The Board will operate a portable refreshment wagon for the Frontier Days festivities. Pepsi, tea and coffee will be sold.

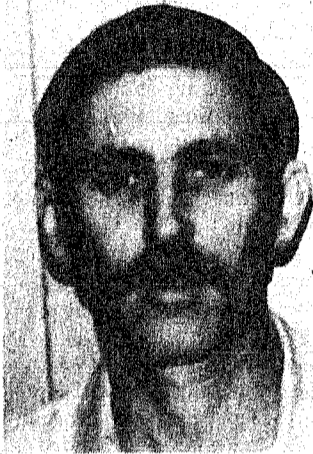

BROWNWOOD--The General Educational Development (GED) Test will be administered Saturday, April 6, at Howard Payne University, according to Marilyn Jackson, HPU Testing Director.

The test will begin at 8:30 a.m. in the first floor conference room of the Packer Administration Building. The fee is \$15.

The individuals to be tested must be at least 18 years of age and withdrawn from school. Seventeen-year-olds may be tested if parents provide written consent and if they bring proof of withdrawal from the last school attended.

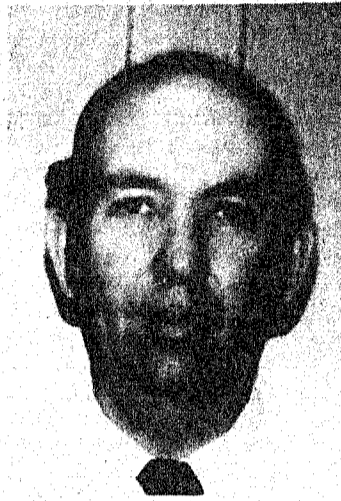
Photographic identification, such as a driver's license, is required. No one will be admitted without such identification.

Council grants rate hike to Lone Star Gas

A called meeting of the Santa Anna City Council and a special hearing on the Santa Anna City Budget was held at 6:30 p.m. on March 21 in the Mountain City Community Center. All members of the City Council as well as the Mayor were present.

Joyce Wilkerson, representing Lone Star Gas Co., appearing before the council for the third time, presented a proposal of an 8.84 per-

cent increase for city gas users. After much discussion, the council granted 75 percent of the request, which is a 6.63 percent increase. The new rates will be put into effect April 3, 1985.

In other action, the council denied the request of Montie Guthrie III, representing the Chamber of Commerce, to close North Second between Santa Fe and Wallis. The council opted instead to grant the closing on Second from Wallis to Avenue B for the May 4 Frontier Day Celebration.

Some items in the budget were returned for clarification. The budget will be re-presented at a later council meeting. There were no questions on the overall budget, but the form used was not thoroughly understood by those at the hearing.

Scholarships offered

Howard Payne University is offering scholarships for teachers during the summer sessions of 1985, according to Harold Preston, vice president for financial affairs at HPU.

"The scholarship amount will be \$155 per three-hour course," explained Preston.

The scholarship is to be awarded to active teachers only. "It is specifically for those teachers who are taking courses to satisfy recent legislative requirements," said Preston.

The applicant must plan to enroll for a minimum of three credit hours in any one session. The first summer session begins June 3; the second, July 11. Classes will meet Tuesday through Friday of each week.

The scholarship will not cover non-credit courses or courses taken for audit.

"Applicants must come by our office in the Packer Administration Building and complete the general scholarship application," added Preston.

The City Polling Place will be at the Santa Anna City Hall. Polls open at 7:00 a.m., and close at 7:00 p.m. The election Judge is Montie Guthrie III.

Sandy Hosch, the local cystic fibrosis chairman, presents a story on Shelly Mann. Mrs. Hosch works for Dr. Mann and has a special interest in this young lady.

Shelly Mann is 13 years old and an 8th grader at Big Spring, Texas. She is the daughter of Charles Mann and the granddaughter of Dr. and Mrs. Morris Mann and Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Jackson of Coleman.

Shelly has cystic fibrosis. At 9 months of age, she was hospitalized with pneumonia, and had very frequent respiratory infections. She had frequent diarrhea as well. The greatest hallmark sign of cystic fibrosis was her "salty kiss."

With an early diagnosis, Shelly's life style quickly became doctor oriented. She is more prone to illness and with each recurrence of infection, fewer and fewer drugs can cure each new illness. Each episode can give her increased lung damage. She undergoes daily breathing treatments, not only when she is sick, but when well. Cystic fibrosis treatment involves her whole family.

In addition to breathing exercises and treatment, Shelly must eat a diet with low or no fat. Her illness has required that she take extra enzymes since she was a baby.

Otherwise, Shelly is a normal, active teenager. She's been a Girl Scout and attends Girl Scout and cystic fibrosis summer camps every year. She enjoys shopping, swimming, exercising, and baseball. Recently, Shelly was inducted into the honor society.

Young ladies like Shelly used to die by the time they were 2 years old. Today, with research and improved medical treatments, half will live to be young adults.

Cystic fibrosis is an expensive disease: Our local Santa Anna Walkathon is Saturday, March 30. You see what your contribution can do. Sponsor a walker today so that others may breathe and live.

IRS tips

When you file your federal tax return, be sure to attach all supporting documents and schedules before mailing it, the IRS says.

Documents such as earning statements, schedules, statements verifying deductibles, or other pertinent information should be securely attached to the 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ. Taxpayers must include W-2

forms from all employers if they worked at more than one job, the IRS points out, regardless of the amount of earnings.

Missing documents cause processing errors and refund delays and can create confusion and inconvenience for the taxpayer, the IRS explained.

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Camporee

Pathfinders club members have the Rocky Mountains in their sights for the summer. They are preparing to be among at least 15,000 club members who will attend the first North American Pathfinder Camporee.

The week-long event begins July 31, and will be held at the U. S. Army 10th Mountain Division's former training site, Camp Hale, Colorado, about 100 miles west of Denver.

Pathfinder clubs are sponsored by local Seventh-day Adventist churches for children between ages 10 and 15. Although somewhat like Boy and Girl Scouting, Pathfinders give emphasis to spiritual activities.

Adult leaders and counselors are trained to work with youngsters in mutually-enjoyable activities which lead to trustworthy citizenship and steadfast church affiliation. These activities may include community service projects, camp trips, recreation, crafts, personal skills development and nature study.

To get to the Camporee, each Pathfinder and staff member must raise all their own funds to cover travel and other costs. We are seeking help from friends in the community, often through community service projects says, Stephen Burton, local club director.

"This will probably be the only time these kids can attend an event of this magnitude," he said. "So we're doing all we can to raise the funds they need for the trip."

Camp organizers have prepared an array of activities and events designed to keep the youngsters busy from dawn to dusk each day, Burton said. They will set up temporary utilities, lay out several "villages" and trails and conduct a variety of nature study, recreational and physical skills events.

"Theme of the Camporee is 'Adventures in Service', but the service comes before we go to the Camporee," Burton added. "We want our Pathfinders to realize that there are many ways to serve their community, their church, and their homes. They are learning that as they prepare for their trip to the Camporee."

We are called to splendor in self worth or significance. We are guilty sometimes of lamenting our unworthiness. But just look in a catalog of biology supply and you will see a different picture. Using the going rate of hemoglobin (\$2.95 per gram) and human DNA (\$7.65 per gram), the human body is worth about \$254 per gram of dry weight; a gram is 1/30th of an ounce. About 68 percent of the human body is water, so the average man of 170 pounds; given the formula of \$254 per gram, is worth about \$6,000,000!!! You are valuable. Not only are you valuable in a scientific picture, but as one great lady put it "God doesn't sponsor flops."

Texas trivia

More than 1,100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and scenic turnouts are located along the Texas highway system.

There are no toll facilities on any State-maintained highway in Texas.

Nearly 218 million vehicle miles are travelled on Texas highways on an average day.

The first Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus were established in 1936 to aid travelers planning to attend Centennial events and stimulate additional travel within the state. Today the department operates ten tourist bureaus at key entry points along State highways, the Judge Roy Bean visitor Center at Langtry, and the State Capitol Visitor Center in Austin.

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Texas highway field operations are under the direction of 24 district engineers. Each district includes from 10 to 15 counties and averages 2,600 miles of highways.

Keeping Texas Roadsides free of trash and litter cost taxpayers some \$22 million last year. Litter pickup costs have risen an average of 17 percent per year during the past five years.

The first construction undertaken by the Texas Highway Department was a 20-mile section of 16-foot wide highway between Falgoutias and Encino in Brooks County. Work began in October 1918 and was completed in June 1920.

In the late 1800s every able-bodied male was required to work on Texas roads a specified number of days each year. Today, highway construction and maintenance are the responsibility of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The first definite route of travel was established in 1691 when Domingo Teran de los Rios blazed El Camino Real from Monclova to the Spanish missions established among the Indians in East Texas.
