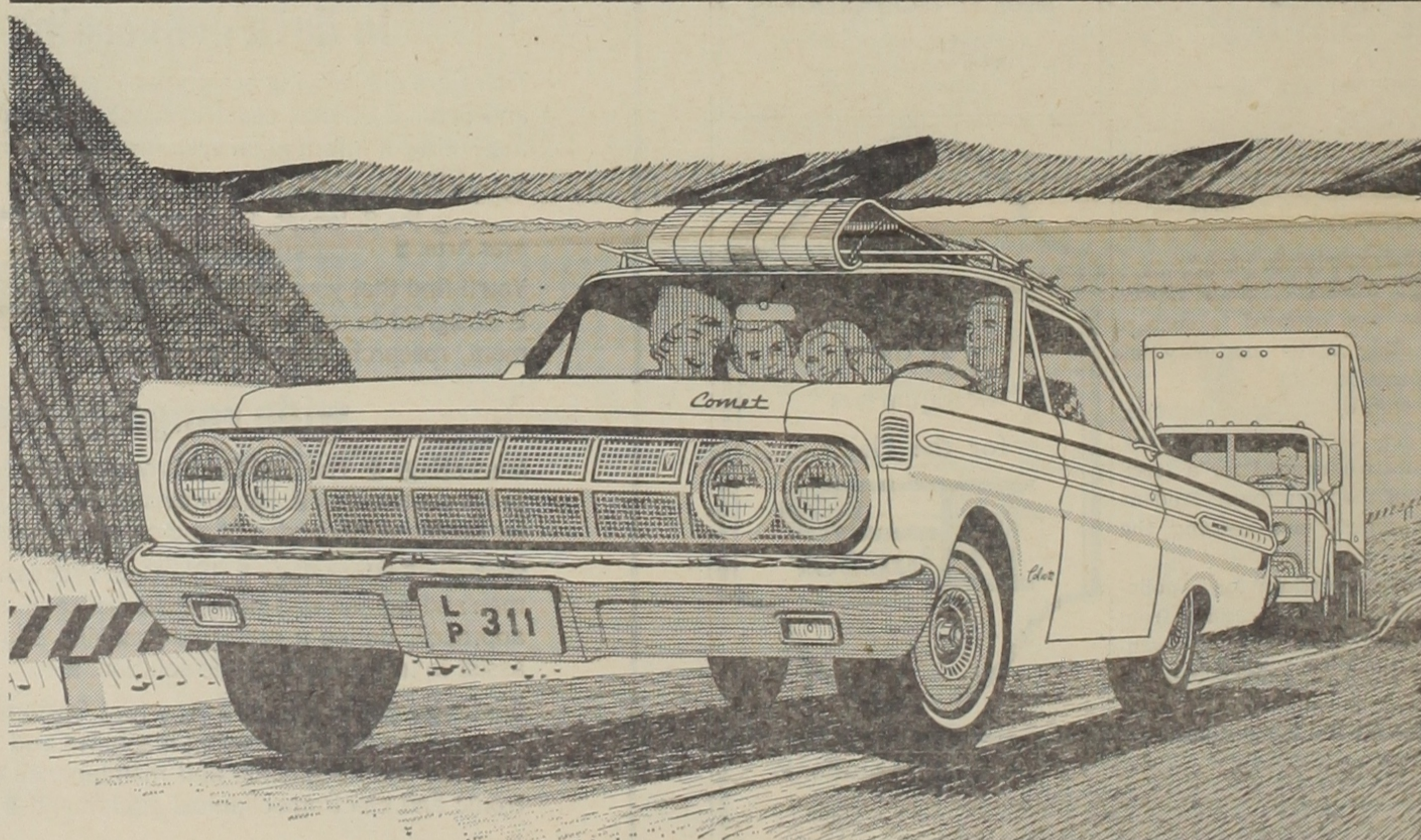
