

Editorial On the pop festival

In an attempt to clear the air about the pop festival, we can say with little doubt that there will indeed be a festival.

It seems as though it may take a miracle to pull it off with any success, however. For one thing it must compete with a similar festival the same weekend in Miami. Will most eager young American prefer Dickens, Tex., over Miami? Obviously, however, area people are more likely to stop at the West Texas version rather than go all the way to Miami. But, after all, you're not supposed to go to a pop festival just because it's close to a cool town.

Once you make it to the festival, your life may be in danger. Who knows what could happen at a pop festival—in West Texas, where all us Baptists love all our brothers except Blacks, Chicanos and hippies.

The area laid out for the festival apparently isn't too cool-unless you're crazy about rattlesnakes and sand pits. And, people, if it rains out there, the resulting mess will make Woodstock look like a plush resort

At any rate, when you get there, play it cool, because there will probably be more police in that county than dollars in Fort Knox. That brings up a matter that's really hard to deal with. What is the role of police at such a festival?

You know that there will probably be innumerable people illegally possessing drugs. You can't arrest all the offenders, and hope to pack them in the Dickens County jail.

On the other hand, if you allow the drugs to flow unchecked, you are knowingly letting the law be snubbed. However, the best policy is probably to keep the non-paying public away and try to deal medically with the bad trips and over doses — with little or nothing that can be done to prevent the presence and use of drugs.

One other thing. If you come back from the festival reveling in how well everyone got along under such adverse physical conditions - don't overdo it. Yes, it's a good sign that Man can indeed live together with greater harmony than at present. But don't kid yourself. Not everyone in the world will want to sit around listening to music for the rest of their lives.



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



Tech committee seeks new dean

Tech President Grover E. Murray has announced the appointment of an eight-man committee to develop and screen a list of nominees for a new dean of Agricultural Sciences.

Murray asked the committee to make a preliminary report no later than April 10. Dean of Agricultural Sciences Gerald W. Thomas has resigned to accept the presidency of New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, Aug. 1.

Dr. Robert L. Packard, professor of biology, will serve as chairman of the committee.

Other members are: Dr. James E. Osborn, associate professor of agricultural economics; Dr. James W. Kitchen, associate professor of park administration and horticulture; Dr. Joseph L. Schuster, chairman of the Department of Range and Wildlife Management.

Dr. T. L. Leach, chairman of the Department of Agricultural Education: Dr. Shiang P. Yang, chairman of the Food and Nutrition Department: Dr. Richard A. Dudek, chairman of the Industrial Engineering Department; and Dr. William Ford, associate professor of economics.

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
