VFD To Make Fire Pails For Local People

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department is undertaking a new project for Santa Anna and the surrounding communities. *They will make "fire pails" for distribution to all in the area who wish to have them. The fire pails are emergency fire extinguishers to be kept in the

The inexpensive fire extinuisher is a one-pound corfee can of ordinary baking soda, properly labeled and with instructions for use for cooking fires, electrical fires and liquid fires. Also on the bright red label will be the telephone numbers of the fire department, deputy sheriff, ambulance and doctor.

Anyone wishing to have one of the free fire pails is asked to take an empty onepound coffee can with plastic lid to the West Texas Utilities Co. office. Any extra cans will, be appreciated if you have them.

The new project is one of the many services rendered by the active VFD organization.

District Director Albert G. Vaughan of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month.

Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this Born Retta McDaniel in requirement: 1. Accredited Brown County on October 25, Diplomats, and 2. Persons ac-

WELFARE PROBLEMS GROWING Warning that next two years, Governor

At the same time, the Governor announced appointment of former U.S. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Wilbur Cohen as a special advisor to help him formulate plans in the areas of welfare and child development.

Smith said he will go before the U.S. Senate finance committee next month to renew a plea for complete federalization of welfare program financing.

Current assistance levels can be maintained within the state's \$80 million constitutional ceiling for major categorical welfare programs the rest of this fiscal year. After next September, however, he said average aid to families with dependent children grants may have to be slashed from \$116.66 a month to \$77.

Smith assigned top priority to attacking the growing welfare problem, which he estimated will cost \$325 million next year. He said findings of a new commission on children






