## The "Nine Teens" Win Second At State 4-H Contest Thursday

The Santa Anna 4-H singing group, the Nine Teens, were second place winners in the State 4-H Roundup contest at A & M University on Thursday of last week. The local group, winners of the county and district talent awards, were competing with

entries from the 11 other districts in the state.

Judged on a point system this year, the Santa Anna singers received 276 points, just two points below the winning entry from Hidalgo County. Third was a group from Montgomery County. Also for the first time, a cash award was given to the winners with \$100 being given to Coleman County for the 4-H recreational promotion.

Members of the group are Jimmy Benton, Roberta Barton, Jana Eubank, David Horner, Ricky Jones, Randy Long, Janice Martin, Mark Wagner and Sherrie McIver. Mrs. Gayla Hornell, Mrs. Terry McIver and Mrs. Richard Horner are sponsors of the singers and accompanied them on the trip. Ann Martin also accompanied the group.

Seven of the nine teenagers were members of the local 4-H singing group last year which also participated in the State 4-H Roundup.

Enroute home from College Station Friday the Santa Anna group stopped at Lake Belton for swimming and recreation.

Besides entering the local and district 4-H contests, the Nine Teens have performed at numerous programs and meetings during the past few months.

Other Coleman County entries at the Roundup also received honors. Ginger Rogers of Mozelle was a blue ribbon winner in the State 4-H Food Show, and Deborah Stephenson, also of Mozelle, won third in the speaking contest.

The Coleman County horse judging team, composed of Jay Davis, Jamie Hemphill, Kay Ryan and Kit Horne, placed 11th in their event.

## COUNCIL RAISES CITY TAX RATE LAST THURSDAY

At the regular monthly meeting of the Santa Anna City Council last Thursday night, members voted to raise the city tax rate from \$1.35 to \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation. The raise is for the 1971 taxes which will be paid beginning next October.

The small increase had been discussed for several years by city officials.

Only other business on the agenda at the Thursday night meeting was routine with minutes of the previous meeting read and approved and the bills and accounts for the past month approved for payment.

A resolution was passed by the Council that all purchases for the city in an amount over \$50 must have approval of the Mayor or the City Superintendent.

The next meeting of the Council will be held on Thursday, July 8.

## ANNUAL COWBOY CAMP MEETING TO BE HELD HERE JUNE 18-27

The annual Cowboy Camp Meeting, which starts Friday night, June 18, will be held for the fifth consecutive year northwest of Santa Anna, and plans for the meeting have been made by the sponsor, George Havens.

People from far and near will be attending the meeting which will end on June 27. Outstanding speakers will be on hand for the nightly services.

The Cowboy Camp Meeting is held at the Flying H Acres, located between Santa Anna and Coleman. For the ten days of the meeting, a giant tent is spread for the services. For historical interest a number of wagons, carriages and buggies are placed around the campsite. Many of the boys who attend from the Christain Corral Boys Ranch sleep in the wagons each night.

The camp has only items that are genuine and authentic. Even the old cook stoves under the cook tent are the wood-burning ones of the past. A new wagon added to the display this year is a genuine chuck wagon used by ranchers for many years along Delaware Creek south of Carlsbad, N.M. The well-preserved wagon was used in the John Wayne movie, "El Paso", and in the production of a number of films by the Standard Oil Co.

Chuck-wagon meals will be served at the camp meeting on Saturday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday nights. An interesting feature of the meeting will be the serving of barbecued buffalo on Tuesday night. Wednesday night there will be chili prepared by the well-known chef, Mr. Carl McGugan of Dallas. Supper will be served at 6:00 p.m.

After the main service, which will begin at 8:00 p.m. each evening under the large tent, the campers and those who wish to remain will gather around a fire and sing songs in an informal atmosphere. Bobby and Margie McMeans of New Brantels will be directing the singing and music.

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In Our Opinion

MAYBE WE SHOULD JOIN the revolution. A lot of people are ready, and for various reasons. Everything from school busing to taxes are stirring up more and more people every day.

In Austin, people from every part of town and every race are upset over the order from the Justice Department for them to bus students to achieve "racial balance." Some parents have gone so far as to say, "let them put us in jail, but we won't go along with such a stupid order!"

When we get right down to it, whose rights are they supposed to be protecting? If all people concerned don't want the busing, then the only ones whose rights are being followed, of maybe we should say whims, are those stpes in the HEW. It can't be anything but stupid to bus elementary school children across a city in order to make sure that all races are represented.

When are the people going to wake up to the fact that they are actually being persecuted by a group of wild-eyed liberal egg heads in Washington who think they know all the answers to every question and that the people don't know what is good for them. As for me, I'd rather make my own decisions.

So, let's join the revolution and see if they can jail the whole populace. Some of the screw balls are revolting and they seem to get away with plenty. Even if a few are jailed, they don't stay in jail long.

Not only is school busing causing an uproar, but taxes of all sorts are killing all desire of people to make a dime. It has gotten to where anyone who will work for a living not only supports himself, but he must assume the job of supporting someone else also. They can lay around and draw their government checks and watch color television, or go to a city or state paid park in the Cadillac, while the rest sweat for what they get and don't have time to take advantage of these tax-supported recreation facilities because they have to moonlight to make a living and pay taxes.

We had better wake up in droves and swamp Washington with protests before this thing gets so far out of hand that Russia will look like a "decadent capitalistic society."

Every day the Communist countries are becoming more capitalistic while we become more socialistic.

Get with it! Take the time to write to every senator and congressman you know. Let's flood our capitol with protests until they wake up to the fact that we are tired of being the fall-guy.

SENATOR TOWER'S NEWSLETTER this week supported the President's bill on revenue sharing. This is designed to return some tax money back to the states and other political subdivisions to help them operate more effectively and also to take some of these programs out of federal control. The theory is good, but the question comes in the back of our mind. How long would it be before this amount that is returned to the subdivisions is just added on to the present tax load?

It certainly is true that we need to free some of our programs from federal control. Every program that they have anything to do with ends up costing at least twice what it should because we have to have another bureau to administer it and these bureaus believe in spending plenty in administration. We have many to prove it.

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Austin — Legislature in regular session agreed to submit 14 more proposed constitutional amendments to voters in November, 1972.

Among major ones is HJR 61, which would authorize the 1973 Legislature to serve as a constitutional revision convention.

Two others (HJR 58 and HJR 95) would provide for raise in salaries of legislators (to \$8,400) and lieutenant governor and House speaker (to \$22,500).

Other amendments on the general election ballot in 1972 will be:

• SJR 1 — Providing four-year terms for governor and other statewide officials now limited to two-year terms.

• SJR 16 — Guaranteeing that no rights will be abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

• SJR 7 — Permitting local governments on popular vote to exempt \$3,000 of assessed value of resident homesteads of persons 65 or older from all ad valorem taxes.

• HJR 68 — Providing for advertising (twice) of proposed constitutional amendments in clear concise language in all legal newspapers in Texas.

• HJR — 35 Authorizing a tax exemption for disabled veterans and a partial exemption for partially-disabled veterans.

• HJR 57 — Permitting county commissioners to reduce the county permanent school fund and provide for payment of money to independent and common school districts on a per-scholastic basis.

• SJR 29 — Providing that state employees can serve on non-paying school boards and city governing bodies without forfeiting state pay.

• SJR 20 — Exempting soil and water conservation district directors from dual office-holding prohibitions.

• HJR 61 — Relating to rates of interest to be borne by bonds.

• HJR 41 — Requiring that justices of the peace be compensated on salary basis.

• HJR 31 — Abolishing Lamar County hospital district.

JOBLESS ROLL DROPS — Number of unemployed in the state decreased 6,000 during April to 181,000, Texas Employment Commission reports.

TEC said the jobless rate was only 3.8 per cent of the total labor force, thus the decline may signal a "possible end to the doldrums of the past year."

Mid-April figure was identical with December, 1970 and considered probably the lowest of the year.

Thirteen labor areas reported improvements. Austin enjoyed the lowest rate of unemployment in the state — 1.8 percent of labor force.

APPOINTMENTS — State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Cavert named William Skelton of Lubbock as a member of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. Senate confirmed the appointment.

Charles W. Horan Jr., Fort Worth, is the new chairman of Texas Tourist Development Board, succeeding John R. McCarty of Dallas. George Dillman of Dallas is vice-chairman.

Appointed branch pilots for Sabine Bar, Pass and Tributaries were Capt. James William Throgmorton of Groves and Capt. Daniel Joseph Bromley also of Groves. Governor Preston Smith asked the Senate's approval of the nominations.

LIQUOR TAX PASSED — Tax on liquor-by-the-drink passed in the first days of the special legislative session.

Measure (HB 3) will place a 10 percent gross receipts levy on sales and service of mixed drinks in bars and private clubs. Cities and counties each will get 15 per cent of the revenue collected within their boundaries.

Bill also boosted the tax on liquor from \$1.68 to \$2 a gallon and upped the wine gallonage tax depending on

strength of the wine.

Beer tax on July 1 will go up from \$4.30 to \$5 a barrel. This rate supercedes the \$6 a barrel ordered in the regular session omnibus tax bill (HB 730).

About \$28 million in new revenue for the next two years is expected from the bill.

COURTS SPEAK — Clark's discount house in Abilene cannot legally arrange with an allied concern (Sundaco Inc.) to offer Sunday sales in its store, State Supreme Court ruled.

High Court also reversed and sent back for a new trial a Dallas auto accident case where the jury returned two different verdicts as to which driver failed to yield the right-of-way.

Court of Criminal Appeals, reversing a Galena Park robbery by assault conviction, held that jurors are not qualified without expert advice to decide whether signature of a defendant is the same as that on criminal records.

A San Antonio man's claim that removal of a bullet from his back was an illegal search because the surgeon turned the slug over to a policeman was overruled by Court of Criminal Appeals.

AG OPINIONS — A called session of the Legislature cannot pass a legislative redistricting bill, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said in a recent opinion. Martin held that unionism must be accomplished by a five-member committee of state officials.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• Taxing authority of a junior college district is specified by the Texas Education Code, regardless of whether the board of trustees of the district is also board of trustees of the independent school district. If a separate board of trustees is created for the junior college district, it would have control and management of all district property but only such control over school district property as the district board agrees to.

• Alcoholic Beverage Commission has no authority or jurisdiction to regulate beer sales by vendors who sell from ship's chandlerage under U.S. Customs bond.

• State Treasurer will receive fines collected in district court for violation of the Texas Motor Carrier Act, and neither district attorney nor district clerk may retain a percentage.

• A bill providing for establishment of a schedule of abused drugs by rule of the State Board of Pharmacy and for dispensing of drugs is constitutional.

AIR PERMITS NECESSARY — A new law provides that any company to construct or modify a facility which may emit air contaminants must get a construction permit from the Air Control Board.

If a construction permit is granted, the facility must also have a permit to operate before going into actual operation.

Air Control Board will formulate procedures for implementation of the permit system.

MH-MR GRANTS APPROVED — Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation approved \$260,795 in supplemental grants for improving MH-finished Senatorial reapportionment.

MR facilities.

Grants went to Abilene Area MH-MR Board of trustees, \$34,581; Bell County, \$15,000; Dallas County, \$26,593; Lubbock County, \$10,000; Midland, \$13,176; Austin-Travis County, \$43,100; Galveston County, \$12,826; Brownwood, \$5,000; Nueces County, \$10,000 and Harris County, \$125,000.

SHORT SNORTS

Bureau of Outdoor Recreation has approved a \$296,150 grant for the development of Pedernales Falls State Park in Blanco County.

Alpine Independent School District has been cleared by the Texas Highway Department to acquire highway department property as site for a new high school.

State Industrial Commission officials are in Munich, Germany, to promote development of intranational trade for Texas.

Construction showed a seven per cent gain in April over March, five per cent of which was accounted for by residential building, reports University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

State economy and immediate prospects for significant recovery is described as "checkered" by the Bureau of Business Research, but encouraging indication must be weighed against "soft spots."

County Agent's News...

Although the rains were spotty and accompanied by some hail, they were welcome by all of us. The lawns should pick up as well. No matter how much you water yards and shrubs a lawn won't green up like it does after a rain. A rain with a lot of lightning and thunder, according to some crop specialists, pulls more nitrogen from the air, consequently, it is possible for some rains to do a lot more good than others.

Fruit tree owners, if you have any fruit left on your trees, you should be in a preventive spray program. You can include a fungicide and insecticide and control disease and insects. Sevin and wettable sulfur make a good combination. We have bulletins available giving the details.

## Santa Anna Artist Paints Toward Her 95th Birthday

After only 12 art lessons during her high school years, Mrs. Bessie Stewardson decided at the age of 70 to take up oil and pastel painting as a hobby.

By the time she was 93, Mrs. Stewardson — better known as Aunt Bessie — had painted more than 300 pictures.

Her art work has not only been prized by many who have received them as gifts, but she has sold paintings to people as far away as South America, Utah, Oregon, California and Illinois.

On August 23 Mrs. Stewardson will be 95 — and she is still going strong.

But long before she became one of the most noted artists in Central Texas, especially with landscapes and still life subjects, she was a busy person. Perhaps this can be attributed to the death of her parents when she was a small child.

She was born Sarah Elizabeth Munn at La Grange, east of Austin. Her mother died when she was three and a year later her father also died, leaving eight orphaned children.

The Munn children then moved to Burnet where, with the help of an older sister, they remained together as a family.

She graduated from Burnet High School in 1886 and moved to Coleman County the following year where she taught at Milligan school, located on Home Creek south of Santa Anna.

She became acquainted here with J. L. Stewardson, whose father had arrived in the United States from England in 1842 and later moved to the Williams Ranch in Brown County. They were married in 1899.

They made their home in the Shields community where their three children — Ted, Hardy and Lillian — were born.

As a wife and mother, Mrs. Stewardson says she was also "busy raising chickens, turkeys, fresh fruits and vegetables."

Her husband died in 1934 and then her sister, Miss Sallie Munn, lived with her some 10 years.

During these years, they crocheted about 50 bedspreads, a number of afghans "and fancy quilts too many to number." They were made for her children, grandchildren and friends.

After her sister's death, Mrs. Stewardson decided "it was really time to get busy." It was then she decided to resume her painting.

## Women Smokers

Women have more trouble quitting smoking than men do. Nobody knows why.

In fact, from 1955 to 1965 the percentage of adult male smokers decreased. More and more men kicked the habit. But the percentage of women smokers actually increased.

Today rates for both adult male and female smokers are tapering off. But a very high percentage of young women of child-bearing age quit but do not stick with it. They slip back into the tar and nicotine habit.

The results are alarming. Pregnant women who smoke one or two packs a day have significantly more stillbirths than women who don't smoke. In one study of 7,500 women, the incidence of spontaneous abortion and premature births was almost twice as great for smoking mothers compared to nonsmoking ones. Some researchers now also suspect that traces of nicotine found in the milk of mothers who smoke adversely affects the nursing infants.

Mothers who smoke set the pattern for their children, especially girls. The percentage of teenage girls who smoke is now nearly 40 percent, almost as high as that for boys who smoke. And smoking mothers may also damage the health of their young, nonsmoking children. Some studies show that rates of acute respiratory illness among nonsmoking children of parents who smoke at home are twice as high as for children of nonsmoking parents. The amount of smoke in the home may itself be related to increased illness. Cigarette smoke in closed places has some of the same effects on nonsmokers as on smokers. But on a decreased level.

Women who smoke spend 17 percent more days sick in bed each year on the average than nonsmoking women. They have three times the rate of chronic bronchitis and emphysema. And the number of women dying from these two diseases has doubled in the last decade.

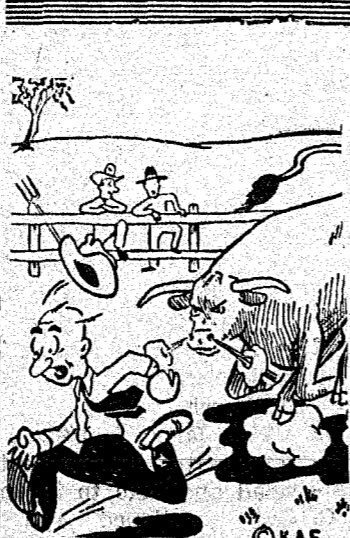

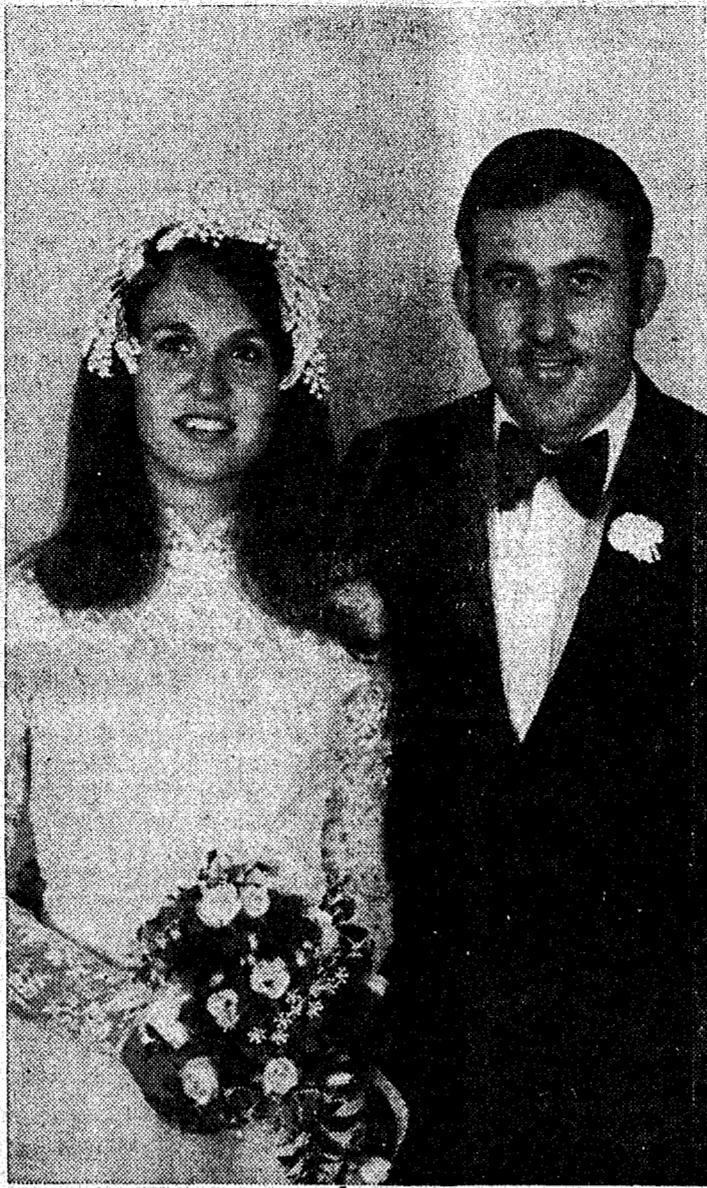

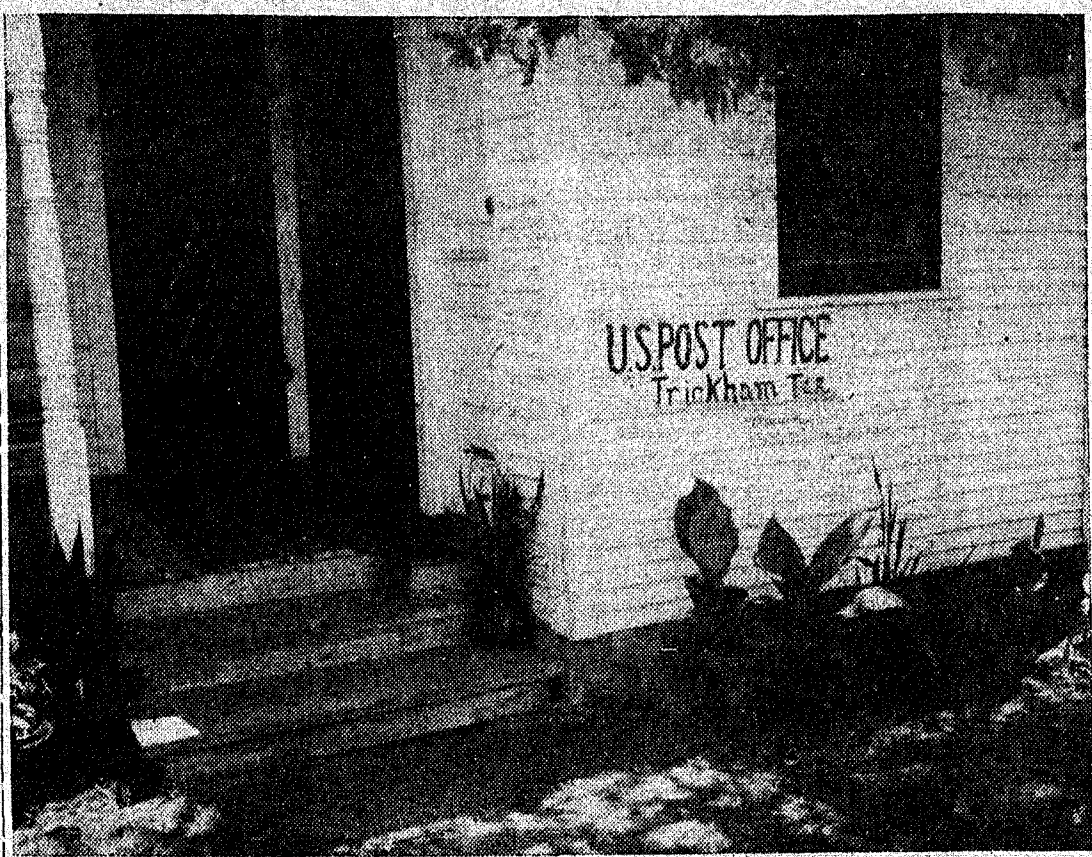

# Postal Service of 92 Years For Trickham Community

Trickham Post Office was established April 10, 1879, with Theron M. Tabor, the first postmaster, according to the National Archives and Records Service, Washington, D.C.

The post office was discontinued July 31, 1898 and since that time is a branch of the Santa Anna office.

Mrs. Minnie Wilson was appointed as clerk in charge by the Regional office in Dallas, August 4, 1958, and is still serving.

Postmasters listed by the Federal Records Service are: Theron M. Tabor — appointed April 10, 1879; Howard D. Walker, June 29, 1880; Charles H. Featherstone, March 21, 1881; Robert J. Bridges, January 30, 1883; William Hunter, December 26, 1883; W. H. Carr, December 8, 1885; Clarence W. Carr, November 24, 1888; Nancy G. Featherstone, June 1, 1893; Elsworth Henderson, July 31, 1894; Morgan J. Stacey, January 8, 1895; Lafayette E. Page, November 14, 1895; Mary E. Wilson, March 16, 1901; James H. Rodgers, October 6, 1911; Amanda F. Vollintine, January 27, 1914; Mrs. Lucy E. Drury, December 10, 1915; Roy L. Armstrong, January 12, 1922; Edward B. Featherstone, October 20, 1924; Minnie Laughlin, May 2, 1927; Henry L. Driskill, June 5, 1929; Elmer Glenn Haynes, September 1, 1930.

Different stories are told of the name of Trickham. It was sent to Washington "Trickem", due to jokes of the cowboys. It was called Tricum, too, according to the Coleman County records.

"March, 1876, the County Court ordered E. H. Fiveash Ranch on Mukewater, near Trickham, to be a smallpox hospital for that part of the County."

That was during the smallpox epidemic that hit the Fiveash family who had moved to the Mukewater Community in 1864. Mrs. Lucinda Fiveash died March 16, 1876 of small pox and her husband Enoch Fiveash, died a few days later, March 21. Other members of the family were ill but recovered. This was the beginning of the Fiveash Cemetery on the Fiveash

Ranch southwest of Trickham. The neighbors were so frightened they dug the graves but would not cover them. Mr. Fiveash was buried across the cemetery from his wife.

Trickham was the first town settled in the county, about the time Camp Colorado was established near the town of Whon, in 1856, by the Second Cavalry. It was on Mukewater (named for the Indian chief, Mukewaka, whose tribe ranged this area) in the southeast part of the county. First stores were on the creek, south of the present town, started for convenience of cattle drives, sometime in the late fifties.

The first settlers got their mail from Camp Colorado at first, but probably had a post office long before 1879. Bill Franks was first postmaster, according to Mrs. Gay in her book, "Into the Setting Sun." The post office has been moved many times, to many places of business or homes.

The 29 lock boxes are collector's items. They were

**ASC News . . .**

Producer certification is required before a producer receives his set-aside program payment. To certify, a farmer comes in to the County ASCS Office, designates his set-aside acreage on a photocopy of his farm, certifies his conserving base acreage and compliance with other program provisions. After certification, ASCS begins processing the data for that producer's farm program

payment. Also after certification his farm is subject to spot-check. Farmers should be sure planting operations which are affected by program provisions are completed before they certify, since no changes can be made after certification.

Producers have been notified by letter who have signed in the wheat and wheat and feed grain program to certify their feed grain and to report all other crops on the farm. June 16 is the final date to file a drought prevented planting form which will qualify the farm for feed grain payment.

June 15 is the final date to plant cotton under the program. If failure to plant was due to drought, the producer has 15 days in which to file under the drought program to protect the allotment and receive payment.

Once the planting and/or failure to plant due to drought is complete, it is to a producer's advantage to certify as early as possible. This will help assure receiving payment as soon as possible after July 1.

Due to the different deadline dates, it is necessary that the farmer make several visits to the ASCS office to complete his compliance with the various programs.

We would like to also emphasize the decision on early certification and the resulting early payment rests with each farmer. Those who are still undecided regarding crop dispositions and location and use of set-aside acreage have until August 1 to certify.

**What do you know about Trooping the Colour?**

**Do you know what a free port is?**

Many nations have ports where ships from other countries can unload goods for trade, storage, processing, or

transfer to another ship. Merchants who send their goods to the port of a foreign country usually pay a tariff, or tax, on their goods as soon as they are unloaded. However, some countries have free ports and others, like the United States, have foreign-trade zones. A free port may be an entire port city where merchants may unload their goods without paying a tax. In most instances it is a section of a port. As long as the goods remain in the free-port area, or foreign-trade zone, they cannot be taxed.

**What is "raptures of the deep"?**

"Raptures of the deep" is an illness related to caisson disease, or "the bends." It attacks people who breathe air under pressure, and it is a great danger to skin divers who go deep underwater, where the pressure is great. One fifth of the air we breathe is oxygen. Most of the rest is nitrogen, which is normally exhaled. High pressure, however, forces some nitrogen to be dissolved in the bloodstream. When nitrogen affects the nervous system, it makes the diver very silly, as if he were drunk. He may play with the fishes, take chances, or even forget to come up again. Many have drowned because of "raptures of the deep."

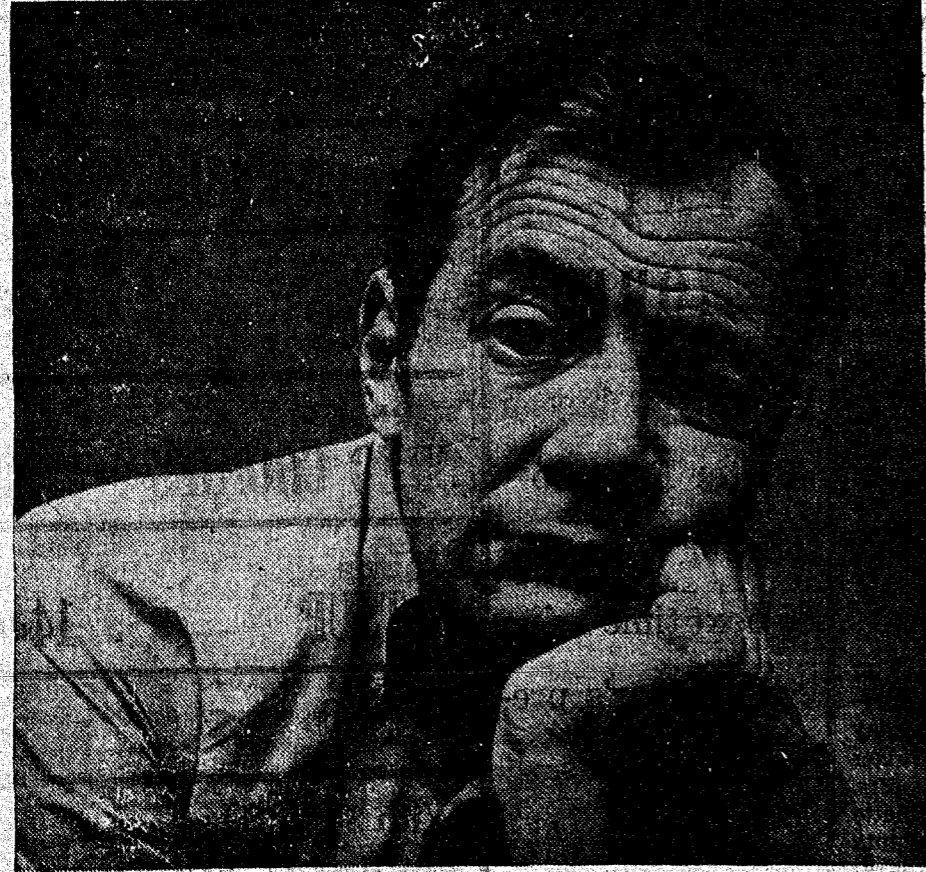

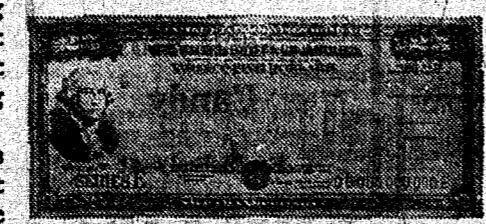

### Premium Cost For Medicare Will Increase

Because of increasing costs of medical services, Medicare's medical insurance premium will be increased from \$5.30 to \$5.60 per month effective July 1, 1971 according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Those who are enrolled in the medical insurance program and who receive social security, railroad retirement, or a federal civil service pension will simply continue to have the premium deducted from their checks. People not receiving one of these payments must pay their premiums direct.

Tuley said, "Even with the impending premium increase, Medicare's medical insurance is still considered a good buy for those age 65 and over. The federal government pays one-half the cost of this insurance from general tax revenues. Those covered by medical insurance will be receiving \$11.20 worth of insurance for \$5.60.

Medical insurance helps pay for a variety of necessary medical services including doctors bills, ambulance service, outpatient hospital treatment, and rental or purchase of durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs or hospital beds for use at home.

He stressed that the premium applies only to medical insurance. Hospital insurance, which pays for inpatient hospital service, is financed by social security payroll contributions.

#### Union Goof

When Mike was fired from his job as a mechanic, the company cited 'incompetence' as the reason. But Mike thought the real reason was prejudice. At his request, the union started the grievance machinery in motion.

Eventually, the arbitrator ruled against him. But Mike, still not satisfied, decided to file a damage suit against the union itself.

"They just didn't try hard enough," he argued in court. "At the arbitration hearing, the union representatives didn't even know the facts of my case. Furthermore, they forgot to tell me the date of the hearing, so I wasn't even there. They also forgot to keep record of proceedings."

The court decided that the union had indeed fallen down on its job and would have to pay damages to Mike. The judge said a union must show reasonable diligence in standing up for the rights of its members.

Most courts agree however, that does not mean a union is liable every time a member's grievance is turned down. As a practical matter, the law gives a union considerable leeway in deciding how to handle a particular grievance.

Another case, involving a discharged welder, the union flatly refused to ask for arbitration at all. When the man took the matter to court, the union pointed out that he had repeatedly failed to show up for work.

Thereupon, the court held that the union was exercising a legitimate discretion in not putting up a fight. A union that pushes weak grievances, said the court, would soon lose its effectiveness in pushing a strong grievance.

Furthermore, a union may even be justified in favoring one group of members at the expense of another. Thus: Two companies merged, raising the question of job seniority among their respective employees. Negotiating with management, the union worked out a compromise that left some men out of work. Could these men hold the union liable for "failing to represent" their interests?

No, said a court, so long as the union had acted in good faith. The judge said: "The complete satisfaction of all who are represented is hardly to be expected."
