Directors whose terms will expire this year are Eddie Hartman, Billie Guthrie and Coyita Bowker.

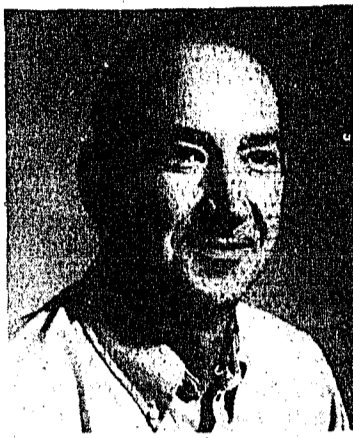
Other directors of the cemetery association are Thomas Hays, Carmen Donham, Barbara Simmons and Earlene Scott.

titled "Wavelets: An Application in Differential Equations" is based on work he completed in the summer of 1993 at the University of Texas at San Antonio as part of the National Science Foundation.

Guthrie is presently in Chicago, Illinois where he has received an appointment for the spring term at Argonne National Laboratory.

This project will be the development of a model for the evolution of sand ridges on the continental shelf and to assess the model's predictive power.

He is the son of Montie and Sandra Guthrie and will be a spring graduate from Tarleton State

University. Guthrie plans to attend graduate school in mathematics in the fall of 1994.

CCTC Schedules Equal Access Conversion To Begin Saturday

On Saturday, Jan. 22, 1994, Coleman County Telephone Cooperative will become an Equal Access Company.

Not long ago the customers in all exchanges served by Coleman County Telephone Cooperative, including Santa Anna, Mozelle, Lake Coleman, Burkett, Valera and Rockwood, received ballots allowing them the opportunity to choose a long distance company. The conversion to each customer's chosen

long distance company will take place at 12:00 a.m. (midnight) on Saturday, Jan. 22, 1994.

For the past few weeks the Cooperative has been in the process of installing and testing equipment for several different long distance carriers. The conversion is expected to go smoothly, with no interruption of long distance service. For the convenience of their customers, the business office will be open

Tom Hays Resigns From City Council; Wanda Campbell Appointed To Serve

The Santa Anna City Council accepted the resignation of Tom Hays at their regular meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 11. Hays cited health problems for his resignation.

Councilman Jim Spillman was appointed as temporary Mayor Pro-Tem, a position previously held by Hays.

The council made a motion to contact Wanda Campbell to fill the council vacancy left by Hays' resignation.

Montie Guthrie and Rod Musick, members of the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization presented the council with information regarding the Main Street Program. Guthrie stated that he felt the program should go hand-in-hand with the economic development. The Main Street Program selects five cities a year to take part in the program. If not selected, the city can be what is called a "self-initiated" main street city. The application for this program requires the City to pass a resolution to designate \$10,000 from the City funds per year for salary and operations. The salary would be for a main street coordinator. Funding would not start until Santa Anna was selected or the town was self-initiated. The Main Street Resolution and other items

pertaining to the main street program will be placed on next month's agenda.

The police report was reviewed and accepted by the council.

Tom Morgan of Lone Star Gas was presented to request an easement to lay a new pipeline across the landfill. He stated that the old easement was never placed on record. The new line would be laid approximately 20 foot north of the existing line. A motion was made to grant Lone Star Gas the easement for the purchase price that the City paid for it in 1987 or not less than \$500.00.

Tommy Jackson reported that the City was opening up Avenue D between South 3rd and South 5th Streets. It is believed that this will aid in water drainage in the area. This area has in the past had problems with standing water. There had been three main water line leaks for the month, two on the line from pump station into town and one on the Lake Brownwood line.

The council appointed Alys Pelton, City Secretary to check with Ken's Office Machines about a plain paper fax.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments is sponsoring a public used oil collection for local cities. The collection site for Santa Anna will be at the City Yard and

will be open 1/2 day per week. Tommy Jackson informed the council that the site has been prepared and ready for the container to be put in place.

The City of Bangs has given the City of Santa Anna their policy handbook as a guide to follow in preparing a Policy Guidelines for the City of Santa Anna. The city secretary and Tommy Jackson will be noting changes that will need to be made and will present this information at the next meeting.

Those present for the meeting were Councilpersons Danny Kellar, Emmitt Simmons, Jim Spillman and Karen Morris. Others present were Rod Musick and Montie Guthrie with the Santa Anna Historical Development Organization; Tommy Jackson, acting city superintendent; Carlos Torres, chief of police; Barbara Kingsbery, city judge; Alys Pelton, city secretary and Tom Morgan, Lone Star Gas.

SAHS Teams To Compete In Small Schools Academic Competition In Coleman Sunday

Santa Anna High School will be sending two teams to compete in the Sixth Annual Area 8 Small Schools Academic Competition to be held Sunday, Jan. 23, beginning at 2 p.m. in the Coleman High School Gym.

Those participating from Santa Anna will be Becky Simmons, Jill Weathers and Tai Musick as one team and Mitchell Guthrie, Bryce Ellis and Andrew Tidd as the other Santa Anna team.

Ten school districts in the area will be participating in the competition which make up a total of 20 teams. The students will vie for approximately \$10,000.00 in scholarship money. Other schools participating will be Ballinger, Bangs, Center Point, Coleman, Hondo, Novice, Paint Rock, Richland Springs and Winters.

Each team is composed of one "A" student, one "B" student and one "C" student. The school districts pay a \$500.00 entry fee for each team and this money makes up

the scholarship money to be divided among the top five teams.

The Texas Association of Community Schools sponsors the Small Schools Academic Competition and will sponsor the state competition which will be held Feb. 20, 1994 at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. There will be nine area meets throughout the state and the top five teams from each area competition will proceed to the state competition. Approximately \$22,500.00 will be awarded at the state competition.

The competition is open to the public.

School Board OKs Work To Be Done On Football Field

The Santa Anna School Board met on Jan. 13 in their regularly scheduled monthly meeting and authorized Supt. Jim McPherson to contract with Jim Crowder of Santa Anna for materials and labor to re-crown the football field. According to McPherson, the process will include about 25 to 30 loads of fill dirt at \$40 a load. Crowder will charge a maximum of \$1,200.00

and will donate any time and material over the amount if the job takes more fill than estimated.

The board considered the "ParentLink" program but took no action. Coleman County Telephone Cooperative Manager Danny Kellar will be present at the next regular meeting to explain the phone operation for the program which has already been implemented in Coleman schools.

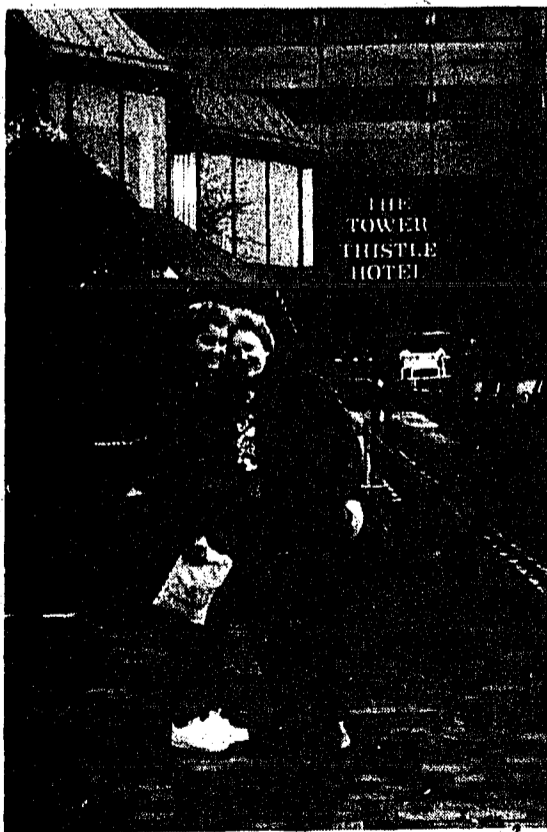
McPherson gave the superintendent's report on bank deposits, appraisal district reports, enrollment figures and update of the budget. He also advised the board that CAP school wants to include students from Santa Anna in a GED program if evaluation shows a diploma program doesn't benefit them.

The board evaluated the superintendent but took no action on a contract extension.

The board met again on Monday night, Jan. 17 to canvass votes of Saturday's special election to fill a board vacancy. Newly elected board member Clint Day received the oath of office following the canvassing procedure but did not participate in board action until papers are filed in Austin to verify his election to the post.

After some discussion the board authorized McPherson to start procedures for applying for an energy grant offered by the state.

An executive session was held to discuss personnel but no subsequent action was taken.

Four guests and twelve members of the Self Culture Club of Santa Anna met in the home of Mrs. Mae Blue Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 12. Hostesses were Mrs. Blue, Bettie Henderson and Polly Warnock. The topic for study was "World War II, Woman's Point of View."

Gale Brock, vice president, called the meeting to order, and members answered roll call with their memories of World War II. After roll call, Mrs. Rose Bass spoke to the club about her experiences as wife of an army sergeant during the war. Her husband, Sgt. Richard D. Bass, was in Temple Company, 36th Division of the US Army.

Some of the highlights of her address to the club were her recollections of living in a former plantation manor in Georgia, then moving to Cape Cod, Massachusetts. She said that her husband left a temperature of -20 degrees Fahrenheit at Cape Cod and landed in 120 degrees Fahrenheit in Africa. She showed copies of photographs of various military units, the church where Sgt. Bass was first taken when he was wounded in the Italian campaign, and a page of a letter.


After conclusion of the study program, refreshments of sandwiches, cookies and hot spiced punch were served to four guests and twelve members of the club, and then Betty Key, president, presided at a brief business session.

Thoughts From Our Pastors

Robert Stumpf Seventh Day Adventist Church

Almost twenty centuries ago the Son of the living God walked directly, into sin's most concentrated radiation and let it take His life.

The accumulated guilt of the ages released its deadly contamination over Calvary. And He whom made the atom permitted Himself to be nailed to the tower at ground zero; He allowed unfeeling men to trigger the cruel device we call the cross. But by that act, He broke the chain reaction. He broke the power of sin. And the people said, "He saved others; himself he cannot save."

Could it be that a tragic nuclear accident could help us understand?

It was May 21, 1946. The place - Los Alamos, New Mexico. A young and daring scientist was carrying out a necessary experiment in preparation for the atomic test to be conducted in the waters of the South Pacific at Bikini.

He had successfully performed such an experiment many times before. In his effort to determine the amount of U235 necessary for a chain reaction - scientists call it the critical mass - he would push two hemispheres of uranium toward each other.

Then, just as the mass became critical he would push them apart with his screwdriver, instantly stopping the chain reaction. But that day, just as the material became critical, the screwdriver slipped! The hemispheres of uranium came too close together.

Instantly the room was filled with a dazzling bluish haze. Young Louis Slotin tore the two hemispheres apart with his bare hands!

By this instant, self-forgetful daring, he saved the lives of the seven other persons in the room. He said to one of his colleagues a little later, as they waited for a car to take them to the hospital, "You'll come through all right. But I haven't the faintest chance myself."

It was only too true.

Nine days later he died in terrible agony.

Tell me. Did that nuclear accident demonstrate that now, since that accident, it is perfectly safe to fool around with hemispheres of uranium-even with our bare hands? Or did it demonstrate the deadliness of nuclear radiation?

And what of Calvary? Did it demonstrate that now, since the cross, it is safe to fool around with sin? Or does the fact that sin took the life of the Son of God demonstrate for all time the deadly nature of sin?

Mrs. Tom Rutherford

Along with all the other activities that keep her busy, Mrs. Tom (Alline) Rutherford, has written the Whon News for the two county newspapers for the past 52 years, beginning in June of 1941.

During those years she has seen many changes in Whon and in this entire area.

Alline was born in Brown County near Brookesmith but the family moved to what she calls "This part of the world" (the Whon area), when she was a small child. Her parents were Sammie and Bertha Smith Shields. She attended school at Whon and recalls when there were 4 teachers and 150 students. She fondly remembers her teachers were sisters, Learlee and Thelma Casey.

In 1932 she married Tom Rutherford in Mareta, Oklahoma. He was the son of George and Lula (Cooper) Rutherford of the Rockwood community and also attended the Whon school.

Mrs. Rutherford spoke of the time when Whon boasted of three stores, a blacksmith shop, laundry and barber shop and a gin which was operated by the late Ed Tisdale. It had two churches and a post office which was the last Whon business to close, that taking place about three years ago.

Alline was assistant postmaster there for 10 years retiring in 1978 and then served as substitute postmaster until the facility closed its doors forever.

She drove a school bus in the Whon School District for 4 years and then 19 years in the Santa Anna School District after the Whon school closed and the students transferred to Santa Anna. After delivering the



students to school she was not allowed to drive the bus back home until the after school route. Not wanting to shuttle a car back and forth she chose to stay in town and work during those hours. She was employed at various times at each of the three grocery stores here at that time. She also worked as a nurses aide at the hospital. She retired from the bus driving job at the end of the 1978 spring term spending her time after that helping her husband on the farm.

In May of 1984, Tom Rutherford died of a heart attack that struck him down while the couple was out checking cows and calves. She took over the operation of the farm with the assistance of their children, Thomas Ray, who lives in New Hampshire, Patsy June Smith of Abilene, Hilary of Coleman, Loyd who lives on the Taylor Ranch in the Trickham area and Linda Wheeler of LaGrange.

After her busy days are finished Alline relaxes with her crocheting, a hobby she picked up not wanting to be idle in the evenings. She shared some of her beautiful work with this writer, for which I am deeply grateful.

She enjoys a close-knit family that includes 10 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.

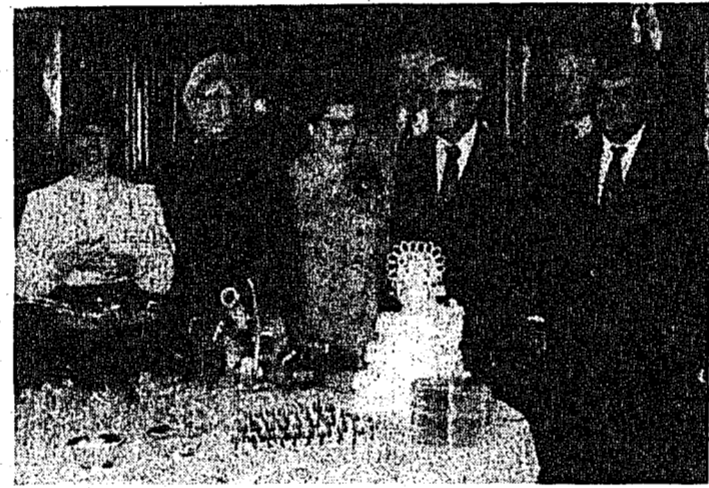

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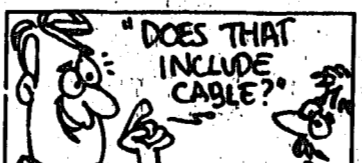
